TURKEYS NOT TO BE TOSSED IN THE RAIN

Possibility that the second Cisco Trades Day event, scheduled for tomorrow afternoon, might have to be postponed was seen today as wet streets and lowering skies apparently gave little choice in the matter. If the bad weather continues, no turkeys will be thrown into the crowds on the street as on the first Trades Day, it was announced. Reason for the decision, it was said, is that the Trades Day management would be unwilling to conduct a turkey throw in weather that would mean persons participating might become muddy as they attempted to capture the flying birds, and which would cut the size of the crowd expected to participate.

Scheduled for 2 p. m. The turkey throw, if the weather permits will begin at the Skiles Grocery at D avenue and Fourteenth street at 2 p. m., and will proceed northward along D avenue until all the birds have been thrown. They were scheduled to be thrown from in front of each firm participating. Every detail possible for the success of the turkey throw, if it is held, will be arranged, it was announced. Police will cooperate by closing the street, a block at a time, to avoid confusion and danger from motor traffic. At the same time, there will be judges with whistles to rule upon the ownership of turkeys and prevent any roughness or damage to the birds.

AUSTIN, Dec. 6.—Death sentences have been carried out in 14 of 16 cases in which Governor James Allred has been asked for clemency, he said today, expressing belief his decision had been for the best. "There is this consoling thought. They are probably better off, as well as the public," he said. "I believe major crime is on the decrease," Allred said. He pointed especially to robbery and hijacking cases in which he showed no mercy.

LAST OF GANG ARE CORNERED G-MEN THINK

McALISTER, Dec. 6.—Federal authorities were confident today that they had caught the last of the five gangsters who last week shot their way out of the Muskogee jail. Swollen mountain streams prevented their returning to a farm house where officers early today killed Dapper Dan Heady, wounded and captured Dewey Gilmore, and where they believed Leonard Short and Donny Garret are being held. Allen Stanfield, deputy United States marshal, said even if Short and Garret have not been captured the same high water that kept officers out would prevent the fugitives from leaving. "Short and Garret were hiding about a mile and a half from the cabin last night and they cannot have gotten out of that section," the officer said. "We told officers left with Heady's body to be up there at dawn and take them. We can't get back up there to find what has happened." Dapper Dan was shot down as 10 officers blazed away at the flash-lighted door of an unpainted cabin where he and Gilmore had stopped for the night. Stanfield said that when he demanded that Heady and Gilmore surrender, Heady cried to his companion: "Let's fight it out."

"When he said that, I got away from the door and we just let them have it," the officer said. The top of Heady's head was shot away. Spencer Testifies Before Rail Body J. E. Lon Smith To Ask Well Space Change

AUSTIN, Dec. 6.—A proposal to change "rule 37," which regulates spacing of oil and gas wells, will be presented by Railroad Commissioner Lon Smith at the oil and gas promotion hearing Dec. 16, he announced today. The change provides a definite rule for exceptions to the general rule which Smith believes will conform fully to the recent state supreme court ruling on well spacing and will give a fair deal to all interests.

NORRIS WILL SUPPORT FDR IN ELECTION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—Senator Norris, R., Neb., today announced flatly he would not seek re-election to the senate but would actively support Roosevelt for another term. Norris' statement was designated to end speculation as to his position in the 1936 campaign. He had been quoted previously as saying he would retire and later to the effect that he had reconsidered this decision. President Roosevelt had urged him not to retire. Today he issued a statement which said: "I believe Pres. Roosevelt deserves re-election and I expect to support him actively, regardless of party considerations. I can perform this duty more effectively if I am not a candidate for the senate from any political party."

Trade Policies Of U. S. Are Attacked

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 6.—Reciprocal trade policies of the New Deal were attacked by F. R. Marshall of Salt Lake City, in an address today before the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. Marshall, secretary of the National Woolgrowers Association, asserted that "it is becoming increasingly difficult for wool raisers to know where they stand," since the 73rd congress "surrendered to the executive branch of the government its right to determine duties on imported commodities."

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BULLETIN

ADDIS ABABA, Dec. 6.—Emperor Haile Selassie protested to the League of Nations against the Italian bombing of Dessye. The emperor's protest, wirelessly from Dessye, said: "They might well believe themselves authorized to bomb us when we depart to share the vicissitudes of our troops and to defend our soil, but to bomb open cities and numerous villages containing noncombating peasants and no troops or means of defense, killing women and children, and bombing Red Cross hospitals unquestionably violates international law."

