There are some business firms that make it their practice to let up somewhat on their advertising in summer. Sometimes they argue that a good many of their townspeo-

But if that is the case, it is also usually true that a good many visitors are in the region at the time, and are carefully looking over the newspapers, and making such purchases of things as they need. This is certainly true of Cisco at this time. When people are away from home they have considerable time which they can put in shopping, and often buy more than they do at home.

Wallace Wants Processing Tax Levy

Secretary Henry A. Wallace, head and maker of the farm administration policies, has declared for an indefinite continuation of federal processing taxes on farm products. Cotton growers are largely responsible for processing taxes. Wheat and corn growers voted for their continuance. Hog growers lined up for the system. Rice growers demanded continuation of the plan. It is the first time in history that the tillers of the soil, or rather the growers of things, have been given a loud voice in the legislation of the country. They voiced their demands and they won.




