Wednesday Is Last Day To File For City Council

Only One Person Has Filed For April 7 Election

Anyone planning to file as a candidate for the Cisco City Council must do so before 5 p.m., Wednesday afternoon. By Friday afternoon, Lonnie Grady was still the only person who has

filed for either of the two places on the City Council. Mr. Grady has filed for Council member place III, one of the three year terms which will be expiring this year. The other position,

council member place IV, has not been filed for by anyone. These positions are presently occupied by Dick Ward and LeRoy Witzsche.

The deadline for possible candidates to file applications for the election is next Wednesday, March 7th at City Hall.

The election will be held April 7th at the Corral Room with Doug Fry serving as election judge.

March 8th is the last day of registration by voters not registered in the County. March 19th is the first day for absentee voting by personal appearance on April 3rd is the last day.

Ginger Johnson will serve as absentee voting clerk with Andrea Coleman and Charlene Thackerson serving as her deputies.

Plans Announced For 50-Unit Motel And Restaurant Here

Construction work will begin within a week on a new 50-unit motel and restaurant at the intersection of Beech

Street and IH-20, according to an announcement by Mr. and Mrs. B.W. (Bill) Hester. Name of the new motel, which will be built just east

of Red Gap Western Store on the IH-20 access road, will be the Colony Inn and Restaurant.

The Hesters, who moved to Cisco last May and took over operation of Jammie's Motel and restaurant, have purchased a six-acre site with an IH-20 frontage of some 425 feet. The motel will be of masonry construction and modern in all respects. The Hesters hope to have the motel in operation by Sept. 1 or before.

Mr. Hester, who is a native of Cross Plains, will supervise the construction work. He will let a number of sub-contracts for various phases of the project. The new motel will be on City of Cisco water and sewer lines.

In addition to the motel and restaurant, there will be a two bedroom apartment for the owners. Plans call for a swimmingpool to be added later. A laundry also will be included in the project.

The restaurant will include a dining room that will seat 100 persons, the Hesters said. It will be built just west

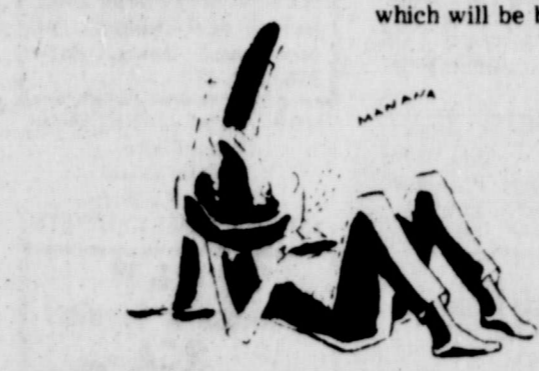
of the motel with a large paved parking area that will accommodate trucks and travel trailers as well as other vehicles.

Architect Cecil Dudley of Dallas prepared plans of specifications for the project, and the blueprints were delivered to the Hesters last Thursday.

The Hesters expect to continue operating Jammie's Motel and Restaurant under lease until their new projects finished, they said. The lived at Palestine for 20 years before moving here last year. They are the parents of six grown children who live in Palestine. The Hesters operated a grocery and feed store and had other business interests, including a 500-acre dairy farm, at Palestine.

Mrs. Hester, who is a native of Arkansas, said that "We have been so pleased with Cisco and our business here that we have decided to build a large motel - one that we fell the community needs."

The Hesters are Baptists.

Residential homestead exemptions will be available at the Cisco Independent School District tax office until April 1, 1979. This deadline corresponds with the deadline for property owners to render their property for 1979.

The homestead exemption can save a homeowner up to \$45.00 in school taxes depending upon his property value. This exemption must

be applied for in person at the school tax office. There is no age limit, any homeowner on January 1, 1979 in the Cisco Independent School District is eligible. This includes mobile home owners who are in the district.

