Six persons filed for two places on the Cisco City Council this week as the filing deadline was 5 p.m. Wednesday afternoon. Each of the two places council member places III and IV, have three candidates for the three year terms.

Those persons filing for place III are Lonnie Grady, Texas Underwood and Willard Lee Johnson. Those filing for place IV are Ealy Black, Stephen Wheeler and William J. Eudy. These positions are presently occupied by Dick Ward and Le Roy Witzsche and neither field for re-election.

The election will be held April 7th at the Corral Room with Doug Fry serving as election judge.

Thursday of this week was the last day of registration by voters not registered in the County. March 19th one week from Monday, is the first day for absentee voting by personal appearance and April 3rd is the last day.

Ginger Johnson will serve as absentee voting clerk with Andrea Coleman and Charlie Thackerson serving as her deputies.

Three File For Cisco Hospital District Directors

Three persons had filed for election to two places as directors for the Cisco Hospital District when the filing deadline ended on Wednesday of this week.

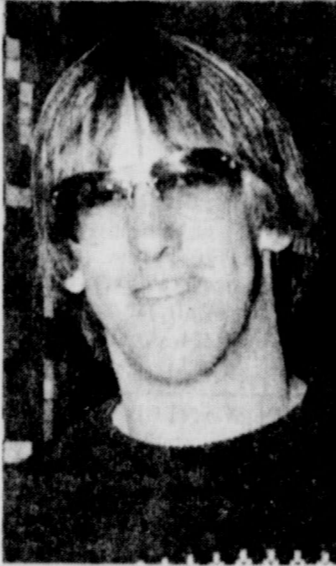

Jerry W. Sitton To Spend Two Months With Panama Paper

Some people retire to a rocking chair—not Jerry W. Sitton, who spent some 25 years as Cisco's "Country editor." Well known in the Cisco area as JWS, author of the Cisco Press column "People and Things," Mr. Sitton will leave Wednesday, March 14, for Panama City, Panama, where he will spend two months working with a newspaper that has been experiencing production problems. He was recruited for this project by the International Executive Service Corps in New York City.

The IESC is an organization financed in part by the U. S. government with grants from a wide assortment of corporations. The agency sends retired business executives from many fields of endeavor to developing

nations to assist in overcoming problems experienced by businesses there.

This will be Mr. Sitton's third assignment with a newspaper requesting help from the IESC. In 1972 he spent two months in Barranquilla, Columbia South America working with a newspaper that had an assortment of production problems. He went to El Salvador in 1977 to work with a newspaper that was upgrading its printing plant by converting to an offset press.

The IESC always sends the executive's wife with him, and Mr. Sitton's wife Dorcas went to both Columbia and El Salvador with her husband. She will delay her trip to Panama a few weeks to keep some previous appointments, then join Mr. Sitton there early in April.

While the Sittons were in Columbia and El Salvador, they enjoyed weekend trips to see as much of the countries as they could. In both instances they attended local English speaking churches and service clubs and enjoyed associating with local people. The ideal of doing things "manana" is restful, says Mr. Sitton, who worked from 9 until 12 every day, took a siesta, then worked from 2 to 4. While her husband worked, Mrs. Sitton swam, shopped, read, sketched local scenes, and in one instance did volunteer work for a local hospital, folding bandages and making pillowcases and sheets.

Their trip to El Salvador got off to an unusual start. En route there, they were taken off their Pan Am flight in Guatemala City, Guatemala, and were told by IESC officials to remain there until a threatening revolution subsided. The newspaper Mr. Sitton was to report to was under seige and had been set on fire. After several days, during which they enjoyed sight seeing in Guatemala as tourists, the situation cleared up, and they went on to his assignment. The first few days in El Salvador, Mr. Sitton was escorted to the newspaper by a guard armed with a machine gun. Although not usually dangerous, such trips are never dull, agree the Sittons.

Looking back Mr. Sitton said he thinks he might have qualified as one of today's politicians; his credentials include coming to Texas in a covered wagon as a six-year-old boy from Oklahoma. He and his father brought the family's belongings to the Texas Panhandle by wagon while other family members went by train.

As a high school boy at Memphis, Mr. Sitton started out as a printer's devil and cub reporter. He learned to run all the presses and type machines and still enjoys doing so. He has kept

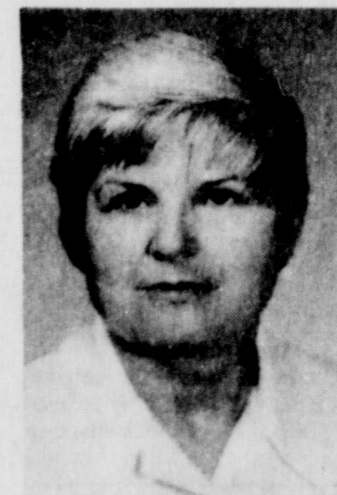

abreast of progress by learning offset printing. The oldest of ten children including a set of triplets, he attended the University of Texas during the Depression.

