Electric Strike Threatens Industry Tieup

UNIONS SEEK TO HALT ALL POWER WORK

TOLEDO, Ohio, June 5 — Business and industry operated today under threat of complete paralysis as a result of a strike of electrical workers of the Toledo Edison company, which supplies current to a tri-state area with a half a million population.

Electric current continued to run through the company's lines despite efforts of union men to plunge the area into darkness and paralyze industry by complete shutdown of all electrical plants.

Strike leaders, who had predicted the tieup would be complete by midday, admitted it would be "probably 24 hours" before they could hope to force complete discontinuance of service.

Libbey Glass Manufacturing company and Electric Autolight closed early today and laid off 6,000 workers as a result of the strike.

Autolight later resumed operations and announced that production would continue as long as the electric current lasted.

The strikers pursued the strategy of allowing fires to die down slowly in the boilers which operate the huge generators. Such a policy would allow further time for conciliation efforts.

Houston Labor to Protest Change
HOUSTON, June 5. — Labor will protest wage reductions and hour changes by some Houston firms at a mass meeting Monday night.

Wilson said some employees had had their hours raised from 40 to 54 a week and their wages cut following the supreme court decision.

Woman Prepares To Die Upon Gallows
GEORGETOWN, Del., June 5. — May Carey, 55-year-old mother of three sons, has accepted her fate with God and will walk unafraid to the gallows at dawn Friday.

Her eldest son, Howard, 27, will follow. He too has accepted religion and is prepared to die. As the two were reading the Bible today, a truck was enroute to the jail with the gallows.

The mother and son were convicted of slaying Robert Hitchens for a \$2,000 life insurance policy. Hitchens is Mrs. Carey's brother.

May Use Tax Power In NRA Substitute

WILL J. CURTIS FUNERAL TO BE ON THURSDAY

Will J. Curtis, 65, died at the home of his sister, Mrs. A. A. Williams at 3:30 this morning. Funeral services will be held at Romney Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

Rev. E. S. James, pastor of the First Baptist church here will conduct the funeral, assisted by Rev. W. R. Ivie, pastor of the Union church. Burial will be at Romney, with Green's funeral home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Curtis died after a serious illness of two weeks. He had been in bad health for two months.

Mr. Curtis, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Boon Curtis, was born near Calhoun, Gordon county, Georgia, August 25, 1869. He came with his parents to Waco at the age of four, later moving to Bosque county. From there he came to Eastland and then moved to the Curtis community, so named for his father.

Suit against Attorney General William McCraw and the railroad commission was filed by E. W. Fischer, representing A. M. Pruiett. Fischer asked a temporary injunction against McCraw and the commission to restrain them from confiscating Pruiett's oil under terms of house bill 581, known as the confiscation bill.

Orange Preacher In Jail Is Hysterical

ORANGE, Tex., June 5 — Rev. Edgar Estridge, 40-year-old Baptist minister, in jail on a charge of murder in connection with the slaying of Police Chief Ed O'Reilly, became hysterical today, his wife said.

Rev. Mr. Estridge was returned here from DeRidder, La., yesterday after waiving extradition. He was in high spirits until today.

WASHINGTON, June 5. — President Roosevelt is bending every effort to formulate a permanent substitute for NRA which definitely will be submitted to congress soon, congressional leaders said today.

The substitute, made necessary by the supreme court's decision, may call for the use of the federal tax power in an effort to force both interstate and intrastate business to meet minimum wage and hour, child labor, and collective bargaining requirements of the original NRA codes.

Chairman Robert Doughton of the house ways and means committee, discussing a substitute for NRA, said he "would not be surprised if we will have to use the taxing power."

All revenue legislation must originate in Doughton's committee and his remark was considered significant, although he denied the tax proposal had been discussed with the White House.

Later Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace gave President Roosevelt the following statement, which the latter approved:

"In cooperation with leaders of congress, amendment to the Agricultural Adjustment Act are being perfected, which are intended to bring the act's provision as to marketing agreements and licensing into line with the NRA decision, and also to safeguard the voluntary adjustment program on basic commodities."

Durwood Newman, 19 and James Garrett, 20, both of Athens, died yesterday.

Physicians said the fatal effects of the alcohol upon the other boys might not be apparent for a number of hours, depending upon the amount of food in their stomachs, perspiration, size, and physical condition. Source of the alcohol was traced to the science building, where the laboratory is located.

Aid of Local Officers Sought After Picketing by Paris Relief Clients

AUSTIN, June 5. — Following picketing operations of relief recipients at Paris, Adam R. Johnson, head of Texas relief forces, today called for the aid of local officials in reducing the state's case load to meet decreases in appropriation.

"I don't believe we may reasonably expect larger relief grants in the future. Federal officials know that the drought has been broken in Texas and they expect an increasingly large percentage of the relief clients to become self sustaining."