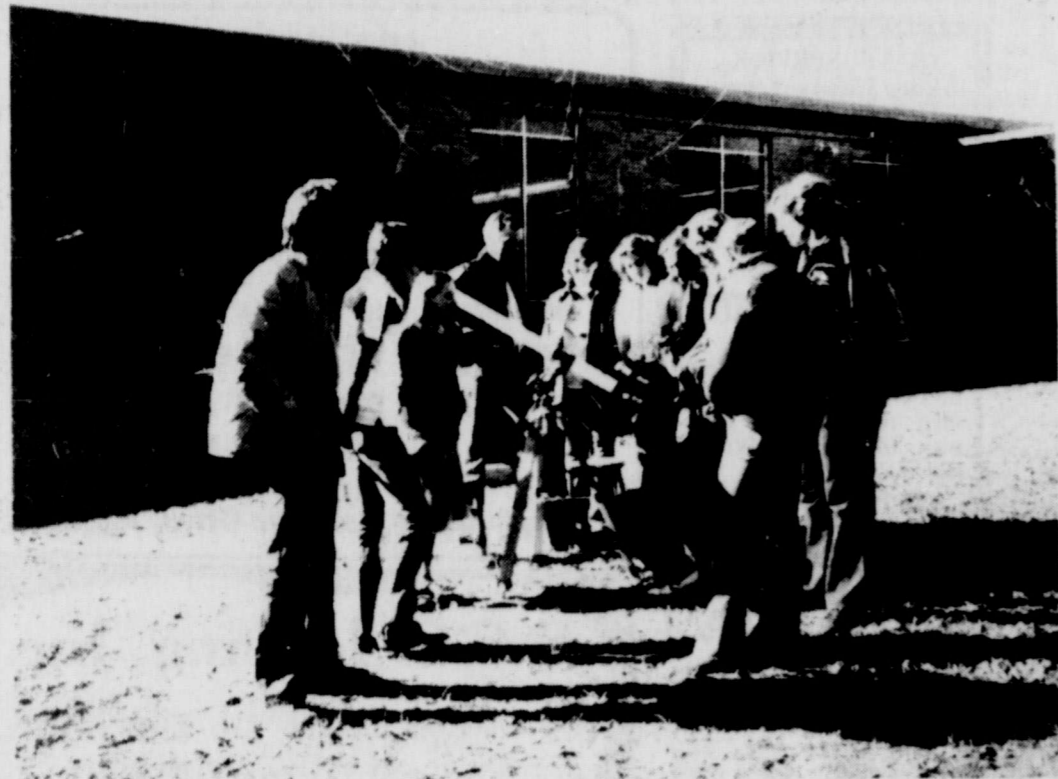

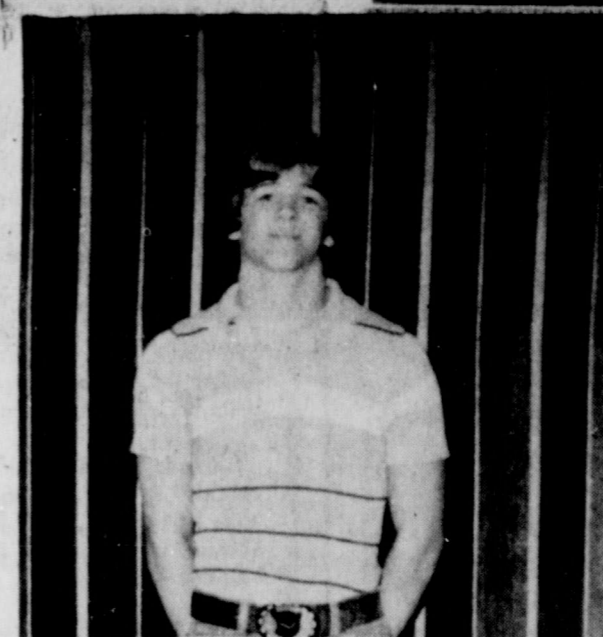

Hints For The Aged & Handicapped

By PATRICIA GALBREATH

DEAR PAT--Age creeps up on us slowly and for many this means limiting their activities. A person does not have to be "handicapped" to benefit from your column. I am not handicapped but for the past 26 years have been a nurse. I have nursed so many elderly persons who have hurt themselves by doing what they always do; walking up and down steps; walking on uneven

ground; standing on a box or chair to reach something and falls getting in or out of the bathtub.

There are by far more serious falls that occur in the bathroom and that is why I would like for you to discuss safety in the bathroom for the elderly and ways to enter and exit the tub.

