SISTER MARY'S RECIPES

Tomorrow's Menu
BREAKFAST: Baked pears, cereal, cream, crisp broiled bacon, soft cooked eggs, toast, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON: Cream of corn soup, toasted rolls, mixed fresh fruits in lemon jelly, cup cakes, milk, tea.
DINNER: Tomato and beet juice cocktail, roast chicken, rice, potatoes, carrots in orange sauce, apple and celery and nut and raisin salad, frozen peach mold, cocoanut kisses, milk coffee.

It's a fact, proved now by science, and suspected by some of our teeth of many of our generation are the result of inadequate diet when we were young. Our parents thought they were giving us everything we needed, but now it seems they simply didn't know. These days we are aware that certain foods make strong bones, others develop muscles, create energy for immediate needs or protect against disease. Children need all these foods daily to grow and keep healthy.

Milk, vegetables, cereals and fruits must be abundant. Meat not so much so. One specialist in children's diets says that the "meat portion should be the size of the palm of the child's hand." Leafy vegetables are important, being rich sources of tooth and bone building material. A child not much over a year old should have one or two leafy vegetables, finely-minced, every day.

Cereals can be used in gruels from the time a child is six months old. Gradually thickened, they may appear in porridge form by the time he is a year old. In a restricted diet, cereals can be used profitably twice a day. Two kinds may be served for sake of variety and preference should be given to those made from whole grains.

Children love ice cream and it's so little trouble to make and so nourishing for them that it should be served often. By varying the flavor, it can be used repeatedly without danger of becoming monotonous.

Frozen Peach Mold
Two cups milk, 1 package unflavored ice cream powder, 2 cups whipping cream, 1-2 cup sugar, 2 cups fresh peach pulp, few grains salt, 4 drops almond extract.

Add milk very gradually to ice cream powder, stirring until dissolved. Whip cream until firm and fold first mixture into it. Turn into freezing tray of automatic refrigerator and freeze as rapidly as possible. Stir thoroughly three times during first hour of freezing. At second stirring add mixture of sugar, peach pulp, salt and almond extract. Cream should be thick for third stirring. Let freeze until firm. Serve cut in slices or pack in melon mold and garnish with slices of fresh fruit.

To freeze in mold fill mold full of frozen cream, packing it in firmly. Cover with waxed paper and press cover of mold tightly over paper. Unless you are absolutely sure that your cover makes a tight seal dip a strip of cloth into hot oil and bind around the cover where it fits around the mold. Pack in four parts ice to one part ice cream and salt and let stand one hour or longer. To unmold wrap in hot towel wrung out in hot water around mold and invert on a chilled serving platter.

Tomorrow's Menu
BREAKFAST: Grapes, cereal, creamed dried beef on toast, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON: Scalloped corn, sliced tomatoes, hot buttered rolls, fruit punch.
DINNER: Melon ball cocktail, cheese souffle, creamed celery, jellied beet salad, fresh berry tarts, milk, coffee.

Garnish with whipped cream and a contrasting fruit. Or use ice cream or sherbet instead of whipped cream. If you use halved peaches, fill the cavity of each peach with raspberry sherbet. Or try pistachio ice cream with a slice of fresh pineapple.

Making Crusts for Tarts
Berry tarts are another easy-to-make dessert. The trick of making the shells is baking the crust on the OUTSIDE of the patty pans rather than the inside.

If you want to glaze the fruit to give it that professional French pastry look, melt a clear apple or currant jelly enough to spread easily and cover berries after they are placed in the tart shells. A rosette of whipped cream may top each tart but don't make the mistake of completely masking the fruit with cream because you will spoil your lovely color effect if you do.

Fresh fruit served in sherbet glasses topped with a sprinkling of fresh grated cocoanut or whipped cream mixed with cocoanut makes a delicious dessert. This is a good way to use up odds and ends of fruit.

