

WASHINGTON, May 23 .-The senate today sustained President Roosevelt's veto and killed the Patman bonus bill. Champions of the \$2,-200,000 measure battled to the last during the dramatic session but they could not win the two thirds majority necessary to have the senate join the house in overriding

The vote was 40 to sustain

and 54 to override the veto. The vote against the Patman plan definitely killed it for this session but did not end the bonus issue.

Bonus supporters planned soon to offer a plan giving Mr. Roosevelt a chance to pay the bonus either through use of regular treasury financing, through use of work relief funds or by issuing United

States notes. They believed offering this proposal might win votes of some senators who opposed the mandatory currency issuance provision of the Patman bil

FDR Warns

The Eternal Prediction For Youth

In the oldest books known to man we find youth being censured for its bad conduct and wilful ways, and predictions being made that the world will suffer from the wilderness of the young. Every generation finds fault with the manners of the adolescents, and decides they will come to no good end. And when these adolescents develop into men and women fathers and mothers, grandfathers and grand mothers, they also shudder at the thought of what will happen to the world when the young grow up.

When a preacher stands and shouts "The young people of today are sending the world straight to hell!" (I quote vergency batim), he is simply repeating what has been said in every language in every age. If the world has progressed, then the young of each generation have been better than those before

"It is almost impossible to know what a man will be, difficult to know what he is, but easy to know what he has been. One must neither distrust nor trust blindly in young people, and one must take care not to depend upon men, nor condemn them; all is yet within them, the metal in a state of fusion is running into the mold. It is only God who knows what the statue will be.

Thus George Sand summed up what our attitude toward youth might be, if we were more charitable.

Youth believes that happiness is its due and its right; consequently it is natural that the later period of youth is troubled and made miserable by the pursuit of happiness as though there were no doubt that it can be met with somewhere in life.

So, it is that the young man is dissatisfied with the position in which he finds himself, whatever it may be; he ascribes his disappointment solely to the state of things that meet him on his first introduction to life, when he has expected something different. It has been said many times that it would be a great advantage to a young man if his early training could eradicate the idea that the world has a great deal to offer him. But our first ideas of life are generally taken from fiction rather than from fact, and the usual result of education is to strengthen this delusion.

Remember that in the bright dawn of our youthful days, the poetry of life spreads out a gorgeous vision before us, and we torture ourselves to see it realized. The youth expects his career to be like an interesting romance; and there lies the germ of that disappointment. Just as the chief feature of the earlier half of life is a never satisfied longing after happiness, the later part is characterized by the dread of mis-

Oceans of Water Cover Drouth Bowl

Mother Nature is wiser than all the wise men in the world of science and the world of politics and the world of industry and all the lesser worlds inhabited by man - who struts like a pouter pigeon when prosperity reigns and passes out like a dead flea when crises come and starvation is threatened in desolated areas.

There is water everywhere in the dust bowl of America. This includes the areas of farming and from North Dakota to the Panhandle of Texas. Charles Goodnight was known as "The First Gentleman of the Panhandle." In the long ago he remarked to a newspaper writer who was his guest: "When it is dry in Texas, it is as dry as hell; when it rains in Texas, it rains like hell." Well, after the drouth it appears to be "raining like hell" from the Rocky mountain foothills across the Gulf to the Mexican state of Yucatan.

Relief of the Needy is Service to All

The public relief problem that has been with us for the last five years has been a good deal like Topsy. It just growed, and it growed so fast and so unexpectedly that we never had time to chart our program very far in advance. As a result, the transition from private charity to pub-

lic funds was upon us before we realized it, and we made the change as a matter of necessity rather than choice.

Today, with all indications pointing to a progressive decline in the relief rolls, it might be profitable to re-examine the whole question and see what attitude should be taken in

Homer Folks is secretary of the State Charities Aid association of New York City, and in that capacity has had long experience in the matter of giving relief to the needy.

In a recent speech before the Philadelphia Welfare Foundation, he suggested that the greatest danger is that we shall lose our "instinctive belief that kindness to a person in need is not only a service to him, but a social service to the

A few years ago Elihu Root declared that the most notable change he had seen in America during his lifetime was the growth of the spirit of compassion. A generation ago, he said, people were not always moved to pity and action by the sight of suffering; today they are.

This new quality of active sympathy he thought a most important factor in American life.

Mr. Folks suggests that whatever the change in our relief methods may be, it is supremely important for us to re-

"If we turn from the thought that it is an obligation of the community to see that need is relieved, that distress is averted, are we not unconsciously turning away from the your very spirit and content of democracy itself?" he asks. "Are we not turning away from rule by persuasion, by group thinking, by patience, and to a rule that inevitably must be coercion-by the strong arm and, in no distant time, by mass

This, then, is perhaps the fundamental point at issue in

The mechanics of the program may vary. We may even return to the old idea that in ordinary times private charity can carry the load, with the state taking it over only in emer-
