# **GOV. HOFFMAN GOES BEFORE GRAND JURY**

TRENTON, N. J., April 2-(U.P)-Bruno Hauptmann's chances of escaping the electric chair tomorrow night increased rapidly today as the grand jury opened new lines of inquiry in its consideration on the

Governor Harold Hoffman, who believed Hauptmann did not commit the crime alone was the first of several new witnesses to be brought before the Mercer county grand jury indicating that their investigation might extend far beond 8 p. m., Friday, time set for the electrocution.

There was no official word from the jury as to how far it would inquire into the murder, and the case of Paul Wendel, who wrote and repudiated a confession of crime. But with the appearance of the governor to urge the mystery be solved before Hauptmann be put ORCHARD MEN to death; with the preparation of Attorney General David Wileniz to

#### Texas Urged to Save Wild Life

J. N. Darling is one of the famous cartoonists of America. He is known as "Ding" Darling to the public and readers of newspapers. He is the president of the National Wildlife Federation and former chief of the bureau of biological survey. Now he is the big ace of a great nation-wide organization. Three hundred sportsmen of Texas, coming from all sections of the state, attended the conference called by Governor James V. Allred to create Texas council. Important committees headed by Phil Sanders, for several terms an outstanding member of the Texas legislature, were named. Darling is a top-notcher among the wild life conservationists of the republic. He called upon his audience to "fight for preservation and restoration of wild life" and warned "it will be the last throw of the dice for preservation." He told of game and fish depletion of territories once considered inexhaustible and directed a very incisive attack on the attitude in Washington. He said "wild life is not legalistic natural resources in the eyes of the federal government." Declaring that something must be done to change the whole attitude in Washington and get a constructive program under way, he called for an organization of an estimated 7,500,000 per- facturing. J. N. Darling is one of the famous cartoonists of America. He is known as "Ding" Darling to the public and readers of newspapers. He is the president of the National Wildlife Federation and former chief of the bureau of biological survey. Now he is the big ace of a great nation-wide organization. Three hundred sportsmen of Texas, coming from all sections of the state, attended the conference called by Governor James V. Allred to create a Texas council. Important committees headed by Phil Sanders, for several terms an outstanding member of the Texas legislature, were named. Darling is a top-notcher among the wild life conservationists of the republic. He called upon his audience to "fight for preservation and restoration of wild life" and warned "it will be the last throw of the dice for preservation." He told of game and fish depletion of territories once considered inexhaustible and directed a very incisive attack on the attitude in Washington. He said, "wild life is not legalistic natural resources in the eyes of the federal government." Declaring that run.
