Good State Park News

The situation of the big park at Cisco now appears more favorable than it has for a good while, following the meeting of the Cisco Boosters and friends and the address of Congressman Thomas L. Blanton last night.

One thing is certain. The two persons who can aid Cisco most to secure an early start upon the park project are strongly in favor of it. They are Judge Blanton and Wendell W. Mayes, state parks board chairman.

The telegram of Mayes, read at the banquet last night, clearly showed that, while the parks board head was unable to be present at the meeting, he is strongly in favor of the park project nevertheless and will do all he can to aid in getting work upon it started.

The congressman was no less favorably impressed with the project. "Even only a lake such as you have here deserves a park," he said, pointing to the fact that "deep water is good water." He even went so far as to promise that the first two CCC camps available as soon as the park project here reaches the approved status will go to Cisco and Fort Griffin. That is certainly a definite statement and shows that the national representative from this district is deeply interested in the project.

The fact that he approves the park project points to another significant factor. It means that the project is very worthwhile. Congressman Blanton has a reputation for strict economy in all government matters. He does not believe in throwing money away uselessly. If he is willing to spend the United States money for a park here, he evidently believes that the park will be most beneficial.

Judge Blanton pointed out something which probably had not occurred to most Ciscoans. "Make it a metropoli tan, not a state park," he said. He gave as the reason for such a suggestion the fact that all concessions in a state park are state controlled. A park, to be really beneficial, should be free to all. There is room for thought there.






