DETROIT, Oct. 3. — The Detroit Tigers were hot as the weather was cold today and with 46,742 yowling fans looking on from the wind swept stands, defeated the Chicago Cubs, 8 to 3, in the second game of the World Series.

Time of the game was one hour and 50 minutes. The Tigers rallied around Tommy Bridges to give him the support needed to take the game from the team which yesterday defeated Schoolboy Rowe.

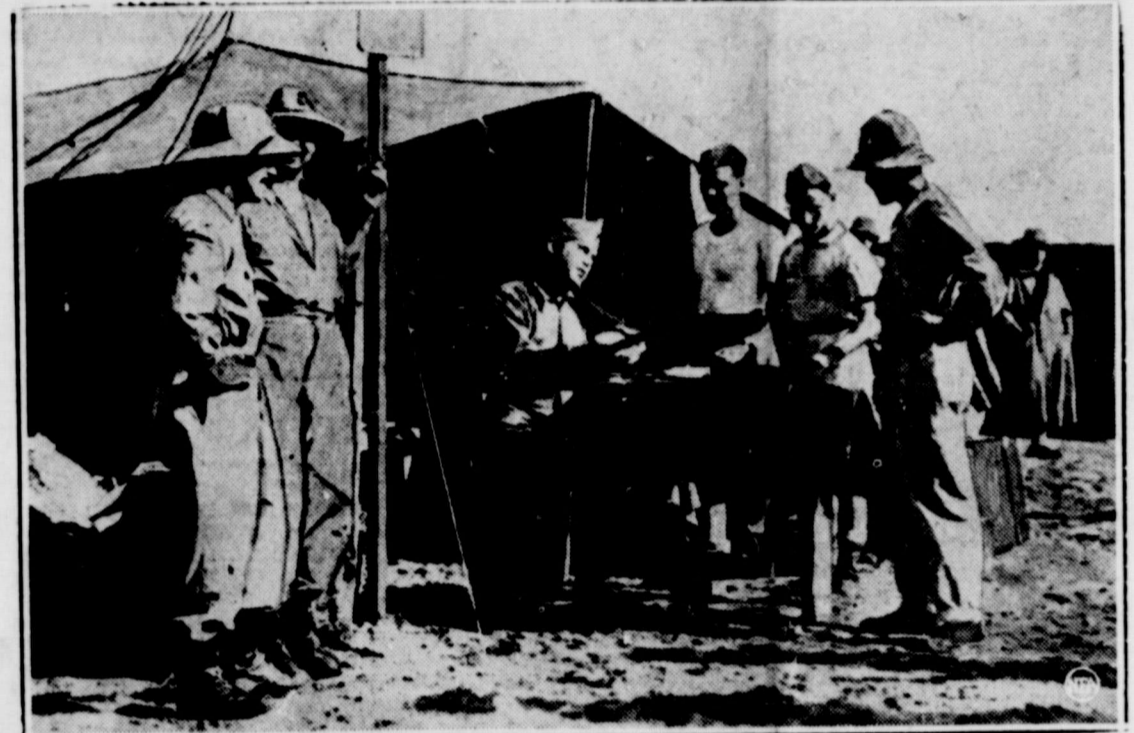
Following is the play by play report of the game:

Wets and Drys in Legislature Ready For Finish Fight Upon Drink Sales

AUSTIN, Oct. 3. — Wets and drys in the Texas legislature prepared for a finish fight today on sale by the drink of liquor.

Before the house was a substitute bill by Representative J. Bryan Bradbury, Abilene, and others to license the sale in package stores only.

No sales would be permitted by the drink, an broken packages, or for consumption on the premises.

Backing the Bradbury plan were advocates of the defeated state monopoly setup.

PARENT NIGHT WILL BE HELD HERE TONIGHT

Parents of high school pupils tonight will have an opportunity to meet their children's teachers and to learn why they are studying the subjects they are taking in Cisco high school.

Parents night, which was held two years ago, will again be held tonight. It has been announced by Superintendent R. N. Cluck. The program will begin at 7:30.

Each parent, upon reaching the high school, will be given a copy of his child's schedule and will follow it, spending five minutes in each class. There the teacher will explain briefly the objects of the course.

"The object of parents night is two-fold," the superintendent said. "First, it gives the parents and teachers an opportunity to meet each other and to form a better understanding of the child. Second, it gives the parents an opportunity to learn the objects of the courses which their children are studying."

Following the schedule of classes, the home economics department will serve refreshments, it was announced.

Bandits Shoot Down Chicago Policeman

CHICAGO, Oct. 3 — Two bandits who had up a bank messenger at the union railroad station, shot and killed a policeman today.

The bandits, who fired on the policeman, William Stringfellow, as he reached for his gun, escaped in a car waiting for them outside the terminal.

