MUSSOLINI DARES NATIONS TO FIGHT

LEAGUE UPSET WHEN ITALY TURNS DOWN PROPOSAL AND PROCEEDS WITH WAR PLANS

Rome, Sept. 21. — Premier Benito Mussolini dared the risk of a disastrous war in Europe tonight by rejecting the proposals of the League of Nations and proceeding with his campaign for the conquest of Ethiopia.

An emergency meeting of the cabinet marked a turning point in the history of Italy, and possibly of the world. The cabinet decided that the offer does not present a "minimum basis" for the realization of Italy's rights and interests in Africa.

Fire Prevention Week

Mayor J. T. Berry, in issuing a proclamation making the week of October 6-12 Fire Prevention Week, has asked the cooperation of the citizenship of Cisco in preventing fires through proper application of education in prevention and protection.

During recent years Cisco has been able to cut its fire loss greatly to effect a substantial reduction on the key rate of fire insurance here. The losses and the insurance rate can be cut even more, however, by proper care in preventing fires.

Except for "fire bugs" there are few causes of fires which cannot be eradicated, and even the fires of incendiary origin can be eliminated by elimination of the "fire bugs," which apparently has happened here.

Not only are fires dangerous and costly to property and life as fires, but they are costly from the point of view of insurance rate. An effort toward reduction of city fires by insurance rate. An effort toward reduction of city fires by each individual pays dividends to that individual in a lowering of his own rate.

Cooperation in fire prevention education and in removal of hazards has been asked. It may pay in terms of both money and human lives.

Transfer of Board of Pardons

George Mendell is a long-time citizen of Dallas. He is a lawyer widely known the state over. He is a democrat. He was a law maker for several terms and he represented the voters of Travis county. First, last and all the time he is opposed to the transfer of the pardon board and he states his reasons. An act repealing chapter 348; house bill 390 of the acts of the regular session of the 44th legislature provided for the location of the board of pardons and paroles to Huntsville. This former lawmaker has prepared a repeal measure undoing the work of the lawmakers of the 44th. Section 2 of the proposed bill makes this very pointed declaration:

"The fact that this legislature removed the board of pardons and paroles to a place where it will not have access to the records of the secretary of state and the court of criminal appeals, which affect hundreds of the state prison convicts and made no provision for supplying said board with said records which are necessary to rendition of proper judgment in such cases, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the constitutional rule requiring bills to be read on three separate days in each house be suspended and the same is hereby suspended and this act shall take effect and be enforced from and after its passage and it is so enacted."

Weekly Sunday School Lesson

JAMES (A Great Christian Leader)

Text: James 1:1-17 The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Sept. 22.

TWO of the 12 apostles were named James—James the son of Zebedee and James the son of Alphaeus. The latter is supposed to be the James referred to in Matthew 13:55, and tradition makes him the cousin or the half-brother of Jesus.

It was this James who presided over the mother church at Jerusalem. He was a man apparently distinguished by his uprightness of character and by his practical good sense and judgment in the problems and affairs of the early church. Out of this reputation he was called "James the Just."

Despite the great respect in which he was held, the bigotry of his enemies was sufficient to accomplish his death by stoning. But as man and martyr he was honored by the Christian community, and he has left us a heritage of his Christian judgment and counsel in the Epistle that bears his name.

HERE in our lesson we study him as a great Christian leader. What were the marks of this man that made him a Christian leader?

First of all, he was a servant of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ. He had devoted his life supremely to a high ideal of faith and character and allegiance to the Master. He had made his life strong through conquest, and he admonishes the early Christians not to be afraid of the testing that comes through life's trials and temptations, but to make occasion of these things to prove their faith and endurance.

Christians if they lack wisdom to turn to God as the source of wisdom; but their attitude, he says, must be one of determined quest.

They must not be like the waves of the sea, driven with the wind and tossed about. The Christian is a man of single-mindedness and stability of purpose.

THE spirit of James is manifest in his advice concerning relationships in the early church. The privileges of the gospel lift the man of low degree to high estate, and the man of wealth and place must realize that the obligations of love and service bring to him something far greater than his wealth, while at the same time they make him a lowly member of a great fellowship. Rich and poor are alike under the law of love.

The strength of James and the value of his counsel are particularly manifest in his dealing with those faced with temptation. Temptations, he makes it plain, do not come from God. But they are inevitable in the earthly life that man is leading.

There is that in man's own nature that responds to the allurements of evil from without, and James bids us be careful about these inner lusts and sins that would sweep us away in the hour of trial.