He worked for Montgomery Ward and waited tables in a women's boarding house while keeping up with studies. Leaving the UoT, he became a reporter for the Kilgore News-Herald and served as the East Texas oil field correspondent for the Associated Press and Shreveport and Fort Worth newspaper. It was in Kilgore that Mr. Sitton met and

married his wife. After World War I broke out, Mr. Sitton joined the Navy and spent five years on active duty as a naval aviator. He accumulated some 5,000 hours as a pilot and still has a pilot's license.

In 1948, he moved his family to Cisco and became editor and publisher of the Cisco Press. Later he bought the Eastland and Ranger newspapers, and sold all of them to Mr. H.V. O'Brien when he retired.

After Mr. Sitton retired, he began publishing small books, mostly on horse training. He calls himself a one-man publishing house, the Longhorn Press, as he contracts with authors, edits their copy, sets the type, prepares it for printing, and then runs the press himself. He binds his books and handles sales of his books, mostly how-to-do-it's, through magazine ads.

The Sittons own and enjoy a travel trailer. Their trips have included jaunts to the four corners of the USA including Alaska, as well as three trailer trips to Mexico and several to Canada.

Always active in community affairs, Mr. Sitton is past president of the Lions Club and the country club, is a past commander of the American Legion Post, and is active in Masonic Lodge bodies.

The Sittons are members of the First Baptist Church. They have two children and six grandchildren.

Being active? "That's typical of country editors," declares Mr. Sitton. It is typical of him, at least, and he has no plans for slowing down in the future.

CARD OF THANKS
This is the real Irish stew! It's a recipe from Ireland and an old family favorite. In the old days of Ireland the original Irish stew was made from kid, not mutton. Sheep were too valuable to put in the family dinner. 3 pounds lean neck of lamb 12 medium potatoes 4 large onions 1 sprig thyme 2 cups water salt and pepper Remove the fat from the meat and cut into 8 to 10 sections through the bone. Do not remove the bone, as this adds flavor. Peel the potatoes and slice one third of them in thin slices. Leave the rest of the potatoes whole. First put the thinly sliced potatoes in the bottom of a baking dish, then a layer of onions, then the lamb. Add seasonings and another layer of sliced onions. Cover with the whole potatoes, season again and add the water. Cover pot with foil and a tight fitting lid. Cook in the oven for two and a half hours at 350 degrees. Carrots are not cooked in the Irish stew but can be served separately. The traditional accompaniment for Irish stew is pickled red cabbage. It gives crunch and adds color.

