How Many Use Our "Second Wind"?

Every one knows what it is to start a piece of work, either intellectual or muscular, feeling "stale." And everybody knows what it is to "warm up" to his job. This process of warming up gets particularly striking in the phenomenon known as "second wind." On unusual occasions we make a practice of stopping an occupation as soon as we meet the first effective layer (so to call it) of fatigue. That amount of fatigue is an obstruction on this side of which our usual life is cast.

But if an unusual necessity forces us to press onward, a surprising thing occurs. The fatigue gets worse up to a certain point when gradually it passes away, and we are fresher than before. We have suddenly a new level of energy.

For many years William James mused on the phenomenon of the second wind. Then he wrote:

A third and a fourth "wind" may supervene.

'Mental activity shows the phenomenon as well as physical, and in exceptional cases we may find, beyond the extremity of fatigue-distress, amounts of ease and power that we never dreamed ourselves to own-sources of strength habitually not taxed at all, because habitually we never push those critical points of fatigue.

"It is evident that our organism has stored-up reserves of energy that are ordinarily not called upon, but that may be called upon; deeper and deeper strata of combustible or explosible material, discontinuously arranged, but ready for use by any one who probes so deep, and repairing themselves by rest as well as do the superficial strata.

"Most of us continue our living unnecessarily near the

Some years ago a psychologist kept three young men awake for four days and nights. When his observations on them were finished, the subjects were permitted to sleep themselves out. All awoke from the sleep completely refreshed, but the one who took longest to restore himself from his long vigil slept one-third more time than was regular with

The man who energizes below his normal maximum fails by just so much to profit by his chance at life. Keep "warmed up."

How Wrong is our Educational System?

'Take any 100 boys of twenty-five years, and at the age of thirty-five, five of them will have passed away, ten will be wealthy, ten well-to-do, and seventy-five self-supporting," Warren S. Stone, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, said in an address.

'Add ten years more, or forty-five years of age," Stone continued, "and eighty-four will still be living, four of them wealthy, six well-to-do, fifty-nine self-supporting, and fifteen unable to support themselves.

With the addition of another ten years, or fifty-five years old, four more will have died, only one will be wealthy, four well-to-do, forty-five self-supporting, and thirty non-

When they have reached sixty-five years, only sixtyfour of the original 100 will be alive, only one wealthy, three well-to-do, but six of the balance self-supporting, and the balance, fifty-four, will be dependent upon others for the rest of their lives.

Stone said his figures were the result of a careful study of all available records, and had been checked by some of the most prominent insurance actuaries in the country.

"When such a thing is possible," he added, "there something radically wrong with our system of education. It is necessary for us to inculcate in our children the spirit of

The Open Road To Success

In the attainment of solid, well founded success there has never been found a sub for honest labor with the hands or mind. The ages have recognized this as an immutable truism, yet every age, including the present, has had its skeptics, its unbelievers, its seekers after fame and fortune without paying the price of work. Some sage has said that to attain success use half as much effort as you would exert in attempting to seek success without work. There is much wisdom in the axiom that takes less mental effort to climb to legitimate success than to climb to an illigitimate success. 



To these will be added the Pantheon, where the bones of France's illustrous dead are buried; the Coinciergerie, those two conical towers of the Palace of Justice, which nearly were destroyed by fire recently, and which will shine in reflection in the Seine, the Institute of France, where the Forty Immortals sit; the Perrault colonade of the Louvre; the Arc du Carrousel; the graceful nobly propor-tioned building of the Chancellery of the Legion of Honor; the Invalides; the City Hall; the Porte Saint Martin; the Comedie Francaise; the Opera Comique: and above all of them, apparently float-ing unsupported, the saccharine

Oriental domes of Sacre Coeur. Floodlighting also will be applied to the entire Rue Royale, making a continuous blaze of light from the Seine through the Place de la Con-corde to the Madeleine.


