

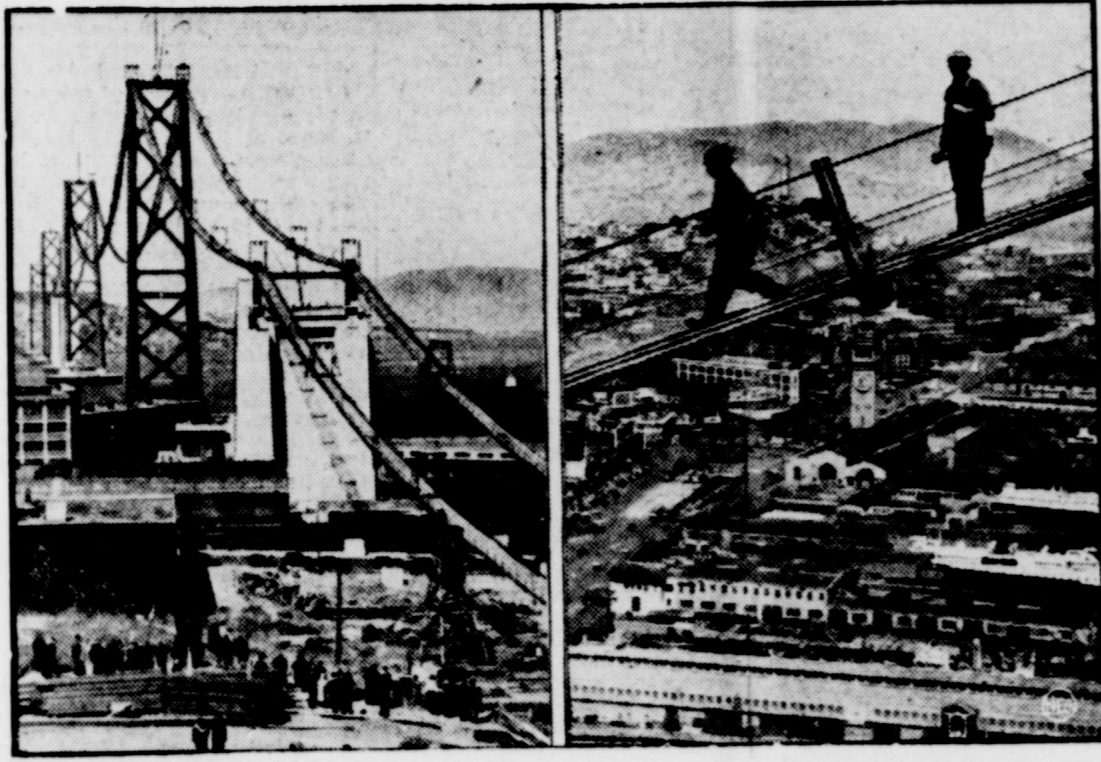

Norris Would Amend the Constitution

Senator George W. Norris of Nebraska is one of the noted statesmen and lawmakers of the nation. He was born a republican, he began his official career as a republican and he has many noteworthy achievements to his credit. His friends and political admirers long ago voted him "The Grand Old Man of American Politics" and one of the most sincere advocates of the rights of the masses, regardless of party affiliation, the restoration of power, high purchasing and otherwise, of the growers of things.

Likewise, he has been a powerful advocate of most of the demands of the wage workers of the country. He never hesitates to battle for his convictions or his legislative programs. He voted for Alfred E. Smith against Herbert Hoover, regardless of the fact that he was a life-long prohibitionist. He voted for Roosevelt and Garner and the new deal policies of the administration.

He sponsored the Tennessee valley project. He is responsible for the one-house legislature which will function in Nebraska next year. Really, he is the chief legislative dreamer and many of his dreams have come true.

Now by amendment of the constitution he has moved that the American people "act to limit the power of its supreme court." He has introduced a joint resolution in the senate to authorize a constitutional amendment to require that seven of the nine supreme court justices agree in order to wipe from the statutes a law the court holds unconstitutional and that supreme court action must start within six months after enactment of law "if it is to be eliminated."

Senator Norris is not of the tribe of the wild radicals of the period. He professes at all times to be a republican, but free to follow the candidates of his choice. During his political career he has vanquished all the machine leaders of Nebraska. He has survived the powerful opposition of the leading republican newspapers of Nebraska. His influence and his voice led to the destruction or rather elimination of the Nebraska senate and now it is to be substituted by a one-house legislature. In a sense, he is "the iconoclast of American politics. He is brainy, "he is sincere," he is as poor as a church mouse after many years' service as a national lawmaker and he "does not expect speedy action on his constitutional proposal." He paved the way for ratification of his lame duck amendment which changed the date for inauguration of presidents and the convening of congress. In other words, he made congressional lame ducks a thing of the past in the political life of his country. He has the confidence of millions of Americans. He has the tenacity of a fighting bulldog. He never employs press agents to sound his praise or beat his drums. Regardless of this there is dynamite in most of his creations and he is a battler who has never run up the white flag since he invaded the arena of politics as an American lawmaker.

