L. and A. Railway Strike Ends Today

EIGHT KILLED DURING LIFE OF STRIKE

BAITON ROUGE, La., Nov. 20 (U.P.)—The two months old strike on the Louisiana and Arkansas railway ended early today when company and union officials signed a conciliation agreement.

Eight persons died during the strike while trains were being operated by strikebreakers.

Governor Richard Leche, who summoned company officials and officers of the railroad brotherhood into a peace conference a week ago, announced an agreement had been reached on all points. The terms of the settlement will not be announced for several days. The 500 trainmen will return to their jobs then.

Treatment Helps Well's Production

Acid treatment of Panhandle Refining Company No. 1 E. H. Wells, section 3 of the Bronson subdivision, William Van Norman survey, Eastland county, increased production from one to 10 barrels of oil.

This was shown Thursday from records in the oil and gas division office of the railroad commission at Eastland.

One hundred and sixty-five quarts of acid were used in the 65 feet of sand thickness. The depth to the top of the sand for matton was 3,320 feet.

No report has been received from the same company's shooting of No. 1 L. A. Hightower, William Van Norman survey, block 2. Two hundred quarts of nitroglycerin were to be used in an effort to step up the present production of two barrels daily. Formations to be shot were 2,940 to 2,970, 3,028-3,050, and 3,110-3,140.

Plugging record has been filed for Robert A. Holt's No. 1 Payne, section 60, H. & T. C. survey, block 2, Comanche county.

Also to be plugged at a total depth of 830 feet was States Oil Corporation No. 1, H. & T. C. R. survey, block 4, northeast of Eastland.

CANADA JUDGE UPHOLDS BABY RACE CLAUSE

TORONTO, Ontario, Nov. 20 (U.P.)—Justice W. M. Middleton today upheld validity of the baby race clause in the will of Charles Vance Miller which started Toronto's ten year \$500,000 maternity marathon.

Justice Middleton ruled that the fortune could go only to the winning mother, or mothers of legitimate children. His decision eliminated one of the seven mothers now apparently tied for leadership with nine children each.

The Justice said he would reserve judgment on the method by which the winner should be determined.

Court Upholds Law As Constitutional

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 20 (U.P.)—Ohio's minimum wage law for women and minors was upheld as constitutional by a three judge federal court here today.

The decision permits the state to continue enforcement of wage regulations, but the victory for the state may be only temporary, since the United States Supreme Court last June invalidated a New York law that was practically identical to the Ohio statutes.

BRITAIN BUILDS NAVY DEFENSE FOR AIR RAIDS

LONDON, Nov. 20 (U.P.)—Defense officials today reviewed with satisfaction firing reports of anti-aircraft ship batteries against pilotless radio controlled airplanes.

Geographically it is impossible to invade Britain only from sea or air. For this reason the navy and air force are being expanded rapidly and closely co-ordinated. To support these two main military arms an entirely mechanized army, featuring tanks, chemical units and rapid-fire mounted artillery, is being created.

The army in case of attempted invasion would form a secondary line of defense at ports and against air raids.

British army officials want their entire force and equipment to move at speeds approaching 50 miles an hour. Such speeds would afford maximum concentrations at danger points due to the smallness of the British Isles. Roads abound in all parts of the country.

Recent naval exercises revealed that increased attention is being paid to anti-aircraft firing. The radio controlled pilotless planes have been sent aloft for three hours at a time flying between 85 and 100 miles an hour at heights up to 10,000 feet.

Use De Havilland Planes
British authorities believe no other country has developed pilotless planes to the same level of efficiency as their own. Planes used are light De Havilland "Queen Bees."

They are powered by a four-cylinder air-cooled engine of 130 horse power. Made of wood, the Queen Bee will float if brought down on the water by gunfire.

The planes have two cockpits, one of which is open and can be fitted rapidly with flying controls for use by the human pilot. In the other, closed cockpit is the secret mechanism which guides the machine on its course and controls the engine throttle in obedience to radio signals sent from a ship or a ground battery.

Control Area 10 Miles
Radius of controlled pilotless flight is about 10 miles from the operating center.

The old aircraft carrier Argus is undergoing alteration to convert her into a mother ship for the robot planes which are launched by catapult.

Future Farmers Elect Officers

WILLIAM GREEN URGES WORKERS STAND FIRMLY

TAMPA, Fla., Nov. 20 (U.P.)—President William Green led the American Federation of Labor and Canadian workers today in a violent denunciation of dictatorship and a summons to the world working class to "stand like the rock of Gibraltar" in defense of democracy.

"The church may fail, the chambers of commerce may be important and civil leaders may lack the power to deal with dictatorial views," Green shouted, "but the trade union movement at which dictators strike first, has the strength to prevent the rise of a dictatorship in any form."

