## Nurses Fill Needs In Homes

Last week R. N. Jackie Tucker, Supervisor of the Home Health Services of Eastland County, joined with her Assistant, L.V.N. Nova George of Cisco, in presenting a film and program at a Senior Citizen's luncheon in Cisco.

At the same time another Home Health Medical Worker, L.V.N. Evelyn Fox, was visiting patients in their homes on the east side of the County.

Duties for these nurses can vary any day from diabetic care to monitoring a heart patient or giving physical therapy while managing to fit in educational and informational services.

The information is needed, for the program is comparatively new in Eastland County.

The plan has a beautiful simplicity-it is based on the idea that nurses can go into homes and give part-time care to patients instead of individuals staying in a hospital for extended periods of time. The program filled a terrific need from the first, and now the nurses care for an average of twenty different patients each week with some of these requiring frequent visits. The nurses are also on call 24 hrs. per day to answer questions and help in emergencies. And this type of service is covered by Medicare, Medicaid, V.A., and Insurance programs, or arrangements can be made for private pay.

The West Central Texas Home Health Agency is part of a large, non-profit organization called the M B F A Foundation. This group, with headquarters in Lubbock, serves people in 135 counties of West Texas with the type of Christian concern which lifts mental and physical distress. This is done with network of nurses and supervisors who work closely with Doctors in all the area.

The local Supervisor, R. N. Jackie Tucker, can be reached at no. 629-8041. The regional office for Eastland County is located in Abilene, with Billie Cook, R. N., as the head.

The home office, in Lubbock, administers a number of other services across West Texas besides the Home Health. There is the South Plains Homemaker Service, where qualified women go into homes for meal preparation, personal care, escort service, home management, and other needs. Memorial Nursing Homes are provided where patients can live when it is no longer possible for them to stay in a home of their own.

The Memorial Homes and Homemaker Service are not available in Eastland County. "There is a great need for the Homemaker Service in Eastland County," states Nurse Jackie Tucker. "We hope to be able to carry that program forward in the future, when we can recruit and train enough people. It takes a special kind of person to give the dedicated personal service we want. Our nurses, too, must have a devoted interest in their patients. For our

care covers the whole person and his environment." The M B F A Foundation began with one man-Land D. Wall of Lubbock. He dreamed of a breakthrough in medical service-where the old, practical ideas of home and family care could be incorporated into modern medicine. He felt this should be a Christian outreach work, ministering to the needs of all people, regardless of race, creed, or color, or ability to pay. The organization was set up as The Missionary Baptist Foundation of America, Inc. The Home Health Agencies were begun as primary functions of the organization. In March, 1977 the trustees elected to change the name to the M B F A Foundations, meaning Many Benefits For All.

In 1975 the organization expanded into the Nursing Home field. Other involvement are the administration of rural hospitals, community nutritional programs, family counseling, and furnishing transportation for persons to essential services.

The work of the M B F A is supported by contributions and memorials by clients, families, and interested persons-by grants from government or private foundations, or by Medicare, Medicaid, V. A. benefits, insurance, or private payments. Individuals who are not covered by these are asked to pay only according to their ability.

The Home Health Nurses of Eastland County have a busy schedule, with appointments in various homes. "I feel this type of care is the coming thing, and certain to expand," says L.V.N. Nova George, who covers the Cisco area. "Many ill patients want to stay in familiar surroundings, if they can just have the supervision and care they need. Home Care is different from hospital care, in that you assist the same patients weekly, and you see their family and understand their complete living situation. You grow very close to these patients, and it is a real joy to see them recover."

At this time Mrs. George is treating stroke victims, changing dressings and catheters, working with cardiac patients, giving physical therapy, and attending to other types of disabilities. Mrs. Lela Lloyd, one of her patients, is attempting to get a 90 degree angle movement from a total knee replacement.

