A limited amount of cookies were ordered to sell directly, but some of the most popular kinds are almost gone. The cookies sell for \$1.25 per box and come in the following kinds: Samoas (a cookie with a caramel, coconut, and chocolate coating); Thin Mints (a chocolate wafer covered with peppermint chocolate); Do-si-dos (an oatmeal-peanut butter sandwich cookie); Vanchos (Vanilla and chocolate sandwich cream); Tagalongs (a cookie topped with peanut butter and chocolate coating); Trefoil (a shortbread made with butter and eggs and Granola a new cookie made with all natural ingredients-Oats, molasses, unbleached flour, sesame seeds, wheat germ and dark brown sugar. These cookies, which were baked especially for this sale, were delivered fresh from the bakery last week. They contain no preservatives.

The profit from the sale is to be used to maintain and improve the Girl Scout Council Camp, Wood Lake. Also each troop retains \$1.80 per case sold, for troop program, and girls not only receive a cookie patch, but also receive "cookie currency" which may be used for camping experiences, equipment, dues, or various girl scout events.

The Cisco Girl Scouts would like to thank the citizens who have helped to make this sale so successful. Forty-five percent more cookies were ordered this year than last year.

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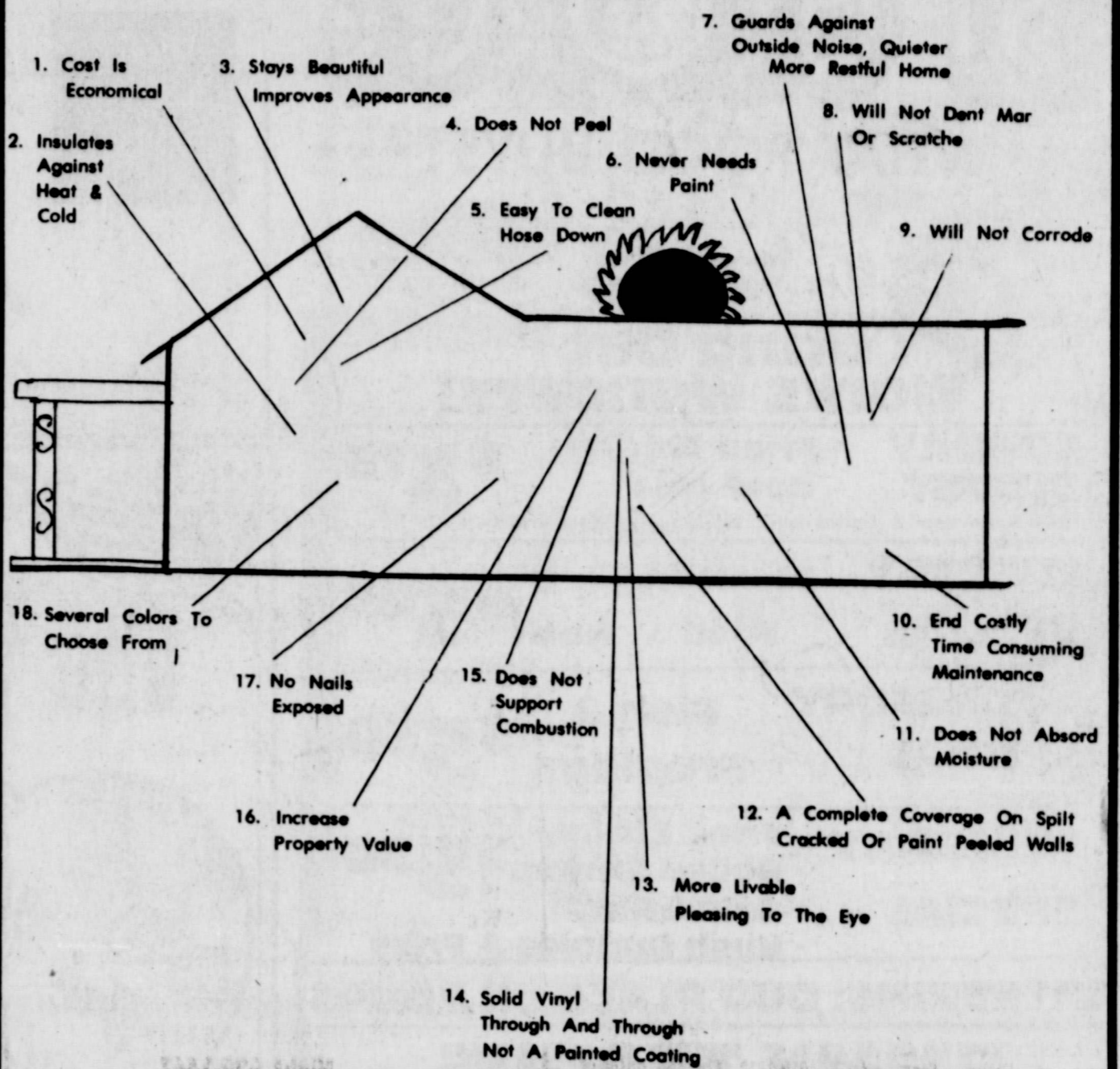