The messenger was carrying the money to the Fred Harvey restaurant.

Congressmen Line Up Against Wallace

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 — Republican and democrat members of congress formed a coalition today to fight Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, whom they accused of "nullifying the laws of the United States," by refusing to enforce the potato control act.

Storming into a meeting of potato growers, Senators Wallace, White and Josiah Bailey, the Agricultural Adjustment Administration enforce a law declaring potatoes a basic commodity. Wallace contended he could not enforce the law for lack of funds.

Warren and Bailey made angry speeches amid cheers from the 300 potato growers. At the luncheon recess, Bailey, Warren, and White left and considered means of bringing pressure on Wallace.

"I'm ready to conduct a filibuster if necessary, until kingdom come, if the AAA lacks down," Bailey said.

ITALY BLAMES WAR ATTITUDE OF ETHIOPIANS

ROME, Oct. 3 — Italian troops will continue to force their way into the interior of Ethiopia without waiting for the official declaration of war.

If any explanation is demanded Rome will claim that Ethiopia, continued "aggressive attitude makes war necessary to safeguard Italian colonies bordering Ethiopia.

In quarters close to Mussolini, the United Press learned that Il Duce feels much relieved now that the decisive step has been taken. His friends said he had been under an almost inhuman strain for many weeks as he fought to carry through his program without setting a torch to European peace.

It was reported that Mussolini has spent many sleepless nights, drinking tea constantly. Last night his emotion reached a climax. Those close to him said that in his speech he scarcely could form his sentences.

SEEK TO ADJUST ITALIAN ADVANCE

ROME, Oct. 3 — An official announcement today that the Italian commander in chief in East Africa had gone into action at the Italian troops positions "beyond our lines," was followed by a statement seeking to adjust the Italian advance.

BRITISH WILL NOT CLOSE SUEZ CANAL

PARIS, Oct. 3. — The British government does not intend to close the Suez canal, it was asserted officially today.

It was understood the question was raised whether ships of Italy could not be "intercepted."

The possibility that such interception might be legal was based on the belief that sanctions may be voted against Italy by the League. The final legal point appeared to be whether interception under the act would constitute an act of war or would be compatible with an economic boycott. It is presumed the study is being conducted in Paris because the headquarters of the Suez canal company are here, although more than half the stock is British owned.

Neither Side Has Yet Formally Declared War; No Declaration To Be Issued By Ethiopians Is Belief

Latest War Developments:
The War Front, by way of Asmara — Italian troops, artillery, machine guns, planes, and tanks begin march into Ethiopia.

Addis Ababa Italian planes bomb two towns, destroying many houses with considerable casualties.
Toulouse — 50 Italians attacked by French crowd.

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ADDIS, ABABA, October 3. — The Italian army poured across the Ethiopian border today, while Italian planes rained bombs on two northern towns and Emperor Haile Selassie ordered general mobilization.

Government advices were that heavy casualties, including women and children, occurred in the bombed towns of Aduwa and Adigrat, near the Italian Eritrean border, where the advance began.

Aduwa, scene of the massacre of thousands of Italians in 1896, was reported in flames. Fifteen houses were destroyed there and 100 in Adigrat.

Fighting was in progress on other fronts. A large Italian force was operating in the region of Mount Mussa Ali near the French border, and fighting was reported on the southern front, bordering Italian Somaliland.

Report 800 Mowed Down

An entirely unconfirmed report said that 800 Ethiopians had been mowed down by Italian machine gun fire.

Count Luigi Gigliucci, Italian minister, demanded his passport, it was said.

Such a step will amount to severance of diplomatic relations. Ethiopia, however, does not intend to declare war, merely accepting the fact that a state of war exists. The Italian legation there. Italian residents will leave for Djibouti tomorrow or Saturday. The legation and homes of all Italians were heavily guarded to protect them from mobs.

The emperor's call of mobilization brought thousands of black warriors streaming to the capital as the big war drum throbbed rhythmically from the palace. Native runners ran to carry the word to the scattered tribes and the news traveled by grapevine telegraph and the beating of drums in relays from village to village.

Italians Cross Border At Dawn Today

GENERAL HEADQUARTERS, ITALIAN ARMY, Oct. 3. — The Italian advance into Ethiopia was started today.

The initial objective was Aduwa. The Italians crossed the Marceb river frontier at widely separated points, all converging in heavy columns toward Aduwa.

Squadrons of bombing, fighting, and scout planes roared south from the Asmara area, topping great mountain peaks that presented a defense for the ancient unconquered kingdom.

Fifteen giant Caproni bombers were in the fleet from one field alone. Many other planes took off.

The first troops took their position along the Marheb river.

Soon, before dawn, skirmishers arrived and waded the shallow stream and, with bayoneted rifles ready, stepped across the border, the first line of the army.