Evelyn Fox, L. V. N., finds her work with the Home Health Service very interesting. "Each week is so different. Sometimes I give instruction in the homes, or observe heart patients. I have cancer patients, stroke victims, and a patient with a fractured hip. The service is really needed in this area: more people need to be aware of it. The M B F A does not pay for publicity, we depend on personal referrals to bring up patients."

Any of the nurses will follow up a request for patient care, as soon as a Doctor gives it approval.

"We work closely with the local Doctors," states Director Jackie Tucker. "We keep detailed reports and charts, just as if the patient were in a hospital. At the least sign of difficulty, we check with a Doctor and follow his recommendation. I also consult frequently with our office in Abilene."

Mrs. Tucker began work with the M B F A in March, 1977. "I believe an Organization such as this is the answer to rising Health-care costs," she says. "We have found that adequate patient care can be adapted to the home in many cases. We find that the patient is often happier and more relaxed at a home."

The Home Care Service, she adds, can include patients of all ages, although there have been no babies under her care in Eastland County. "Most of our patients are Senior Citizens. But we are open to any situation where we can be of help. Please call my office, No. 629-8041."

The confidence the patients have in Mrs. Tucker, George, and Fox is reflected in the calls they get, in which their judgement is asked on all sorts of matters. Other rewards are the deeply-felt words of thanks when they relieve a suffering patient, or help someone to progress. Along with that must be the feeling of being "new" pioneers-innovative people who take the best of the past and combine it with a far-seeing look into the future of medical care.

The second session of the short course will be conducted at the Eastland County Farm Bureau Building at Eastland, February 13. Dr. James Armstrong, Extension Veterinarian, will discuss prussic acid and Nitrate poisoning and other beef cattle health problems.

The third session will be at the auditorium of Ranger Junior College Dr. Ernest Davis, Livestock Marketing Specialist, will discuss cattle marketing and price outlook. All sessions will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Gordon urges all cattlemen to attend each session of the short course.

**DEAR PAT--**We are building a new home and have added several features that I think will make my husband and I more comfortable.

We both use wheelchairs but we are not severely handicapped. However, it is difficult for us to roll our chairs on carpet and we are undecided as to what kind to install.

We have considered vinyl flooring but it really looks to cheap to install throughout the home. Hardwood floors is not practical because it would be hard to keep looking nice with wheelchairs rolling on it constantly.

Can you tell us what other handicapped persons use in their homes?--Mrs. T.P., Georgia

**DEAR MRS. P.--**If carpet is to be used it should be wall to wall and of low pile. Much more strength is required to roll over carpet that is deep, plush, or of loose pile. If at all possible, you should eliminate the padding under the carpet.

The flat, smooth-surfaced, commercial carpet is the most suitable for home floor covering. It is not only easier to move around on, but is long lasting and easy to care for.--PAT

**DEAR PAT--**Epilepsy is so unfair. A person can do anything anyone else can except for short periods in one's life. It seems as though when one knows a person has epilepsy they automatically think he is retarded and an undesirable person to associate with. And no one will let you work for them if they know you have this dreadful disease.

I thought people were more educated in today's time but I can see I am wrong. I'll never tell anyone again I have epilepsy and I bet other's don't either.

I am not physically handicapped but I always read your column. I don't know if you ever receive letters from people like me but I just had to write someone and get this off my chest.--M.S.D., Oklahoma

**Dear Margie--**Yes, I do get letters like yours and I'm so glad you felt you could write to me about the unfairness of it all. You are not alone in your feelings as a recent survey by the National Epilepsy League shows. "One out of three epileptics conceals his disorder from employers."

Epilepsy authorities called the finding surprising because it indicates a high degree of public discrimination. They had believed that increased public understanding of epilepsy and its problems had long since made it unnecessary for the epileptic to conceal his condition from his employer. Instead, the survey showed that epileptics fear loss of deserved promotion, unjustified demotion, or even being fired because of their illness.

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

The dairyman said everyone appreciates a word of encouragement, a pat on the back, and after milking 65 head of cows twice a day during the very disagreeable weather of January, this award could not have come at a more opportune time.

