TARVER SLAIN, ON INDICTMENT 3 MEN JAILED

Jim Elliott, 40, one of the accused in the death of Buford Tarver, at Cisco last Thursday night, is at liberty under a \$500 bond in each of two cases, that of murder charge and possession of a still. Both of these charges were lodged in Justice Joe Wilson's court. The same bonds have been granted under the same charges to Bert Bradberry, 25, which are in the process of being made at Big Spring, Bradberry's home.

No bond has been made for Fate Campbell.

A confession by Jim Elliott, substantiated by a voluntary statement by Bert Bradberry and the surrender of Fate Campbell, all three of whom have been lodged in the Eastland jail, charged with the killing of Buford Tarver, who was found shot with a 38-calibre pistol, north of Lake Cisco Thursday night, apparently solves the murder which is said to have grown out of a quarrel over a 100-gallon still, confiscated by officers, Special Deputy Loss Wood, Constable Grant Daniels and Chief Police M. L. Perdue. The three men have been charged by Grant Daniels with the killing to await the action of the grand jury, which convenes April 27.

Campbell Surrenders
As a result of investigations by officers, Jim Elliott, 40, who lives with his mother at East Eighteenth street, Cisco, made a confession and was arrested here Saturday. This confession implicated two other whom officials were seeking, Fate Campbell, 38, who lives with his wife in Humboldt, on South

Bert Bradberry, 25, living in Big Springs, wife dead but has a little girl, was arrested in Big Springs Sunday and held for officers who brought him to Cisco where he was held in the city jail and later transferred to the Eastland jail. Bradberry made a voluntary statement to officers here Sunday night which corroborates that of Jim Elliott, made here Saturday. It is said.

Body Found on Highway 23
The facts as stated in the confession and substantiated by the officers are essentially a follow.

Chief Police Perdue says he was notified by telephone Friday morning of the killing of Buford Tarver on highway 23, and coming down to the office, he found Quinville Ingram and Herman Notgrass. They got in the car to go to the scene of the murder, and after getting there found that it was necessary to go to the site of a still where the men were the day before. This still was located on the land of Chiley Williams and on the grass lease owned by Ernest Hittson, but had been moved and captured by officers working on the case. (The still was being displayed at the city hall Friday and Saturday).

Ingram and Notgrass said that the Notgrass car had been disabled the preceding night by having the distributor cap removed, while the men were out in Hittson's pasture, presumably doing business connected with the still. Ingram and Buford came to town after a cap and came back to the pasture, getting the car working again. It was now near 10:30 and they prepared to return to Cisco, Ingram and Notgrass in the lead car and Tarver in his car behind.

On coming out into the canyon road, they saw a car parked on the opposite side and it turned the lights on them as they came across the cattle guards. Ingram and Notgrass being ahead were fired on, two shots being fired from a 12-

Buford Tarver passed them and soon after stopped on his right side of the road. The suspects pulled in ahead and parked, one of them getting out to go back to talk to Tarver. After spending a few minutes, there were two shots fired, the suspects returning to their car and immediately driving toward town.

Ingram and Notgrass coming into town to have their motor tuned up became uneasy about Tarver, went back and found his body lying about ten feet behind his car with a bruise on his head and a 38-calibre pistol bullet hole in his breast. (The bullet was taken out of the back of the body by Justice Joe Wilson at the examination of the body which took place when Wilson accompanying officers Pierce and Hendrix to the scene at a little after eleven o'clock that night, had the body brought to Green's funeral home where the body has since remained).

A few minutes after Ingram and Notgrass got back to the scene of the killing, two other men, Mason and Stephens, said to be Elks from Tex. came along and after looking at Tarver said, "He is dead."

Ingram and Notgrass then returned to Cisco and notified Justice Joe Wilson and Officers Pierce and Hendrix, who went to the scene, finding him shot with a 38 calibre pistol, called Green's ambulance and had the body conveyed to Green's funeral home.

Officers Work Fast
Investigations which resulted in the confiscation of a still, the possession of which had caused the fatal quarrel, were made by officers and a confession by Jim Elliott led to the surrender and arrest of Fate Campbell, and Bert Bradberry, and the voluntary statement of the latter, which is said to agree with the facts in the Elliott confession.

Campbell and Elliott are well known in Cisco, Bradberry, only slightly known. The still in question was finger printed in Fort Worth and finger prints of suspects are to be compared with these results.

VOTERS TO PASS ON NEW DEAL, STATE AND LOCAL OFFICERS AND SIX AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION

AUSTIN, April 9 — (U.S. —) The chance to vote on the New Deal, six amendments to the state constitution, state officers, and local political heads all for the price of one is proving attractive to Texas voters, whose poll tax payments indicate a near-record vote for 1936.