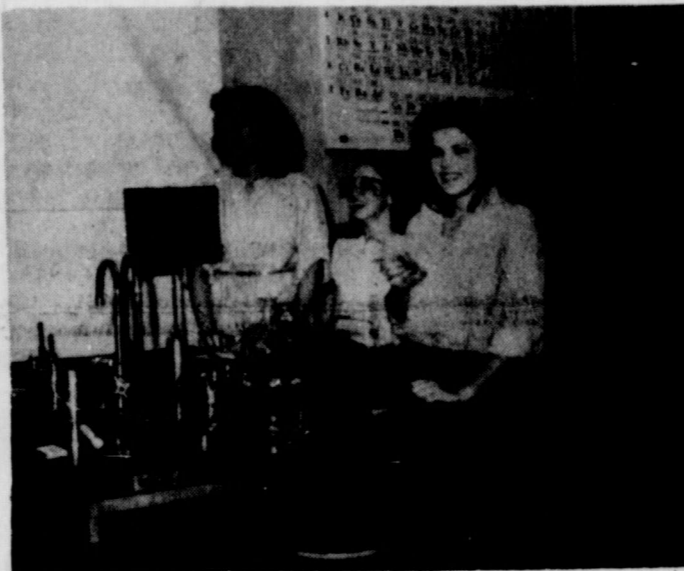

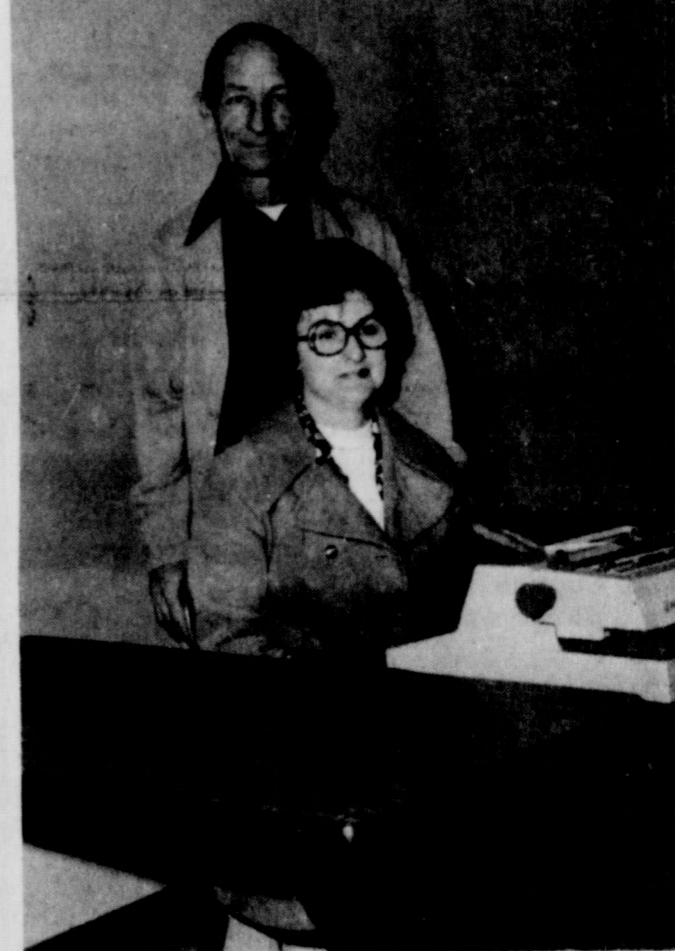

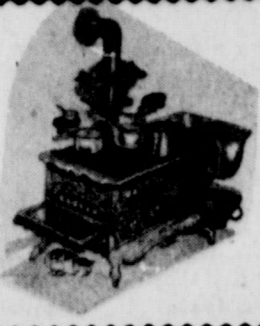

What's Cooking In Eastland County

"Breathes there a wife with soul so dead;
Who to her husband has never said:
"This is my own, real, home-made bread."

Bernice Gorr of Cisco does not fit the above description! She called last week to compare sourdough bread notes. We found that she is an avid recipe collector and enjoys cooking. Being a cook-book and recipe collector, I know what she means when she says that she would not have the same thing twice if she tried them all, which would be impossible to do. Bernice makes the sourdough loaves.

She promised to share her chicken spaghetti recipe with the column.

Bernice Stephen, our neighbor across the street in Eastland, shares her Bran Roll recipe with us in today's column. She has shared these rolls with us many times and for bran lovers, they're hard to beat. She starts as always on a poetic note:

In these days
Of sneezes and colds
Just make yourself
A batch of Bran Rolls.

All-Bran Rolls

1 c. shortening
1 c. boiling water
¾ c. sugar
1 c. All-Bran
6 c. flour
1½ teaspoon salt
2 eggs, beaten
2 yeast cakes in
1 c. warm water

Put in mixing bowl: sugar, bran, salt and shortening. Pour over this, 1 c. boiling water. Let stand until warm. Blend these two mixtures and add flour.

Let stand until double in quantity, the roll out and shape. These may be shaped into three balls and placed in greased muffin tin for parker-house rolls or cut with biscuit cutter and one layer placed on the other.

Let stand about 1½ hours and then bake in hot oven. These may be shaped in pan and kept in deep freeze for a good while.

Here is a recipe for some healthy bran muffins the O'Brien family enjoys for breakfast.

Refrigerator Muffins

5 cups whole wheat flour
1½ cups bran
2 teaspoons baking soda
2 teaspoons salt
2 cups brown sugar
4 eggs, beaten
1 cup oil
1 quart buttermilk
Combine dry ingredients in mixing bowl. Add eggs, oil and buttermilk and mix until blended. May be stored in covered container in refrigerator for as long as 4

