SISTER MARY'S RECIPES

DAGUE NEA Service Staff Writer ANY serious attempt to give a new slant to the Thanksgiving dinner ends only in disappointment because the peculiar charm of this feast is its fond memories and traditions. But there are little touches and accessories which lend zest and interest to the feast without offending the most loyal descendant of a Mayflower ancestress. In fact, the ancestress with her spirit of adventure and daring would doubtless approve of them—of baked peaches, squash and walnut croquettes. Tomorrow's Menu BREAKFAST: Sliced pineapple, cereal, cream, baked French toast, milk, coffee. LUNCHEON: Potato and cheese souffle, stewed celery, lettuce with French dressing, brown butter, milk, tea. DINNER: Tomato bouillon with oysters, crown roast of pork, squash and nut croquettes, Brussels sprouts with Hollandaise sauce, French endive and avocado salad, baked peaches, milk, coffee.

Thanksgiving Pudding Four cups milk, 1-2 cups broken crackers, 4 tablespoons molasses, 1 cup sugar, 4 eggs, 1 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons melted butter, 1-2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-2 cups seeded raisins. Scald milk and pour over crackers. Let stand until cool. Pour boiling water over raisins, cover and let stand until plump. Pour off any water not absorbed by fruit. Beat eggs slightly and add to cracker and milk mixture with sugar, molasses, salt, butter and spices. Mix well and add plumped raisins. Pour into a well buttered baking dish and bake very slowly for two and one-half hours. Stir twice during the first half hour to prevent raisins from settling to the bottom of the dish. Serve with hard sauce or sterling sauce.

Sterling Sauce One-fourth cup butter, 3-4 cup light brown sugar, 3 tablespoons whipping cream, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla. Work butter with a wooden spoon until very creamy. Slowly beat in sugar which has been rolled until smooth. Stir in vanilla and gradually beat in cream. Pile lightly in a dish and garnish with snips of candied cherries. Baked Potatoes Eight large peach halves, 1 tablespoon butter, 1-2 teaspoon mace, grated rind of one lemon, 1-2 cup peach juice, 1-2 cup sugar. Drain peaches from juice and arrange in a baking dish. Dot with bits of butter and add sugar, mace, brandy and peach juice. Grate lemon rind over the top. Cover baking dish and bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) for twenty minutes. Chill and serve with a garnish of whipped cream. Squash and Walnut Croquettes Four cups baked and mashed squash, 2 egg yolks, 1-8 teaspoon nutmeg, 4 tablespoons butter, 4 tablespoons cream, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup chopped nut meats. Walnuts, pecans, hickory nuts or Brazil nuts are best in the croquettes, although peanuts may be used. Put squash through a ricer to be sure it is perfectly smooth. Beat egg yolks until thick. Add to mashed squash with seasoning, butter, cream and nuts. Mix well and spread on a platter to cool. Shape as wanted and put in refrigerator until ready to fry. Roll in fine dry bread crumbs, dip in egg slightly beaten with one tablespoon milk, roll again in crumbs and fry in deep fat hot enough to brown an inch cube of bread in sixty seconds, or 390 degrees F. on a fat thermometer. It will take about three minutes to fry the croquettes. Drain and serve with a garnish of crisp parsley.

No Opponent For Collie In Sight

AUSTIN, Nov. 23—Senator Wilbourne B. Collie of Eastland soon will announce for his second term of office. The record he has made, as an independent thinker, a careful, painstaking lawyer scrutinizing the varied assortment of legislative proposals, has been outstanding often needed in the rush of railroad through measures not sharply contested. This record was such that the senate recently honored him by unanimous selection as its president pro tem. During the interval between sessions. In nominating and seconding speeches by such veterans of the senate as Will Martin of Hillsboro and Dr. J. W. E. H. Beck of Bowie county, his faithful attention to the public duty and his useful work were recounted. Whether or not anybody announces against him, it does not appear that Senator Collie will have any real contest in returning to the senate for a second term.

