City Council Votes To Purchase Used Truck

Cisco City council members voted at Tuesday night's regular meeting to purchase a used 1974 sanitation truck for \$8,000. The additional truck will allow repairs to be made on the present truck. The motion to purchase the truck was made by council member Louise Allison voted no, stating she hates to see the city invest \$8,000 into any kind of used vehicle. All other members present voted to purchase the truck. Council member Dick Ward was absent from the meeting. A discussion was held concerning the summer Youth Conservation Corp program, in which City Manager John Boland reviewed the 1978 program's accomplishments. He also gave a list of proposed work for 1979 if Cisco receives the funds this year. He went on to say that although the city does not know whether or not it will receive any funds, it must go ahead and start recruiting for the program.

City Manager Boland reviewed the financial report for council members and presented the monthly bills for their approval. Three members of the Cisco Country Club Ronie Ledbetter, Charlie Graham and J. L. Stafford, were present to discuss with the council about a reasonable water rate for the Country Club. Council member Witzsche suggested that John Boland try and get some figures which show how much it costs the city to supply water to the Country Club. Council members seemed in agreement to wait for such figures before setting a rate. A discussion was held concerning the Battle Creek pump stations. Boland said one pump is working but he estimates that approximately \$2,000 to \$3,000 worth of work remains before the station could be in good repair.

March 7 Last Day To File As City Candidate

Only One Person Has Filed For April 7 Election

With less than a week left for candidates to file for the Cisco city election, only one person has done so. Lonnie Grady of Cisco has filed for the City Council member place III. As of Tuesday afternoon, no other persons had filed for either of the two

places, III or IV, which both are for three year terms.

Deadline for candidates to file applications for the election is next Wednesday, March 7th at City Hall.

The election will be held April 7th at the Corral Room

with Doug Fry serving as election judge.

March 8th is the last day of registration by voters not registered in the County. March 19th is the first day for absentee voting by personal appearance and April 3rd the last day.

Election Of Directors For Hospital District Set April 7

Election of directors for Cisco Hospital District will be on Saturday, April 7, 1979, along with other elections set for that date.

Mr. Doug Fry has been named election judge. Mr. Fry will name his alternate and arrange for clerks to assist him. Virginia Johnson, Charlene Thackerson and Andrea Coleman have been named as absentee voting clerks. March 19 is the first day for absentee voting by personal appearance at Cisco City Hall and April 3 is the

last day.

The Cisco Hospital District consists of County Commissioners' Precinct 4 and voting Precinct 8. It is a five member board with two (2) directors to be elected this year for a two (2) year term. Incumbents are Olin O. Odom, III and Jay Richardson. Hold over directors are Lloyd McGrew, Emma Lee Donovan, and Ayres R. Cermin, M.D.

Legislation creating and establishing the hospital district states that any person desiring his name to

be printed on the ballot as a candidate for director shall file a petition, signed by not less than twenty-five (25) qualified voters asking that such name be printed on the ballot, with the secretary of the board of directors of the district. The petition may be filed with Jay Richardson, Secretary, or with Garner Altom, Administrator, at the administrative offices at the hospital.

Deadline for filing the petition is 5:00 p.m., Wednesday, March 7, 1979. Those persons whose names are to be placed on the ballot will meet in the conference room at the hospital at 10:00 a.m., Monday, March 12, 1979, for the drawing of names for order on the ballot. To vote April 7, persons must be registered in the county by March 7.

C.I.S.D Residential Homestead Exemptions Available Until April 1

Residential homestead exemptions will be available at the Cisco Independent School District tax office until

April 1, 1979. This deadline corresponds with the deadline for property owners to render their property for 1979.

The homestead exemption can save a homeowner up to \$45.00 in school taxes depending upon his property value. This exemption must be applied for in person at the school tax office. There is no age limit, any homeowner on January 1, 1979 in the Cisco Independent School District is eligible. This includes mobile home owners who are in the district.