There are certain jobs that must go on even in cold winter days. And then there are some jobs that should only be done during winter months. One of these jobs is pruning of dormant shade trees. However, before you start whacking away at your favorite tree or shrub, make sure you have a justifiable reason for pruning.

There are a number of reasons for pruning. First and foremost is to maintain a strong framework for the future development of the tree. Other reasons are to reduce the size or to keep the tree within specific bounds and to remove dead, diseased or weak growth as well as broken limbs and rubbing branches. Another reason for pruning is to improve the size and quality of flowers and fruit. A final reason is to balance the top growth with the root system at transplanting time.

Unless pruning can be justified for one of these reasons, it is better to place the shears and saw in the shed and obtain the desired exercise by spading the garden.

Some of the general principles that will apply when pruning shade trees include the removal of all dead or diseased wood, broken limbs and weak growth. Also, long unsightly branches should be shortened or removed as they offer too much resistance to the wind and are frequently

subject to storm damage. Never stub back limbs or branches. Rather, cut back to a main branch or trunk so that there will be no stubs remaining. The so-called stubbing back or topping large branches will result in a proliferation or sucker growth and will leave a wound that is impossible to heal.

Recent research indicates that the use of tree wound paint on wounds is not essential. Woody plants have the ability to wall off the wounded area and will heal over just as effectively without the dressing. However, there is no harm in using a wound paint.

Use a saw or chisel to smooth broken stubs and torn bark to promote healing. While the homeowner can handle most pruning operations, it may be best to hire a professional arborist or tree surgeon if trees are large or need extensive work.

If the tree or shrub being pruned is diseased, it is important to dip pruning equipment in a disinfectant after cut to kill disease organisms so as to prevent their spread to other portions of the tree or even to other trees. A 10 percent household bleach solution makes a satisfactory disinfectant. This can be prepared by mixing one part of bleach to nine parts of water.

Have you mailed your 1978 Census of Agriculture report? They are due by February 15. Response to the census is required by law. But the same law information furnished on reports forms is kept confidential and even other government agencies cannot obtain or use the report made by any farmer or rancher. The law also provides that copies retained by the operator are immune from legal process.

## Congressional Comment

The ethical conduct of our public officials has always been an issue of concern to the people whom they serve and rightfully so. An eighteenth century philosopher stated the issue well when he said that those who treat politics and ethics apart will never understand either one. Recent political scandals have proved this maxim true. Watergate, Koregate, and recently the troubles of several of my colleagues, give evidence to the fact that it is not in the institutional interest of Congress for our legislators to make our laws and then, at the same time, violate them. Political corruption degrades the public perception of Congress and contributes greatly to government inefficiency and waste.

The issue of remaining in a position of power in the House of Representatives, while at the same time being implicated in unethical or illegal practices, has been a key item in the House Democratic Caucus, which has been meeting recently. The very fact that we are required to "legislate" ethics is a sad commentary, and particularly in a body such as the Congress, where it should be expected that our elected officials would maintain the highest possible integrity. While in the Caucus I have consistently supported proposed rules changes, within Constitutional limits, which would prohibit those convicted of crimes from serving in positions of leadership in the House. Surely we must face certain inherent rights such as a person being presumed innocent until proved guilty. Ultimately this is what the voters must

decide for they are the arbiters of the public morality and must determine what they are willing to tolerate. But if the public decides they want a representative who has been convicted in a court of law or in the Congress of illegal conduct, the Congress must look after the national interest and deny a leadership position within the House to those who have reached the public trust.

It should be the aim of the political process to obtain leaders who work for the common good of society and take the necessary precautions to make sure the public trust is not violated. The selection of leaders is the responsibility of the voters. The responsibility of the legislator is to work for laws that will maintain the integrity of the institution in which he serves and to uphold the public trust. History has taught us that respect must be earned and only through wise leadership and honest administration can this be accomplished. As your representative I accept this trust that has been placed in me and will work to enforce the rules of ethical practices in the Congress.