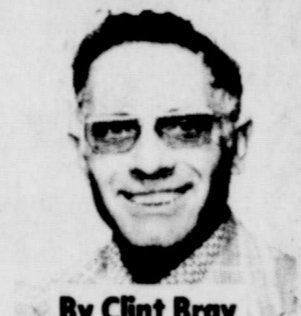

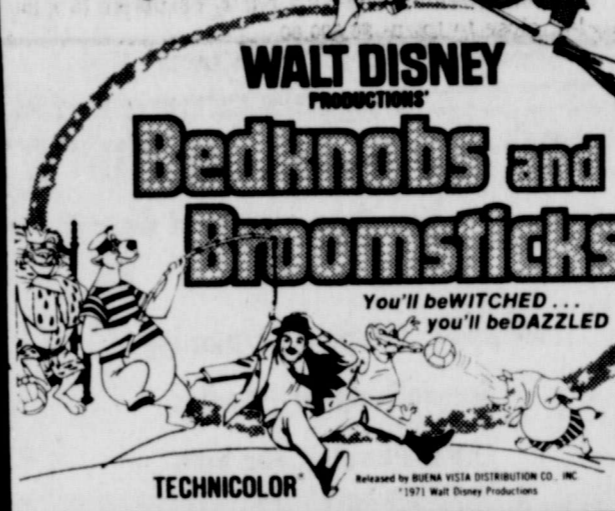

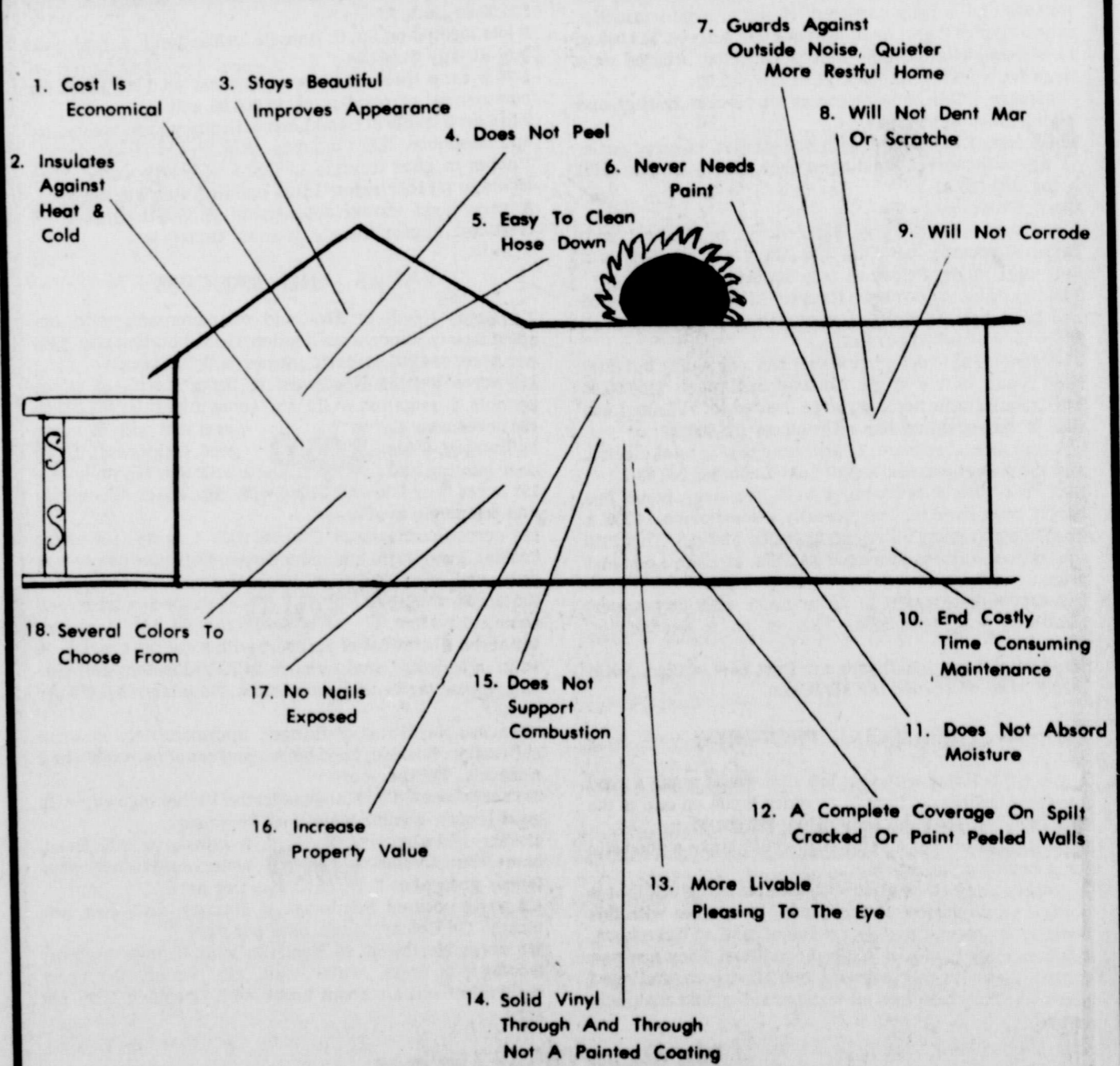

Do you have any information on building an accessible shower stall in my bathroom? I don't have the room for a stall now but if it is possible for me to use a shower

independently, I will remove the bathtub and replace it with a shower.

DEAR MR. H.—There is a new roll-in shower unit for persons in wheelchairs that consists of one piece of molded fiberglass with four and one-half square feet of floor space and a graded lip to insure accessibility and keep the water in.

By January 1st, 1980, Eastland County will have a new jail. Like the child of a shotgun marriage, it is coming-whether wanted or not. It will sit just west of the present jail, on White and Lamar Street, and its initial cost will be \$1,300,000. It will be one of the most expensive buildings in the County, and it will take at least twenty years for the local taxpayers to pay the debt. Its stormy beginnings included a lawsuit against County officials by seven prisoners in the current jail, charging that this building was in violation of Federal Jail Standards.