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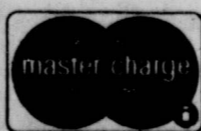
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Hints for the Handicapped

DEAR PAT-Will you please give some information on the disabled, aged, and others who have limited mobility.

What is being done for these people in the way of helping those who want to remain in their own homes. I work with many elderly and handicapped on a volunteer basis and no one wants to go

to a nursing home or an institution.

With a little help, many of these people could remain in their own homes and be fairly independent.--Mrs. T.E.M., Kansas

DEAR MRS. M.--The national health survey by HEW reports that 22.5 million noninstitutionalized persons have limited ac-

tivities resulting from chronic conditions or impairment, of which 4.1 million are unable to perform their major activities.

Twelve million are limited in the amount and kind of such activities; the rest, 6.1 million, have limitations but not in their major activity.

It is significant that the survey found more persons (11.5 million) with chronic conditions in families of low income--under \$4,000 a year--than in families with higher income.

Dr. Howard Rusk of New York University Medical Center states there are 10 million American women with some homemaking responsibilities who are physically disabled, not including those afflicted by blindness or mental illness.

Many of these people wish to remain in their own homes and this is being made more and more possible by the expansion of such home services as:

National Council for Homemaker-Home Health Aide Services, Inc., 67 Irving Place, New York, New York 10013. This is a nationwide system of organized assistance to individuals in their own homes.

The services offered often allow the person to remain in his home and continue a self-directed style of living, when he would otherwise be forced to leave it.

A person who is now in an institution and wishes to

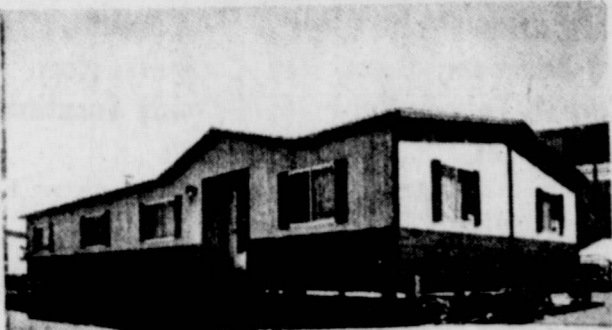

Congressional Comments

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The Administration recently released its proposed budget for 1980 calling for outlays of \$531.6 billion and revenues of \$502.6 billion creating a deficit of \$29 billion. Increases in Social Security payments, due to increased benefits and a greater number of beneficiaries, compose over one-third of the growth in spending. Defense spending rises by \$11.3 billion. Medicare/Medicaid, veterans benefits, and interest on the national debt are additional major elements in the outlay expansion. Despite the increases in some of these programs, the President refers to the budget as "lean and austere."