### Stenholm Selected

#### To Serve On Subcommittee

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm was today selected to serve on the Investigations Subcommittee of the Post Office and Civil Service Committee in the House of Representatives. This Subcommittee has the responsibility for oversight of the civilian agencies of government.

One of Congressman Stenholm's primary interests is to assure greater productivity on the part of the Federal Government. In this connection, he plans to gear his work on this Subcommittee towards proposals designed to streamline Federal Departments and to make them more receptive to the citizens they are intended to serve.

In line with this philosophy of greater Government efficiency, Stenholm has also introduced legislation, referred to as "sunset" legislation. This proposal would require, among other things, that most Federal programs be reviewed and reauthorized once every ten years. Those programs not receiving reauthorization, would be terminated.

County it could have been much greater if cattlemen had not been informed of the danger and told what steps to take to save cattle. Between June 13th and 30th, for example, over 100 head of cattle died. The number of deaths in July were reported to be 35, although the Prussic Acid content was very high through this whole month. The information, testing, and close work with Veterinarians undoubtedly helped avert a real disaster for cattlemen.

## Gordon Recognized For Saving Cattle

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, working out of Texas A and M University, has issued informational date on the Prussic Acid poisoning of cattle in Eastland County during the summer of 1978, and the efforts of the Extension Service to save livestock. The work of County Agent De Marquis Gordon is singled out as being responsible for saving an estimated 200 head of livestock in July 1978 alone.

In most years there are occasional deaths from Prussic Acid poisoning in Johnson Grass and Sorghum-type grasses, but nothing to compare with the unpredictable 1978 situation, where drought and showers combined to produce a sudden deadly toxin in these feeds. The first case of Prussic Acid poisoning was reported on June 13th. Agent Gordon prepared a news release at that time warning cattlemen of the problem. The article appeared in County newspapers on June 16, and was read on the local radio station several times. On June 16, following a State Extension Conference, the Agent received reports of six more deaths.

During the next two days large numbers of cattle deaths were reported. The Agent called Dr. James Armstrong, Extension Veterinarian, to ask for advice. Dr. Armstrong brought a test kit and came to Eastland County. He had Gordon tested several pastures and found that all contained Prussic Acid. Gordon and Dr. Armstrong went to Radio Station KERC in Eastland and taped a 10 minute program warning cattlemen of the Prussic Acid danger, and explaining how to avoid the problem. Many cattlemen who read the article or heard the radio program began following these instructions. But some producers had not received the news.

On June 30th a news letter was prepared and mailed to 250 cattlemen concerning the Prussic Acid problem. A news article was prepared the following day. In July more and more cattlemen were taking steps to prevent this poisoning, but death losses were still being reported. Many of these were caused by feeding freshly cut hay. Another news letter was mailed out on July 14th warning cattlemen about feeding freshly cut hay that might contain Prussic Acid.

Cisco Junior College provided Gordon with a supply of sodium carbonate and picric acid to perform Prussic Acid tests. Dr. John Foster, Veterinarian, provided him with chloroform needed for the tests.

During July De Marquis Gordon tested 26 samples of forage for Prussic Acid, and made 14 farm and ranch visits. Producers were advised to keep cattle off pastures which contained the poison as indicated in tests. The close work with Veterinarians also helped reduce losses. The agent showed the Vets how to run the Prussic Acid tests and gave them chemicals for testing. Dr. Foster ran out of antidote to treat sick animals and was unable to obtain a new supply. Gordon obtained the name of a source of antidote from Dr. Armstrong and gave it to Dr. Foster.

On July 20th more and more tests began showing negative results. The poison seemed to be leaving the forages, but some deaths were still being reported, especially with hay feeding. After rains on July 22 and 23 the poisoning became less of a problem.

