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### STATE KEEPS ITS MONOPOLY ON BASEBALL

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 2.—Albert Fielding Lang, Florida's "baseball ambassador," is in the zenith of his glory. He has almost succeeded in the achievement of his purpose of 24 years, that of corraling all major league baseball clubs for Spring training in the sunshine commonwealth.

Twenty-two organized clubs will work out their regulars and "rookies" throughout Florida through March, including eleven major leaguers, six from the National and five from the American circuits, six International league clubs, two American Association and three Southern Association.

Two major league outfits will train in St. Petersburg, the Boston Braves returning for their fourth consecutive season and the New York Yankees for their ninth, the longest for any club at any training camp.

**Profit to State**

It is estimated that a half million dollars will be expended by the 22 clubs in conditioning their players, on the basis of \$30,000 for each of the majors and \$15,000 for each of the minor leaguers. Club owners expect to salvage part of training through the state and over the south enroute home for league openings. This city is regarded by club owners as the best "gate" community in the training sector.

The possessor of this achievement is now employed at the Old-Fashioned National Bank of Bluffton. He is Robert Cummins, who starred in a local high school and later on Indiana University's basketball team.

Edwin Bolton, present operator of a store at Sturgis, Mich., another forward on the aggressive team, accounted for 40 points that memorable evening.

The other three basketweavers of the team were Earl (Red) Moorman, later an I. U. football star; Ernest Shoemaker, now employed in the offices of the Indiana Service Corporation at Indianapolis, and Ralph Humbert, of Huntington, Ind.

### BRITISH OPEN DRIVE FOR GREATER MOVIE SALES IN UNITED STATES

LONDON, March 2.—Because of the splendid reception and the enthusiastic praise accorded British made pictures by American moviegoers, production chiefs of Electra, Islington and Shepherd's are looking forward to even keener interest and support in 1935. Many Hollywood names of stellar importance have been cast for leading roles. Claude Rains, Clive Brook, Fay Wray, Madeleine Carroll and Jane Baxter are among those already lined up for new pictures while negotiations are under way for many others.

Film units are working on the new schedules at full blast, studio officials in Britain remaining firm in their belief that the movie-going public primarily is interested in the merits and distinction of a film rather than in its birthplace. No matter where a picture is made, they feel, it receives first-rate support if its standard of entertainment and its story value are noteworthy.

Word in particular comes from the GB studios at Shepherd's Bush, London, listing an important array of pictures which will be released by GB in America as its second group for this season. The group includes two musicals, "My Heart Is Calling" and "My Song For You," starring Jan Kiepura, the famous operatic tenor, and featuring the well known comedian, Sonnie Hale. "The Dictator" with Clive Brook and Madeleine Carroll has been completed under the direction of Victor Caville.

"Man of Aran," the saga of the sea directed by Robert Flaherty, which won the Mussolini Cup, was awarded the honor of being judged the "best film of 1934" by the National Board of Review, and is now in its 20th week at the Westminster Theater. It is also one of this second group. "Man of Aran" has

already been released in key spots throughout the country and has been breaking records wherever it is shown.

"Lover Divine" starring Hans Jaray, Helen Chandler and Maria Eggerth is another musical romance scheduled for early release. George Arliss begins work on his second GB picture as yet untitled, in the spring, while Conrad Veidt is soon to start filming his next, which may be "The Tunnel."

"My Heart Is Calling" was previewed at the Waldorf Astoria recently by the National Plant, Flower and Fruit Guild with Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt as Honorary Patroness and Mrs. Frank N. Doubleday in charge of arrangements. Jan Kiepura, who at the age of thirty has achieved international fame in the great capitals of the world, sings several modern numbers especially composed for this film. "My Heart Is Calling" and a waltz, "You, Me and Love," to which Maria Eggerth dances in a mirror-lined ball room. "My Song For You," Kiepura's second picture, is a musical romance with the irrepressible Sonnie Hale contributing the comedy while Kiepura sings arias from "Aida" and two new numbers.

HOT SPRING, Ark.—Starting at the bottom in Cincinnati, Charley Dresen apparently made up his mind to let the players grow with the club.