While studying the proposed budget, I am increasingly concerned by the large deficit, particularly when perceived realistically the President's Budget will probably exceed \$29 billion in the red. Certainly we need a constitutional amendment to balance the budget except in times of war or national emergency. I have sponsored such a proposal in Congress. Despite the large deficit and the high tax rate proposed, I am pleased with the direction in which we appear to be heading. The attitude of our leadership seems to be toward a more fiscally

responsible course. There is not the massive increases in social programs that past Presidents have proposed. People are beginning to understand the definition of economics: the study of the allocation of scarce resources. We are not a nation of unlimited resources but are subject to restraints that must be dealt with.

We must, though, realize that the government has to perform some essential services that the private sector is unable to provide. The President's proposed cuts, in some of the expenditures that enhance the assets of America such as soil conservation and agricultural research and development, cause me great concern. They constitute investment for future generations. The budget does contain increases for necessary government spending for defense. I support these increases because they are needed to defend our way of life against aggression. If we do not have an adequate defense the rest of our goals will not matter for we stand in danger of losing everything we cherish.

Certainly the government has to provide some services, but if we are to survive as a world power our citizens must realize that government cannot solve all of our problems, all of the time. Our strength as a nation

depends on how each one of us lives our own individual lives. It is not a time to ask more of the government, but a time to demand more of ourselves. It is not a time to increase government hand-outs, but a time to put people back to productive work. It is a time to thoughtfully plan for the future of our Nation.

- (2) Paper and print quality is monitored automatically as the web of pad stock is printed with the horizontal blue lines.
- (3) The vertical left margin of the legal pad sheet is imprinted by a second-station cylinder while the web of paper is running at high speed.
- (4) After the printing process is completed, the paper is cut, counted into stacks and the chip-board backing is fed upward from the center of the press.
- (5) Lifts of paper with the proper sheet count and a chip-board backing are fed into a first-way cutter that produces a strip that's one pad high by four or more pads wide.
- (6) With head-strips attached, the semi-finished pads are stacked into lifts of twelve and fed to the second-way cutter and trimmed into the desired width.
- (7) Now completely finished, the legal pads are slipped onto a conveyor headed for the wrapping and packaging operation.



PREVENT BLINDNESS - recommends indirect watching as the only safe way to view the solar eclipse. The simplest indirect way is the "pinhole" method. Texas Society To Prevent Blindness

Texans should not look directly at the sun February 26, according to the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness. Although Texans will notice no visible difference in the day's brightness, a total solar eclipse will occur in a path from the Pacific Ocean crossing the northwestern United States. The eclipse will occur partially in virtually all the rest of the continental United States. The solar eclipse will begin in Houston at 9:11 a.m. as the moon first touches the sun's upper right corner. The moon will hide 57.8 percent of the solar disk at 10:23 a.m. when the eclipse reaches its mid-point. The eastward moving moon will slowly pull away from the sun after mid-eclipse. At 11:41 a.m., the dark new moon will leave the sun's upper left corner. Prevent Blindness recommends indirect watching as the only safe way to view the solar eclipse. The simplest indirect way is the "pinhole" method. Take two pieces of white cardboard, make a small hole in one, and with the sun at the back,

focus the eclipse through the pinhole onto the second board. The size of the image can be changed by altering the distance between the cardboards. One may use the binoculars or a telescope as the projector, replacing the pinhole cardboard. With the sunlight at his back, a person should position the instrument over his shoulder with the eyepiece down so that the light passing through it focuses on the white cardboard. Using either method, the circle of light on the cardboard will show the sun being slowly obscured by the moon as it passes between the earth and the sun. NEVER LOOK AT THE ECLIPSE THROUGH THE PINHOLE OR THROUGH THE BINOCULARS OR TELESCOPE. Photographers should also remember not to look at the sun through their camera viewfinder. Houston area sun watchers can view the eclipse by means of closed circuit tele-

visions at the Houston Museum of Natural Science. As part of the museum's free observing program, the Margaret Root Brown Solar Telescope will capture the sun's image and send it to monitors while staff members explain eclipse events. Following the last total eclipse seen in the U.S. (March 7, 1970), 145 cases of eye injury were reported in a Prevent Blindness survey, 121 of them eclipse burns. Sixty percent of the casualties had looked at the sun directly with the naked eye. The remainder had tried to protect their eyes with various devices - sunglasses, totally exposed photographic negatives, smoked glass and welder's goggles. Prevent Blindness is the only voluntary health agency solely concerned with preventing blindness through community service programs.

