

Beware of Typhoid This Summer

While at home, Cisco people have little to fear, but one of the things to be thought about in preparing for the summer's travels is the taking of simple precautions against ty phoid fever. Many persons going abroad and expecting to delve into queer out-of-the-way places have a typhoid inoculation before they go. In most cases this will prevent typhoid. Persons so inoculated are usually immune for two or three

Campers, hikers, vacationists of all sorts, and even persons who must eat habitually in public places, would do well to take the same means of self-protection. And in case of doubt in the summer camp, always boil the water even if it flows from a seemingly clear and sparkling spring or stream.


Typhoid fever is a serious disease. A patient who does not die is usually left weak and an easier prey to other diseases. Typhoid is a filth disease, the germs of which are carried by houseflies and found in sewage-contaminated water, in unclean milk, in shell-fish from poluted water, sometimes in uncooked vegetables.

Typhoid used to be a terrible scourge, until science discovered the means of preventing it-by rigid cleanliness, by proper supervision of food supplies and by inoculation. There need never be another epidemic of typhoid fever, if these facts are widely known and used.
