## OCCUPANTS OF PLANE CRASH DEAD

### PLANE RAISED FROM WATER AFTER 14 HOURS

**BULLETIN**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 10 (AP)—The United Airline plane that plunged into San Francisco bay carried all 11 of its occupants to death, authorities found today when the wreckage was raised from the water. More than 14 hours after the accident.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 10 (AP)—A derrick bared along side the wrecked U. S. airline plane half submerged in the bay today attempted to raise the wreckage and determine the fate of the 11 occupants. None believed that any of the eight passengers and three members of the crew had survived. Salvage operation began at low tide, the barge was moored between two coast guard boats about one and one-half miles off shore. Officials estimated it would require four hours to lift the wreckage high enough to permit authorities to estimate the damage.

Department of commerce inspectors stood by ready to investigate. Cause of the crash may never be known, however. Weather conditions were perfect as A. R. Thompson, veteran pilot eased the big plane into a landing that ended in the worst airport major air tragedy of the winter. Some experts believed Thompson dipped too low endeavoring to land and the plane struck the water. The county coroner also wanted to start an investigation and the U. S. Airlines commenced an inquiry. The 21-passenger airliner crashed 5 miles east of municipal airport at 11 o'clock Tuesday night. The wreckage was discovered five hours later.

### NEW ECONOMY FOR MID-WEST BEING SOUGHT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10 (AP)—President Roosevelt urged congress in a special message to develop a "new economy" for the midwest to protect the nation's "breadbasket" against disastrous future. President Roosevelt transmitted a long range rehabilitation program in an effort to resume 19 mid-western states from the threat of poverty through repeated ravages of dry weather. The president said a "new economy" must be developed which is based on conservation and effective utilization of all water available. The committee report approved by the president urged creation of regional midwest authority to direct the long range program.

Highway Engineer A. D. Schmid, for the state, announced today that the department had accepted the work of the three jobs just completed for highway One through Eighth street and had relieved contractors, Wommack & Tenning from further responsibility. 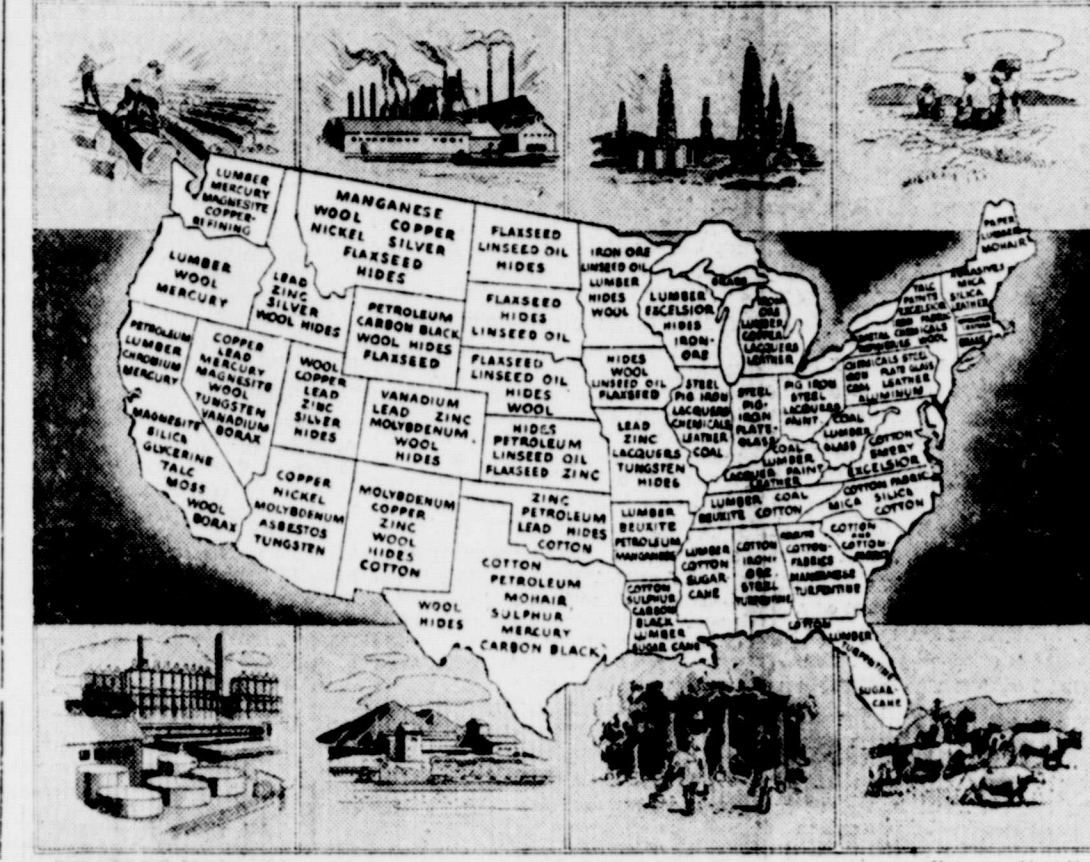

