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MANY SECTIONS OF STATE GET GOOD RAINS

Rain-hungry crops and pastures throughout Texas from the panhandle to the gulf and from the Big Bend to Louisiana were soaked by thunder showers today. Moisture laden clouds from the Gulf of Mexico sweeping northward the state assured more rain Friday and Saturday. The Fort Worth and Denver railroad reported "general rain" throughout the grain growing and pastures upland of the West Texas plains. Government reports show 1.34 inches of rain at Haskell; .9 at Henrietta; .91 at Memphis; 1.10 at Miami; .3 Quannah; .83 Seymour; Snyder 26; Spur 26; Lamesa 1. Southward the participation was heavy. Brownwood reported 1.02; Ballinger, 1 inch; Eastland 1.4; Dublin, 1.6; Kerrville, .36; Llanos, 1.8; Taylor .02; Waco .06; Mineral Wells, .03. Bridgport, 50 miles northwest of Fort Worth, had 2.1 and rain was continuing. While 3.8 was reported at Weatherford. Heavy showers began during the morning at Fort Worth.

OTHER STATES RECEIVE BENEFICIAL RAINS KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 8 — (U.P.) — "The best general rain this spring" soaked farm lands and pastures in Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Colorado and parts of Texas last night and today.

2-INCH RAIN FILLS TANKS HELPS CROPS

Rain, accompanied by lightning which struck the northwest corner of the east wing of the high school building, knocking off about six layers of brick some two feet in each direction, caused a 2-inch precipitation, filling tanks and thoroughly soaking the ground, Thursday night and Friday morning. The rain began about midnight and was accompanied by fierce lightning flashes and heavy thunder but no wind to speak of. A report that made every one in that vicinity think their own house had been hit, struck the corner of one of the high school wings and knocked brick down, tearing a hole that allowed water to pour in one of the upstairs rooms. A workman has been secured to repair the damage today.

R. R. Bradshaw, of the Scranton community, reported his tank full and running over as he came to Cisco this morning. The gauge at the city hall registered 2 inches at 11 o'clock today. Wind on the lake Thursday afternoon caused the overturn of a boat, it was announced, but parties were rescued without damage. Through the courtesy of Henry Stubblefield, desk sergeant, the figures for the year are given at 6.7 inches precipitation. This rainfall seemingly small, has been divided in such manner and has fallen so slowly that no crops save small grain have suffered and plenty of moisture is now in the ground. Grain needed rain in the early part of April so as to bunch out, it was said, but some of this will be overcome and heads will fill out for a good yield, regardless of whether more rain falls. Irish potatoes were just at the point of making tubers and this rain should insure a good yield. Corn is said to be growing nicely and making stalk; while gardens are just coming in to heavy promise. Berries will also respond to the moisture for well filled fruit.

No rain is reported from Lubbock; Rising Star, 2 inches; Abilene, 3; Breckenridge, 2 inches; Coleman 1.5; Mineral Wells, 2 inches.

Europe Hastens Air Armament; Hitler Fleet Most Formidable

VIENNA, May 8 — (U.P.) — At least 40,000 planes and more than 100,000 dive-bombing planes, observers or mechanics stand poised on the military airfields of Europe, ready for war at a minute's notice. Six months hence the six great air powers — Germany, which leads France, Britain, Russia and Italy — will have added nearly 2,000 planes each to their sky forces — mightier speedier, deadlier units than the already existing terrifying hordes. Military experts further predict that, once the present arms-building race gets into full stride, a total of 100,000 fighting planes will have been surpassed in 18 months. By that time, it is believed, the rate of production reached by some countries in the last World War — 1,000 planes a month — will have been eclipsed by the major powers

SAN ANGELO, May 8 — (U.P.) — The best price paid for West Texas wool in eight years was recorded today. Tom Richey of San Angelo paid the peak price of 32 and one-half cents a pound for a card of 12 month wool bought from Lyde Sellers of De Rio. The sale was made a day after D. E. Hughes and Jack Hughes of San Angelo had set the previous record for the year by paying 32 cents a pound for 80,000 pounds bought at Del Rio.