Although the economic loss was heavy in Eastland

## Keeping Well

In the past two years several articles have appeared in magazines and newspapers suggesting that many unnecessary operations are being done in the United States. This campaign to accuse doctors and hospitals of doing unnecessary operations is being sponsored largely by the Health, Education, and Welfare department of our government. H.E.W. is doing this in an effort to save money on their government

health programs (Medicare, Medicaid, Champus, etc.) As I will discuss in a later article on socialized medicine, our government is trying to "take over" the practice of medicine in our country. The government has promised the public more than it can afford so they are "cutting expenses" by trying to keep people from having necessary operations, by trying to force doctors to prescribe cheaper, possibly less effective drugs, etc.

The government is setting up a so called "second opinion" program to encourage patients to see a second physician when on recommends surgery. This results in more expense than is saved by the few operations that might be avoided.

Of course, a few doctors surgery that will make the patient more comfortable or may take the life of the patient. Certainly many operations are done now that were not done in past years. Many new operations have been perfected to benefit the patient, and improvements in anesthesia and medicines

have made operations safer for the patient. By unnecessary operations the government means not having a hysterectomy unless cancer is suspected. They think patients should continue to put up with pelvic pain, flooding, prolapse of the uterus and bladder. They would like for patients to just keep on living with hemorrhoids that bleed and hurt. In fact, Medicare already refuses to pay for the surgical repair of corns or bunions which in some patients cause great pain and disability. Many other examples could be given. But the point

is that although American medicine is the best in the world, those who want the government to control medicine will require us to go backward to the standards of fifty years ago by eliminating many operations that are very desirable for the patient's comfort and good health-- all in an effort to save money. Find a physician you trust and follow is advice. Don't let "Uncle Sam" diagnose or treat your problems.

change or repair the item—or refund your money. If results are not satisfactory, report the matter to the customer service department or to the manager.

**When To Write Company**  
If local action is not satisfactory, write to the manufacturer.

Find the address on the label, instruction booklet or the product packaging.

Do not send the product

unless the manufacturer asks for it. They may have special locations for returned merchandise.

**How To Write Company**  
In writing a letter to the manufacturer, be as courteous and precise as possible. Keep a copy of the letter, and enclose your return address.

Include product identification, brand name and model, serial number, size, color and other descriptive

information.

Explain the problem carefully and briefly—and steps already taken to correct the problem.

Include the name of the store which sold the product and the purchase date.


Also, suggest action you want the company to take. Action could include a money refund, product replacement or repair.

Address the letter to the Customer Service representative or the Con-


sumer Division of the company. A letter addressed to the "president" can sometimes delay any response.

However, in cases of "no reply" from the consumer division, "going to the top" is necessary. In this case, check the Standard and Poor's Register of Corporations at any public library, for the name of the person who is the president of the company or the chairman of the board.

Gains in the total number of telephones in Cisco during 1978 reflect the overall telephone growth throughout the state last year, according to statistics compiled by Southwestern Bell.

Doug White, local manager for the telephone company, said 420 phones were added in Cisco last year as part of the company's statewide growth of 500,000 telephones.

At the close of 1978, Cisco had 4,120 total telephones in service. Statewide, Southwestern Bell installed its 8 millionth phone late in the year.

"We expect growth to continue," White said. "Locally, we project an additional 230 phones this year. Across Texas, Southwestern Bell is anticipating a gain of about 560,000 phones during 1979."

The company's 1978 construction budget was more than \$1 billion throughout the state, the manager

said. "This year, our forecasters project a construction budget of \$1.3 billion to maintain service and meet growth throughout the state."

Meanwhile, Southwestern Bell has initiated an operational reorganization to respond to changes in customer demands, new technology and competition.

To meet the principal needs of the market sectors it serves, White said the company is reorganizing into three new segments--business, residential and network.

The manager emphasized the reorganization will not change Southwestern Bell's primary goal of quality phone service. "We're changing the way we respond to the needs of customers, he said, "which should help us do an even better job of providing the quality service."

Cisco has about 26 telephone company employees, who received salaries totaling \$453,580 last year, White said. "Most of these salaries were absorbed by the local economy for goods and services in the Cisco area," he added.

The local economy received an added boost during 1978 when Southwestern Bell paid ad valorem taxes and 1977 gross receipts taxes exceeding \$20,200.
