Police On Watch For Gang Rescue

PATTERSON, N. J., June 25. — Policemen, heavily armed, surrounded police headquarters and took posts on nearby rooftops today after a telephone warning that an underworld gang would attempt to rescue 8 desperadoes held in jail. The prisoners were the "Pompano Lake gang" captured in a spectacular raid Sunday on a mountain view bungalow. Two of them have been identified as participants in the daring \$427,500 armored car robbery in Brooklyn, in August of last year, police said.

Johnson New York Work Relief Head

WASHINGTON, June 25. — Almost two years to the day from his appointment as director of the NRA, General Hugh S. Johnson today was named director of work relief for New York City in the administration's \$4,000,000,000 drive to put men back to work.

Cutting's Will To Aid Progressives

WASHINGTON, June 25. — Bequests totaling \$1,066,000 including \$50,000 to his progressive colleague, Senator Robert M. La Follette, and \$25,000 to Governor Philip La Follette of Wisconsin, were revealed today with the filing of the will of the late Senator Bronson Cutting, republican, N. M., killed in an airplane crash in May.

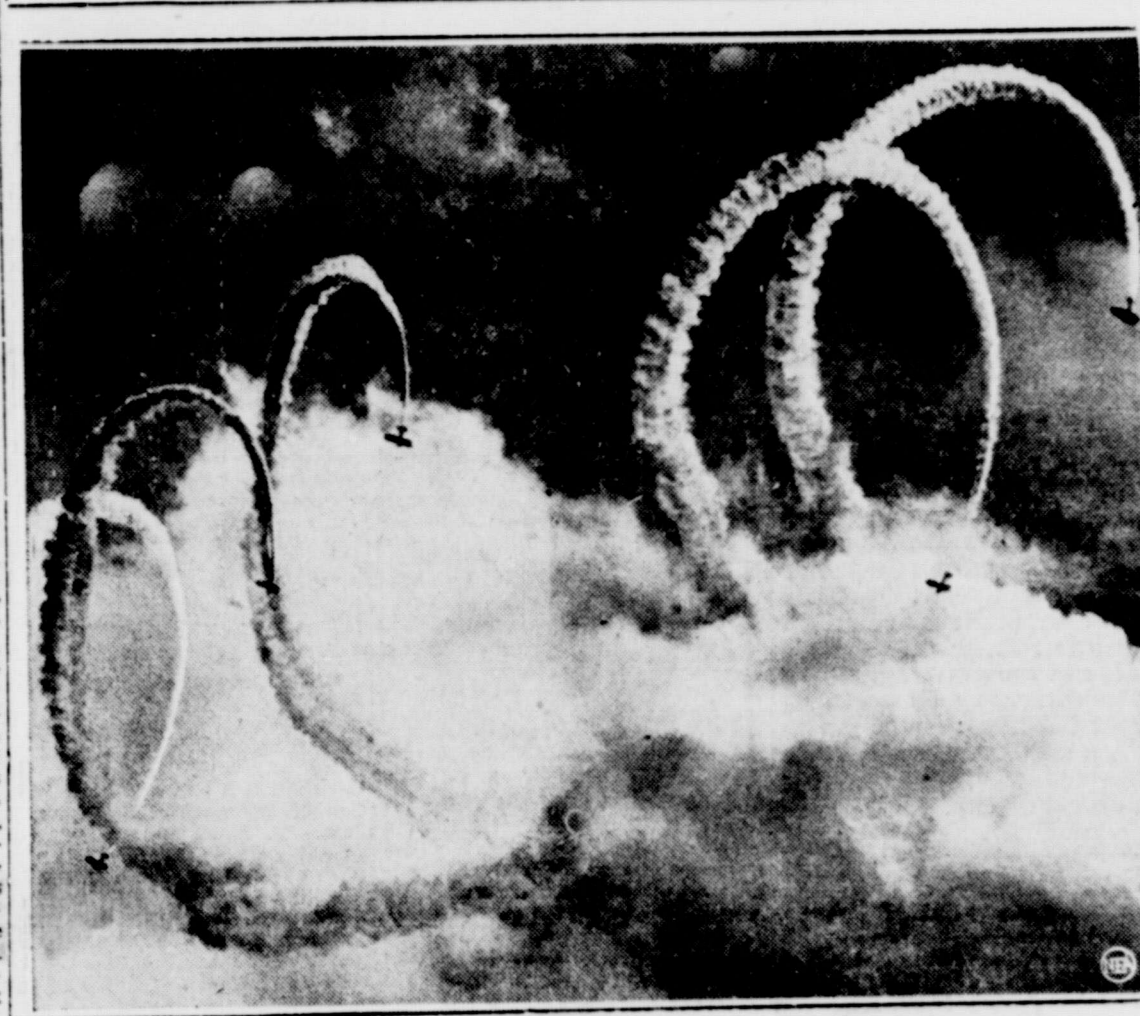
Cost of Feeding Nation's Needy Cuts Deep in Work Relief Fund