The infielders Dresen intends to start average 23 years of age. Johnny Mize, Billy Myers, and Lew Riggs are fugitives from the St. Louis Cardinal chain gang. Alex Kampouris, whom General Manager Larry MacPhail hopes will become the idol of the coffee pots, is a product of Sacramento.

Mize, Myers, and Kampouris come with fancy price tags. The Reds paid the Cardinals' Rochester subsidiary \$55,000 for Mize, whose average of .339 prompted keen judges to call him the greatest hitter in the minors in 1934. It is said that only a long-range hitting first baseman like Ripper Collins could keep Mize, a 6-foot 3-inch Georgian weighing 195 pounds, out of the Cardinal lineup. Mize hits left and throws right.

Myers and Riggs did their part in winning the American Association pennant and gaining victory for Columbus in the little world series.

New York paid the Double A Red Birds \$30,000 for Myers, who was slated to perform at shortstop for the Giants until the experienced Dick Bartell was obtained from the Phillies. With the acquisition of Bartell, Bill Terry shipped Myers to the Reds in exchange for Pitcher Allyn Stout and Mark Koenig, whom the Giant strategist figures will come in handy as a jack-of-all-trades.

### BAYLOR TRACK AND BASEBALL TEAMS DRILL

WACO, March 2.—With the close of the winter football training camp, and the imminent close of the basketball season, Baylor university is beginning to turn its attention to track and baseball. In fact, most of the infielders and a good sprinkling of outfielders are warming up every afternoon now, but the pitchers, and a few other candidates will not be present until after the last basketball game.

Coaches Morley Jennings and Botchey Koch were fairly well pleased with the showing and progress made by the football candidates in the thirty day period of training. According to the material on hand, Baylor will be stronger in every department of the game next year, particularly in the tackle and guard posts.

A strong array of backfield material, with a wealth of talent in blocking, tackling, and handling the ball, gives promise that the 1935 Bruin team will be in a position to give all its conference rivals a lot of trouble.

There are a number of exceedingly promising youngsters up from last fall's freshman team, and a group of junior college transfers who will also be present for the first time at varsity training. The growth of material may be said to be fairly broken.

The basketball squad has far surpassed the hopes of most of the fans here, winning four conference games. This is a direct tribute to the coaching of Ralph Wolf, and to the fighting spirit of the men. The material was extremely mediocre, and predictions that the Bears would not win a game were as plentiful as they were wrong.

### TWO AMERICAN HORSES ARE AMONG FAVORITES IN GRAND NATIONAL

LONDON, March 2.—The Grand National Steeplechase has definitely developed into an Anglo-American tussle.

The three outstanding contenders in the world's greatest jumping race, to be run at Aintree, Liverpool, March 29, are:

Dorothy Paget's Golden Miller, (British)

J. H. "Jock" Whitney's Thomond II (American)

J. B. Snow's Delaneige, (American)

These three are now quoted at odds of 5-1, 7-1, and 14-1, respectively, and they are likely to keep that order, if not those prices, until the day of the race.

With the weights announced and the first acceptances made, it is possible to look the field over as it will probably start. There are now 47 possible starters out of an entry of 60.

Golden Miller, as last year's winner in the record time of 9:20 2-5 for the 4 1-2 mile course, was always the most fancied of the field. But when the weights were announced Thomond II and Delaneige were so liberally treated that they immediately jumped to the fore as Golden Miller's most dangerous rivals.

The problem for the backer is this. Can Golden Miller carry the top weight of 175 pounds over all

those perilous jumps, and still finish in front of Thomond II, 167 pounds, which is second highest weight, and Delaneige, 156 pounds.

In the last 50 years of the history of the race only five horses have won under such a load as 175 pounds.

On paper Delaneige is the better of the two American-owned mounts. His stable expected him to get 160 pounds, and they are delightedly surprised that he has four pounds less to carry than last year.