It has been reported that Mrs. H. S. Drumwright, who was taken to the Harris Sanitarium Clinic in Fort Worth Thursday for examination, stood the trip nicely.

Mr. Drumwright expects to return home Sunday.

Nell Carmichael's Condition Unchanged

There was no change in the condition of Miss Nellie Carmichael who is in the Graham sanitarium as a result of the car wreck just east of Oden Wednesday night about 8 o'clock, which crushed three lower vertebrae of the spine, completely paralyzing her lower body, it was reported today.

It is still too early to tell the extent of the paralysis at this time, it was reported. Some of it may be due to the shock of the injury and some of it may be permanent. It all depends upon the amount of the injury to the spinal cord the report continues. Later, perhaps, she will be placed in a cast and efforts made to minimize the effects of the shock, but about all that can be done at present is to minimize the pain.

Nebraskan Elected NASU President

AUSTIN, Nov. 20 (U.P.)—President E. A. Burnett of the University of Nebraska was elected President of the National Association of State Universities as it ended a two-day meeting here today.

STATE'S DEFICIT HITS ALL-TIME HIGH; OLD AGE SAFE

AUSTIN, Nov. 20 (U.P.)—The deficit in the state's general fund hit an alltime high today or \$13,984,163. Collections have been insufficient this month, said State Treasurer Charles Lockhart to call in any outstanding warrants.

Such calls customarily are made twice each month.

On the last call date November 5, the general fund deficit was \$13,136,527. The deficit in the confederate pension fund today was \$5,349,186.

All doubts of financing old age assistance this winter were dispelled, however, with the award of a contract to the Republic National Bank of Dallas to loan \$2,000,000. The borrowed money will be used to pay pensions until the payment of new taxes furnishes the needed amount.

BARCELONA EXPECTS TO BE BOMBARDED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (U.P.)—The United States received indirect warning today from the Spanish nationalist government to keep all American naval and commercial vessels out of the port of Barcelona, which is under threat of bombardment.

Acting Secretary of State Walter Moore announced receipt of a warning which came in a round-about way through Lisbon and the American consulate at Seville.

INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT GRAVE

Indications today were that the international development surrounding the Spanish revolution may have a greater bearing on its outcome than the struggle for possession of Madrid.

The battered capital had a slight respite from the attack of the nationalist government when a drizzle held the bombers in check. Artillery shelling continued during the morning, however, bringing new destruction.

Complications surrounding a threat of the nationalists to mob-bard Barcelona appeared of extreme importance.

The question of how far Great Britain will go to protect her shipping was aired in the House of Commons in London.

Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden read a communication from the insurgent government warning foreign shipping to evacuate the harbor.

Eden disclosed that the government had asked Sir Henry Clifton British ambassador to Spain to arrange with the rebels for safety zones at Barcelona, as was done at other ports attacked by the nationalists. This was accepted to mean that Britain would recognize the privilege of the rebels to attack the city.

A significant editorial in the Journal of Italy in Rome, recognized as Premier Mussolini's mouthpiece, said Italy "and other strong powers" had decided to prevent the establishment of a red republic in Spain. The editorial hinted Italy may take steps to prevent Soviet China carrying supplies to the loyalists, from reaching Spanish ports.

In Alicante it was announced Jose Antonio Primo DeRiviera, fascist leader and son of the former dictator of Spain, had been executed by loyalists.

James will have charge of the Thursday morning service; breakfast; Dr. R. C. Campbell will speak at the Thursday morning hour; Dr. Carl Moore and Dr. J. M. Dawson will be on the Thursday program.

STRIKERS THREATEN AMER. OIL INTERESTS

MEXICO CITY, Mex., Nov. 20 (U.P.)—Strike action threatens to tie up American and other oil interests today. The walkout set for November 29th, would affect 20,000 workers unless the companies agree to union demands.

Automobile Death Rate and Diseases!

A comparison of mortality from automobile accidents with that resulting from the four principal communicable diseases of children combined, indicate the need for continued concentration of efforts to bring about further reduction in automobile accidents and fatalities.

However, the mortality rate has decreased 6 per cent in the last year, statistics show. One reason for this decline is the work of education along safety lines, zones near schools and to a lowering of the speed limits of city driving.

But there is much need for still further stressing this matter of careful driving and safe speed limits on the highways since each day our papers are filled with stories of car wrecks which kill or maim some person as a result. And in most cases it is fast driving—driving at a speed that loses control of the proper management of the car.