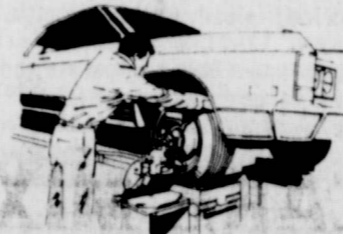

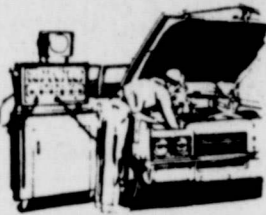

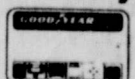

Keeping Well

LOW BACK PAIN
One of the most common problems seen in the daily practice of medicine is low back pain. This symptom may vary from a mild aching in the low back to pain so severe that the patient can hardly get up or down -- so severe that any movement greatly increases the pain in the back, in the legs, or in both areas.

organs, bladder, prostate gland, or rectum that refer pain to the back, disease in the vertebra themselves (arthritis, infection, cancer, etc.), and local mechanical defects (injury, abnormal structure of the low back, or herniated intervertebral disc).
Probably the most common cause of low back pain is an acute strain usually from lifting a heavy object or twisting or bending in a certain direction. This pain is

sudden in onset and may cause muscle spasm in the low back preventing the patient from straightening up. Examination of the back shows the spasm and the abnormal curvature of the lower spine. This acute lumbosacral strain is best treated by bed rest, heat, muscle relaxants, and pain medication.

Some patients have backs which have recurrent strains due to instability of the supporting ligaments of the back. These patients can be helped by back exercises to strengthen the muscles and improve their posture.

The most common severe low back problem is the herniated intervertebral disc.

The disc is the cartilage cushion between the vertebrae. It is subjected to great strain and pressure each day. The disc ruptures by injury or degeneration and pushes outward causing pressure on the nerve roots of the sciatic nerve. This produces low back pain that usually goes down the leg, often to the foot. This pain is made worse by movement, coughing, or straining. Weakness of the leg and even numbness of the foot occur in severe cases.

Treatment of the herniated disc is rest, heat, muscle relaxants, etc. If this does not bring relief, then surgery to remove the ruptured disc is necessary. The diagnosis