"We understand that farmers are in need of help in their fields. Able bodied men on our rolls should not fail to seek this employment," Johnson said.

Relief work here still shut down
Relief work in Eastland county today was described as "the same as yesterday."

There had been no order given to resume operations on the various projects, ordered suspended Monday. The only projects upon which work was being done were those of the five canneries, one of which is in Cisco.

Relief officials were unable to say how long the shutdown would last, but said that it is of a temporary nature.

Reason given for the shutdown by County Administrator H. E. Driscoll Monday was that he will receive only \$13,900 for all relief work in the county this month instead of a requested \$32,535.

TACOMA GANG AIDED BY OLD KARPIS ALLY

TACOMA, Wash., June 5. — The names of the six men who kidnaped George Weyerhaeuser, 9, and collected \$200,000 for his safe return to his millionaire parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Weyerhaeuser, are known to the department of justice it was learned by the United Press today.

Search is concentrated in Seattle and Portland for five of them — local men—and is spread through the midwest for the sixth, a minor figure in the old Barker-Karpis gang.

The "low voiced, nervous" man who passed one of the \$20 ransom bills at Huntington, Ore., in exchange for a railway ticket to Salt Lake City is the old Karpis gangster, police and federal agents said.

He is sought also for a part in the kidnaping of Edward G. Bremer and his presence with the Tacoma gang presumably gave it the characteristics which directed first suspicion toward that kidnap and slayer.

The Karpis gangster is the only one who has fled from the Pacific northwest, officers said.

The "pot-bellied" man described in police broadcasts is known as a former Tacoma bootlegger.

The erstwhile bootlegger is probably the "Egoist," signer of the ransom notes. Most authorities think so. He is described as the brains of the plot.

He is said to be a drug addict.

WOMAN TELLS OF PAYOFF IN LIQUOR DEAL

LUBBOCK, June 5. — Additional evidence that Sheriff Len Irvin ascertained received bribes to protect liquor dealers in Lamb county was introduced into court today.

Irvin, with 27 other persons, is being tried for alleged complicity in a liquor ring operating in West Texas.

In court today Mrs. Bill Herman testified that her late husband in 1926 made a deal to sell whiskey, paying Irvin \$200 a month.

In 1927, she said, her husband established a whiskey still, paying Irvin \$600 per month. Twice, she said, she made the payments to the sheriff for her husband.

DYNAMITE IS USED TO FIGHT SOIL EROSION

WASHINGTON, June 5 — Farmers have turned to the use of dynamite in a nation-wide fight against soil erosion. Annual losses caused by erosion of the soil cost hundreds of millions of dollars and in many cases destroys the fertility of entire farms.

More than 100,000 members of the Civilian Conservation Corps, divided among about 500 camps, are being assigned to help farmers in their battles to save their lands.

Under a cooperative plan, the CCC men do the work on terrace outlets, while the farmers do the terracing of their fields. The part that dynamite plays in these projects is for blasting out stumps and boulders from the terrace lines. This makes possible the use of mechanical equipment in the grading of the terraces.

Another small army of CCC workers is engaged in gully control work. Thousands of farms have been cut through with gullies which have increased in dimensions from those of small ditches to chasms many feet wide and from ten to thirty or more feet deep. These great gashes in the earth, if left unchecked, steadily widen until whole farms are destroyed.

Dynamite is used to shoot down the sheer banks so that they may be sloped by hand labor with pick and shovel. After the banks are sloped, grass, bushes, and trees are planted to prevent further erosion. Soil-saving dams are constructed to collect top soil blasted into the gullies. In this rich soil, planting is done. This method is proving effective in not only stopping further gully, but also in saving the surrounding farm lands.

Ultra Short Wave Stations Planned

EAST PITTSBURGH, Pa., June 5 — Three new ultra-low wave broadcasting stations will be established in eastern cities within a few months.

The Westinghouse Electric company will build the transmitters in Boston, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. They will carry the regular broadcast program on a frequency of 55.5 megacycles or about 5 meters. Power output will be 50 watts.

Only a few radio receivers will pick up the programs, which on that wave-length cannot usually be heard more than 20 miles. Static, however, cannot be heard on that wave band, and the whole band is free of interference. Fading, also, is unknown at 5 meters.

The wave band is now largely controlled by amateurs, who find it handy for chatting within a few miles. The Westinghouse engineers, however, believe it may also be useful for television.

EPSOM DOWNS, Eng., June 5 — The Aga Khan's Bahram, heaviest favorite in years, won the 156th Epsom derby today before a madly cheering crowd of nearly 500,000 people.