Federal laws passed in 1956 had actually set up higher standards than the old jail could meet. A 1977 inspection by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards found that the facility, met or exceeded 124 mandatory items, did not meet 190 mandatory items, and did not meet 52 recommended items.

The Ft. Worth Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union assisted the local prisoners in their Court case. In July 1978 Federal Judge Leo Brewster ruled in favor of the plaintiffs, stating that Eastland County must provide a jail which meets Federal Guidelines. A deadline of Jan. 1, 1980, was given for the completion of the building. The new jail will contain 8,416 square feet of floor space, and be designed for 25 inmates. The present jail will hold 29, but the conditions of confinement in the new structure will be quite different.

This situation has caused Eastland County people to ask a lot of questions. Will a new jail deter crime? What rights do jail prisoners have? Isn't the old jail good enough

for people who break the law? Where did prisoners get the idea they could sue County Officials? By what Constitutional rights does a Federal Judge step in and tell a County how to run its jail facilities? And-how humane can Eastland County afford to be when this type of humanity cost \$1,300,000?

I knew that my visit to the jail wouldn't answer all these questions, but I hoped it would provide information as to why the present building is considered obsolete. Sheriff R. B. White and Jail Administrator Burl Walker and their Deputies-who cope with the old jail and law enforcement on a daily basis-obviously have more knowledge of the situation than most people. But all of us are affected by crime and the handling of jail inmates. For crime has risen at an alarming rate in Eastland County over the past few years, bringing the local rate up to the National average. In 1977 there were 480 males and 44 females booked in the jail. In 1978 there were 748 males and 54 females. In 1978 these arrests consisted of 112 felons, 285 D.W.L.'s, and 405 other charges. Obviously the men of Eastland County are more violent than the women!

One recent morning I stepped to the front of the jail, and noted the careful construction of the light-brown brick and sandstone walls. This building, constructed in 1897, was remodeled in 1934. It seems caught in some kind of a time warp, for it has outlasted most Eastland County buildings, and will probably outlast many more.

Sheriff R. B. White had an emergency call and could not show me through, but Jail Administrator Walker and his Deputy, Lin Rice, took time to assist. Three other men are hired to assist with

the work of the jail, and two trustees are being used at the present time. Burl Walker, who gives the impression of the fairness and strength lives in a trailer house beside the building.

He had been up the night before to take a sick inmate to the Doctor. This job was made more difficult, he explained, by the narrow door to the main cell block-a door so small for a stretcher to enter.

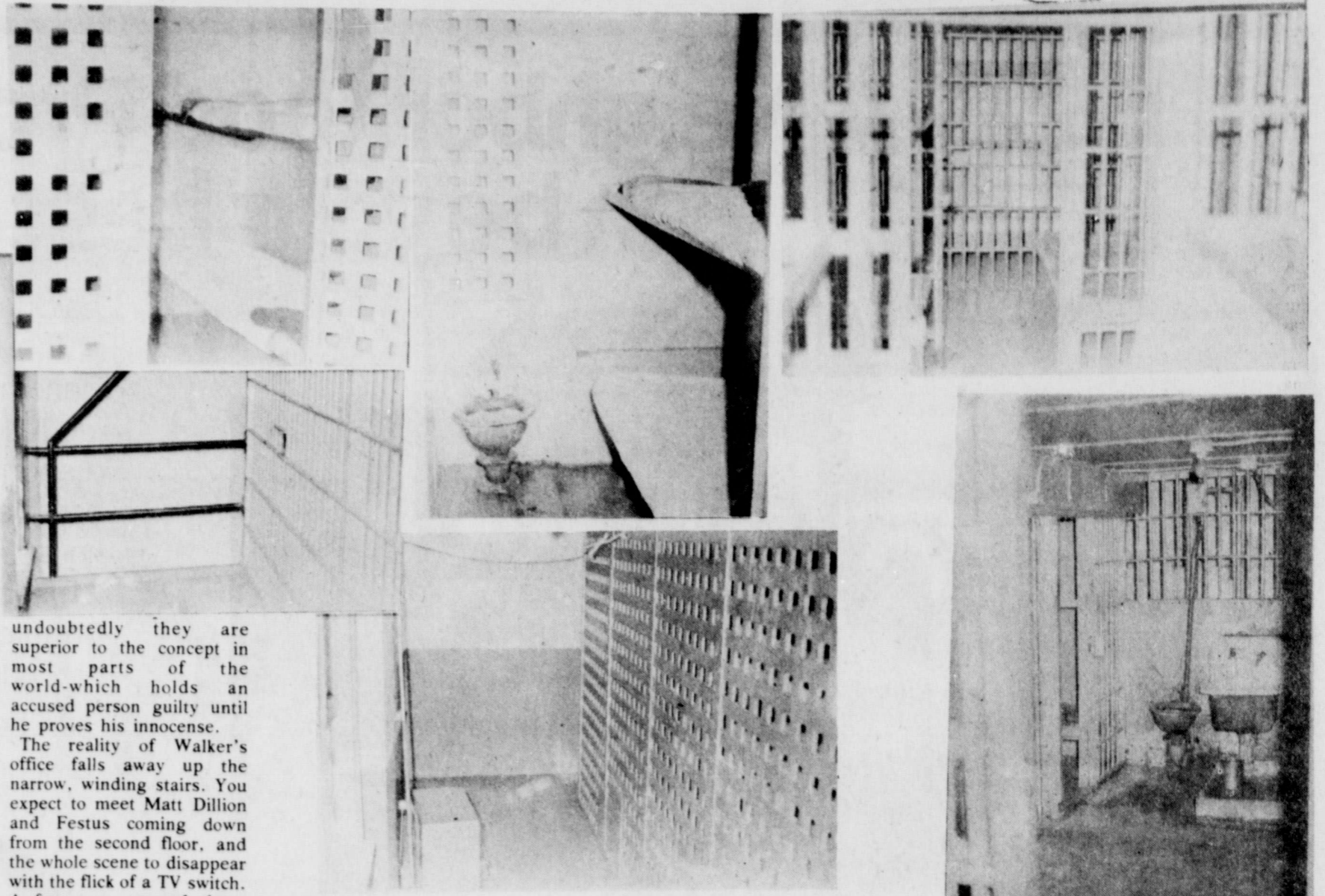
Jailer Walker mentioned that he cooked meals for the inmates, and feels that the Eastland County Jail has better food than 95 percent of the jails in Texas. With wholesale buying and careful management, he has kept the cost at a reasonable level.

