

Harnessing of Brazos River on Way

Directors of the Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation District have chosen permanent officers and outlined plans for construction of 13 dams to cost \$30,500,000, A committee and John A. Norris, chairman of the state board of water engineers, conferred with legislators on a proposed appropriation of \$200,000 to expediate work. It would be repaid from tax diversions previously authorized by the legislature. Fair enough.

Texas has many great rivers. Work on the Buchanan dam has been inaugurated. There is an upper Colorado river authority and its backers are very active. Valley lands in the upper and lower Colorado river projects in coming time will add hundreds of millions of dollars to the assessed value of Texas. Flood waters will be controlled. They will be stored for the needs of the people of the lower as well as the upper valley. They will furnish water for irrigation purposes in the drouth seasons of the year. They will assist in the electrification of thousands of farm homes and prove a God-send to all the people. And the same goes for the Brazos river projects and all other flood control projects on the rivers and streams of the commonwealth.

Texas will celebrate its hundredth anniversary next year and this should be the beginning of the harnessing of the rivers of Texas and the control of the waters of the river for the needs of mankind. Texas has a state planning board. There is lots of work ahead of it. There should be thousands of small factories in Texas and the staples of Texas should be the materials used for home consumption and the nearby markets without the borders of Texas. God Almighty made this paradise here below. Man has done little until recent years to complete the job passed on to the workers and builders of the commonwealth.
