## SEVER SOVIET RELATIONSHIP

**URUGUAY WILL** 

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Dec. 27 (U.P.)-Uruguay today severed diplomatic relations with the Soviet Union, whose representatives here were charged with assisting revolutionary activity.

The Soviet minister, Alegandro Minkin, and his entire staff were ordered expelled from the country. Uruguay also will withdraw its representatives from Moscow.

Decision to break relations and hand the minister his passport was reached at a midday meeting of the Uruguayan council of ministers. Montevideo long has been regarded as a center of communistic activity in South America.



#### La Guardia Champions Sales Tax

Mayor La Guardia of New York is one of the ablest executives of any city in America. He was criticized severely by opponents of the sales tax. This is what he said: "I can look the governor and the legislature of New York state in the face and say that the city of New York takes care of its own while every other large citybut a few is bankrupt or on the verge of bankruptcy.

A very courageous man is La Guardia. Continuing he said, "I shall continue to uphold retention of the tax and take all the blame with all the political consequences." One of his critics said that New Jersey had repealed its sales tax. This was the rejoinder of the hard-fighting and upstanding may or of the greatest of American cities. "Yes, the day they stopped collecting the sales tax in New Jersey is the day they started to borrow and to pay interest on their borrowed money.'

"New York is one of the wealthy cities of the world. Why shouldn't it support its own unemployables and its down-and-outers? If the sales tax does the work why growl? Like "the dew of heaven, it covers all alike." La Guardia was elected for a four-year term. He bluntly tells his critics that he is not thinking of re-election but facing the responsibilities of "feeding the hungry this winter."
