Television to Span Atlantic!


A prediction that television may soon span the Atlantic was made by Senator Guglielmo Marconi, inventor of radio, n a record-breaking four-way shortwave broadcast which inked his yacht in the Mediterranean with David Sarnof. in New York, and with 26 members of the International Broadcasting Union flying between Niagara Falls and Washington in two American Airlines cabin planes.

The principal participants in the broadcast, arranged as a special feature of the National Broadcasting Company' Tenth Anniversary celebrations, were Marconi; Mr. Sarnoff president of the Radio Corporation of America; Robert Jar dillier, minister of Communications of France, and Maurice Rambert, President of the I. B. U.

The program was opened over NBC networks by Mr. Sarnoff, who spoke over a desk microphone in his office in the RCA building. New York City. The RCA President was answered from one of the speeding cabin planes by ernment is undergoing its Rambert, who is also head of the Swiss Broadcasting Com-

Translantic shortwave was then used to pick up the voice of Senator Marconi, speaking from aboard his yacht, the Electra, cruising near Genoa in the Mediterranean. French Minister Jardillier joined in from the other cabin plane. and all four broadcasting points were talking and answering in a general conversation.

Senator Marconi did not elaborate on his prediction regarding the future of television. He was exchanging greeting with Mr. Sarnoff and after felicitating the National Broadcasting Company in its Tenth Anniversary, he declared "we will soon be able to see you by television."
