

Rome, Sept. 21. - Premier Benito Mussolini dared the risk of a disastrous war in Europe tonight by rejecting the proposals of the League of Nations and proceeding with his campaign for the conquest of Ethiopia.

An emergency meeting of the cabinet marked a turning point in the history of Italy, and possibly of the world. The cabinet decided that the offer does not present a "minimum basis" for the realization of Italy's rights and interests in Africa.

Ethiopia Ready For Mobilization **But Will Wait**

ADDIS ABABA, Sept. 21 -Italy's rejection of the League of Nations peace plan found Ethiopia prepared tonight to re-

sist invason to the last man. Plans for mobilization of Ethiopia's fighting force are completed but they are being with held for reasons of military strategy and to avoid providing Italy with anything that might be characterized as "provbca-

"There is no reason as yet for putting the mobilization plan into operation. For the next three weeks attack is impossible except in Ogaden province (bordering Italian Somaliland) where we have enough men to offer all the resistance we may wish to make at the outset," a high military official told the United Press.