Beauty Is Big Business

Beauty is big business today, and the scene at Cisco Junior College Cosmetology School is a graphic illustration of that statement. Step into this classroom located in the Technical-Vocational Building on the CJC campus any day of the work week and you will see students busy at seventeen working stations learning the actual processes that will equip them with a marketable skill. And that marketable skill is becoming a professional hair stylist, helping the individual project his best physical image in this image-conscious age.

Perhaps you will not detect too much of a classroom atmosphere on your first visit to the Cosmetology School. You as a patron have come to "have your hair done," and the pace seems undemanding. "That is as it should be," says Mrs. Alta Dixon, now serving in her fifth year as director of the school. "When a patron comes for beauty care, he or she should be able to relax and enjoy the process of receiving attention."

But come a little early some

Friday morning, and you are apt to see a line of serious-minded students walking out of an adjoining room where classes on theory taught by Mrs. Dixon are held for an hour each morning before actual work begins. This particular Friday morning students arrived at their work stations a little later than usual because they had just taken a "tough" test on cold wave processing. "Do you study?" I asked several students. "Oh, you bet we do. We have to. We want to be prepared when we go to take that State Board."

And State Board is never far away from the students' consideration as they go through their 1500 hours of careful preparation. Each day is divided into one hour of textbook study and five hours of actual work in the shop. The one-hour study period deals with each divergent topic as hair structure and chemistry, professional ethics, and employee and customer relationships. The laboratory experient deals with the nineteen phases of beauty work which the students tabulate weekly on a program sheet for careful evaluation by the director. These procedures involve all the regular beauty techniques including hair and scalp treatment, chemical hair relaxing, hairstyling, and wig and hairpiece care.

As the students carry out these nineteen phases of beauty work, they are closely supervised by their director and two student instructors, Mrs. Peggy Harrell of Ranger and Davy Wheeler of Eastland. Peggy and Davy, both licensed operators, are currently studying to become licensed instructors. This means they are preparing for a stiff, two-day examination

in Austin at the conclusion of their study. Peggy and Davy, along with the director, are always close at hand to advise the students, demonstrate techniques, check progress, and give final approval before a patron is released.

"Patrons from the community are a service to our school," says Mrs. Dixon, "and feel we in turn render a service to them." Charges for services are nominal, set to cover the cost of material involved. Although it is not workable to make appointments in advance of the day on which they are done, Mrs. Dixon says the school rarely is forced to turn down a patron's request for an appointment. "Patrons receive the service of beauty care and give an opportunity to the students to work with the different textures of hair during their training period," Mrs. Dixon explained.

As a special gesture to the community, the CJC Cosmetology School regularly furnishes complimentary beauty care to those mobile patients of Cisco Nursing Center who wish such care and also to the students of the Rehabilitation Center in Eastland.

Persons wishing to become licensed operators are fortunate to have such a facility as CJC Cosmetology School available in the area. Students come from the immediate area in and around Cisco and also from a wider radius, including towns like Haskell and Throckmorton. Tuition is a modest \$150.00 for the one-year course, with textbooks and the student's kit of tools making the total cost only \$210.00. Students are expected to furnish their own uniforms.

Students are screened through recommendations and general admission rules, the student personnel is varied; however, they do share the common determination to learn a skill which will give them a regarding income. Age level varies from the age of high school graduates to mature persons, usually women who have raised a family and are ready for the challenge of a new career.

Student Lydia Jackson of Clyde is an example. With her husband Bill and two teen-age sons supporting her in this venture, Lydia is ready to reach beyond the challenge of household tasks to a new career as hairdresser. Another student is soft-spoken Mrs. Tim Warren, mother of five, a native of Thailand and now a resident of Breckenridge. Tim is just days away from taking her State Board in Austin. She has battled the language barrier with fortitude and has already secured the promise of employment upon receipt of her license.