Poll tax experts of the state comptroller's office believed 1,350,000 would be eligible to vote. Largest number of voters in Texas was in 1924 when approximately 1,350,000 were qualified.

Normally Democratic Texas will be closely watched for its reaction to the New Deal, since its 1928 vote for Republican Herbert Hoover. More important locally is the Nov. 3 constitutional election when amendments to establish a state monopoly liquor sales system will be considered along with increases in salary for most constitutional state officials.

The gubernatorial race with incumbent Governor James V. Allred against the field will give voters a chance to express their views on the sales tax, increased natural resources taxes and other forms of revenue. The current 44th or the 45th legislature which takes office next January will be called upon to choose some tax to raise money for paying old age pensions.

First statewide election will be July 25 when the first Democratic primary is scheduled. The second party primary will be Aug. 22 with the national and final state election set Nov. 3.

An unusually large turnout of voters past 60 years of age is expected in the state elections in view of the interest in old age pensions. Voters past 60 may vote without poll tax payment, and those living

in towns of less than 10,000 population need not even be reported to the state comptroller's office.

Tribulations from 237 of the state's 254 counties on March 20 showed 993,983 paid poll taxes. Supplementary reports plus the totals from the 17 counties still unaccounted were expected to swell the paid poll tax number to 1,175,000. The long-standing method of figuring exemptions is to add 15 per cent to the poll tax total, making about 1,350,000 qualified voters in Texas this year.

Counties still "out" include El Paso and Bexar, two of the five largest. Others whose collectors have yet to report pre-February payments are Kaufman, Smith, Eastland, Limestone, Nueces, Brazoria, Bee, Briscoe, Henderson, Hidalgo, Limestone, Navarro, Starr, Titus, Willacy, Victoria and Duval.

Largest number of paid poll taxes reported was Harris county with 83,556. Dallas county had only 62,364 and Tarrant, 40,900 at the first report.

Other counties included: Anderson, 6,304; Bowie, 7,732; Brown, 5,972; Ellis, 8,557; Freestone, 3,946.

KEEPER DIES; CLOCK STOPS

It points out that engineers recently have abandoned with theory of walling streams with dikes, thus forcing flood waters out somewhere else, and have begun the more practical program of a combination of levees and revetments with control features at the sources of streams and the construction of dams and impounding structures.

Portions of the book are technical in dealing with topographic surveys, the hydraulics and design of floodways and levees, and pumping plants and drainage structures. One of the numerous photographs shows the Lake Austin dam, with the lake silted to the up-side level of the dam. Another shows a marker in Austin with its notations that the \$16,250,000 flood of June, 1935, lacked 2.08 feet of the record flood in 1869.

'Horse Sense' Advice Offered to Motorists

Good old horse sense goes a long way in the proper care of an automobile motor and in obtaining maximum mileage at a minimum cost, say the laboratory scientists of Gulf Oil Corporation, Gulf Refining company.

To begin with, it has been necessary to use a very light oil in the crankcase during the extreme winter weather just past. Even if this winter grade oil were in prime condition, it might not lubricate properly in warm weather.

ORDER OF BEER ELECTION Order No. 18

On this the 1st day of April, 1936, came on to be considered by the Commissioners Court of Eastland County, Texas, petitions signed by qualified voters of Eastland County, Texas, requesting that this Court should order an election in Eastland County, Texas, for the purpose of determining whether or not there should be legalized the sale of vinous and malt liquors that do not contain alcohol in excess of 14 per cent by volume in Eastland County, Texas; and the Court after having heard and considered said petition is of the opinion that it is sufficient and it is the opinion of the Court that said election should be held in each voting box in Eastland County, Texas, on the 18th of April, A. D. 1936, as provided for by laws of the State of Texas, this being Article 666 of the Vernon's Annotated Civil and Criminal Statutes of the State of Texas, and being what is commonly known as the Texas Liquor Control Act.

It is therefore ordered on this the 1st day of April, 1936, that said election shall be held at each voting box of Eastland County, Texas, on the 18th of April, 1936, and the Clerk of this Court shall post or cause to be posted at least one copy of this order in each election precinct for at least six days prior to said election, which election shall be held and return thereof made in conformity with the provisions of the General Laws of the State of Texas, and by the election officers appointed and qualified under such laws, and all officials shall take such further action as may be necessary to hold said election and carry out the purpose of this order.

The vote shall be by official ballot and there shall be printed on each ballot the following words: "For legalizing the sale of vinous and malt liquors that do not contain alcohol in excess of 14 per cent by volume" and "Against legalizing the sale of vinous and malt liquors that do not contain alcohol in excess of 14 per cent by volume."