WASHINGTON, June 25. — Cost of feeding and clothing the nation's 20,000,000 unemployed until they become self supporting today cut into the New Deal's \$4,000,000,000 unemployment fund at the rate of almost \$4,000,000 every 24 hours. The work drive, meanwhile, moved forward slowly as officials labored to put it into active effect by July 15, with one million family heads and on federal payrolls. The president ordered back on every job, not less than 90 per cent of all workers in the ranks of the needy taken from relief rolls through the U. S. reemployment service.

RELIEF CASE PROBE OPENS AT EASTLAND

Reexamination of Eastland county's case lead to determine the eligibility of every client on relief rolls was begun yesterday by special workers from Austin headquarters. It was announced today by County Administrator H. E. Driscoll. The special workers will either assume the full responsibility for the task of re-registration or will work in conjunction with the case work staff of the county relief offices, Driscoll said. "These workers are directly responsible to Mrs. Val M. Keating, director of social service of the Texas Relief Commission, and their decisions are final as to eligibility of the relief client receiving aid from the Texas Relief Commission," Driscoll said. "These workers have been instructed to refuse all applicants whose income exceeds the allowed budget. They will compute resources and take into consideration old-job possibilities for employable persons, and deduct such earnings from budgetary requirements. As stated before, the recommendation of this staff of special workers will determine whether the case should be closed, or continue to receive relief. It is estimated this re-examination will entail three weeks work in this county. Meanwhile, work relief of the county was slowed down almost to a standstill. In Cisco only the cannery was in operation. Recently the relief work was stopped and then some of the projects were reopened, with clients working on a 50 per cent budget for June last week work was again stopped on everything here but the cannery, relief officials said.

TAX-THE-RICH PLAN PUSHED IN CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, June 25 — President Roosevelt drove his tax-the-rich program forward in congress today despite rebellion in the house and threats of senate filibuster. Schedules of proposed higher taxes on large corporations and personal fortunes were drafted. Schedules designed to carry out President Roosevelt's program and add \$340,000,000 a year to federal revenues were drawn up by Chairman Pat Harrison of the senate finance committee and treasury experts. Racing against time in a drive to enact them July 1, Harrison called his committee to meet at 4 p. m. to consider the new rates. In accordance with Mr. Roosevelt's demands Harrison said he would try to put the higher inheritance, income, and corporation taxes through as an amendment to the pending nuisance tax extension resolution.

St. Louis To Have Soldiers' Memorial

ST. LOUIS, June 25 — Approval by a citizens bond supervisory committee has enabled St. Louis to go ahead with plans for a "Shanghaï" memorial on the Plaza and to appropriate an additional \$100,000 to the million already provided for consideration. Total funds for the construction and the "development and maintenance" of the plaza reach \$1,000,000. A memorial plaza commission has been appointed to supervise planning. The new appropriation was made to permit stone for the building to be cut in St. Louis. The process will be more expensive but will take people from relief rolls and provide work for St. Louis labor.

Former Engineer Is Shot to Death

SAN ANTONIO, June 25. — Paul K. Sankey, 41, former El Paso city engineer, geologist, and former engineer in the Texas state highway department, was found shot to death in his hotel room here last night. A pistol lay beside him on a chair. Acquaintances said Sankey had been unemployed recently, was in ill health and despondent.

Kidnap Bill Passed By Senators Today

WASHINGTON, June 25 — In an attempt to strengthen kidnaping laws, the senate today passed and sent on to the White House a bill imposing heavy penalties on all persons convicted of writing ransom letters. WASHINGTON, June 15. — The senate today adopted a resolution extending the present temporary system of federal deposit insurance until June 30, 1936. There was no record vote. The resolution now goes to the house where administration leaders will attempt to rush it to a vote in time to prevent expiration of the present system at midnight Saturday.