What is the relationship of student to director and director to student? Mrs. Margaret Dumith of Ranger says, "Mrs. Dixon is an excellent instructor. She explains things to us in language we can understand, and we know what we are supposed to do." Mrs. Dixon says of her five years experience as director, "When I first started instructing, I was extremely strict and inflexible. Since that time I have allowed myself the pleasure of getting to really know my students. It is regarding to get to know them as people. We are one big family, and I think they know I care about them."

This care is evidenced when students take their State Board examination given by the Cosmetology Commission Office in Austin. Contrary to the practice of some directors, Mrs. Dixon accompanies her students to Austin. "The examination is hard," she says, "much harder than when I took it twelve years ago. Beauty care procedures have become more complicated. With hair coloring so common today it is necessary to

know much more about chemical reactions."

Taking the State Board involves teacher accountability at its very practical level. Students take a written test and also demonstrate before examiners on live models what they have learned in such skills as permanent waving and hairstyling. Mrs. Dixon says in her five years as director of the school she has never had a student fail

to secure a license at the first attempt. "I would like to compliment CJC for allowing me to accompany my students," she said. "They have expressed appreciation for the moral support of having someone with them to back them up."

Cisco is fortunate to have a Cosmetology School on the CJC campus and fortunate also to have such a capable director.

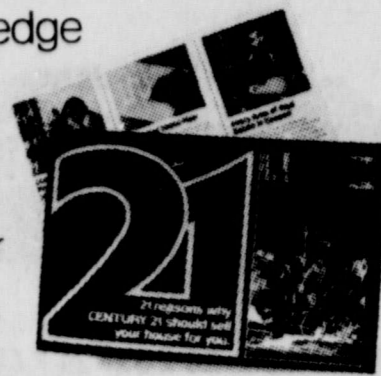

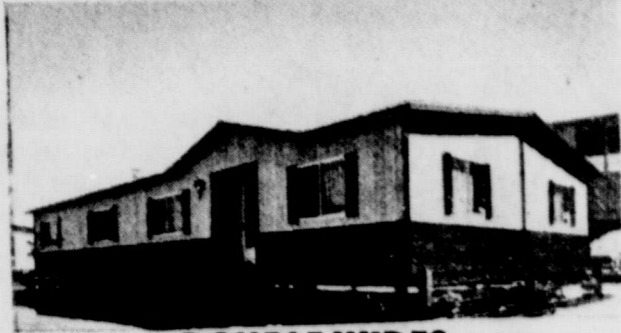

Keeping Well

Anxiety
Anxiety is an emotional state that is normal in all individuals under certain conditions of stress but may become abnormal creating a true emotional illness. Anxiety is an uneasy feeling of apprehension, tension, or panic which all of us experience at times. Anxiety usually goes away quickly if the situation causing the anxiety does not develop or can be easily solved. The problems develop when this state of anxiety cannot be relieved or becomes chronic. When a person has a constant feeling of apprehension or worry, he can develop many other symptoms. Of course, such a person cannot be happy so he does not enjoy his daily activities. Some of the symptoms of anxiety are fatigue, sweating, palpitation of the heart, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, urinary frequency, headache, etc. Many organic illnesses are made worse and sometimes actually brought on by anxiety. Such illnesses are bronchial asthma, peptic ulcers, chronic colitis, and even coronary artery disease. Some people are just

worriers and are unduly anxious over almost everything. This results in an anxiety state with some or all of the above problems. These patients need to learn to live in such a way that everything is not a crisis. They need to learn to change the things that they can change and accept the situations they cannot change rather than to be in a constant state of apprehension and tension. Some patients just cannot seem to change their anxious personalities. The only treatment for them is to show them how tension can cause the many symptoms they have. Usually these people become even more anxious because they worry over the terrible diseases that they must have to cause their symptoms. This leads to more worry and anxiety. If patients can accept the fact that their anxiety is causing the symptoms, they will at least eliminate a few causes of further anxiety. Anyone who suffers from anxiety in more than the ordinary emergency situations of life, or who has physical symptoms that he cannot explain, should con-

sult his physician who will do the examinations necessary to rule out organic disease and administer the treatment necessary to help the individual overcome his anxiety.