England and Germany as Future Partners

Statesmen of Great Britain and Germany, speaking of two powerful nations represented by John Bull and Adolf Hitler, have signed a naval compact. A London cable carries the news that the statesmen of Great Britain "regard the program as being satisfactory to all parties concerned."

Well, Brother Jonathan was not consulted. He was not invited to sit in. Later along he may be given a bid. The fathers of America fought naval battles for the freedom of the sea. This was in the long ago. Regardless of this, Great Britain claims to be the mistress of all the seven seas and Brother Jonathan has taken it on the chin in all years known as the machine civilization. He demanded the freedom of the sea at the close of the World War.

He had furnished millions of soldiers to the Allies. He loaned billions of dollars to the allied governments. He mortgaged the American people for a hundred years to come to pay the loans. To date all loans have been repudiated. When Brother Jonathan sits in on invitation at another world conference he should carry the farewell address of George Washington, the first liberator, who advised his people to avoid entangling alliances with foreign nations and attend to their own business through the coming years. George Washington was a very wise man, a great soldier, a patriotic leader "and ever first in the hearts of his countrymen."

Soil Erosion Advocates Have Evidence

Advocates of soil erosion have been furnished the evidence for their argument for quick action by American lawmakers. After spending its fury in the valley of Texas, the Colorado river deposited its water as well as millions of tons of soil in the Gulf of Mexico.

Four states contributed to the soil losses and the millions of dollars in property losses swept away in the wild rampage of the floods which were let loose by the watersheds of the river. There have been huge losses to the taxpayers everywhere. Bridges have been destroyed. Miles of roadway have been washed out. Damage to growing crops has been appalling. Thousands of river valley dwellers lost their places of shelter and their household goods.

Thousands have been placed on the relief rolls of the state and the nation. For years and years soil erosion has taken place whenever the flood waters sent the river out of its banks and devastated the living conditions of man, ruined his growing crops, robbed him of his personal belongings and inflicted incalculable damage to the soil of the commonwealth.

Why shouldn't the rivers and creeks of the commonwealth and country be harnessed and the flood waters con-

Why talk of our superior civilization, the onward march of science and the mighty inventions of the men of genius in the face of disasters that have swept over in the world in the years of 1934 and 1935. This is a scientific age. This is the period of laboratory achievement. Why should man be left to grope in the darkness as he did in the days of the tallow-dip candle and the oxcart of ancient history.

Texas Topics

AUSTIN, June 22 — Gov. James V. Alford delayed the West Texas vacation trip he had planned two days in order to work with authorities in dealing with the Central Texas flood. He personally helped in efforts to get families out of lowland areas, and in doing all possible to safeguard life and property in the flood's path. The governor threw into the service all the resources of the Texas National guard and enlisted the cooperation of the United States army authorities at Fort Sam Houston. At the same time, the state highway patrol was giving valuable service in inspecting and patrolling bridges and highways endangered by floods.

Recently U. S. Sen Norris demanded an investigation of the source and cost of litigation forced by utility companies in trying to hamper cities in rate control and trying to hamper public agencies in affording utility services and reasonable rates to consumers.

Clarence R. Wharton, Houston utility lawyer, filed an intervening plea in the test suit of Lower Colorado River Authority to establish validity of bonds to be offered the government for funds for a flood control program in the Colorado river. He failed to delay the decision of the case.

The same Attorney Wharton filed an injunction suit in federal court to restrain the public works administration from lending money to the city of Liberty, Texas for the construction of municipal utilities. A news dispatch from Liberty said "Every attorney in the city has volunteered his services free of charge to defend the city against this attack of the utility company."

Now Texas Utilities company has filed a suit in federal court against the city of Plainview, trying to prevent the city from signing a contract with the public works administration for funds for municipal utility construction.

It seems a well-demed, however short-sighted, policy of the utility companies to try to use the federal courts as an agency to hamper the public, acting as cities or districts in construction or expansion of utility plants, or development of flood control projects.

Example of recent floods has been the destruction of vast quan-

ties of the property of hundreds of thousands of people.

If the courts are to stand primarily as defenders of property, there is a strong plea of behalf these 100,000 citizens whose property has been destroyed by floods, as against the dividends of Electric Bond & Share.

