AUSTIN, Oct. 16 - The second special session met at noon today to consider old age assistance and revenue measures. Senator W. R. Poage, Waco, was elected president pro tem of the senate and received the gavel from Senator Jim Neal, Laredo, who held the place between the first and second sessions.

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Britain's Concern

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on a special mission by the British government to recon- sider the whole river basin, includ- ing the Blue Nile right up to Lake Tana.

Dam Called Need
In 1904 Garstin proposed the construction of a dam at Lake Tana the most urgent of several measures for holding up the waters of the Nile.

In 1921, following a further in- vestigation, it was estimated that a dam would cost \$11,500,000 with- out \$9,000,000 for road con- struction.

In the meantime, 1902, Menelik agreed "that there is to be interference with the waters of the Blue Nile and Lake Tana in consultation with the British government and the Sudan government."

That in connection with any such interference, all conditions being equal, prefer- ence will be given to the pro- posals of the British and Sudan governments and the Emperor Me- nek has no intention of giving any assent that relate to the Blue Nile and Lake Tana except in agreement with the governments of Britain and the Sudan.

Three Nations Sign Pact
In 1906 the tripartite agreement signed between Britain, Italy and France, under which the three nations undertook to cooperate in the event of rivalries or internal differences in Ethiopia, and agreed to a neutral attitude, abstaining from all intervention in its internal affairs.

One of the clauses of this agree- ment stated that Britain, France and Italy agreed to "safeguard the interests of Britain and Egypt in the Nile basin, more especially as regards the regulation of the wa- ters of that river and its tributaries."

In 1915 a joint Egyptian-Sudan- Ethiopian expedition was sent to survey the lake, but was prevented by political turmoil. In 1930, a United States firm, J. White Engineering Corporation, surveyed the lake on behalf of the Ethiopian and Sudan govern- ments.

The cost involved was so big how- ever that the co-operation of the British government was sought. Another survey party was sent in 1933.

A conference arranged for last year and now postponed indefinitely, is the direct outcome of this survey. It is from creating a huge reser- voir a dam would materially help in the regulation of the Nile's wa- ters. At present Lake Tana gives the greatest contribution to the Blue Nile at the time when the river in the Sudan is amply supplied by other sources — principally the White Nile and the Atbara — gives its smallest contribution to the river is low, that is in May, June and July.

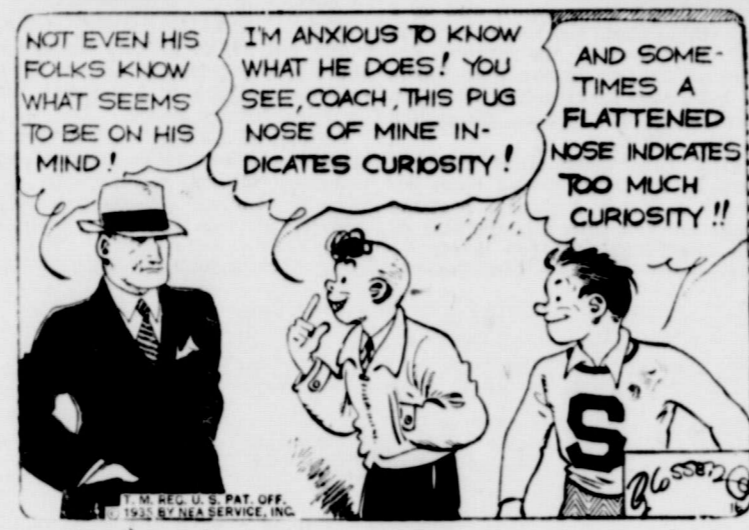

CISCOANS SEE NEW FORD AT DALLAS SHOW

Through invitation of S. H. Nance of the Nance Motor company and the Ford Motor company of Dallas, this writer was privileged to journey to Dallas yesterday and see the new Ford for 1936. Others who attended this premier showing were Pete Nance, Charlie Yates, W. B. Statham, Jay Richardson and H. G. Locke, Rev. Frank L. Turner accompanied the party as far as Fort Worth.

Upon arriving in Dallas, we immediately went to the Fair Park auditorium where the showing was held. Approximately 1000 Ford dealers and salesmen were there waiting for the show to begin, each one anxious to see the new Ford, and believe you me they saw an automobile that would do justice to any built, in looks, mechanically and in stability. But wait, I am getting ahead of myself.

First of all everyone was seated in the auditorium and one of the officials of the Ford Motor company in Dallas, made a speech welcoming the dealers and salesmen there and then a six reel show was presented on a screen showing the Ford plants that are scattered in the four corners of the earth. In this screen show, pictures of the actual work carried on in these gigantic plants were shown and as I was seated there the high mechanical operations of the various devices required to make a Ford flash back and forth before my eyes. In other words I saw an automobile in the making.

After the screen show everyone went to the large dining room for dinner, and what a dinner. A young squab chicken with dressing and all the trimmings. To top it off ice cream and cake for dessert. It took about 30 minutes to consume this delicious dinner and then a smoke and what not.

Around 1:30 we went back to the auditorium and an orchestra entertained us for a while. More pictures were shown regarding the various commercial units of the Ford for 1936. Then introductions of the officials of the Dallas branch of the Ford Motor company. Plans regarding the program for 1936 were submitted to the dealers and salesmen and then the showing—and what a showing. When the large curtain was raised we saw before us one of the most beautiful displays of the new Ford cars for 1936 I have ever seen.

Shift In AAA Is Planned by Gov't

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 — The Roosevelt administration is considering a shift in the AAA to place all cooperating farmers under a single contract covering the tilling of their entire farms, it was learned today.

Such a shift, if decided upon, would not affect present contracts, but might be offered farmers after existing contracts and those to be announced soon expire.

Influential AAA officials urge the broader and long range proposals necessary for soil conservation to simplify administration and to meet criticism of red tape and bureaucracy.