DEAR MRS. S.--Grab bars should be properly placed

depending on one's disability, strength, and whether one is entering the tub or shower from a standing or sitting position.

Even though a person is not disabled, strength and balance does lessen with age so proper precaution should be taken.

Whether entering the tub from a sitting or standing position, grab bars should be placed on the wall between the elbow and shoulder level.

If one's hips and knees bend easily but lack the ability to step up and over the sides of the tub safely, sit in a secretary's swivel chair and lift first one leg and then the other into the tub. Scoot yourself off the chair and onto the side of the bathtub. Hold onto a grab bar that has been placed on the inside wall of the bathtub and lower yourself into the tub.

The use of two ordinary kitchen chairs may also help one to enter the tub easily and safely. One chair is placed beside the bathtub and the other is placed inside it. Sit on the outside chair, lift one leg at a time into the tub, and shift over to the other chair that is inside the

tub. By holding on to the grab bar that is on the inside wall of the tub and the other hand placed on the edge of the bathtub, lower yourself into the tub.

A sliding board can be used for even greater ease if one needs it. (This is a board approximately 20 inches long placed on top of the two chairs. These can be purchased commercially, or they can be homemade and covered by a variety of materials.)

For added safety, the water should be drained from the tub and the individual should dry himself before beginning his exit from the tub. After drying, place the towel on the chair inside the tub and then rise to a sitting position and transfer to the outside chair.

If you are using just the outside chair, place the towel on the side of the bathtub, lift yourself to the side of the tub and then onto the outside chair.

There are many aides and devices available commercially to aid the non-handicapped elderly along with many products for the handicapped. If one is concerned about bathroom safety, he can write for a list of manufacturer's names who specialize in these products. These brochures on bathroom safety products are free.

GORDON SPOT

Over 300 people have attended home gardening meetings conducted by the Extension Service during the past three weeks. People are really getting the gardening fever with the beautiful weather the last few days.

We have talked a lot about tomatoes, probably the most popular home grown vegetable. It is too early to put out tomato transplants, but in three or four weeks you may want to start selecting your transplants.

Bigger is not the same as better when selecting tomato transplants for your spring garden. Research conducted by universities and institutions has confirmed what growers have suspected all along, and that is the age and size of the tomato seedling or transplant when set in the garden can make a big difference in yield.

Research has shown that you generally get the best results from tomatoes when you set out 6 to 8 inch tall plants that have 5 to 7 true leaves. The plants should be about as tall as they are wide, dark green in color vigorously growing and free of spots or lesions on the leaves indicating the possibility of disease problems. As a rule, tomato plants of this size have not yet begun to flower. Believe it or not plants of this description will usually give you a greater total weight of tomatoes when you would realize from planting larger and older plants.

Most transplants purchased at garden centers or local stores are available growing in some type of plantable container usually composed of peat. If the tomato plants are large, chances are that the roots have outgrown the small container and their growth has been affected. This early "stunting" will usually show at harvest time.

What can you expect if you set out larger plants in your garden, that might even be blooming or might even have set a few small green tomatoes? Chances are the first mature fruit, although early, will often be small and misshapen. These first early fruit may cost you dearly as total yield can be seriously reduced.

To obtain early production it is highly preferable to select smaller plants of an early maturing variety such as Spring Giant or Big Set rather than using large, older plants of later maturing variety.

You may have difficulty in finding the ideal tomato transplant. But this year take time and look around and find good plants of the right varieties. Remember it is always great to have the first ripe tomato in the neighborhood, but those first few red fruit could be the bulk of your harvest.

A number of high quality tomato varieties are available which have resistance to a number of the important diseases. Two of the more important are fusarium wilt and root knot nematodes.

Fusarium wilt is a fungal disease which causes wilting followed by rapid death of plants as they reach the fruiting stage. Chemical control has not been effective. Resistant varieties must be used if this disease is to be eliminated.

Root knot nematodes are another serious problem in many Eastland County gardens. Although fumigation is used, the use of fumigation plus resistant varieties will result in the best production.

Three important letters to follow certain tomato variety names. They are VFN. This means they are resistant to the following diseases: Verticillium wilt, fusarium wilt, and root knot nematodes. If only VF is used, then the varieties are resistant to only fusarium wilt and verticillium wilt.