Sun streamed through the windows of his office, outlining the scuffed boots and huddle of belongings left by prisoners. "All our inmates, men and women, wear white coveralls," Walker explained. "I lock up all their valuables. The work load is getting heavier here all the time. About eleven forms to fill out for everyone the Sheriff brings in. It's lucky we don't get many women-we only have two cells in which to keep them. We have no place here to keep juveniles-have to take them on to Brownwood. The new jail will have a special place for juveniles.

"The men can't be segregated here as to age or crime.

The first offender, or a young person, or someone who can't pay a speeding ticket, has to be put in with someone accused of a felony."

He was careful to use the word "accused" rather than "guilty". The public doesn't realize, he explained that most people held in the jail are legally innocent until proven guilty. That's the way American laws operate, and



undoubtedly they are superior to the concept in most parts of the world-which holds an accused person guilty until he proves his innocence.

The reality of Walker's office falls away up the narrow, winding stairs. You expect to meet Matt Dillion and Festus coming down from the second floor, and the whole scene to disappear with the flick of a TV switch. A few runs up and down these stairs would be a powerful argument for a jail spread out on one floor, as the new jail will be.

The scene hardens into steel and concrete painted over with gray. Two cubicles emerge on the landing, and they resemble zoo cages, complete with barred doors and locks.

"These are holding tanks for drug prisoners," Lin Rice explains. "We get some most weekends."

So this was a chapter in the life of a "man of distinction". Bunks with dark blankets. An open toilet, with a faucet above it. The inmate drew his drinking water from this faucet.

The women's cells-duplicates of the "holding tanks" were across a hall. A woman, who appeared to be drunk, was lying in one of them. She had just been brought in. I learned. At least the

women's cells were segregated from those of the men.

Soon we reached a heavy metal door leading to the cell block where the men were jailed. Eleven were there at present. I learned. A small window in the door, covered with heavy mesh, provided a place for visitation. The door swung back on an expanse consisting of rows of cells and concrete emptiness. A flight of stairs led to another floor.

The place was as clean as possible, but stripped of almost everything we are accustomed to in daily life. There were the same bunks, toilets and faucets of the "holding tanks". But the individual cells could not be locked, for the locks were non-functional. The room had the appearance of an animal shelter. But I thought of it more as a warehouse-a place where people are

stored until they can be disposed of. I had to remind myself that this jail was probably better than the average jail in Texas, and far superior to the jails in Mexico, with their crowding, poor food, and lack of sanitary facilities.

The men had magazines, Bibles, a few table games, but no chairs or objects made of glass, some had the privilege of a radio. But there was a total lack of privacy for anything. The ordinary decency of an enclosed bathroom simply did not exist in this world.

The men stood about. They had learned how to survive, over your emotions over with gray-like the paint on the floor. Crawl in a shell, and hibernate.