Weslaco To Hold Its Annual Party

WESLACO, Oct. 26—Weslaco's annual birthday party celebration has been tentatively scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday, December 11 and 12, according to Gus S. 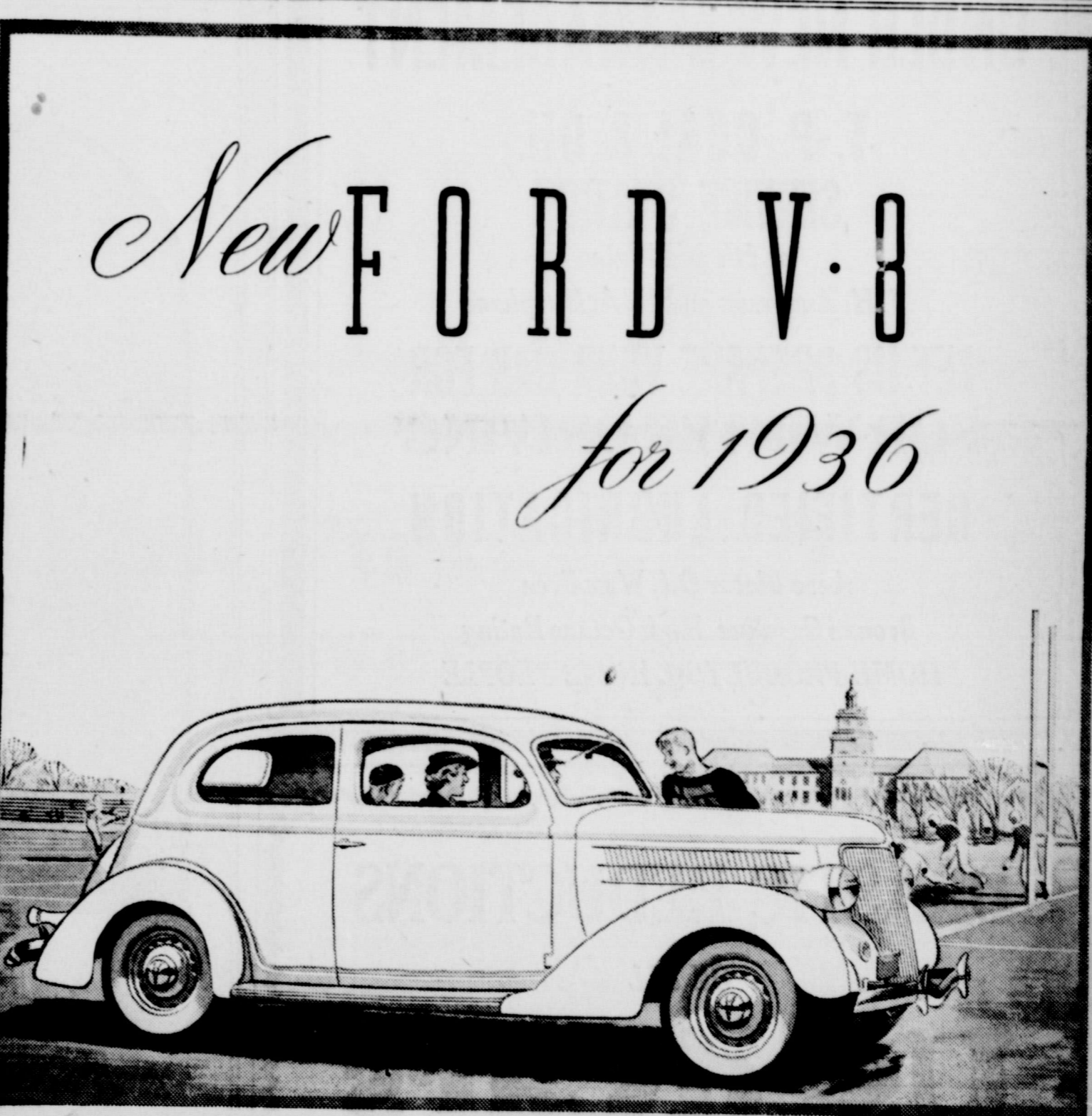

RETAIL SALES IN SEPTEMBER ARE GREATER

AUSTIN, Oct. 26 — Retail sales in Texas during September compared favorably with the previous month, and also with September last year, according to the University of Texas bureau of business research.

Reports from 88 representatives of Texas establishments showed average dollar sales 3.7 per cent above those of September a year ago and 40.3 per cent over the previous month. The usual seasonal increase from August to September is 35.3 per cent.

Aggregate dollar sales for the first nine months were 4.8 per cent greater than for the corresponding period last year. The increase in sales over September and the year to date was above the average for the state in the following cities: Austin, Beaumont, Dallas, and San Antonio.

