The Cisco Independent School District would like to remind local property owners that they will have until April 1st to file for their homestead exemptions. If you rendered your property before January 8, 1979, you should check with the tax office to see if you were granted the homestead exemption as they had just gone into effect at that time. There is no age qualification for this exemption, if you lived in a residence located within the Cisco Independent School District on January 1st, 1979, you are eligible and could save as much as \$46.54 on your 1979 taxes.

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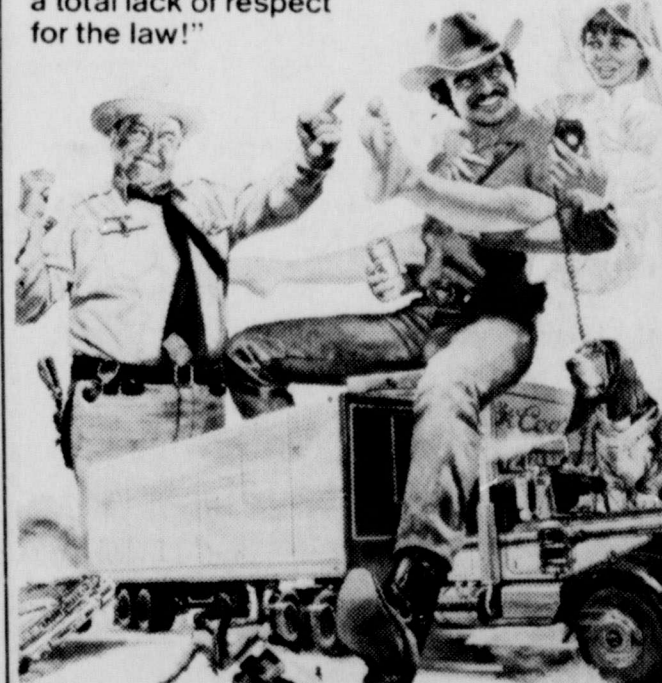

WASHINGTON, D.C.—On March 15 the House Administration Committee will begin hearings on a proposal to allow public financing of Congressional campaigns. It appears that once again we are being led down that long, treacherous road of more government regulation, higher government spending, and less individual freedom. This is another example of an idea that sounds good on the surface, but, if implemented, will

radically alter our political system for the worse.

Advocates of this proposal point to the fact that the high cost of running for office is discouraging people from becoming candidates. Also they believe that the majority of the Congress is being "bought" off by means of campaign support they receive from various interests. This is very shallow and superficial reasoning. People have always selected lawmakers they believe will be most representative of their beliefs. They form groups to receive recognition on a collective basis and seek out candidates who agree with their political philosophy. Nearly every American belongs to some organization that is active politically, whether it be a political party, business association, a labor union, or a church group. All these interests are active in the election process. In our system of government, competing groups seek to influence their destiny through the legislative process.

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There is nothing sinister about this procedure, in fact it has served America very well for over 200 years.

Certainly the high cost of running for office is an ever increasing problem. The difficulty is that politicians are required to spend a large portion of our time campaigning and thus have to disburse large amounts of funds. This problem could be alleviated by shortening the election period.

With public financing of elections we get more bureaucracy and less personal freedom. This proposal gives the government power to determine the allocation of political resources. Politicians will be monitoring politicians. Also there are serious constitutional questions as to whether the government has the right to force a taxpayer to contribute to a candidate or a cause to which he does not adhere to. It is my firm belief that every citizen has an absolute right

to support the candidate of his choosing. However, we also cannot ignore the cost. In this era of taxpayer unrest it is not wise to start a costly new program with benefits of doubtful value.