NEW OIL FIELD DISCOVERED ON PIERCE RANCH

PIERCE, Tex., June 25 — The famous oil-cattle ranch of "Shanghaï" Pierce, noted Texas cowboy, became the state's newest oil field today when the Pierce Number Two wildcat came in. The well three quarters of a mile south of the discovery, came in after the latter had been abandoned as dry. The discovery well built up 1,600 pounds of pressure when it was allowed to flow.

SUSPECT HELD FOR DEATH OF TWO COUPLES

SANTA FE, N. M., June 25. — A man believed to be Jack Sullivan, formerly of Las Vegas, N. M., is under arrest in Nevada, Mo., for investigation in connection with the disappearance and supposed murder of four East St. Louis tourists, it was learned today. Authorities believed he had some knowledge of the disappearance of Mr. and Mrs. George Lorus and Mr. and Mrs. Albert Heberer, of East St. Louis. The two couples dropped from sight after leaving Albuquerque on May 22 to drive to Grand Canyon by way of Gallup. The United Press learned that the chief reason for Sullivan's arrest was that a man who was seen driving the Lorus car after the two couples disappeared had registered in an El Paso hotel as James Sullivan.

El Paso Bond Plan Beaten By Schools

AUSTIN, June 25 — Efforts of El Paso county to redeem all of \$154,000 county bonds, in which part of the state's permanent school fund has been invested, were defeated by the state board of education today. Instead, El Paso was authorized to redeem as much of the bonds as can be purchased by money in the county sinking fund for that particular issue. El Paso, seeking to save interest, proposed to redeem all the issue, buying part of it for the sinking fund of other bonds.

Murphy Nominated Islands Official

WASHINGTON, June 25 — President Roosevelt today nominated Frank Murphy of Michigan, present governor general of the Philippines, to be United States high commissioner to the Philippine Islands, to take office upon the inauguration of the government of the Philippine Commonwealth. Mr. Roosevelt also sent to the senate nominations of Harry L. Hopkins to be administrator of the works progress administration.

ROAD OFFICIAL IS HOPEFUL OF FLOOD MONEY

AUSTIN, June 25 — State Highway Commissioner John Wood returned today from Washington where a conference of Texas commissioners and federal road allotment officials was held. Wood said he was confident that \$4,500,000 or more will be authorized for flood damage repairs. Replacement of bridges washed out in floods will be the first thing to which funds will be applied. Wood added that Commission Chairman Harry Hines had returned to Wichita Falls and Commissioner D. K. Martin, to San Antonio.

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Matman Says Boxing Needs More Tricks

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ONE INJURED CRITICALLY IN BRIDGE CRASH

He was said to be suffering from extreme shock. Mrs. T. L. Bentley, 37, his daughter, Enid, Okla., suffered lacerations and abrasions. T. L. Bentley was treated for contusions of the body. The two Bentley children, Theresa, 11, and Wayne, 8, were also injured. Theresa suffered a laceration of the right knee, and Wayne a laceration on the right side of the face. The collision was said to have occurred today when the Bentley car and a truck driven by J. F. Ratliff of Albany of the Dean Brothers Oil company, met head-on on a narrow bridge. No injuries to the truck driver were reported. The Bentley car was traveling toward Cisco, from Santa Anna to Enid, Okla.

Cultural Press Is Ordered by Turkey

ANKARA, Turkey, June 25.—The Turkish direction of the press is trying to find out from newspaper readers in the country what sort of papers they really want. It will then make newspaper owners fall into line.

It has canvassed the public through the press asking:

"What do you think of people who do not read papers and what are their motives? Can you get the paper you want easily in your district? What do you want in your papers that you do not find there? Are you content with the paper you read?"

The replies are being considered at the Press Congress and will serve to establish what sort of a press is to be encouraged in Turkey.

The Direction of the Press desires to make the newspapers more serious and cultural, but hesitates to eliminate all human interest. A compromise will be reached.

Meanwhile to extend culture throughout the country, all cafes are being forbidden to allow card games or backgammon—a favorite Turkish pastime—to be played within them.

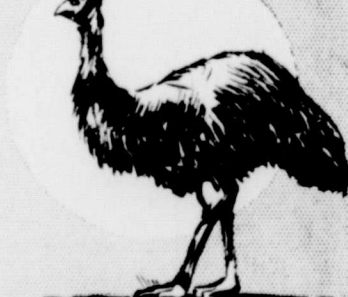