Of the different types of stores the best relative showing was made by women's specialty shops, followed in order by large department stores, men's clothing stores, small department stores, and dry goods and apparel stores.

The ratio of credit sales to total sales was 4.2 per cent above a year ago, and the ratio of collections to outstanding accounts was about 1 per cent better than last year.

Boyce House Tells of Wild, Money-Mad Days of Oil Belt in His Recent Book

Trips across the street in the famous sled, shown above, by citizens and visiting oil men in Ranger during the boom days—at so much a trip, cash in advance—are included in the incidents portrayed by Boyce House, former editor of the Ranger Times, Eastland Telegram, and Cisco Daily News, in his book, "Were You In Ranger," which has just appeared.

The book deals with the wild, roaring, money-mad days in the Oil Belt, especially Ranger, following discovery of oil in the McCleskey well.

Cisco, DeLeon, Dublin, Leera, Merriman, Eastland, Desdemona, and Breckenridge, all have their places in the most readable book dealing with the boom that has yet been written.

Nitro Explosion Here

Speaking of nitroglycerin used in shooting the oil wells, House says: "As deadly but not as annihilating as the nitroglycerin in process of manufacture. A factory near Cisco blew up, killing two men. Fragments of flesh and bits of timber were found near Lake Bernie. He spins many yarns of incidents that actually happened to the well shooters, as well as to others in the Oil Belt in those hectic days.

House tells the following about the famous railroad race to Breckenridge:

"R. Q. Lee, who formerly ran a country store in the village of Caddo and was destined to die as a member of Congress, was the man who took the lead in giving his home town of Cisco a railroad into

Breckenridge.

"In March, 1920, all three of the racing lines, from Cisco, Eastland, and Ranger, were laying rails in Stephens county, each striving to be the first into Breckenridge, while the Wichita Falls and Southern from Newcastle, approaching Breckenridge from the north, was the fourth contender. The isolated city, like a princess imprisoned in a tower, watched the gallant suitors dashing to her rescue.

Staking Out Towns

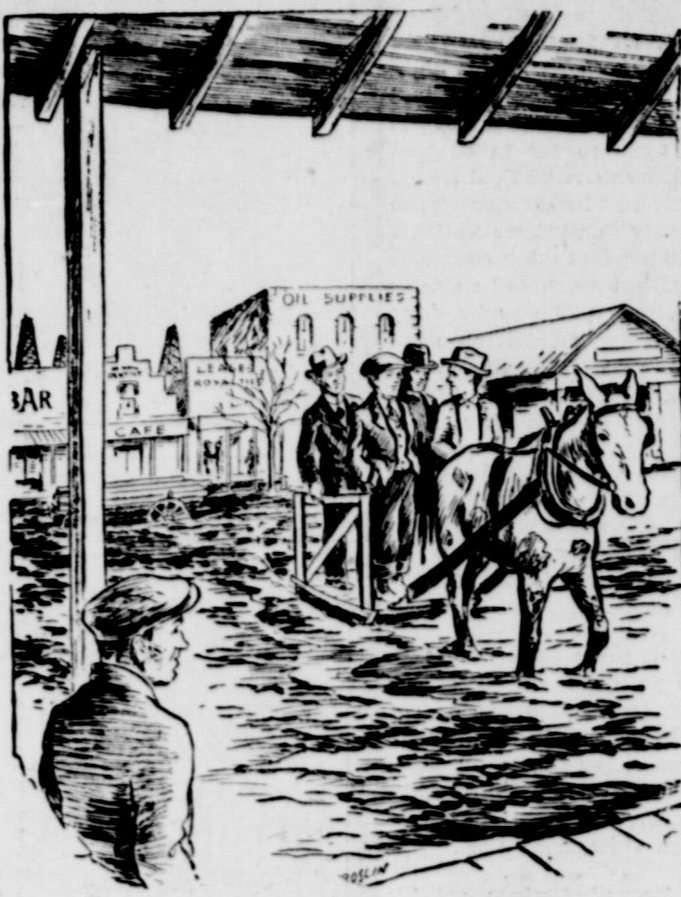
Added thrills were given to the spectacle as townsites were thrown open ahead of the rails. Bare spaces were staked out, eight or ten miles apart, given the name of some man associated with the railroad project and, after a fanfare of advertising, the sale was held on a given day.