Barring the accidents which must always be taken into account in such a risky race, there is only last year's performance to go on. The order then was:

Golden Miller, 170 lbs. .... 1

Delaneige, 160 lbs. .... 2

Thomond II, 172 lbs. .... 4

Won by 5 lghs; 5 lghs. between 2nd and 3rd.

The difference in the weighing this year makes it an obviously better thing for Delaneige and Thomond II, and the reason why the latter is at present at a shorter price than Snow's horse is that Thomond is a vastly improved animal since March, 1934. The only trouble is a report that 4 1-2 miles is too far for him.

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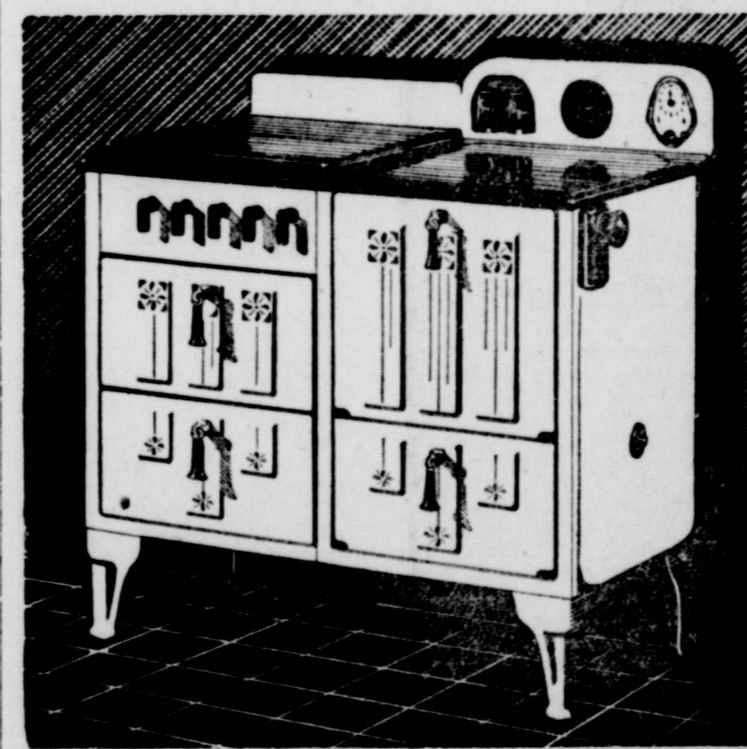

**FLIGHT FIRST LINK IN NEW AIR NETWORK**

THE HAGUE, March 2— South America has been brought one link closer to the European aerial network by the flight of the K. L. M. machine "Snip" from Holland to Paramaribo in December in the opinion of Albert Plesman, managing director of the W. L. M., or Royal Dutch airlines.

In an interview with the United Press Plesman said "Our Successful flight from Holland to Paramaribo and Curacao has inaugurated co-operation with Pan-American airways whereby Curacao will be linked with the existing lines of Pan-American Airways' existing web of airlines.

"Apart from that, however, the K. L. M. hopes to create its own airlines in Central America with bases at Paramaribo and Curacao. South and Central America offer enormous possibilities for aerial development. How exactly they will be utilized we cannot say definitely, but we are working to do our bit."

The K. L. M. is also planning extensions of its network on airlines in the Far East.

"As soon as the ground organization is completed," Plesman said, "a new line will be opened between Sourabaya, in Java, and Manila by way of Balikpapan and Tarakan in Borneo. This line actually will be operated by the Royal Netherlands Indies Airlines with which the K. L. M. is affiliated. The United States and China will play a big part in the development of air traffic which I believe will occur in the Far East."

Plesman revealed that the K. L. M. is studying the possibilities of operating a Zeppelin service between Amsterdam and Batavia in which airplanes and airships may be used. He added that it probably will be at least a couple of years, however, before this project is realized.

**PRECAUTIONS TAKEN AT KREMLIN ARE REMINISCENT OF WAR DAYS**

MOSCOW, March 2 — The precautions taken by Kremlin guards these days against allowing any dangerous person to enter the citadel of Soviet power remind one of an army camp in time of war. This impression is heightened, perhaps, if one contrasts the elaborate system of documents and identification necessary to enter the Kremlin with memories of vacationing Americans in Washington strolling unhindered and unquestioned through the White House grounds and merely by request, through the public rooms of the presidential mansion itself.