BIG OFFENSIVE LOOMS ON ETHIOPIAN FRONT

The military stalemate in the Ethiopian war showed signs today of ending. After two months of scattered maneuvering, a real battle appeared in prospect. Discounting rumors and the occasional bits of misinformation which reach isolated Addis Ababa, the following appeared to be facts. 1—Italian airplanes submitted Dessye war headquarters of Emperor Haile Selassie to a terrific bombardment. 2—Italian planes are increasingly active on the northern front, perhaps presaging a general Italian offensive. 3—Haile Selassie has conferred with his chiefs at the front and probably is prepared to start his long delayed resistance. Whether it will be confined to harassing the Italians or will be followed by a mass attack was not certain. On the diplomatic front there was a heavy fog. Paris was represented as optimistic. Geneva seemed to feel the French-British peace talks starting tomorrow would fail, while in Rome, it was said, Mussolini had already decided to reject any offer they make. Hence, predictions are not in order, but Monday it should be clear whether an agreement is possible or the League will take a step nearer to war by applying the oil embargo.

BRUNO WRONG MAN, BELIEVES FAMED POLICE

TRENTON, N. J., Dec. 4.—Ellis Parker, famous chief of Burlington county detectives, is convinced that Bruno Richard Hauptmann did kidnap and kill Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., Governor Harold Hoffman said today. Parker, whose fame as an investigator caused a book to be written about him, has been working on the case at the request of United States Senator Harry Moore, the governor said. Moore was governor at the time of the kidnaping. "Governor Moore wrote to Mr. Parker and asked him to interest himself in the case." He personally is convinced Hauptmann is not the man, that they have not the right man. There is no official investigation on his part. Parker from the very start has been working on the things that would provide some definite clue," Hoffman said. There are several other independent investigations in progress, Governor Hoffman revealed.

Britain and the Oil Embargo

Great Britain yesterday made it clear, through Sir Samuel Hoare, foreign secretary, that the empire is ready to go forward with oil sanctions against Italy as a belligerent. At the same time, the British government said that talk, under the circumstances, of arms reductions probably would be of little worth.

Evidently what the British spokesman meant in making the two statements at the same time was that Britain is ready to go ahead with the oil embargo and is ready to back up the embargo with all the armed forces of the British Empire.

If oil is entirely shut off from Italy, the Fascist nation will be hard put to carry on its campaign against Ethiopia in East Africa. Mussolini knows that. The British government would like to stop that war, not only in order to have peace, but because the very foundations of Great Britain are threatened as a result of it.

The question, then, remains: How can Italy's oil supply be stopped.

Italy itself has very little oil, but across the Adriatic is Albania, a tiny country that is dependent, in a large measure, upon Italy and which sends much oil to the Fascists. But that oil would hardly be sufficient to carry on the heavy burden of a foreign war in which the entire army is motorized.

Italy, then, must purchase oil elsewhere or develop oil fields in some of the Italian possessions. That is one of the reasons why Mussolini would like to have Ethiopia, in order to sink Italian bits into Ethiopian oil.

Half a hundred nations of the League have agreed not to furnish oil to Italy. They are looking to Britain for the lead.

Italy has intimated that such embargoes mean war. Britain's statement yesterday simply recognized Italy's position and showed that his majesty's government intends to go forward with its oil embargo, war or no war.

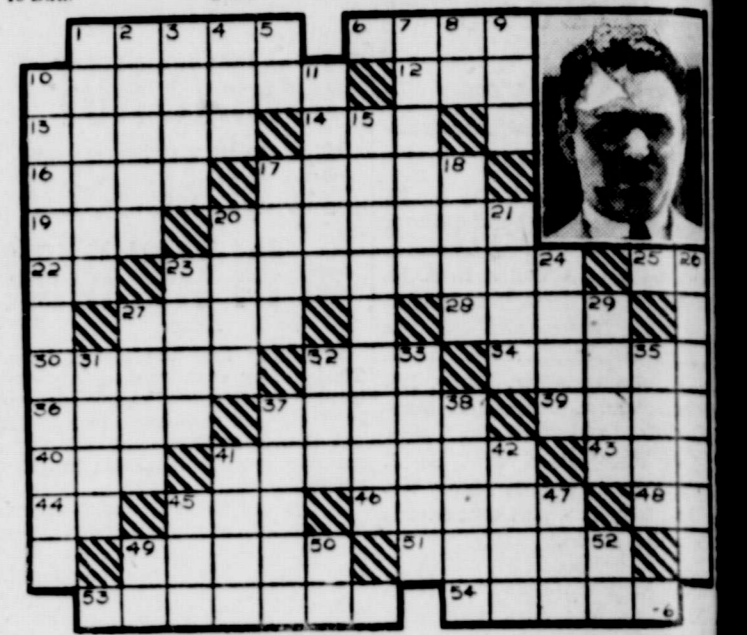