### AUTOMOBILE STRIKES AFFECT EVERY STATE IN THE UNION



Map prepared by A.M.A. The automobile industry is one of America's largest buyers of raw materials and manufactured products. The map above shows a few of the principal products bought by motor manufacturers in each of the 48 states, at a total cost for 1936 estimated at more than \$1,600,000,000. Significant as this is in indicating the nation-wide effects of a strike, it is far from complete. Another map might show, state by state, the thousands of dealers and salesmen directly affected. There is no way to picture indirect losses in retail sales and government revenue through reduced taxes and increased relief.

## What's News Today

President Roosevelt will lead up to his plan for judicial reform concerning "junking" of justices of the supreme court who have reached the age of 70 by getting a law passed allowing their retirement on reaching that age. This law will probably pass without much opposition and then the further legislation may easily follow for appointing additional justices for those who refuse to retire. The country arouses in arms against the measure but it will soon quiet and the measure will pass.

Gov. Allred says he will not consent to legislation spending more money until means or raising needed revenues are provided for. In his message to the body he recommended that revenues be raised by taxes on natural resources and by franchise taxes. He reports his suggestion. He evidently means to use the big stick to enforce action by the lawmakers. And of course each representative receives floods of letters from voters back home asking that taxes must not be levied on "this and that." So what are the poor fellows who must look to their political fence going to do about it?

Meanwhile, a score of bills are proposed, such as inspection of automobiles as to compulsory repairs making them safe for driving; drives against liquor advertising in the state; against gambling on horse racing and innumerable other matters. The legislators had much rather discuss some of these matters than to impose taxes on irate constituents. They are wise.

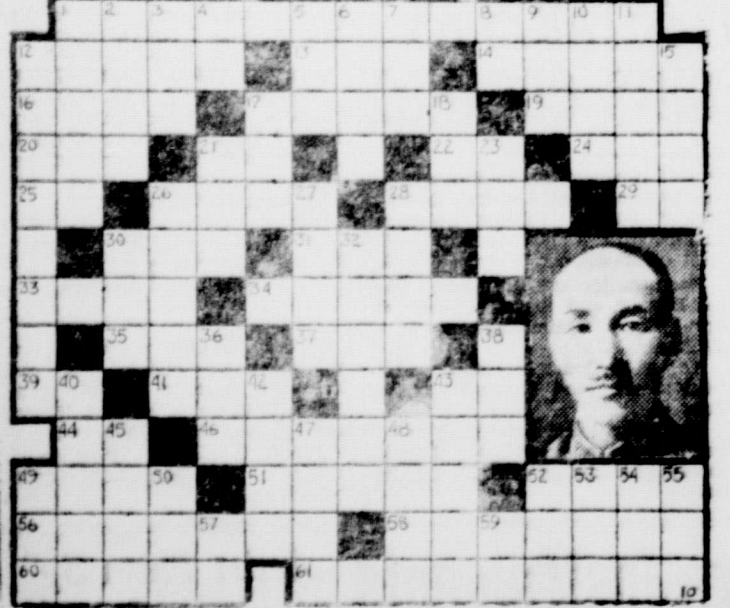
The automobile strike continues at a dead lock, but Chrysler, wise to the signs of the times, raises wages 10 per cent in an effort to keep men contented and at work. And why not? All big corporations must pay many thousands as excess earning taxes each year. Why not give it to their workmen and make living conditions better for them, keeping them happy and contented at their work? Of course, there is another side to the controversy that is not influenced by this matter of wages. But with good wages, men will be slow to jeopardize jobs by fighting for some leader's "principles."

The deficiency bill of \$90,000,000 which carries \$789,000,000 for WPA work to aid 2,580,000 persons occupied until June 30, has been passed and signed. Mr. Roosevelt has not forgotten to think of the jobless. If any of this money is used for food relief, congress will be asked to reimburse the fund in a later deficiency measure.

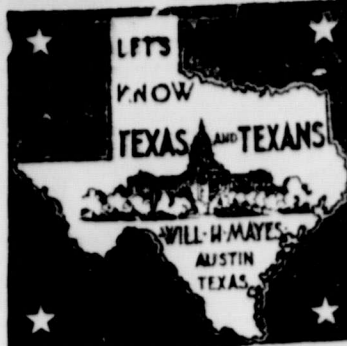

Q. What inscription is on Houston's monument at Huntsville summing up his leading achievements and characteristics, G. L.