The difficulties of entering the Kremlin were brought sharply to the attention of foreign correspondents recently during the meeting there of the Soviet All-Union congress. As most readers may know, the Kremlin consists of about 20 buildings, mostly former palaces and churches of the Tsars, surrounded by a high brick wall which is surmounted by medieval turrets. These buildings now provide living quarters and offices for Joseph Stalin and other high-ranking members of the Communist hierarchy. In one of them, formerly a palace of the Tsars, the congress met.

Armed with a special pass to the congress as well as an identification card issued by the foreign office, this correspondent approached the guard on duty at the entrance to the Kremlin grounds. Both documents, one bearing the possessor's photograph to prevent its being used by any other person, were scrutinized meticulously. They were similarly examined by another guard at the entrance of the court yard of the congress building; again at the outer door; once more in the lobby; and for a fifth time at the door of the congress hall itself.

All these uniformed officers were extremely polite but also extremely cautious. Correspondents carry portable typewriters were requested to open them for examination before they could be taken into the congress building. Perhaps tales of American gangsters carrying machine guns in violin and typewriter cases have penetrated even this far away.

The dread which Soviet citizens feel for the political police recently was capitalized upon by a gang of bandits. These robbers, disguised as "representatives of power," entered ten apartments here and six in Leningrad and in each case demanded to search them.

Not daring to resist, the luckless householders permitted the intruders to go carefully through all their belongings. After the pretenders left, the householders found that many valuable things had been stolen. The gang has now been arrested and, no doubt, will receive drastic sentences not only for theft of property but, more serious, for impersonating the secret police.

The quartet will also sing a medley of southern songs that were popular at the time of the Civil War.

Banquets were held on March 2 by approximately one hundred local groups in Texas in several other states of the United States and in numerous foreign countries carrying out the pledge. "Wherever two ex-students of the University shall meet on March second, Texas Independence Day, they shall sit and break bread together and pay a tribute to the founders of the Republic of Texas that made our education possible.

## Cement Production Is Up 11 Per Cent

AUSTIN, March 2.—Activity in the Texas cement industry increased substantially during January, according to the University of Texas bureau of business research. Production totaled 294,000 barrels, 11 per cent above December and 51 per cent greater than during January last year. Shipments, totaling 240,000 barrels, were up 30 per cent from December but 9 per cent below January last year. Stocks on hand on January 31, amounting to 725,000 barrels, were 8 per cent higher than on December 31 and 50 per cent greater than on January 31, 1934.

## Building Permits in District Hit Highest Point Since 1931

DALLAS, March 2.—Building permits in the eleventh federal reserve district during January reached the highest point since 1931, the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas reported today in a survey that in general was cheerful.

Activity in construction formed the leading bright spot in the bank's monthly review of conditions in this territory. The valuation of building permits issued at the fourteen principal cities during January totaled \$3,501,663, almost three times as much as the previous month and more than four times as much as in January a year ago. The total in January, last year, was \$799,294, and in December, \$1,288,037.

Another bright spot was the sustained volume of merchandise distribution.

While department store sales reflected a seasonal decline of 56 per cent from the December volume, they were 8 per cent in excess of those in January last year. January always shows a decline from the preceding month because of the Christmas trade during December.

**Rains Aid**

The volume of wholesale distribution generally was maintained at a level in line with the previous month and with January a year ago. Unseasonable weather retarded buying in some lines.

Heavy rains in February caused an optimistic farm outlook, after

at a January freeze had hurt crops and the livestock industry.

The freeze killed back all range vegetation, checked the growth of winter wheat, killed a large percentage of winter oats, and caused heavy losses of vegetable crops in south Texas, the report said. "The subsequent rains and favorable weather, however, have done much to offset the effects of the freeze. Much of the oat acreage has been resown, truck crops were replanted, and wheat has come out rapidly. Farmers have proceeded rapidly with the preparation of soil for spring planting, which is beginning in South Texas."
