Borah Endorses Tax Plan

Senator William E. Borah of Idaho is one of the outstanding republican progressive lawmakers of the nation. He is one of the ablest and one of the most widely known popular orators of the republic.

Texas became important for cheese production in 1928 when 983,-000 pounds of cheese was made. In 1929 2,202,000 pounds was produced

and 1930, 2,621,000. In 1931 the production figure jumped to 4,406,000 pounds. In 1932 t was 6,641,000 pounds and in 1933 3,095.000. No figures are availab for 1934.

It will be somewhat less than the average supply of the last five years, but will be about 5 per cent more than domestic disappearance in 1934, and about 9 per cent more than in 1933.

The figures include prospective production plus the carryover at the beginning of the 1935 crop season. There will be less meat and possibly less of some other livestock products available for consumption this year, but there will be adequate upplies of other foods to which etary shifts can be made.