"The greatest of all was the opening day of the Jakehamon townsite sale. Involved in the launching of that city was the ambitious design of virtually compelling a city of 16,000 inhabitants to move overnight—in other words, the practical wiping out of world-famed Desdemona."

VALUE OF CCC WORKS SHOWN NEAR LUFKIN

LUFKIN, Oct. 26—Value of CCC work in the woods and parks, and economical value of the allotment checks of CCC enrollees faded in some East Texas communities before the recreational facilities in isolated communities.

All CCC personnel, whether army officers in charge of the camps or forest, or park, or soil conservation service officials in charge of work projects, are instructed to cooperate in every way with local people.

Most welcome form of such cooperation in many small towns are the stunt nights, boxing and wrestling matches, free picture shows, dances, and other recreational activities of the camps. No charge is made for any CCC activities except dances, when sufficient money to pay for the music is collected.

With the opening of the autumn county fair season virtually every one of the 25 CCC camps in the Lufkin district has taken an active part in the fairs of their counties, furnishing trucks for the parades, displays for the exhibit halls, fascinated and spendthrift spectators for the midway attractions.

At the opening of the Angelina

County fair at Lufkin the army furnished a car, two trucks, and two ambulances for the parade from the district headquarters motor pool; Texas forest service furnished three realistically decorated trucks; and the U. S. Forest service, which has a headquarters but no camp near Lufkin, sent in two trucks from outlying camps.

Popular in local circles are the "showboats" of the colored camps at Lufkin, Nacogdoches, San Augustine, Oakhurst and Zavalla, whose quartets, hoofers, and instrumentalists appear at churches, luncheon clubs, and the like, as well as drawing crowds at their weekly stunt nights.

A group of white enrollees at the Madisonville camp has organized an entertainment program which is exhibited without charge at the schoolhouses in the vicinity, at churches and before organizations which invite them. The group receives more invitations than it can respond to.

Weekly Sunday School Lesson

BELSHAZZAR'S FEAST

(International Temperance Lesson)

Text: Daniel 5:17-28

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Oct. 27.

TEMPERANCE lessons have a new meaning, and there is a new need for them at an hour when such sins of debauchery as Belshazzar's feast can be duplicated on a small scale in so many communities.

The debauchery of individuals, of families and nations, through drink is always associated with other dire evils.

Belshazzar was ruler of a great and proud empire, but he had not established his empire in righteousness and truth. The fate of his father might well have warned him, for Nebuchadnezzar had ended his career of conquest and greatness a broken and pitiful figure.

Belshazzar had refused to be warned, and in the hour of wrath judgment had come upon him. Writing had come upon the wall which had struck terror to his heart, but which none of his soothsayers had been able to reveal.

Then in this hour of fear and need, the queen had remembered Daniel, the Hebrew captive, and they had brought Daniel into the king's presence to read the writing.

DANIEL, strong young hero, as disciplined in mind, soul and body as a well trained athlete, dared to speak to the king without subterfuge. He was prepared to read the writing, but before reading it he spoke out against Belshazzar the judgments of truth and righteousness.

He brings against the ruler the indictment that he has lifted up himself against the Lord of Heaven, that he has misused and desecrated divine things, and that he has perverted all true worship to things of silver and gold, of brass and iron.

"The God in whose hand thy breath is, and whose are all thy ways, hast thou not glorified," said Daniel.

With what sobering intensity these words must have come to the fear-stricken king! Then in this tense moment, Daniel begins to reveal the writing. "God hath numbered thy kingdom, and brought it to an end. Thou art weighed in the balances, and art found wanting. Thy kingdom is divided, and given to the Medes and Persians."

THERE is a significance in this lesson beyond the outward facts of history in the rise and fall of kings and kingdoms. We are told that in that night was Belshazzar, the Chaldean king, slain, and that Darius the Mede became the ruler of the kingdom. The Persian triumph is a matter of history. But the lessons of the story lie deeper, and they strike at the heart of every man's life.

Every man is called to be the king over his own soul. In the exercise of that sovereignty he may make his life great and secure, or he may make it foul and degraded.

"Dare to be a Daniel" is still a finger mark for the way of right and strength and honor.
