New Oil Extraction Means To Aid China

DONCASTER, Eng., May 4 ome interested in the low temperature carbonization method of extracting oil from coal. Two Chinese ingineers, sent by their government have arrived here to study, at the Askern plant of Low Temperature Carbonization, Ltd., the actual treatment of a load of Chinese coa! which has been shipped here for testing purposes.

shown that Chinese coal can be profitably treated by that method and the two engineers have been authorized to place contracts in Sheffield for a plant to be erected

While China is one of the richest ountries in the world in coal rescurces, with an annual output of around 29,000,000 metric tons, she is very short of good coking coal suitable for blast furnaces. In fact, this lack of good coking coal is stated to be one of the great handicaps of the struggling iron and steel indus-try in the Pacific basin. As one of the advantages claimed for the low temperature carbonization technique is that it produces, as a by-product, a good semi-coking coal not unsuitable for blast furnaces, it is considered probable that this aspect of it has weighed with the Chinese authorities.

It also produces, of course, moto pirits and lubricating oil, but, although these are useful enough, they would have to compete with the nuge natural petroleum resources of the Far East and are probably less interesting, from the economic point of view, than the semi-coke.

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