BATTLESHIP STILL BACKBONE OF NAVY SAYS REAR ADMIRAL FENNER

HOUSTON, Nov. 23—The battleship, despite rapid developments of other implements of war, continues to be the backbone of a fleet, in the view of Rear Admiral E. B. Fenner, Boston, commandant of the Eighth Naval District. Admiral Fenner, who visited Houston as representative of Secretary of Navy Claude G. Swanson to the annual meeting of the American Association of Port Authorities, said the United States must have battleship parity for adequate defense. "I have been through three distinct periods of naval evolution," he said, "during which many said the battleship was an obsolete vessel. "First, there was the torpedo boat. They said a torpedo boat was better than a battleship. "Next, it was the submarine. The statement often was made that one submarine rendered one battleship helpless. "Planes Latest "Now it's the airplane. But the airplane is merely an adjunct to a fleet and nothing ever will replace the battleship because the navy needs the battleship's gun-power." Admiral Fenner said that no fixed number of ships could adequately defend the United States' coastline if another nation developed greater strength. "Everything in naval work is relative. Under the last treaty, the program of the United States provided for an adequate naval defense. However, it appears that Japan intends to obtain naval parity and have as many or more ships than we have. "We cannot see why, under existing conditions, Japan needs as large a navy as the United States," he said. The only limit to a "wide open" naval building race between nations, he said, is the length of each nation's "purse strings." Cisco Daily News want ads are a good investment.

World Struggle to Keep Fundamentals of Bible Shown by Connecticut's Governor

EDITORS NOTE: In connection with the 400th anniversary of the first printing of the Bible in English, the United Press presents Gov. Wilbur L. Cross's views on the modern influence of the Scriptures.

By WILBUR L. CROSS, Governor of Connecticut. The publication of a complete translation of the Bible into English 400 years ago marks an epoch in the history of private and public morals.

"Conduct," Matthew Arnold often remarked, "is three-fourth of life." Apart from historical facts and traditions, the Bible deals primarily with right conduct under the sanction of religion. Righteousness alone is "health to a nation."

This is the message that went four centuries ago to all English people who could read the printed page. The message was so memorable in phrasing and rhythm that once read it could not be forgotten.

The Bible became a household book in Great Britain and a century later it was brought to America by Puritan and Pilgrim. I can still remember when in my boyhood there was in some families no other book but the Bible, which was read every morning at prayers and again on evenings to the delight of children who loved to hear the story of Samson and other heroes and wise men over and over again.

God's Ten Commandments. The Biblical way of life enjoined upon every man and woman embraces the whole social order. No man shall live unto himself alone. He lives for the family, for the community, and for the state as well as for himself. "Thou shalt not commit adultery" is an injunction

not merely for the promotion of family happiness but is essential to a well-ordered society, of which the family is the basic unit. "Thou shalt not kill" and "Thou shalt not steal" are injunctions pertaining equally to personal virtues and to the welfare of the state. "Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor" is a denunciation of all deceit in public as well as in private affairs.

For man's guidance in his daily life, and for the preservation of his physical well being, and for the upbuilding of his mind and character are all manner of rules and precepts. Thousands of years ago it was discovered that man needs intervals of rest from his labors. At the same time he was taught respect for his elders and reverence for a God whose name should not be taken in vain.

Spiritual State Built. Upon these foundations Jesus Christ built a spiritual state. He saw in vision a heaven upon earth where peace and mercy should prevail over man's primitive passions. Lay up for yourself treasures, not so much upon earth as in heaven. He told his disciples. Those treasures were care for children and for all in want, sickness, or distress. Christ's treasures were all of the spirit. His was a voice out of the heavens.

As I look about me I see no heaven upon earth. In my own time family ties have become looser and looser. They may be broken without censure or comment. Among certain classes, children are cast off or neglected, and among other classes, children have no respect for their parents, whom they coldly let suffer and die in poverty.