HE pictures the Christian as living under the rich endowment of a gracious God who pours down from above good and perfect gifts. With this Father of Lights there is no variation, neither shadow nor turning, and the man who persistently seeks God's guidance will inevitably find it.

Thank God for the Jameses who have been in the Christian church in every age—steady, trustworthy, sensible leaders, for whom practical religion has been more a reality, speculation, and controversy.

Loboes Score 25 to 14 Upset Over Wildcats In Opener

76-YARD DASH BY BEASLEY IS FEATURE PLAY

Cisco's black clad Loboes Friday night scored a sensational upset in a 25 to 14 victory over the Wildcats in the first game of the season on Chesky field.

It was a case of a fast, hard hitting team that clicked against a slower team. The Loboes swept the Wildcats off their feet in the first half and after a brief lull in the free-scoring final period, came back to drive down the field for a fourth touchdown.

Beasley's Dash
The feature of the game was the 76-yard dash down the sidelines by Poppey Beasley for a touchdown as the final quarter opened. A few minutes later Jennings of Electra kicked off a 55 yard dash for a score. In the first quarter Rylee shot two field goals, both of which were completed for good gains that carried the Loboes nearly to the goal.

Jennings Scores
Then Jennings broke through right tackle, cut back, and sailed the rest of the way down the field unhindered for a touchdown. A plunge was good for the extra point. To make the score Cisco 13, Electra 14.

Things looked bad momentarily, but the Loboes uncorked a drive that carried them down the field from their own 39, where Rylee had returned the kickoff.