New songs books have been ordered and prayer groups have been organized. The public is invited.

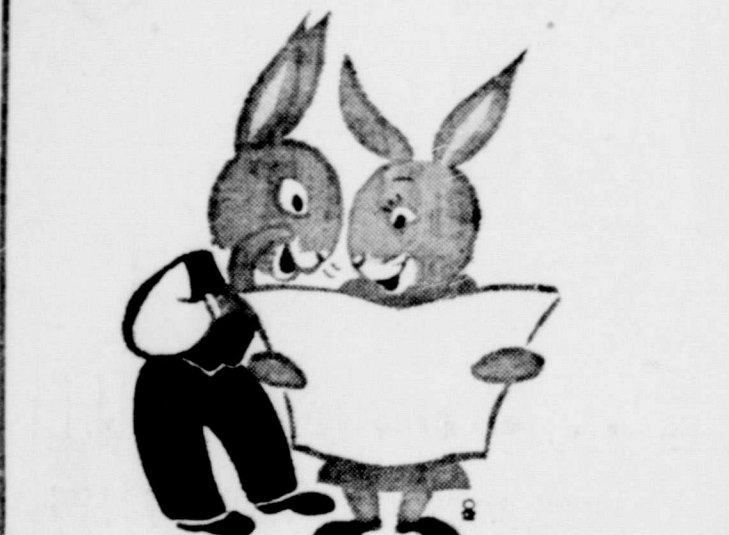

Court Erred Says New Trial Motion

A motion for a new trial for Raymond Henry, given 50 years Sunday in the "hanging skeleton" death of H. L. McBee at Rising Star May 1, 1933, was on file Tuesday in District Clerk P. L. Crossley's office.

L. H. Fiewellen of Ranger and R. E. Grantham of Cisco, attorneys for Henry, contended the court erred for the following reasons:

1. The court erred in refusing to instruct the jury to return a verdict finding the defendant not guilty, as charged in the indictment.
2. The court erred in failing and refusing to instruct the jury that the state relied herein for conviction on circumstantial evidence, and in failing and refusing to apply the law of circumstantial evidence in this cause.
3. The court erred in failing and refusing to instruct the jury that Ted Crosswhite was an accomplice witness, and in failing and refusing to apply the law of accomplice testimony in this cause.
4. The court erred in failing and refusing to instruct the jury that M. E. Tyler was an accomplice witness in this cause and failing to apply the law of accomplice testimony in this cause.
5. The court erred in failing and refusing to submit to the jury in appropriate terms, the issues as to whether or not the state's witnesses, Mrs. M. E. Tyler and Ted Crosswhite, were accomplice witnesses, and in failing to instruct the jury the law applicable to such accomplices, if the jury believed them to be so.
6. The court erred in refusing to permit the witness Ivan Ellis to testify before the jury in reference to finding an automobile on the Zephyr highway in Brown county on or about May 7 or 8, 1933, and in failing and refusing said witness to testify that said automobile belonged to Lynn Smith. Such testimony was and is material to the defense in this cause for the reason that state's witnesses, Pete Fenwick, M. E. Tyler and Mrs. M. E. Tyler, testified that they used Lynn Smith's automobile when they claimed to have disinterred the body of the deceased and hung the same to a tree during the last week of May, 1933.

Raymond Henry Found Guilty By 88th Court Jury--Gets 50 Years

Raymond Henry, 25, was convicted of the "ice pick slaying" and skeleton hanging" of H. L. McBee, 42, and his punishment assessed at 50 years in the penitentiary by an Eighty-eighth District Court jury which made its report Sunday morning at 9:30.

Jurors received the case at 10:20 p. m. Saturday, deliberated late, and reported their verdict of murder with malice aforethought at 9:30 Sunday.

The defendant's head drooped, his eyes filling with tears. His wife, Della, 30, whose case, on a similar charge of murder of her former husband, is scheduled May 18, sobbed

violently. She choked out words of sympathy. "I know you aren't guilty."

Assisted From Court
She was assisted from the courtroom by her father and brother, G. W. and Russell Barton.

C. B. Wellman of Eastland was foreman of the jury.

By the conviction the jury voted they believed the State's contention that Henry stabbed McBee with an ice pick May 1, 1933, engineered an early-hour burial the following day and the exhumation and hanging of the skeleton several weeks later. The skeleton was found in a Rising Star wood December 22, 1934.

Four Were Charged
Four persons formerly were charged with the murder, Jack Smith, 40, of Wichita Falls, was adjudged a suicide after his body, with throat slit, was found in the county jail at Eastland recently. His brother, Lynn, 29, of Joshua, Johnson county, is charged as an accessory. A count in his indictment alleging murder was dismissed, leaving the accessory charge.