Back down the stairs, Sheriff White opened the door to Burl Walker's Office about the time I did. He pointed out that the building

was fireproof and almost escape proof, but that much difficulty lay in how prisoners could be handled without incurring real dangers. And I realized that the cell-block door area could be quite sinister-especially when he brought up a prisoner at some late hour, had to unlock the door, take off the man's handcuffs and get him settled. This must be done in the presence of the other prisoners, who are unrestrained in the room.

The new jail, he explained, will eliminate that dangerous situation with an automatic door and other safety features.

He mentioned that some local Churches brought programs to the cell block and that the A.A. group

visited inmates frequently. One man joined the Methodist Church as a result of the religious programs.

Burl Walker spoke of the inmates he has observed. "Most of them were abused when young, or come from broken homes. I would say that alcohol is involved with most of the crimes in this County. With drinking on the increase, I wouldn't be surprised if the new jail is inadequate before many years!"

I kept thinking of that, as I walked from the world of bars back to the world of sunlight and freedom. And I kept wishing there was some way to prevent crime, so that people wouldn't have to be caged in any sort of building.

Keeping Well

Hernias
A hernia is an abnormal protrusion of an organ or part through the wall of its normal cavity. There are many types of hernias seen in medical practice. Hernias can cause many symptoms depending on their location and their size.

The most common hernia is the inguinal type in which an

abnormal swelling develops in the lower abdomen on one side in the inguinal canal. This is most common in men and may extend down into the scrotum or may just swell in the lower abdomen.

In this same area a hernia may develop in the canal through which the main artery goes from the abdomen to the leg. This is a

femoral hernia and causes a swelling in the upper thigh just below the abdomen.

The so called umbilical hernia is an abnormal protrusion through the navel. This is seen very commonly in children. Many small umbilical hernias are seen in babies and will disappear by the age of one or two years. If this hernia persists beyond age two or progressively enlarges, it will require surgical correction.

Another common hernia is the incisional hernia. This is any protrusion through an old scar - usually through a surgical incision. These hernias may be small but usually become larger and

larger and need treatment.

The hiatus hernia or diaphragmatic hernia is a protrusion of the stomach up into the chest through the opening in the diaphragm for the esophagus.

There are many other less common types of hernias.

The symptoms of a hernia are usually pain and an abdominal swelling. Occasionally a loop of intestine will get into a hernia and become caught (strangulated) causing severe pain, abdominal cramping, nausea, and vomiting.

The only satisfactory treatment of hernias is surgery. A few people wear a support (truss) to compress the

hernia and prevent it from protruding. This may give temporary relief but will not cure the hernia nor prevent the complications that can occur. Surgical repair usually cures the hernia. A few cases will recur even after excellent surgical repair, because the tissues break down. This only happens in a small percentage of the repairs and these recurrences can usually be fixed by using a mesh or some other special surgical procedure.

At 9:00 a.m. Saturday the judging will begin with the market steers and at 10:00 the breeding beef will be judged.

The sale of the Champion and Reserve Champion animals will begin at 8:00 Saturday night at the Eastland Livestock Auction. The presentation of special awards will be given at this time also.

The judges for this years livestock show will be Garth Priddy-swine; Tim Stone beef cattle, A. K.

Whisenhunt-goat, breeding sheep and fat lambs; Daryl Hirst-dairy and the rabbit judge is yet to be named.

The exhibitors will also be competing for showmanship awards which are awarded to the exhibitors in the various division for the best job of fitting, grooming, and showing their animals. The Eastland Auction Co. will donate showmanship trophies for steers, fat lambs, and market swine. Showmanship trophies for the breeding beef cattle, dairy, sheep and goats will be donated by the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

The Farmsworth Angus Ranch will donate the Mike Farmsworth Memorial Trophy to the Champion Angus Heifer. \$30.00 will also be presented to the Champion Angus Heifer and \$20.00 to the Reserve Champion by Hubbard Angus, Gladis Carter Angus, Charles L. Moad Angus, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Cooper, and Heysler Angus.

The bill Hoffman Ranch will present a trophy and \$50.00 to the owner of the Champion Hereford Heifer and a trophy and \$50 to the Champion Hereford Bull.

The owner of the Champion of other breeds will be presented a trophy by the Ralph Berry Family.

The Farmers Peanut Co. will present a trophy to the Grand Champion steer of the show and the Champion lambs.

The Ferguson Trim Shop will give an award to the Most Cooperative Showman.

