They are better livestock at lower cost and a ready market for the animals shown, both of which conditions are brought about at the fall show rather than the spring affair.

Feeding of animals through the winter months to get them in shape for the stock show costs a great deal more than many of the farmers and stockmen feel that they are justified in spending to be able to exhibit prize animals. At the same time, it costs much less to get the stock in shape for the fall showing, and they are perhaps actually in better condition. Actual cost of the show itself is lower in the fall, with feed costing less and other things about equal.





BOSTON, Sept. 19. - The old Marshall House, in Marshall Lane, within the shadows of Faneuil Hall, is one of the few buildings still standing here that offers a direct link with Revolutionary War days. Built in the early 18th Century, once was the home of Ebenezer Hancock, deputy paymaster-gener-al of the Continental Army.

In 1779, when Count D'Estaing arrived here with his fleet, his ships carried 2,000,000 silver crowns which King Louis XVI of France had sent as a loan to cover the back pay of the Continental Army The fortune was transferred from the shops to the Marshall House where it was stored until used

The Fall Livestock Show

Change of the annual Eastland county livestock show from a spring to a fall affair by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, which sponsors the exhibit, was for two reasons, it has been pointed out. They are better livestock at lower cost and a ready market for the animals shown, both of which conditions are brought about at the fall show rather than

Feeding of animals through the winter months to get them in shape for the stock show costs a great deal more than many of the farmers and stockmen feel that they are justified in spending to be able to exhibit prize animals. At the same time, it costs much less to get the stock in shape for the fall showing, and they are perhaps actually in better condition. Actual cost of the show itself is lower in the fall,

with feed costing less and other things about equal. Most farmers and stockmen have more money in the fall than they have in the spring due to the harvesting of crops with the attending annual payoff for them. They are better able, then, to purchase livestock in the fall than they would be six months later. Since the purpose of the livestock show is to promote interest in fine stock through exhibition and sale, and since farmers and stockmen are the principal buyers of the animals, the interest will be greatly increased by holding the show in the fall.

Last spring's stock show, although attended by bad weather at its opening, was termed the most successful ever held here, from the viewpoint of the quality of animals shown. Chamber of Commerce directors, in changing the date of the show from the spring to the fall, were hopeful of promoting more interest in it and in drawing exhibits from more stockmen of this part of West Texas.