A striking point is the comparison between automobile accident deaths and certain other causes of death which we have in the past been accustomed to think of as prominent. For example, in the four outstanding diseases of childhood, measles, scarlet fever, whooping cough and diphtheria—diseases that still maim and kill thousands of children yearly, but that are being brought under control gradually, we note a comparison that will astonish many. Automobiles take toll of more than three times as many as do these four diseases of childhood.

Fast cars of course naturally are contributing causes to wrecks, but this should be offset by the efficiency of brakes which stop a car now at the ordinary speed of 50 miles per hour, quicker than formerly at 30 miles per hour. Good roads invite speed but they also allow for a better control of the car than formerly on rough roads.

So, it would seem that in addition to driving at high speed we have become reckless drivers. The increase in traffic and the disregard for curves and angles of the road, have become contributing causes of increasing fatalities. Perhaps we had better do something to make more careful drivers of our speed fans—a course in education upon the success of reaping what we sow.

WHEN you speak of passing you immediately think of Michigan. When you think of Michigan, Benny Friedman pops into mind. There was a passer—a fellow with probably the softest delivery in football, whose eagle eye could spot Benny Osterbaan, Wolverine end, anywhere.

Benny was the pass in Michigan's "punt, pass, and prayer" system. He was "the only quarterback I ever had who went through a whole season without making a mistake," Fielding H. Yost, grand old man of Michigan's football, said of him.

Benny was a brainy field general who knew how to handle men. He probably was the only signal caller of his time who adopted the code never to carry the ball himself when his team was inside the enemy's 20-yard line. Friedman's theory was that nothing would work for disharmony in the backfield more than one man monopolizing scoring hooses.

