ADDIS ABABA, Dec. 6-Emperor Haile Selassie protested to the League of Nations against the Italian bombing of Dessye. The emperor's protest, wire-lessed from Dessye, said:

"They might well believe themselves authorized to bomb us when we depart to share the vicissitudes of our troops and to defend our soil, but to bomb open cities and numerous villages containing noncombatting peasants and no troops or means of defense, killing wo-men and children, and bombing Red Cross hospitals unquestion ably violates international law.

Copyright 1935 by United Press ADDIS ABABA, Dec. 6 — Italian war planes, heavily bombarded Emperor Haile Selassies' war headtaneously were reported to have started a general bombing offensive In the bombing of Dessye a fleet of great three-motored planes flew over the city, dropping perhaps 700 bombs. It was apparent the empercr's palace was the main target. Unofficial announcements said the bombardment was ineffective, although 10 persons were killed and

80 injured. The emperor's palace was damaged slightly. The emperor himself had ample warning and escaped to safety. As soon as he could, the emperor visted the hospital and saw that the wounded were well cared