A. "Soldier under Jackson—Boy hero of Horseshoe Bend—Congressman from Tennessee—Chief of the Cherokees—Commander-in-Chief of Texas Army—Hero of San Jacinto—twice President of the Republic of Texas—United States Senator from Texas—governor of Texas. A brave soldier, a fearless statesman, a great orator, a pure patriot, a faithful friend, a loyal citizen, a devoted husband and father, a consistent Christian, an honest man."

Q. For what is the historic oak creak near the courthouse square at LaGrange especially noted?

A. From under its great shades Capt. N. M. Dawson and his company of 35 men marched to the relief of San Antonio after its capture by Mexicans in 1842; it shaded Gen. Kirby Smith's volunteers assembled to join the Southern Confederacy; two companies were formed beneath its foliage for the Spanish-American war; there Fayette county's young manhood gathered to enlist in the World War, and there the people of the county assembled to give thanks when the armistice was signed.

Q. What became of Ensign James A. Sylvester, color-bearer at the Battle of San Jacinto? A. Soon after peace was achieved in Texas, he went to New Orleans and, being an expert printer, obtained a position with the New Orleans Picayune. He died in 1882 and was buried in the Old Fellows cemetery at New Orleans. His remains were brought to Texas in November, 1835, and interred in the State Cemetery.

## CONFIDENTIAL REPORT

### CRIME FILE ON BOLITHO BLANE

BEGIN HERE TODAY. BOARDING CARLETON ROCKSAVAGE, NIAGARA FALLS, GOLDEN GULL, OF MICHIGAN, TO INVESTIGATE THE disappearance of BIRTHDAY BLANE, British banker and Rocksvage's chief competitor in world soap trade. Further, that she lost a considerable portion of her capital in the Hatry crash, and is now principally dependent upon her holdings in the Rocksvage companies.

If it can be proved that he visited Blane's cabin between 7:45 and 8:15, when he appeared in the lounge, it will look very much as though he is our man.

MR. JOCELYN: As dependent of Lady Welter his motive is considerably strengthened by the facts about her financial situation which have now emerged. From the report of his activities previous to his marriage with Lady Welter's daughter it is obvious that he is something of an adventurer and, since he was frequently written, probably unscrupulous where money is concerned. Moreover, he is responsible for having introduced into the party a known criminal, "Slick" Daniels, alias Count Posodini.

MISS ROCKSAVAGE: Nil, as far as is known at the moment.

COUNT POSODINI: Nil, as far as is known at the moment, but the count is now identified as the ex-convict "Slick" Daniels, so I hope to be able to make him talk, as there must be some special reason for Reginald Jocelyn having asked him on board, when he was quite unknown to any other member of the party.

MR. ROCKSAVAGE: Strong motive to do away with Blane, as pointed out in previous analysis. This becoming even stronger on confirmation of the precarious situation of his companies.

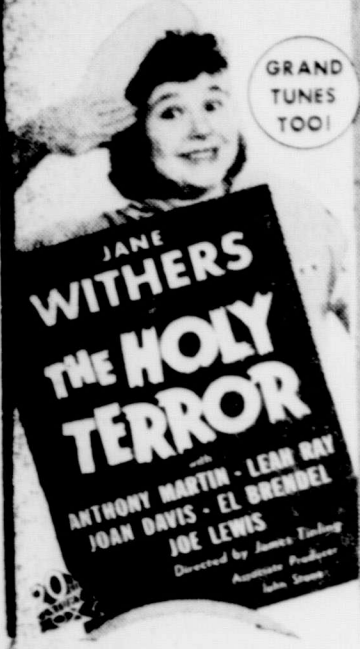

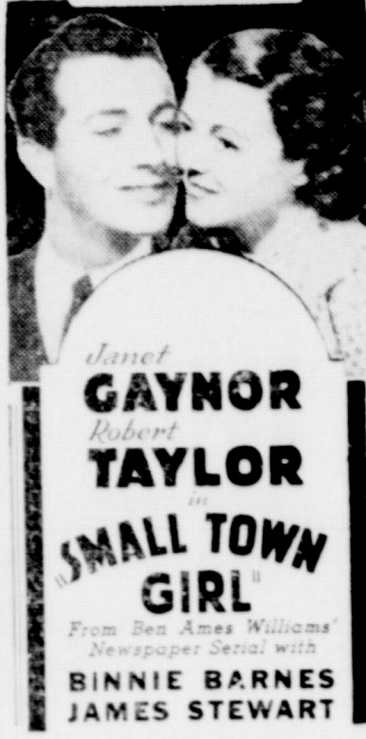