Clifford Doggett Case Is Dismissed

Granting a motion of Criminal District Attorney, Judge B. W. Patterson of 86th district court Friday dismissed a case alleging murder of L. P. Threest, Callahan county rancher, August 1934, against Clifford Doggett. The Court of Criminal Appeals April 15 of this year withdrew a former opinion affirming Doggett's sentence of death, assessed in Eastland county Nov. 23, 1934. State's attorney referred the case to the high criminal tribunal's holding that the conviction of Doggett in Eastland county placed the defendant in former jeopardy as he was convicted and assessed 99 years in Callahan county upon a robbery with firearms charge. The high court's action acted as complete bar to the prosecution of Doggett on the murder count, the State's attorney contended. Action Friday by the Eastland district court let two—Mary Lou Howell and Elmer Van Cleave — against whom murder charges remain in the same case.

SLUMP SLICED FOR TEACHERS ALAMEDA, Cal. — (U.P.) — The depression for Alameda school teachers is 50 per cent over. The original 8 per cent cut in their salaries has been reduced to 4 per cent.

Cole.

NEXT CLEANUP ON CROOKED POLITICIANS

WASHINGTON, May 8 — (U.P.) — An indication that the next major field of the federal government G-men would be the connections between dishonest politicians and the underworld was seen today in an announcement of J. Edgar Hoover that only one of the kidnapers who harassed the nation for over three years remains at large. In Tacoma, Washington, William Mahan, kidnaper of 9-year-old George Weyerhaeuser, who was public enemy number one during the six days between his capture and then of Alvin Karpis, faced quick arraignment on two indictments. In St. Paul, Harry Campbell, last member of the Karpis-Baker gang, joined his chief, Karpis in custody. Both faced trial for the kidnaping of William Hamm Jr., in 1934 and Edward Bremer in 1933. Remaining at large was Thomas H. Robinson Jr., kidnaper of Mrs. Alice Steed Stoll, of Louisville. He has retained his liberty only because he had no underworld connection and is an expert female impersonator. Hoover revealed that arrests were eminent in Cleveland where he said "members of the Karpis-Baker gang have been harbored by persons accepted as respectable in their community. He intimated that no person who aided any of the recently captured fugitives will escape. He revealed that Campbell and Karpis escaped capture months ago only because they were tipped off by crooked Cleveland politicians with police connection."

About Freedom of Speech

The South Dakota supreme court brought in an emphatic decision the other day in a four-year-old contempt judgment against one of the state's newspapers. The decision dealt exhaustively with the legal question and emphasized the need for upholding the right of free speech and free press.

"It is better and wiser to err in favor of absolute and unrestricted freedom of speech," the court announced "than in the other direction."

The sentence quoted stands out boldly in the decision, more emphatically because the court opinion criticized the news story complained of as "inaccurate and unfair" and the editorials as "definitely beyond the bounds of fair and decent comment and criticism."

The paper involved and the issue was one of which we cannot generate much steam. The editors sought to be a hell-raising, cure-all for their community, and centered their fire on the local judiciary for a punishment meted out to an embezzler of public funds. It described the punishment as "a pat on the back." The editors were cited to court by the bar association, found guilty of contempt, and put under suspended sentences "during good behavior with no other condition than that you do not publish in the future articles of condemnation or contempt of court." This condition, argued the editors with reason, was a manner of censorship.

But the supreme court overturned all these arrangements.

"The need for a free and unfettered press is perhaps more urgent in this country today than ever it has been before, although we venture to think that it is not by the judicial department of government that freedom of the press or of speech is most threatened in the present era," the justices wrote. "Freedom, nevertheless, is not synonymous with utter and unlimited license."

The court added a bit of counsel to newspapermen. "The public interests will be much better served," it said, "if the newspaper will permit the courts to conduct pending matters without interference, reserving and exercising fully and freely the right fairly to criticize and comment, in decent and temperate language, when the case is fully concluded. We think no one will be readier to agree with this view than the great mass of able and conscientious newspapermen, who have regard and respect not only for the courts but for the ethics of their own profession. It is, we think, a fortunate thing for the people of this country that the newspapers in general do, and as a matter of fact, accept this view and save in rare instances, conduct their papers accordingly."

