The Cisco Loboes will meet the Ranger Bulldogs Friday afternoon at 3:30 on Chesley field. The traditional Armistice Day contest was postponed because of bad weather which would have cut the attendance and hurt the crowd. It was announced this morning by Superintendent R. N. Cluck. "Ranger wanted to postpone the game and we wanted to postpone it, so we set the date for Friday," he said. The game will have to be played this week, regardless of weather, however, for Cisco has another contest scheduled for the following Friday and interscholastic league rules prohibit playing of two games in the same week. The superintendent said there will be no other games in the district and the Cisco-Ranger affair should draw a large number of fans. The game yesterday would have been in competition with the Breckenridge-Abilene affair, which would have hurt the attendance somewhat. It was the inclement weather, though, that caused the postponement. Playing Friday instead of Monday probably will aid the Cisco team, which has not quite recovered from the Eastland game. Some of the boys are still somewhat sore, and Fred Rylee, and Paul Ivie have been bothered by leg injuries.

## FROGS DUE TO MEET STEERS ON SATURDAY

FORT WORTH, Nov. 12 — The figures in the record book show that Texas Christian university goes up against its most difficult football opponent next Saturday — the University of Texas.

The Horned Frogs have managed to win from the state eleven only three times in 20 games played. Perhaps, though, the Frogs of today may take some satisfaction in the fact that all three of the victories have come in the last six years.

In other words, since the Frogs found out that the Steers could be beaten, they have won half of the time.

Rivalry between the two institutions dates back to 1897, when T. C. U. was located in Waco and known as Add-Ran college. The 1897 aggregation was the first football team to represent T. C. U. in inter-collegiate competition and they held Texas to an 19-10-10 victory.

Most of the games between the two teams have resulted in shut-out scores for the victors over the losers. Twelve of the Longhorns' 16 victories have left the Frogs without a single point. Twice the Frogs have left the Steers without a point. And in the lone tie game between the two, not a point was scored!

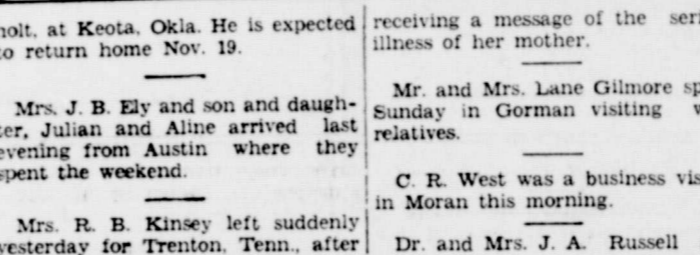
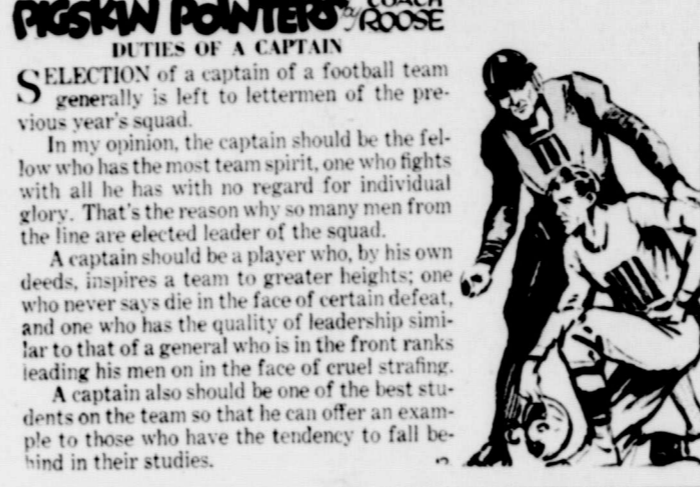