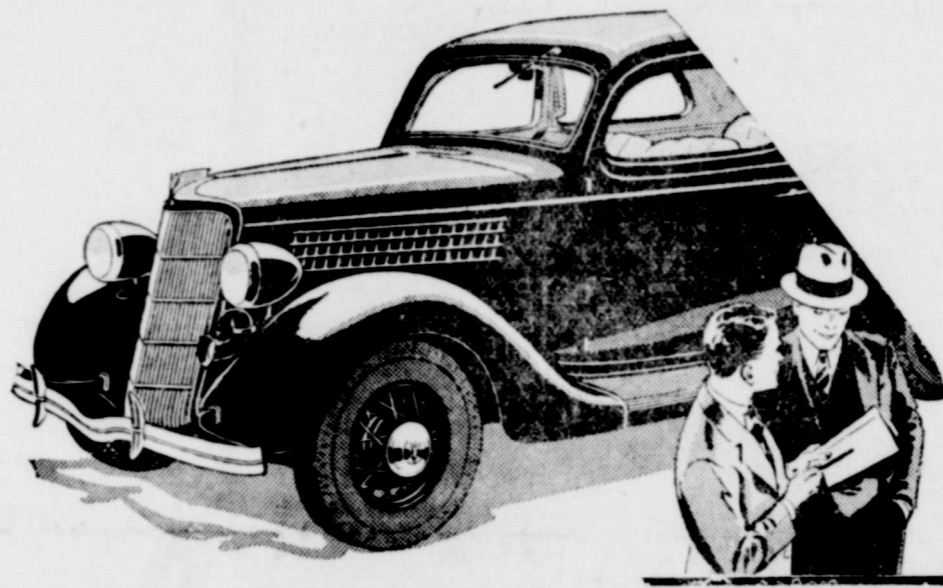

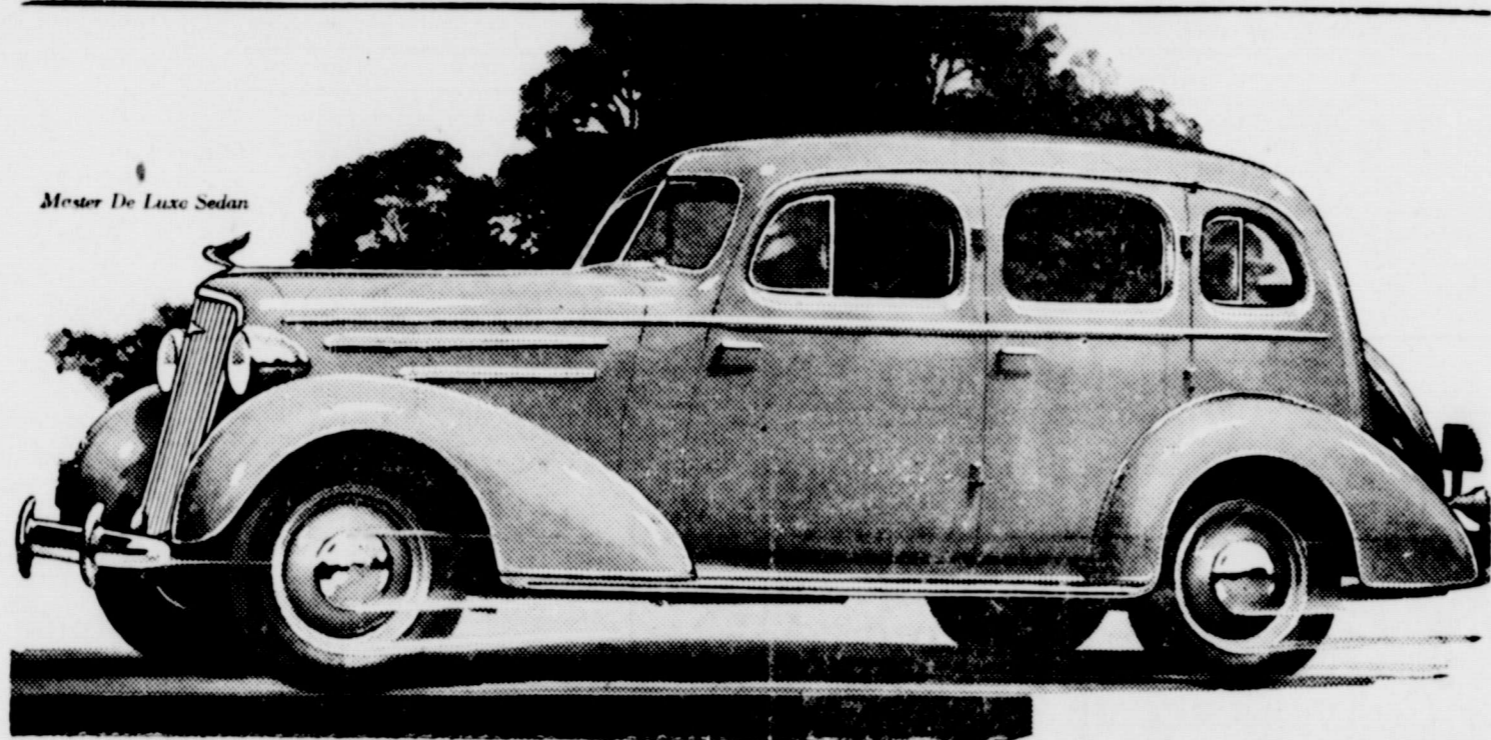

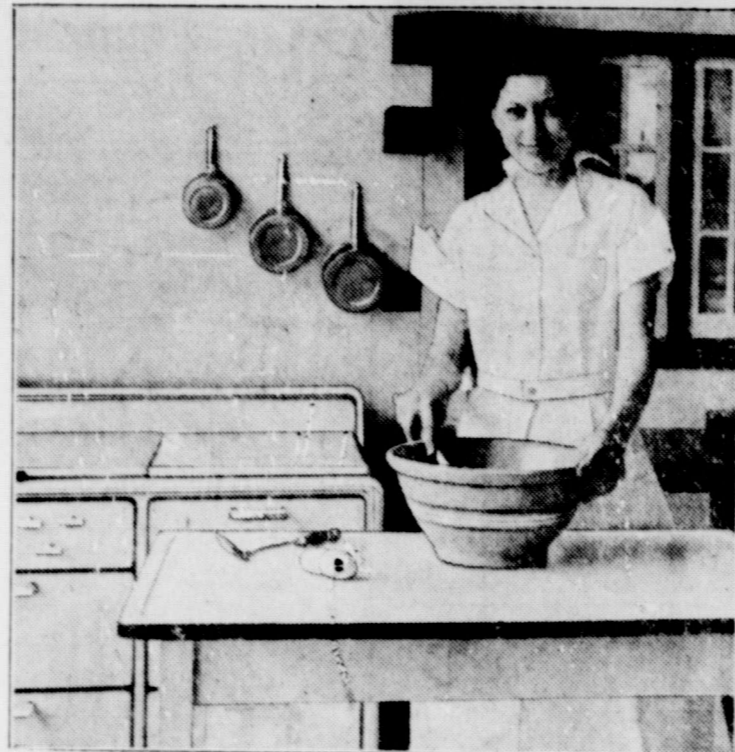