There has been a lot of tilting at windmills about freedom of the press. Really this freedom is a guaranteed right, not a mysterious phrase, and some of the conspicuously defenders of the mysterious phrase might do well to read the words of the South Dakota supreme court.

at this moment it could probably send into the air about 5,000. Premier Benito Mussolini has made it known that Italy has 10,000 pilots ready to fight.

France has between 5,000 and 6,000 bombers, fighters or scouts but its air ministry is well aware that a large proportion of the sky fleet is old. By the end of this year, the force will be renovated so that 3,000 first-line machines bombers and fighters, will be available, while the older machines will go into the second-line or reserve.

Britain's home defense air fleet, as shown in a White Paper issued last March, totals 1,700 first-line planes, but the nation has entered the task of remedying the defects in its aerial weakness so that the combined defense, naval, overseas and other sky-forces are expected to total 4,000 units shortly.

Soviet Russia, so long, air-conscious, can muster the second largest

air power to Germany, with 5,360 planes, and the number is rapidly increasing. It is said there are 50,000 trained paratroopists in Russia.

Little Powers Not Idle

To the aerial might of Germany, Soviet Russia, France, Britain and Italy, whose combined air units amount to roughly 30,000 machines, must be added the by no means negligible power of some of the smaller states. Poland and Czechoslovakia, according to Lieut. Col. Ludwig Kromer, of the Austrian general staff, have nearly 3,000 units between them.

Belgium has about 940 planes, Rumania nearly 1,000, mostly turned out from French factories at the time when France was arming the Little Entente allies; Yugoslavia has more than 1,000 planes, Sweden 500, Spain 500, while the other European states — Holland, Switzerland, Denmark, Greece, Norway, Finland, Lithuania, Hungary, Bulgaria, Turkey and Austria — bring the total near the 40,000 mark.

Under the peace treaties, Austria,

Hungary and Bulgaria are prohibited from building or using war planes, but they are known to have incorporated fighting craft into service since Germany scrapped the military clauses of the Versailles Treaty.