Applying a herbicide to Coastal bermuda grass pastures will prevent weed problems later this spring. In April and May, warm season weeds and grasses will begin showing up in Coastal bermuda grass pastures. If a herbicide isn't applied in time, weedy hay and grass loss due to weed competition will result.

We recommend applying simazine (Princep 80W or 4L) prior to March 10 to get ahead of early germinating weeds. Of course, rainfall is necessary to carry the herbicide into the soil where weed seeds germinate.

Weed problems are virtually a certainty this year if weeds are a problem in a particular pasture last year. An investment of \$5-\$10 per acre in a herbicide will prevent most weed problems and will result in higher yields of grasses and better quality hay.

Farm or ranch operators who have not been counted yet in the 1978 Census of Agriculture still have an opportunity to be included, according to the Bureau of

Help For The Bills

Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. has received a small Emergency Energy Assistance Grant to help low income elderly people (60 years & older) who do not have sufficient funds to pay their utility bills and other bills last Winter (Jan. 1, 1978 through June 30, 1978) without causing undue hardship. These funds are carryovers from last year (1977-78).

In order to be eligible for assistance, the applicant must meet the following guidelines for this program:

1. Must Not have received assistance last year by the Emergency Energy Assistance Program.
2. Must be 60 years of age or over, and must be living on a limited income.
3. Must furnish proof of income, and provide utility bills (paid or unpaid) for either last year (Jan. 1 to May 31) or current utility bills.

Fuel or utility bills are eligible for payment under this program. Also, funds may be used to buy blankets and warm clothing, temporary repairs on heaters, temporary shelter, nutrition, health, and emergency house repairs.

These are Federal guidelines and must be followed. Application for this program will be taken at the Family Planning Clinic at 701 W. Main in Eastland on March 5, from 9:30 a.m. until 2 p.m.

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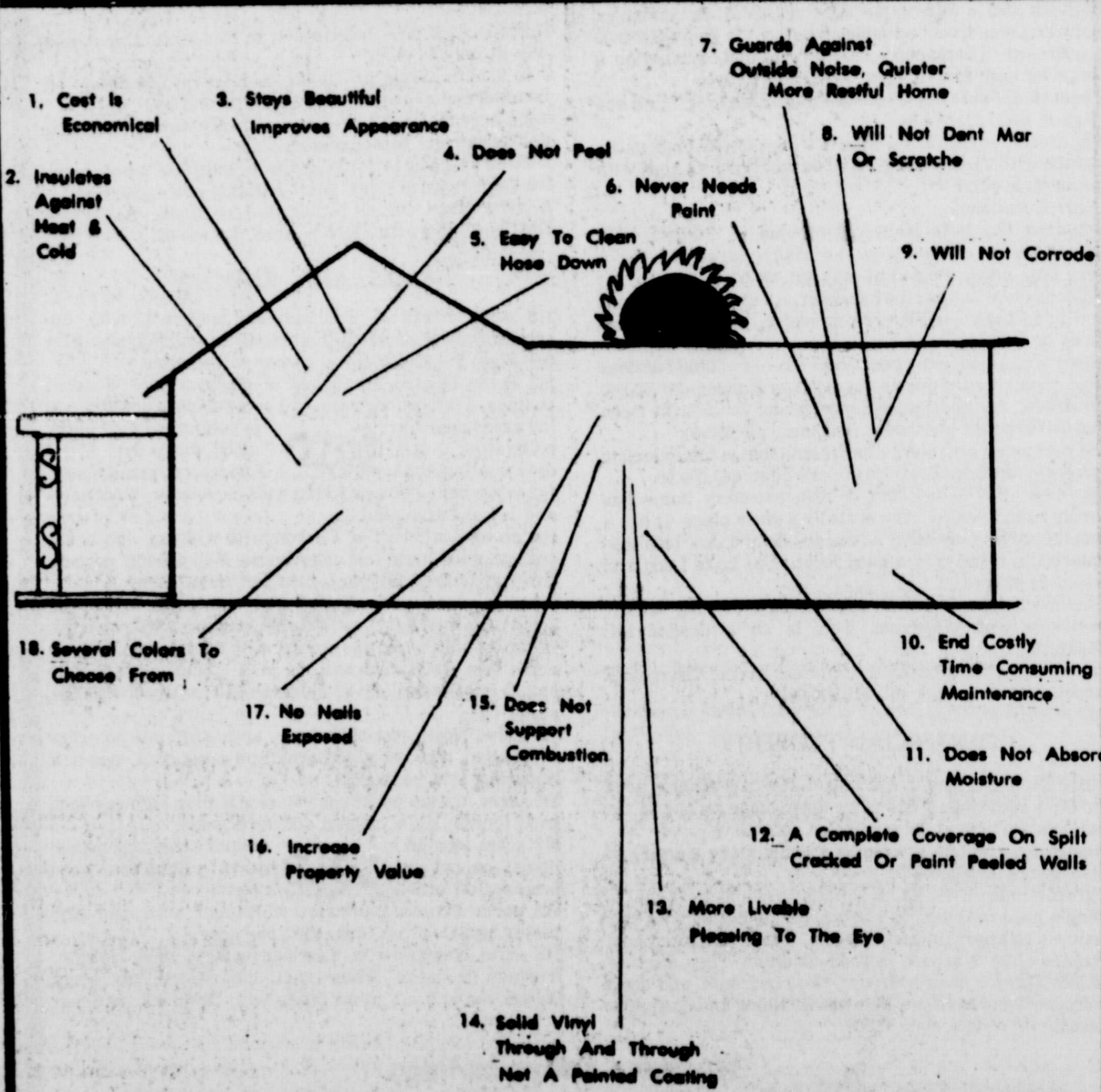
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'Preacher' Smith Travels Carbon In His 'Preaching Pickup'