The army took off from the hills on the Italian side at the end of fine stone roads which Italian workmen had hacked, over great precipices, at the end of a new system of wells which had supplied water, from thousands and thousands of tons of stores, packed in stone buildings, from thousands of low tents which had sheltered the men on the Asmara plateau.

The men surveyed before them hill after hill on the Ethiopian side, uprighted by great gulfs of gorges, hills that presented an obstacle even without an enemy.

Claim Italy Bombed Red Cross Hospital

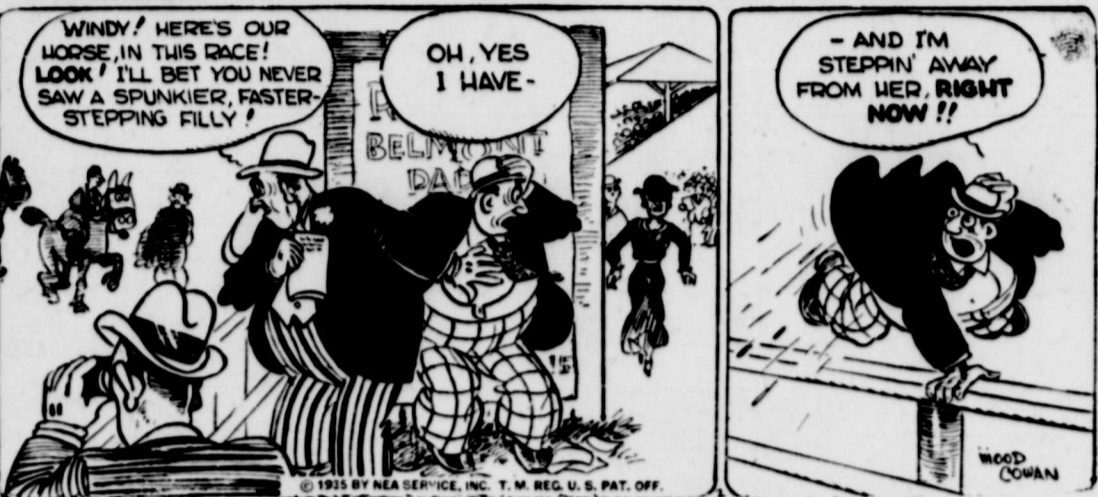
GENEVA, Oct. 3. — Ethiopia accused Italy today of bombing a hospital flying the Red Cross flag, and simultaneously the League committee took what was regarded as the first step toward moral condemnation of Italy for invading Ethiopia.

The committee of 13, which is really the council itself, comprising all members except Italy, and designed a subcommittee of five powers to report its judgment on the merits of the dispute.

SISTER MARY'S RECIPES

NOW'S the time to get the good of your root vegetables for they are at their best—beets, carrots, turnips, and the like, sweet and tender.
Also, until a killing frost comes, eggplant, cauliflower, sweet peppers, late spinach, tomatoes and lima beans are plentiful. Curly endive and celery will be good until hard frost. Late cabbage really needs a good nip of frost to improve its flavor and give it body for that frothy cole-slaw that is so surprisingly difficult to achieve.
The hard-shelled, full-flavored squash comes into market to take its place in either main course or dessert. Squash pie, squash custard and squash pudding are delicious and nourishing desserts. Baked squash, squash and hot croquettes, squash soufflé and cream of squash soup are appetizing ways of using the vegetable in the main course.

Tomorrow's Menu
BREAKFAST: Chilled sweet cider with lemon juice, cereal, cream, shredded eggs, squash muffins, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON: Egg plant with cheese on toast, celery hearts, apple slump, milk, tea.
DINNER: Jelly omelet and toast, ten-minute Chinese cabbage, lima beans and corn in cream, green pepper and grape fruit salad, grape sherbet, sponge cake, milk, coffee.

Watch for Late Fruits
And late friends—pears, grapes, peaches and quinces are plentiful and apples of course with elder and nuts to give variety to menus.
Grapes are good as a breakfast fruit and for luncheon and dinner desserts. The juice makes fine sherbets and frappes, whips, sponges and gelatin confections. Game is added to the usual poultry and meat. Pork stags a comeback and oysters are with us again.
A good way to use up one-half cup of left-over cooked squash is in muffins. They are quite unusual and have a delightful flavor.

Grape Sherbet
One-half cup sugar, 1 cup water, 1 teaspoon granulated gelatin, 1 cup grape juice, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1-3 cup orange juice, 1 egg white, few grains salt.
Make a syrup of sugar and water and stir in gelatin which has been softened in 2 tablespoons cold water. Cool and add fruit juice. Turn into freezer or refrigerator of automatic refrigerator. Freeze to a mush. Fold in egg beaten until stiff and freeze until firm.