Texas, after much delay and trouble, has put upon its statutes books a strong law to regulate and license so-called travel bureaus. These agencies are "go-between's" to find passengers for hire in unlicensed, unregulated transportation facilities such as privately-owned cars. They charge fees for their service, but afford no guarantee that an individual who pays his money to a car owner will not be stranded anywhere on the trip.

Under the law approved by Gov. Alford, existing travel bureaus are given 60 days from the effective date of the act, to secure a license from the motor transportation division of the railroad commission, and to meet the requirements of continued service. They are required to present a \$50 filing fee along with the application. They are required to show that motor carriers to which they assign passengers are complying with reasonable regulations. They shall execute and keep in effect a bond of \$1,000 to protect any person suffering loss under a transportation contract, and shall pay a \$25 annual license fee.

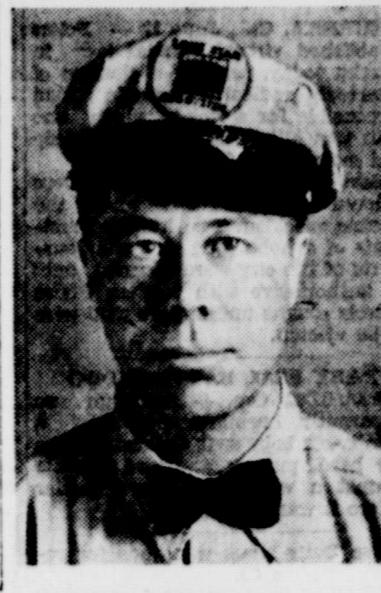

DOCTOR DEBUNKS TALL TALES OF DANGER FROM TEXAS TARANTULAS

DALLAS, June 22 — The sight of a big tarantula, hairy-legged and venomous-looking, is calculated to send shivers down the back of a person who sees him suddenly, but his looks are worse than his bite, according to Dr. J. W. Bass, Dallas health officer.
Several reports have been received that tarantulas have been seen in large numbers in Dallas recently. Reports also have been received of a number of scorpions and snakes.
The tarantula, of which there are several varieties in the world, belongs to the spider family. It is a large, hairy, venomous spider with eight legs that appear to be larger than they are because they are covered with hairs.
The spiders live in holes in the ground, in pairs, and sometimes they equip their holes with "covers."
The Central American variety, which sometimes is found on barns brought to this country, is particularly venomous and can cause a large ulcer, Dr. Bass said.
There is no record available at the emergency hospital here of a person being treated for a tarantula bite, which tends to discount some of the tall tales about them.

evaporating gas should be used in filling them.
If turpentine is used, only the spider in the hole is killed. The mate, which may be away, will re-enter the hole because of the smell of turpentine.
Tarantulas are found in Europe, especially in Italy. Superstitious people there still cling to an old belief that the bite of the tarantula causes what is known as tarantism — a melancholy state of stupor joined with an uncontrollable desire to dance.
Scorpions are dangerous looking but their bite is not as bad as that of the centipede. They are easily killed and can be crushed by a fly swatter.

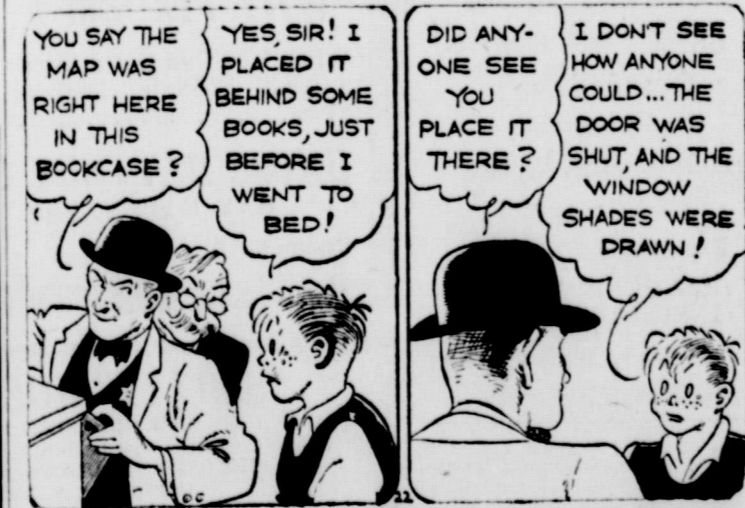
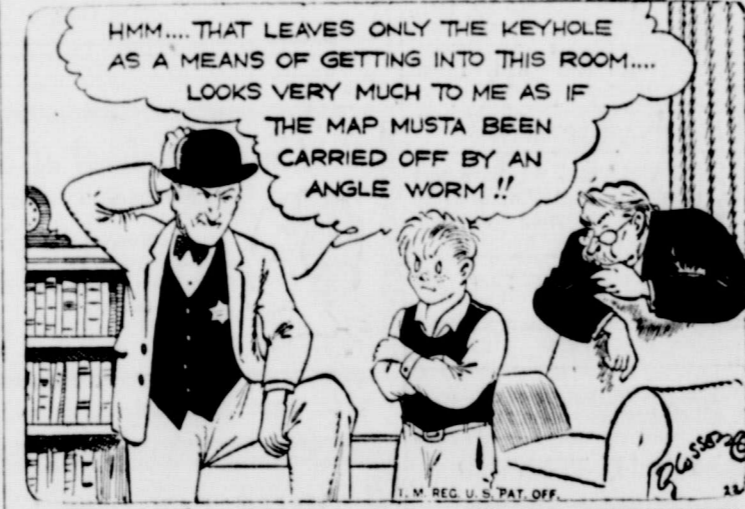
Dangerous Black Widow