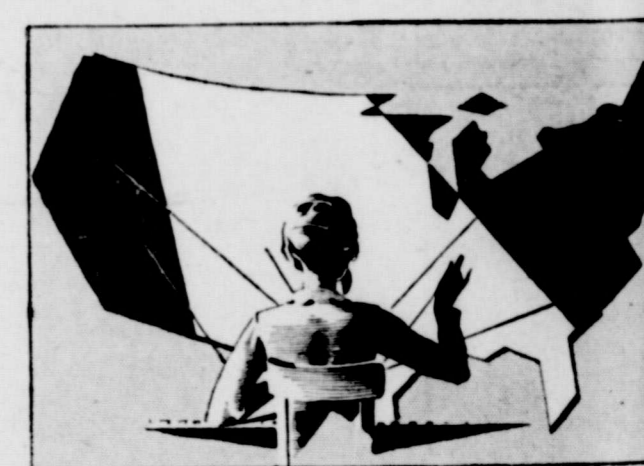

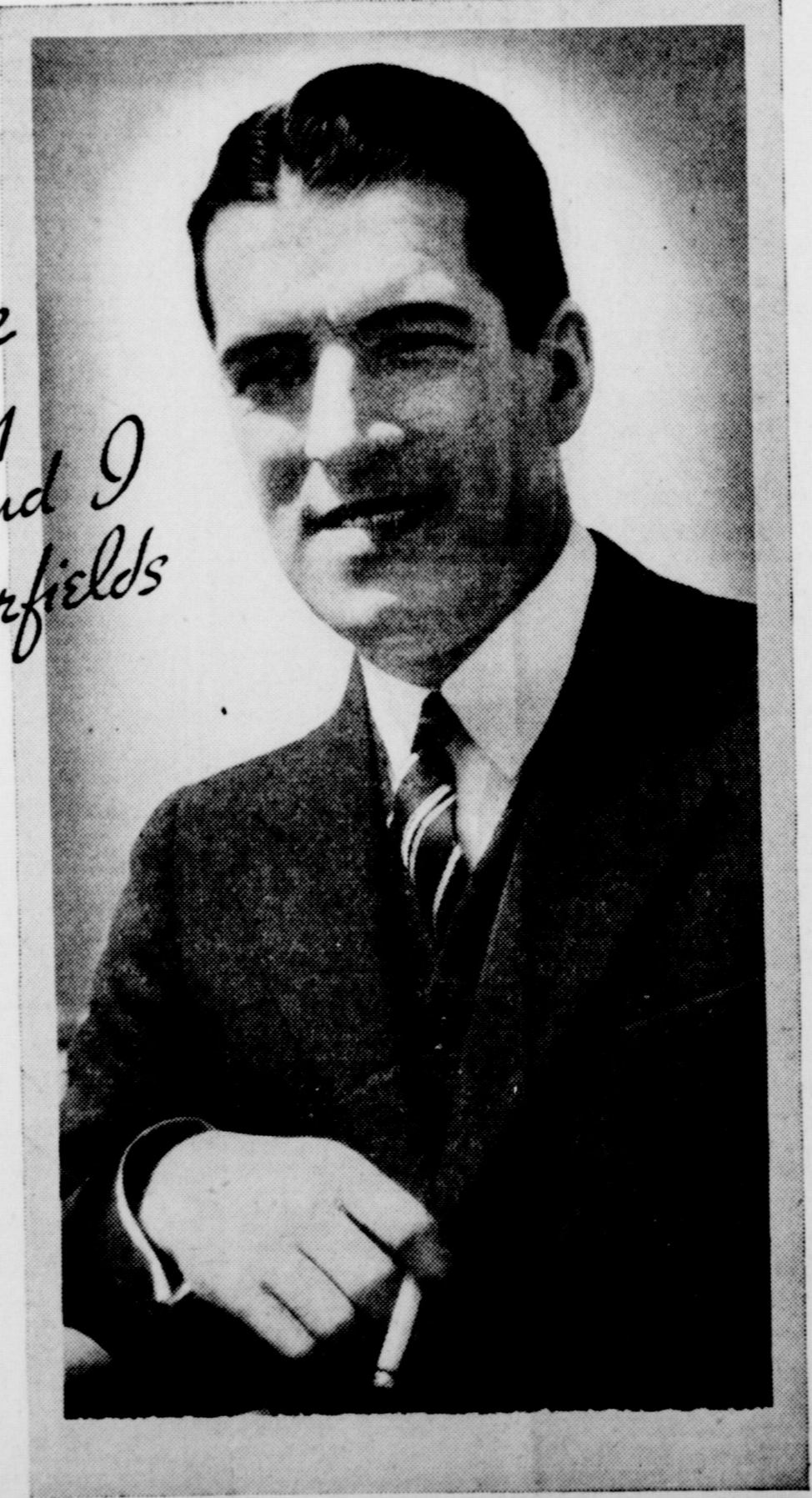