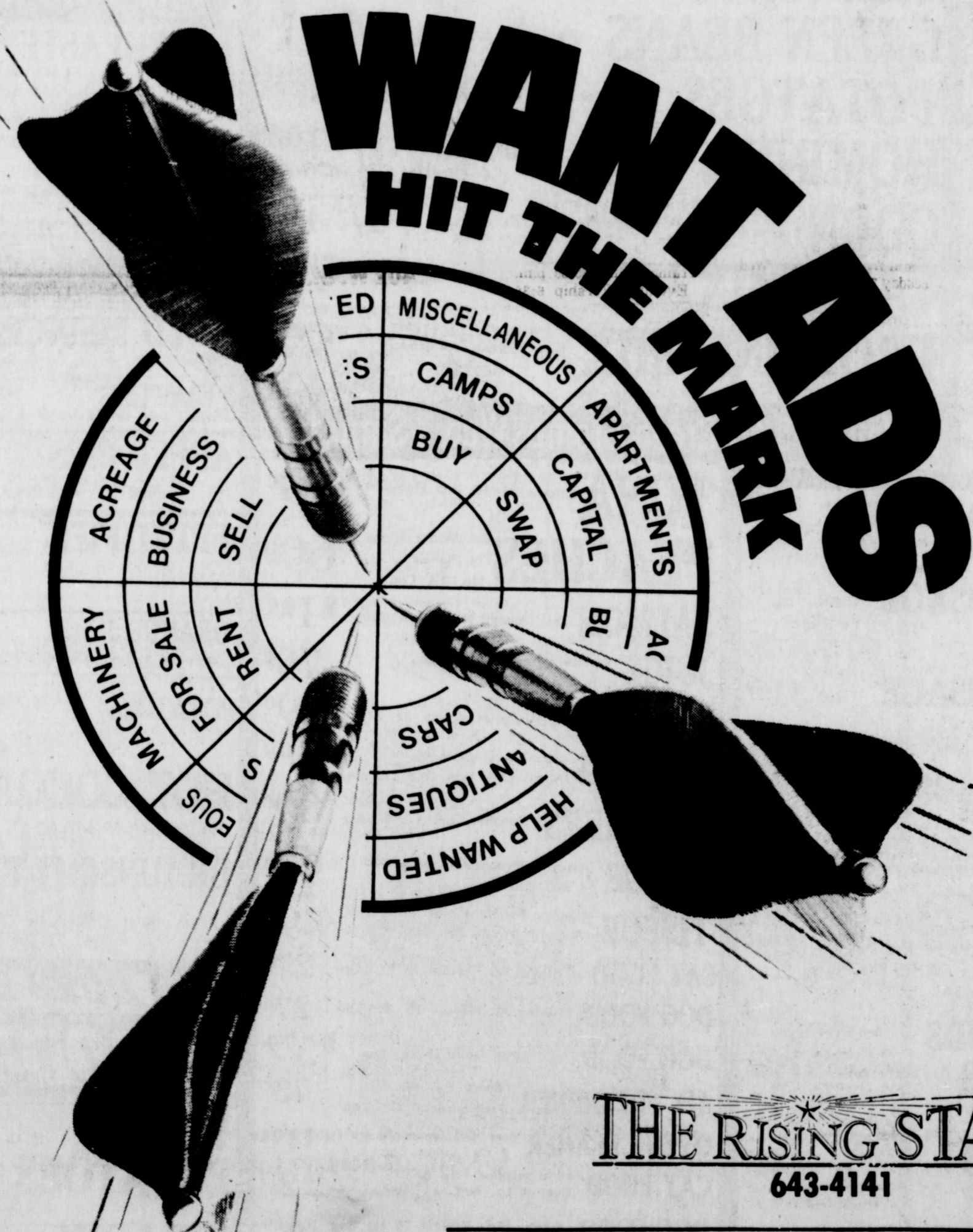

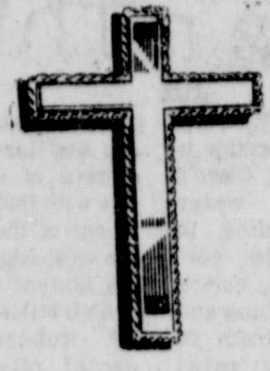


A THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

THE WEST BOUND Water Supply Corporation is one of the City of Cisco's very largest water customers, according to scout reports. The corporation, you know, built a pipeline from Lake Leon and Lake Cisco to Putnam to deliver water to rural customers along the route and to those who live a few miles north or south.

Mr. J.C. McDaniel of Carbon who is a member of the faculty out at Cisco Jr. College, is the vice president of the firm and helps with business matters. The WBWSC has a total of 425 customers. Of that number, 350 are tied into the Lake Cisco part of the line and the other 75 get Lake Leon water.

Customers, who have minimum billing of about \$13 per month, pay bills by mail or at the bank in Eastland or at the office of Mrs. Dolores Sharp at 208 East 8th Street in Cisco. Mrs. Sharp handles the bookkeeping for the corporation.

Under original plans, the firm figured to take a maximum of about three million gallons of water a month from both Lake Cisco and Lake Leon. The total hasn't been that high yet.

We talked up to several customers on the line and they're delighted to have dependable running water in their homes. Most of the customers use the pipeline water only four house use. The fact that they're on the pipeline has improved the value of their homes, we're told.

The pipeline system was built with a federal loan that is due to be paid off in 40 years. Mrs. Meta Isenhower of Putnam is president of the corporation, and Mrs. Ronnie White of Eastland is the secretary.

