#### Man's Greatest Restraint

Look around you, and you will see that the greatest restrainer of the anti-social tendencies of men is fear, not of law, but of the opinion of their fellows.

Observe that the conventions of honor bind men who break legal, and moral, and religious bonds; and, while people endure the extremity of physical pain rather than part with life, shame drives the weakest to suicide.

Every forward step of social progress brings men into closer relations with their fellows, and increases the importance of the pleasures and pains derived from sympathy.

Huxley observed that we judge the acts of others by our own sympathies, and we judge our own acts by the sympathies of others, every day, and all day long, from childhood upward, until associations, as indissoluble as those of language, are formed between certain acts and feelings of approbation and disapprobation

The result is, Huxley points out, "It becomes impossible to imagine some acts without disapprobation, or others with. out approbation of the actor, whether he be one's self or anyone else. We come to think in the acquired dialect of morals.'

Thus an artificial personality, the "man within," is built up beside the natural personality. He is the watchman of society, charged to restrain the anti-social tendencies of the natural man within the limits required by social welfare.

Huxley terms this evolution of the feelings out of which the primitive bonds of human society are so largely forged, into the organized and personified sympathy we call conscience, the ethical process.