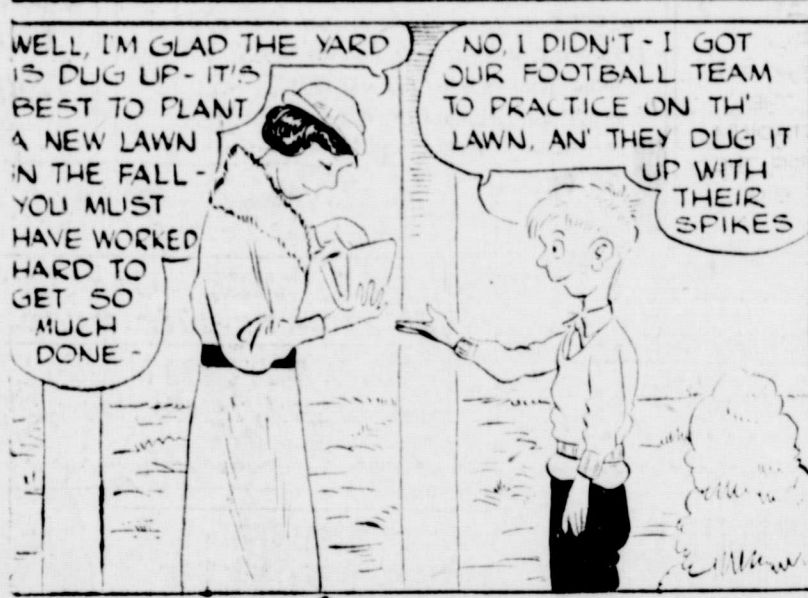

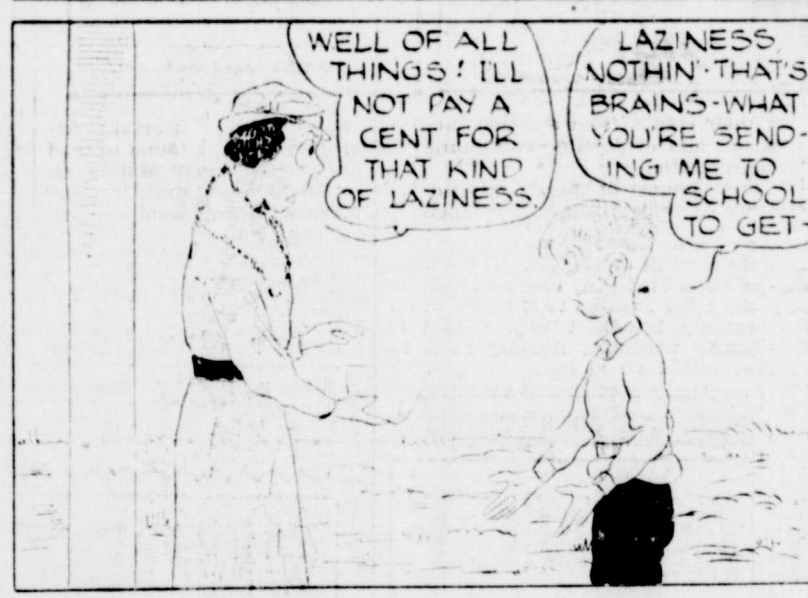

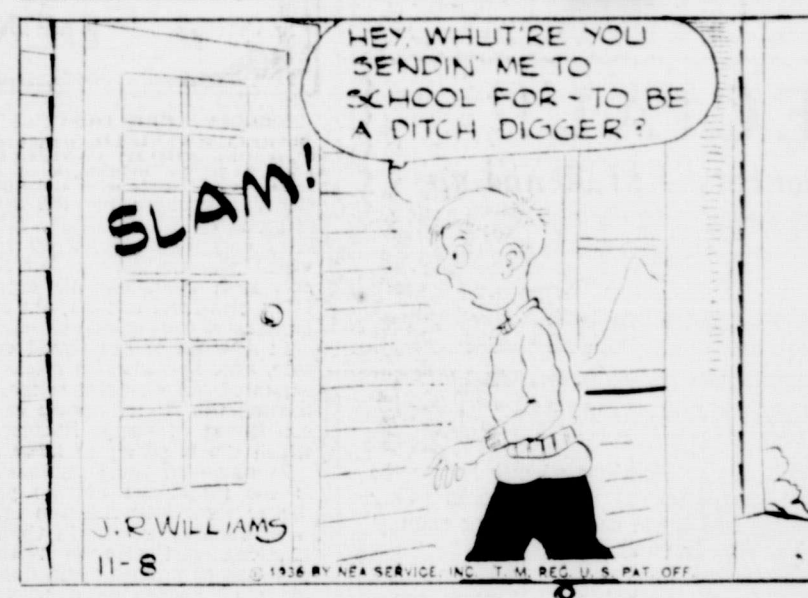

Eastland Questions 1927-28 Bond Issues

EASTLAND, Nov. 20.—The validity of two Eastland bond issues is attacked in a suit filed by the City of Eastland against C. C. Huff of Dallas county and C. C. Harris of Eastland county and "unknown holders."

The suit, filed by John Sayles of Abilene, Perry Sayles of Eastland and J. Frank Sparks of Eastland, asks cancellation of "City of Eastland Water Revenue Bonds, Series 1927" and "City of Eastland Water and Sewer Plant Revenue Bonds, Series of 1928." The 1927 issue aggregates \$15,000 and the other \$100,000.

The petition also asks 91st district court to void deeds of trust or mortgages purporting to secure payment on the bonds and to remove clouds on property of the city as described in the deeds or mortgages.

The city holds issuance of the bonds was illegal as they claim, it was executed without vote of the citizens. The petition says the bond issuance was authorized by the city commission in ordinances.

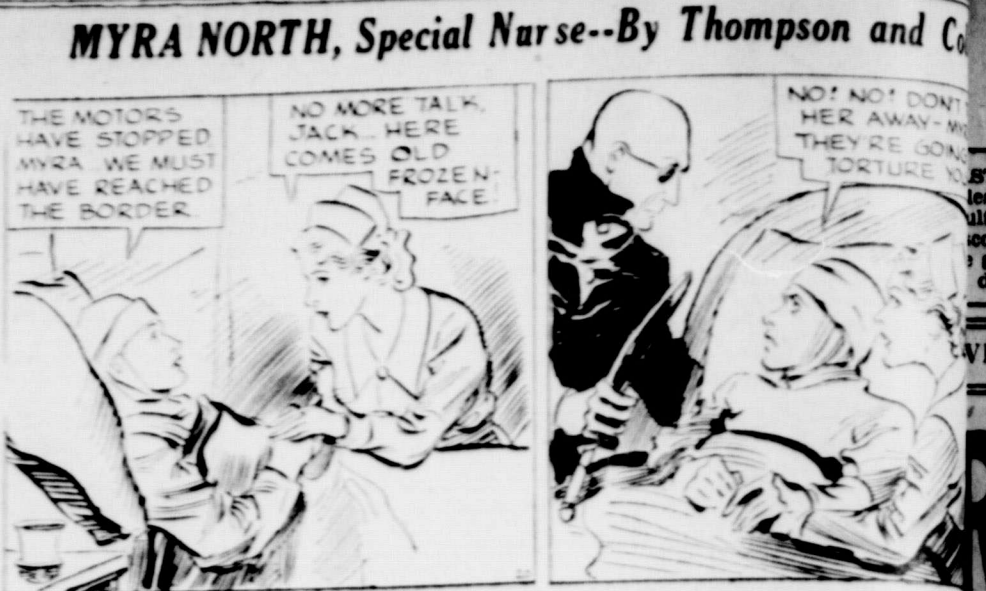
