Treasury Speaker GOV'T FACES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24. — Federal officials turned with some apprehension today to the problem of feeding needy miners and their families during the soft coal strike. Despite the bitterness of the wage negotiations, those close to the situation had not abandoned hope a protracted strike could be avoided The relief problem was serious, not only from a financial point of view but from a point of view of policy. Officials decided that during the cotton textile strike last year relief would not be granted until destitution was at hand. A similar poli-

cy likely will be followed now. Edward McGrady, assistant secretary of labor, advised relief Administrator Harry Hopkins to be prepared for calls for aid from the mining district.

The action stirred up new resentment against McGrady among operators, who have felt he was attempting to force them into an agreement with the United Miners association.



The cabinet's statement denied Italy had made counter proposals to the League of Nations proposal of the League's conciliation committee of five last Saturday. After announcing that the cabi-

O'n hectic days it seems as if kitchen than any other place, and that if you take your eyes for one second from the vegetables on the stove they burn or otherwise mis-behave. And that's where you prove your mettle as a house-keeper by knowing how to turn failure into success

Any vegetable that has just started to burn can be placed—in its cooking pan—into a larger pan of cold water. The vegetable then should be SHAKEN, not scraped, out of the burned pan into a fresh pan or bowl, leaving the sauce is very lumpy it can be the scorched portion in the pan. If not done, a little boiling water can be added and the cooking finished. Season and serve as usual, and nobody will know the difference.

If the breakfast cereal lumps despite vigorous stirring, use a heavy wire whisk or a strong dover heater.

Shake Pan to Prevent Scorching

An excellent precaution for the new cook is to shake the sauce adding butter and flour rubbed totirring might do. Potatoes and curdle, too. sliced carrots are examples of vegetables that often scorch.

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