Hunger for land and riches has no bounds. People of small means are exploited by corporations organized for the purpose. From him who hath little all is taken. Men seek public office not for the benefit of their constituents, but for private gain. Fraud and embezzlement are common occurrences. A lie is a virtue if one can get away with it. Our minor courts are often run in the interest of political parties. Justice which once had a home there has long since taken flight to the heavens above us. Murder goes unpunished. War has a continuous existence like the germs of the most deadly disease. When one war ends, another begins somewhere else. It is a dark picture.

Modern Consciousness Noted. And yet against these sinister forces are always working the Biblical ideals of personal and collective conduct which lie embedded in our fundamental laws. New means and devices for detecting crime have been discovered. People are watching the action of our courts with eyes more alert than a generation ago. Nations are uniting in efforts to prevent aggressive wars. When crises arise men of integrity come forward to assist in affairs of state and nation. State and federal laws are being enacted to mitigate greed and the exploitation of the public. As private charity has weakened, the state has come to the rescue of the sick and the afflicted, orphans and neglected children, widows unable to care for their children, and the growing number of men and women who reach old age with no means of support. This is what Jesus Christ would preach and urge were He still among us in the flesh.

The struggle between light and darkness may go on forever. But there is no reason for despair. As long as our civilization lasts the Bible will call men and women back to the banner of honesty, justice, and mercy.

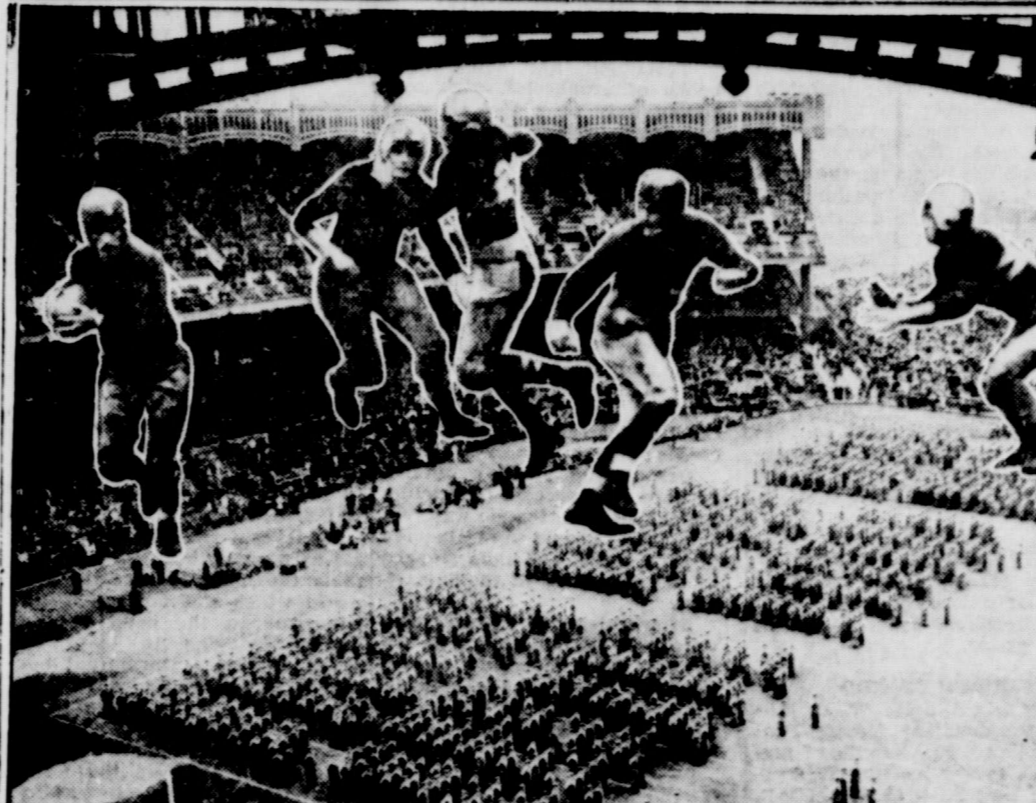