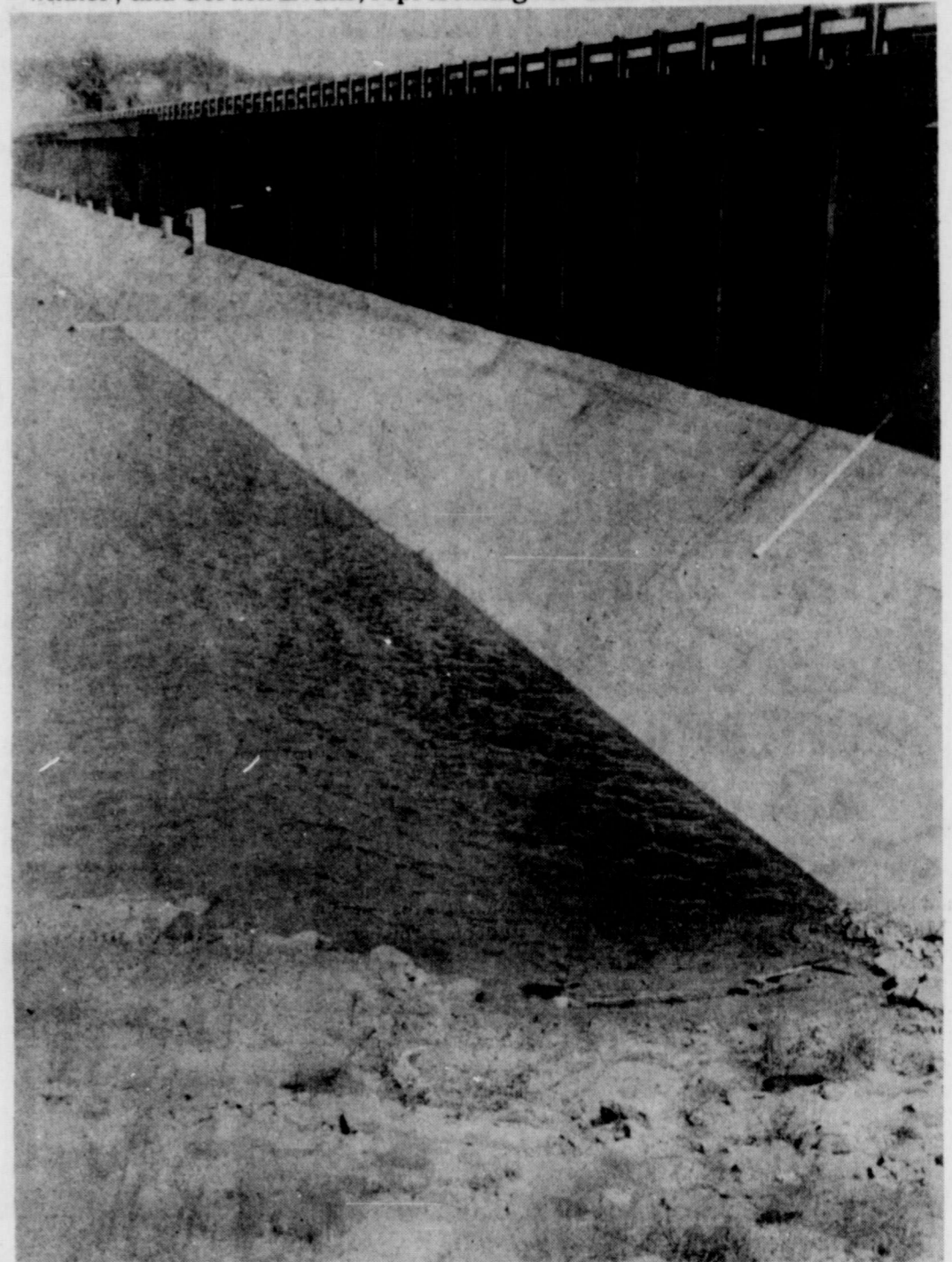

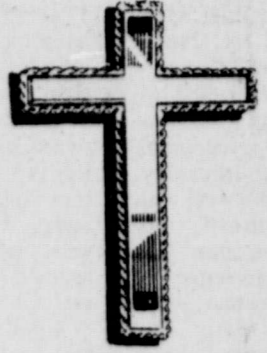

Also while you're waiting for your Pompeii tour, the Dallas Museum of Natural History also nearby, offers "Volcano" a special exhibit utilizing slides, films, volcanic specimens, photographs and descriptive panels to take you on a tour of the world's great volcanoes.

Like touring the Alamo Shrine in San Antonio, the Pompeii Exhibit is especially note worthy when you stop to think about it. The more than 100 items on display are in remarkably good condition. The tour takes you on a tour of Pompeii to show you the life style and customs of the people. As workmen uncover the ruins, they find well preserved skeletons as well as artifacts galore.

If you go over, it would probably be best to avoid the weekend crowds. The exhibit is open from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday through Sunday. You can't reserve or order tickets. There's plenty of parking space and there's a bus for 25 cents to the exhibit from the parking area.

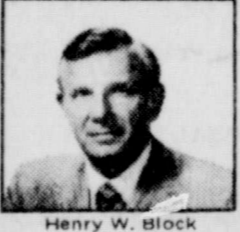