Dr. Bass said it was his belief that some so-called tarantula bites probably were due to bites of the black widow spider.
"I heard of a case several years ago in East Texas where a farmer was bitten on the neck while cutting cats with an old fashioned cradle, but I think the big ulcer was caused by a black widow spider," Dr. Bass said.
"The tarantula is not to be compared with that spider."
Dr. Roy Melvin of the United States Bureau of Entomology said that the bite of a Texas tarantula will make a person sick but that the tarantula will not bite unless he is hemmed in.
He pointed out that they live in pairs in their holes and that a quick

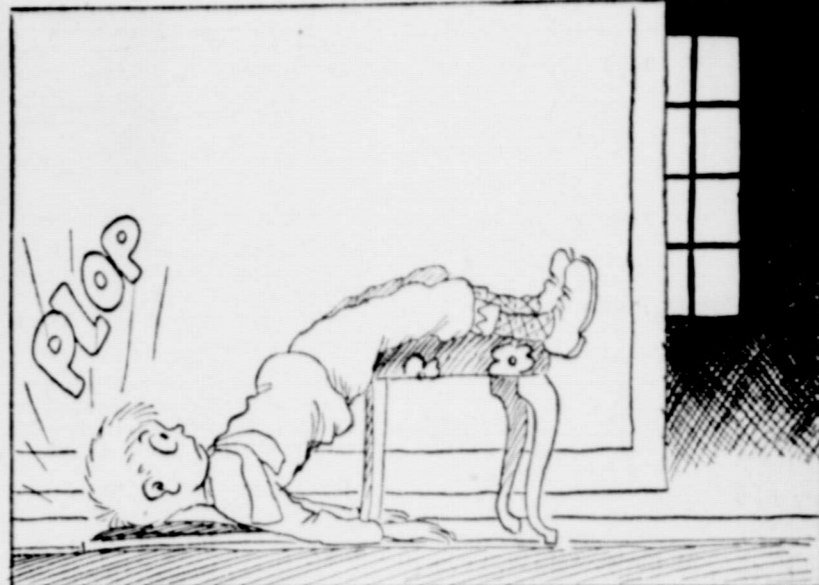
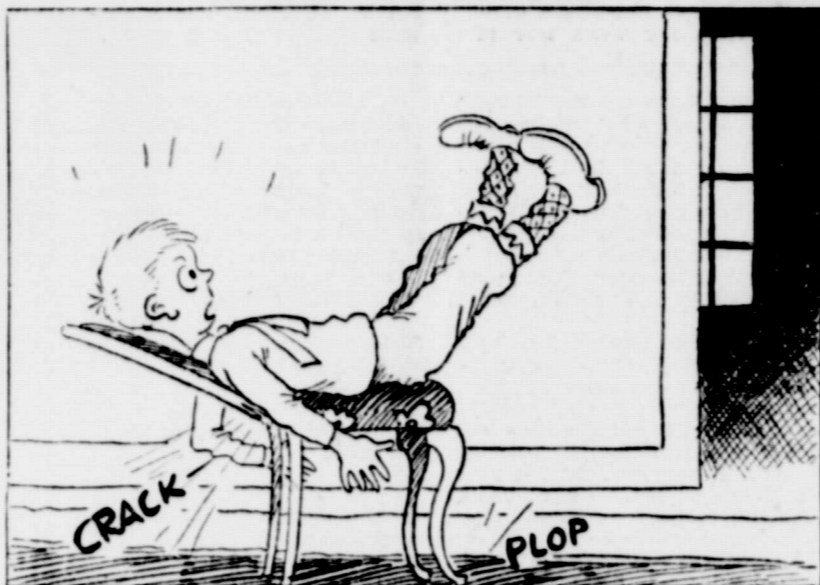