The Pastor's Study in the First Baptist Church in Carbon is a quiet place—just right for reading the Bible and preparing sermons. And Pastor Delbert R. Smith gives some good ones, like the one about the three types of people on earth: The Uncontrolled, The Self-Controlled, and Those Controlled By Christ. Sometimes local people call him "Preacher" Smith, and sometimes they call him "Brother", a and either name fits. But Pastor Smith, dark-eyed and tanned, is equally at home bouncing along in his blue pickup on a peanuts farm or cow pasture. "My Preaching Pickup", he calls his favorite vehicle. "I don't know exactly how far my territory goes," he says. "Maybe ten square miles around the town here. And about 300 people live in Carbon now. Some people are moving away from the cities and coming here, looking for a different way of life."
His ministry actually reaches much farther, for he regularly visits people in hospitals and Nursing Homes in Ranger, Eastland, Gorman, Cisco, and De Leon and sometimes Abilene. This is only a fraction of his Church activities, which consist of Sunday School, a weekly sermon, Training Union on Sunday Night, and an active Youth Program. Once each month the men of the Church have a Prayer Breakfast,

with Charles Morgan as cook. Every fourth Sunday the Church presents an afternoon program in a Nursing Home in Gorman. Add to that a lot of visiting in private homes, counseling, revival services each year, weddings, funeral, and special activities which involve the Church and you have an interesting life. Pastor Smith mentions the great cooperation he gets from the Church members, including the help of Fred Tucker, Chairman of Deacons, and Nelson Dotson, who directs Youth Activities. No pioneer circuit-riding preacher could have visualized the way Pastor Smith keeps in touch with Home Base while out visiting. He has an Inter-Com system, connected between the Church Study and the trailer house on the Church grounds, where he and his wife, Patricia, live. Then he has a CB in the pickup, one in the family car, and one in the trailer house, so his wife can call him when he is needed.
"I could not possibly carry on the work here in this way without the help of my wife," he remarks. "She is my secretary, Assistant Pastor, everything. She is a student of history, and helps me with historical background on sermons. She can answer the phone and set up schedules for me when I am not home."
The Baptist Church is a pleasant place for members and visitors to meet. Although the Church was established in Carbon in 1885, the present building was probably constructed some years afterward. It has seven rooms downstairs and several upstairs. The Smiths came to Carbon in 1973, and the remodeling has been of special interest to them. The Sanctuary, which will seat 300 people, has numerous windows made of antique frosted glass. "They have such an unusual pattern,"