DRIVING OUT Lake Cisco way the other spring-like day, we were somewhat shocked to see how low the water level is. It was the first time we had been out there in several months. The water isn't near as low as it got in the early 1950s.

It has been several years since the usual spring rains were sufficient to raise the water level appreciably. Perhaps this year will be different.

BANKER JOE Cooper could wear another hat if he wanted to. He is now a licensed Certified Public Accountant, having been notified the other day that he had passed the state CPA board exams. Joe is a graduate of Texas A&M University and has been in the mortgage insurance and banking business here eight or ten years.

We stopped by to congratulate Joe on winning the coveted CPA license. Any CPA will tell you that the exam is very, very difficult. More people fail than pass the first time around. And it's not unusual for a man to take the exam three or more times before finally winning the battle.

Joe said that he has no

plans to use the CPA license. Joe and his wife are good citizens of our town. They live with their two daughters in one of the new houses at the west edge of town on the old Abilene highway.

ANOTHER "Graduate" of Dr. Robert Blackstock's dental offices has been admitted to dental school. He is Gary Wayne Harris, son of the W. W. Harrises of our town. Gary Wayne, who is a Vietnam veteran was notified the other day that he has been accepted for the fall 1979 class at the University of Texas Dental College at San Antonio.

Gary's brother, Larry, in dental school at Houston, and Larry's wife has been accepted by the same school. Another brother, Leland, graduated from the Houston school last June and now is practicing dentistry in Houston. He plans to special in orthodontia children's teeth straightening, etc.) Both Larry and Leland are Blackstock "graduates."

Two other Harris boys are available for dentistry. Gerald, the youngest, is now in the Blackstock "school." He works part-time in the lab and attends high school. The other Harris-Dennis is a student at San Angelo State University.

YOU'LL BE pleased to know that Kelly Kent, the young Cisco man who died of a heart attack in Abilene recently, was listed in the papers Friday as a member of the Academic All-America football team. This was the second time that he had received the honor.

Kelly was an outstanding athletic and student during his years in the Cisco Public School and was a Junior at Abilene Christian University. His life was a model for an outstanding young man.

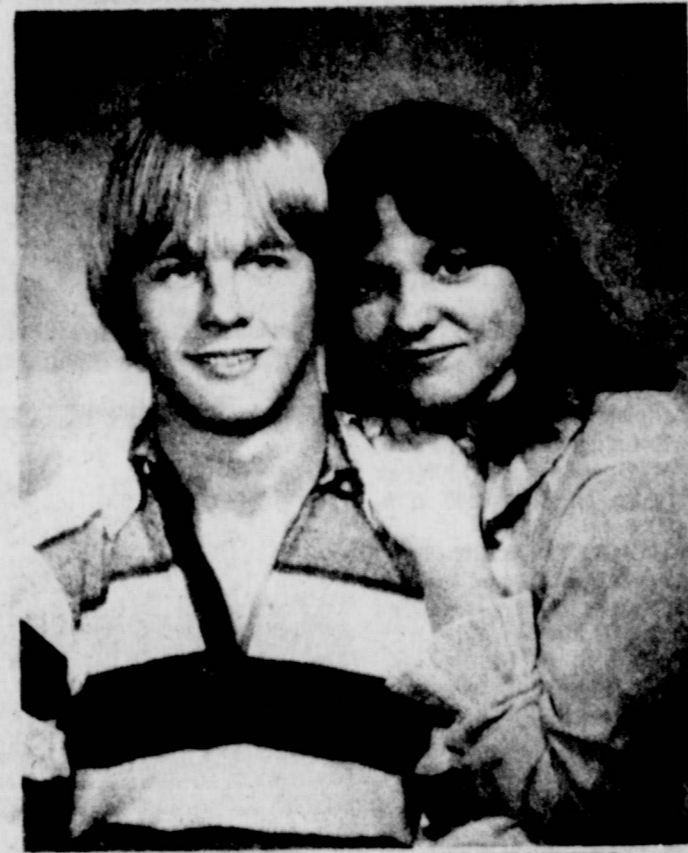
