Plans Heard For Restoration Of Mobley As Hilton Memorial

Members of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and several city officials were present at a meeting Friday afternoon in which they heard plans for the restoration of the old Mobley Hotel in Cisco as a museum and a type of memorial to the late Conrad Hilton. The plans were revealed by Dr. James C. Taylor, Dean of the Continuing Education Center University of Houston Hotel and Conrad N. Hilton School of Hotel and Restaurant Management.

Dr. Taylor informed those present that he has been approached by Eric Hilton, son of the late Conrad Hilton, with the desire to restore the original Mobley Hotel at Avenue D and Fourth Street as a memorial to his father. Conrad Hilton bought the Mobley, the first hotel he owned, in 1919 and invested his life savings of \$5,000 into the purchase.

Kelly Kent Memorialized By Texas Legislature

AUSTIN - Kelly Kent, the running back whose recent death at the age of 21 stunned Abilene Christian University, Abilene and Cisco was memorialized by the Texas Legislature Tuesday in a concurrent resolution.

The resolution read: "Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the State of Texas, the Senate concurring, that the 66th Legislature hereby honor the memory of Kelly Kent and extend deepest sympathy to his family: to his wife, Mrs. Kerri Kent of Abilene; to his parents, Mr.

and Mrs. Hershel Kent of Cisco; and to his brothers Danny and Craig Kent, also of Cisco."

Gary Thompson, newly elected representative from Abilene, introduced the resolution in the House. Sen. Grant Jones of Abilene brought it before the Senate.

In three years as a fullback at ACU, Kent rushed for 2,124 yards and 26 touchdowns. He broke Wilbert Montgomery's single season rushing record and led the Wildcats to the NAIA national championship in 1977.

Hints For The Aged

DEAR PAT--We are putting together a Spring program on recreation activities for the disabled and elderly.

Photography offers a great deal of pleasure and creativity to so many that we plan to include this in the program.

We are aware, however, of the difficulty in operating a camera when one has limited use of his hands and/or fingers.

A year or two ago you wrote on how to operate a camera when one has limited use of both hands or the use of the left hand only.

Could you possibly repeat this? As it will soon be Spring, I'm sure many others could also benefit.

Mrs. S.M., Indiana

DEAR MRS. M.--It's true that cameras are geared for right-handers, which in turn, makes them impossible to use in the normal manner if you have the use of only the left hand.

If an individual own any kind of camera equipment, from an Instamatic to a Single-Lens-Reflex, he can get the same quality picture by turning the camera upside down. This will put the necessary controls on the left side of the camera at the bottom. The left thumb is used to press the shutter release. Some professional photographers use this method when trying to get a shot of a certain subject when in a crowd.

For those who have difficulty in holding a camera, try a Twin-Lens-Reflex, which can be held with the use of a neck strap at about chest level. You view through the top of the camera at your subject, thus you don't have to hold the camera to your eye.

If an individual uses a "lap-board" attached to his wheelchair, a small tripod can be placed on the board. With the camera attached to the tripod, even severely handicapped individuals can usually operate a camera. A device that makes it even easier is a cable release attachment that professional photographers use. This cable release can be adapted to the left hander, or for those who lack strength or coordination.

The tripod and cable release are inexpensive and can be found wherever camera supplies are sold. There is another useful, more expensive device, however, that could be extremely beneficial to a handicapped person in the operation of a camera. An automatic film advance is worth considering if one has limited ability but a real desire to engage in photography regardless.

There is an older model camera, slightly larger than normal 35mm that is made to be operated with the left hand. The Exacta is not being produced any longer, but you may find a second-hand one at your local camera shop--or maybe a pawn shop.

OBSERVATIONS FROM... The River Road

An icy spell is a fine time to take a mental vacation - a quick trip to a favorite, far-away place. Sometimes these places are worth sharing, such as Punta De Agua, in Central New Mexico. Although I have visited this old Spanish Mission ruins many times, each trip impresses me with a sense of mystery and beauty. Not long ago I looked at a panoramic picture of the area: the high blue peaks of the Manzano mountains across the clear sky, with a green valley meandering toward the east. In the center of the valley stood the massive Church, like a red jewel set in the landscape. I know that now the little valley and the high ripple of the mountains is encased in snow, with only gray threads of pinon smoke to mark the location of a ranch house. But in my mind, an eternal spring lies upon the hills and creek - with cottonwoods budding, the sheep grazing, a blue jay rasping from a juniper tree.

Punta, or Quarai ruins, as they are called in travel folders, is one of three large and totally different Catholic Church ruins in the Mountairair, New Mexico area. They were all built in the early 1600's by Indian workmen under the direct supervision of Spanish Priests and soldiers. They were located in the pueblos of the Saline group of Indians, so-called because of large Salt Lakes to the east. Each of the Churches and pueblos were

abandoned around 1680, and all lie in remote places of pastoral beauty. Gran Quivera State Park is 26 miles south of Mountainair, Abo is to the west, and Punta (Quarai) is six miles north, on the edge of a Spanish Grant which was settled after the reconquering of New Mexico in 1698. This is called the Manzano Grant, and encompasses several picturesque towns along the edge of the mountains.

The settlement of Punta, about a mile down the creek from the old Church ruins, contains another Church constructed in the early 1700's. This is used as the present place of worship. I have been told that the ruins of the splendid older mission were never restored or used by colonists because they were considered to be "haunted" by spirits of people who had died there. The local Spanish people lived near these ruins for more than 200 years without disturbing them. Until the Anglo first came to the area around 1880, few people of the outside world had seen the crumbling cathedral of red sandstone. Charles F. Lummis, Editor-photographer and founder of the School of American Research, visited them in 1884. "On the Rhine it would be a superlative; in the wilderness of the Manzanos it is a miracle," he wrote. The Editor didn't exaggerate. The stark, roofless walls are four to six feet thick, and they rise 40 feet

high - dominated by even higher and thicker towers. The sanctuary is 100 ft. long by 50 ft. wide at the cross-beam of the cruciform design. The massive shell dwarfs humans who stand on the flagstone floor and gaze at the towers. The lofty walls of mud-mortared sandstone slabs, hand cut and irregular in size, have withstood time and the elements for more than 350 years.

There are altars, steps, seventeen excavated rooms, hallways, kitchens, and remains of the Indian Pueblo beyond the main part of the Church. All of this establishment sits on a low rise above the Creek, giving it an even more dramatic appearance.

There are several different versions of what happened to the Spanish and Indians who lived in the three Missions east of the Manzanos. Historians believe they were abandoned about 1660 because of attacks by the Apache. The Spanish inhabitants of the Manzano Grant used to tell stories - passed down for generations of how the Missions were destroyed by rebellion inside the settlements during the general Indian uprising of 1680. Either way, the Spanish Churchmen were killed there or left, and the Indians migrated to other quarters.

Local people believe that the Spanish Padres operated a silver mine in a certain canyon in the Manzano mountains, and have found some evidence to substantiate this. I used to walk the five miles from an Uncle's ranch across to Punta ruins, long before they became a State Monument and tourist attraction. There, with several cousins, I would spend an afternoon

browsing around the walls and picking up Indian pottery. That is the best way I know to become steeped in the atmosphere of an area. And something which has been a part of your life can never leave you, no matter how many icy spells come.