the Pastor says, that I was afraid we wouldn't be able to duplicate some cracked ones. But finally we found a company which can furnish that type of glass." The sanctuary has pale green carpet, contrasted by copper-colored upholstery on the pews. The Pastor salvaged two oak pulpit chairs, and had them upholstered in red velvet. An old stand, handmade from pine, was refinished and placed at the front of the room. "I couldn't see throwing away all that good handwork."
The kitchen, adjoining a fellowship hall at the back of the Church, will feed a hundred people and often does. The Youth activities Building is a frame house west of the Church, meant for a parsonage. "But it's no hardship for us to live in a trailer," the Pastor explains. "We lived in them for years, when I moved around with my work. We have a fine program going for young people, with music, entertainment, good refreshments, and Bible Study. Young people are looking for something they can believe in and depend on. They are curious about what the Bible says, and how it can relate to their lives. When we started this program, about five young people were coming to Church. Now we have twenty to thirty active young people." The total membership of the church, he adds, is 191 persons. Of these, eighty have joined since his ministry began.
Carbon is actually the first church where Delbert Smith has worked as a full-time minister. He always held down a full time secular job before, in addition to his Church duties. It has been a long road, from small towns in Illinois, where he and Patricia Gene were born. Delbert says of his early life: "I grew up in Church." He kept his interest in religion through his years in the Army, at the close of World War II, when he was stationed in Germany. Then he came back to Illinois, where he became a meat cutter in a Market. He married, and eventually began work with an Oil Company which was drilling in Texas and New Mexico. Finally he went back into the Meat business for ten years. During these years he and Patricia brought up two sons—Dennis and William. Dennis, age 29, spent three years with the Green Berets, serving in Viet Nam. He finished a Master's Degree in College, and is now working with the Police Force in Orlando, Florida. William, age 26, served in the Army Medical Corp, and also lives in Orlando. Dennis and his wife, Penny, have a little girl, and William and his wife, Ann, have a boy.

By 1956 Pastor Smith was serving as a Lay Preacher, and he was licensed as a Baptist Minister in 1962. He and his wife worked as Skid Row missionaries in the Wayside Rescue Mission in Odessa. "I learned a lot in that type of work," he says. "Many of the people who drift to a Rescue Mission are gifted people—people who had advantages. I spoke to a number of Doctors and Lawyers who had lost purpose in life. Then there were the young people, some no older than fifteen years, just wandering around."
Smith was Pastor of the King Solomon Baptist Church, in Odessa, for more than five years. He was the Chaplain Captain of a Texas State Guard Unit, as appointed by the Texas Gov. In 1970, in 1971 he and his wife left Odessa and went to Snyder. There he had a full-time job as head of the Meat Market for Furr food, and served as Interim Pastor for the Greenhill Baptist Church. He also supplied six Baptist Churches in the absence of regular Pastors.

Keeping Well

ULCER DISEASE
So called peptic ulcers are those ulcers that occur in the lower esophagus, stomach, or duodenum. The most common site for an ulcer is just beyond the outlet of the stomach in the duodenum. The next most common location for an ulcer is in the stomach itself. The symptoms of peptic ulcers are indigestion, gas, pain in the upper abdomen, nausea, and vomiting. These symptoms

are sometimes relieved by eating. In more severe cases ulcers may bleed causing weakness and anemia, or they may perforate (go through the wall of the stomach or duodenum) causing sudden severe abdominal pain.

The cause of ulcers is unknown, but the common duodenal ulcers are always seen in people who have excess amounts of acid in their stomachs. Excess acid

secretion is caused by emotional tension and psychological conflicts so these things will frequently cause an ulcer or cause a healed ulcer to flare up. Smoking also causes increase acid production and is very bad for ulcers.