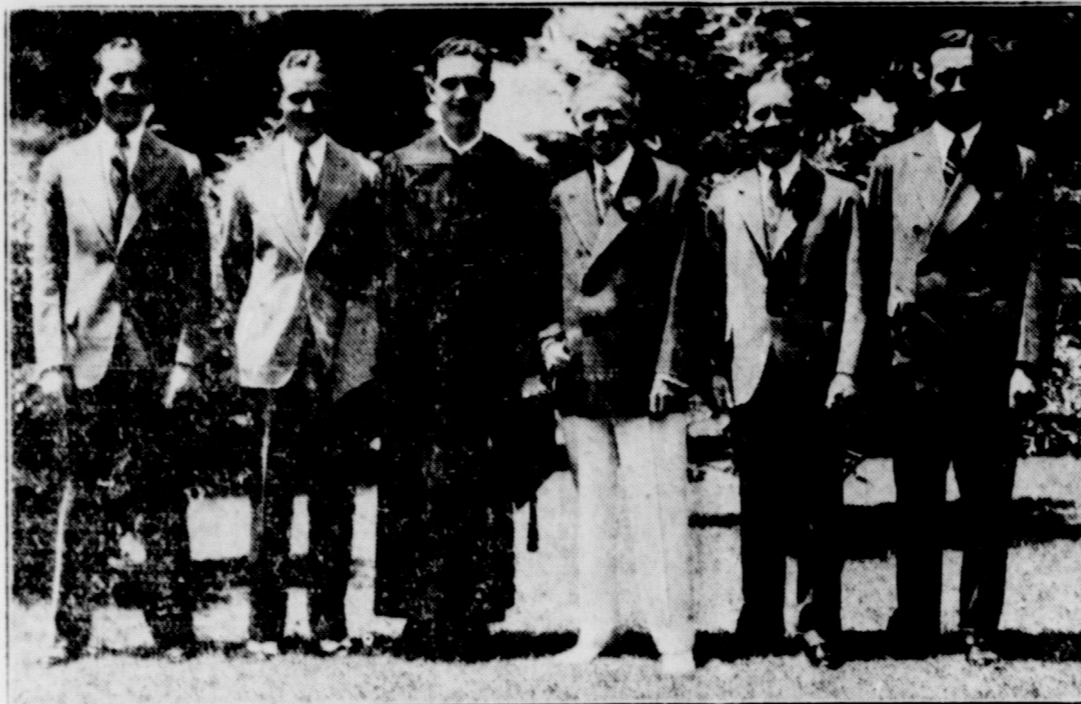

BALKANS PLAN NEW AIRLINES FOR SECURITY

By STEWART BROWN United Press Staff Correspondent VIENNA, June 22 — An almost unnoticed but highly important decision to improve air communications between the Balkan states was taken at the meeting of the Balkan Entente in Bucharest.

According to military attaches, this decision is significant because it will mean a vast improvement in the air superiority of the four nations (Jugoslavia, Rumania, Turkey, Greece) belonging to the Entente.

The Entente members did not disclose their plans, but it is generally believed they will establish new airlines between Bucharest, Belgrade, Athens and Istanbul.

and Polish companies presently operating in this territory. Pilots Would Get Training The advantages of this new setup would be to familiarize the pilots of these four countries with the entire Balkan peninsula, thus making them more valuable in case of war.

Informed circles it is generally believed France will find ways of supporting the Entente's plans because France is anxious to make the allies as strong as possible militarily.

Three international lines, the Air France, Lufthansa and Lot (Polish) are operating in the Balkans and it is rumored the British soon may enter the field.

The German line operates daily between Berlin and Saloniki, with stops at Vienna, Budapest, Belgrade and Sofia. The flying time between Berlin-Saloniki is 9 hours and 25 minutes, which represents a great saving of time over the train which takes about 36 hours.

French Line Operates Air France flies between Paris, Strasbourg, Nuremberg, Prague, Vienna, Budapest, Belgrade, Bucharest and Istanbul. The planes leave Paris at 6 a. m. and are in Bucharest at 7:40 p. m. The lap from Bucharest to Istanbul is made the next day.

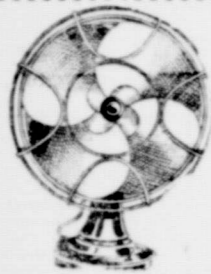