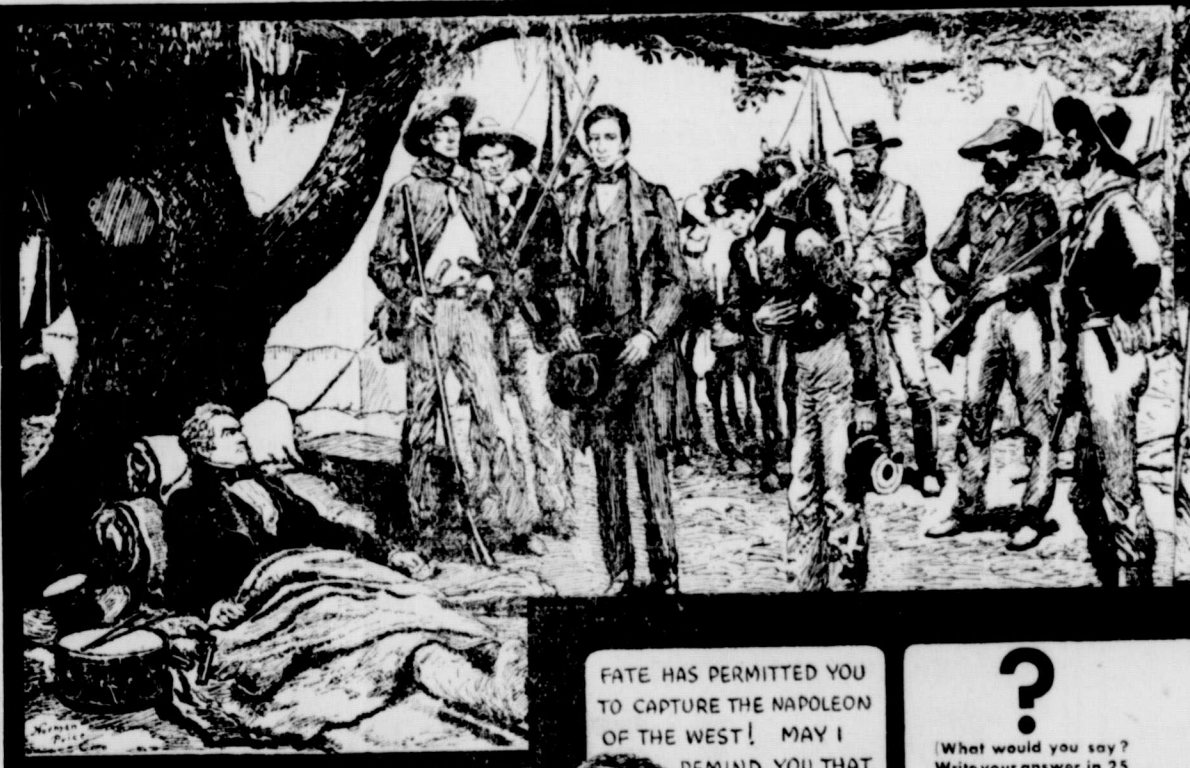

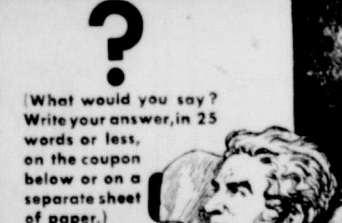

Texas Topics

AGSTIN, May 8 — Travis county commissioners court, have carried out the spirit of the general statement movement to consolidate of fees, where practicable, even beyond the technical letter of the mandatory statutes. Two years ago it merged the office of county treasurer into the department of the county auditor, and secured the services of a treasurer and a chief deputy in the auditor's department as one salary. No additional compensation is paid the treasurer of Travis county, and this office is operated at the net annual cost of a \$1200 bond for the treasury.

When the county home rule amendment was adopted by the voters, movements were started in several counties, such as Travis, El Paso, Tarrant, to write and submit county charters. The movement came at a disturbed political time when opportunistic and ambitious leaders were seeking to capitalize the discontent of large groups. Friends of county home rule found their whole effort jeopardized and were put to the necessity of laying plans on the shelf for a time. Some counties, such as Travis, in merging staffs of county auditor and treasurer did what they could in the absence of the charter.

New constructive thought is being given to a permissive-type home rule charter to the end that proper functions gradually may be merged even while distinct arm of the present set-up remain. A major step after the county adopts the same sort of charter that cities of over 5000 now have, will be to begin uniting the duplicate, overlapping functions of the city and the county, even though for a long time a separate municipal administration may prevail to most home-rule counties.

The county home-rule amendment is a complex document, but can be boiled down to the few words: "Counties may adopt the same home-rule powers now held by cities."

Federal officials estimate Texas is now losing \$300,000 a year from federal sources, through failure of the last legislature to create a set-up to administer the granting of aid to widowed mothers of non-supported children. Even without a matching appropriation, Texas would get considerable federal money, with matching aid, it would get much more.

There is every indication that, since Texas pays the tax on this kind of federal aid to other states, and since Texas is accepting many forms of matching and non-matching federal aid under other headings of the social security program, the lawmakers will lose no time in gaining this when they reconvene.

Court Continues Della Henry Case

The case alleging murder, by H. L. McBea of Raining Star, May 1931, against Della Henry was continued Friday for the term by Judge B. W. Patterson of 88th district court. The "hanging skeleton case" originally had been scheduled May 18.

Raymond Henry, wife of Della, former male of McBea, has been assessed a 30-year sentence in the case.

The continuance was granted Friday because of the opportunity of the state and defense to have expense of the case.

Points in the continuance motion of Frank Sparks, attorney for Mrs. Henry, included:

He would be out of the state May 18; that there is a "pronounced and wide spread prejudgment of the guilt or innocence of the defendant on the charge against her in this case"; "the existence of a combination of influential men and governmental agencies, known as the safety commission of Texas, seeking and determined upon the conviction of this defendant's case."

Particular emphasis was placed Sparks that Mrs. John P. Raining Star would be probably testify or appear in the trial of the case.

A change of venue request defense was listed.

May Wheat Breaks To Lowest

CHICAGO, May 8 — Wheat broke 1 cent a bushel, lowest level since last fall, as reports of trade today while crops slumped about 1 1/2 percent around the lowest level for some time.

The break reflected the drop of 5 cents a bushel at Minneapolis and weaker other North American and markets.