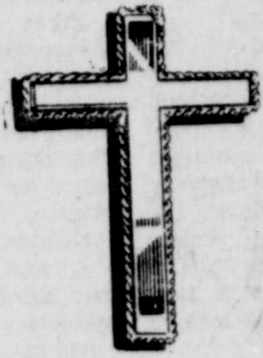
Ulcers in the duodenum are practically never cancers while ulcers in the stomach are frequently malignant. The usual way to diagnose an ulcer and to determine its location is by X-ray examination. The x-ray, however, will not differentiate between a benign ulcer and a malignant ulcer (cancer). Any ulcer in the stomach that does not heal

after three weeks of good medical treatment must be suspected of being a cancer. In recent years an even more accurate way of diagnosing and locating an ulcer is the gastroscope. This is an instrument that is put down the throat into the stomach and duodenum, allows the doctor to see the lining of the esophagus, stomach, and duodenum, find the ulcer, and actually cut out a piece of the ulcer (biopsy) to determine if the ulcer is malignant.

Treatment of ulcers is done with certain medicines to decrease the acid content of the stomach, antacids to neutralize the

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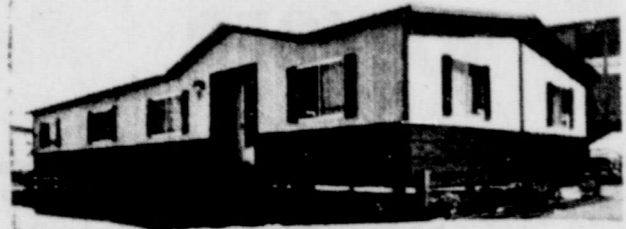

Court Justice Talks To Lions

The mission of the Court of Civil Appeals is to determine from records and arguments whether trial errors were made. Associate Justice Bob Dickinson of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals, Eastland, told the Cisco Lions Club in a talk last Wednesday noon.

Mr. Dickinson, who joined the court by appointment after his election to the office last year, reported that the state's 306 district courts tried some 350,000 cases in 1977. Of this number, 77 percent were civil suits.

Of the civil suits tried, a total of 2,172 verdicts were appealed to the states 14 Courts of Civil Appeals. This amounted to 155 cases for each appeals court. In the 11th district, only 51 cases were filed in the appeals court. To equalize the load of these courts, some 102 cases were transferred to the 11th Court.

Mr. Dickinson noted that the Eastland court ranked No. 2 in cases completed last year. Of the 2,172 cases appealed, the higher courts found grounds for reversal in 27 percent of them, he said. Of the opinions, the Texas Supreme Court changed only six per cent.

Criminal case verdicts are appealed to the Texas Criminal Appeals Court. Mr. Dickinson noted that all juvenile crime cases are classed as civil matters in

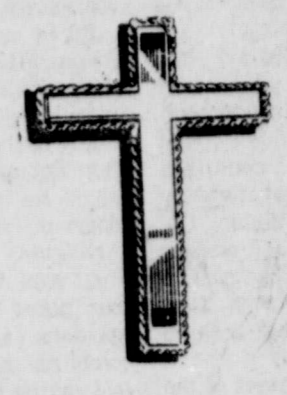

MR. WESLEY VALEK history proof out at Cisco Jr. College, has lived here 15 years or so and his interest in Cisco area history has grown with the years. That he is helping preserve some of the community's early history is a valuable contribution indeed.

Mr. WV's interest in the old Mobley Hotel and the Hilton Foundation's plans for it resulted in him doing some scouting in the hotel's neighborhood. Across the street at 401 Avenue D the J&M Cabinet Shop occupies a historical building.

The old building has passed through a good many ownerships since it was built in the 1918 era. Mr. WV found a painted wall contained signs for a National Highway Garage, Huey Motor Co. (Hudson dealer), Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Co., Lee Auto Supplies, W. D. Lee, Lee Motor Co., and Graham Bros. Trucks.

With the agreement of the J&M folks, Mr. WV's history classes will get some paint and brushes and restore the painted wall. History students are given credit for lab work for helping in historical projects such as this. What is more, they usually get as interested in the project as Prof WV is.

As they carefully cleaned out dirt, they found bones, old buckets, bottles, assorted cans and bits of iron. Before they got through, the rains came and the well now has five feet of water in it. When summer comes, efforts will be made to resume this project.

Mr. WV and his students are interested in the old LeeRay community near Cisco. If you can help them, call him. They're also interested in any landmark building history and pictures. Color slides are being made of pictures, buildings,

projects and the life for showing.

And if you know anything about any of the firms that have occupied the old J&M Cabinet Shop building, give Mr. WV a call.