My political philosophy is one that advocates less government spending and regulation and more individual freedom. Certainly if public financing of Congressional elections becomes law we will be spending \$80 million of the taxpayer's money to hire 500 more bureaucrats, and the end result will be a severe limitation on each individual's right to participate in the political process. 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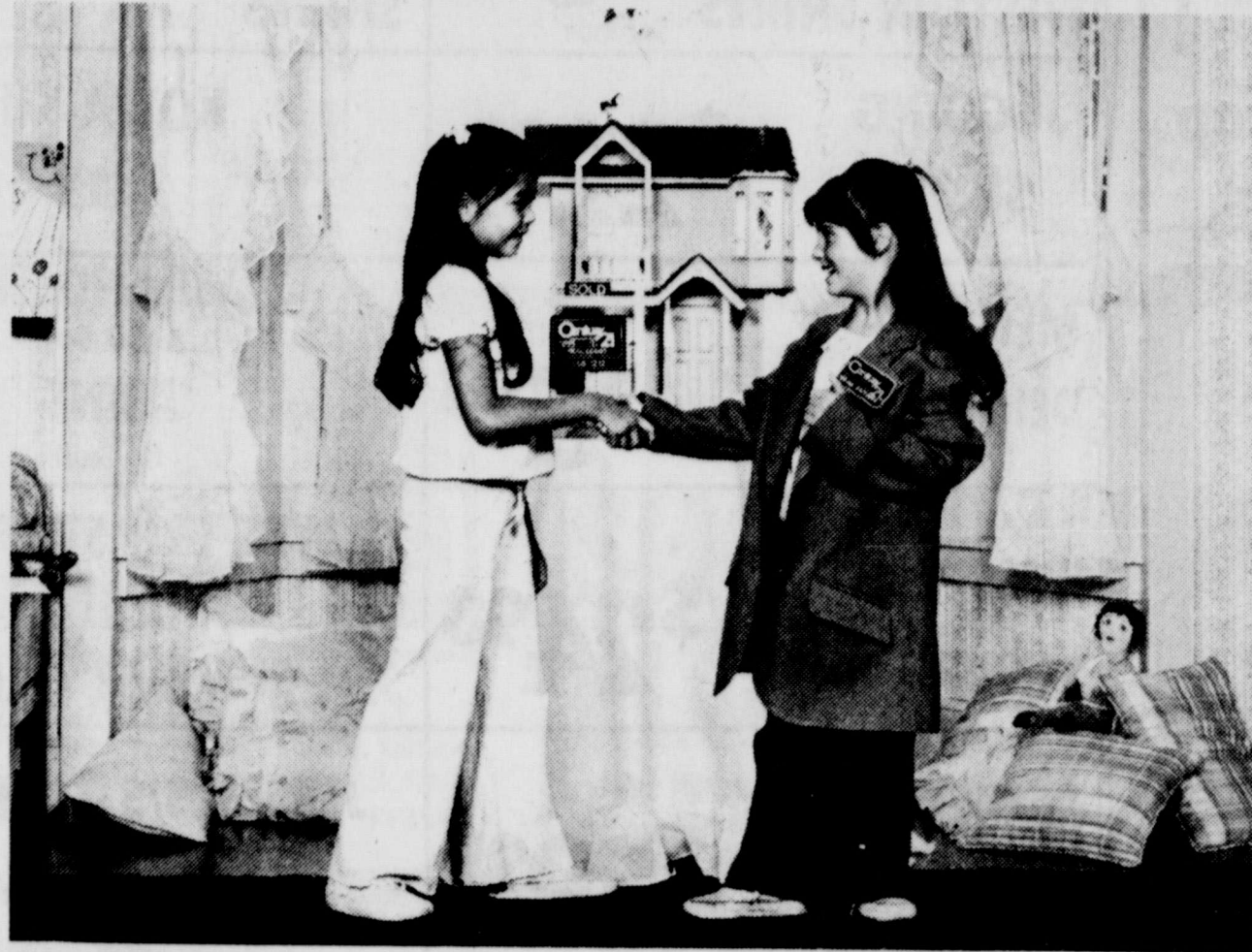

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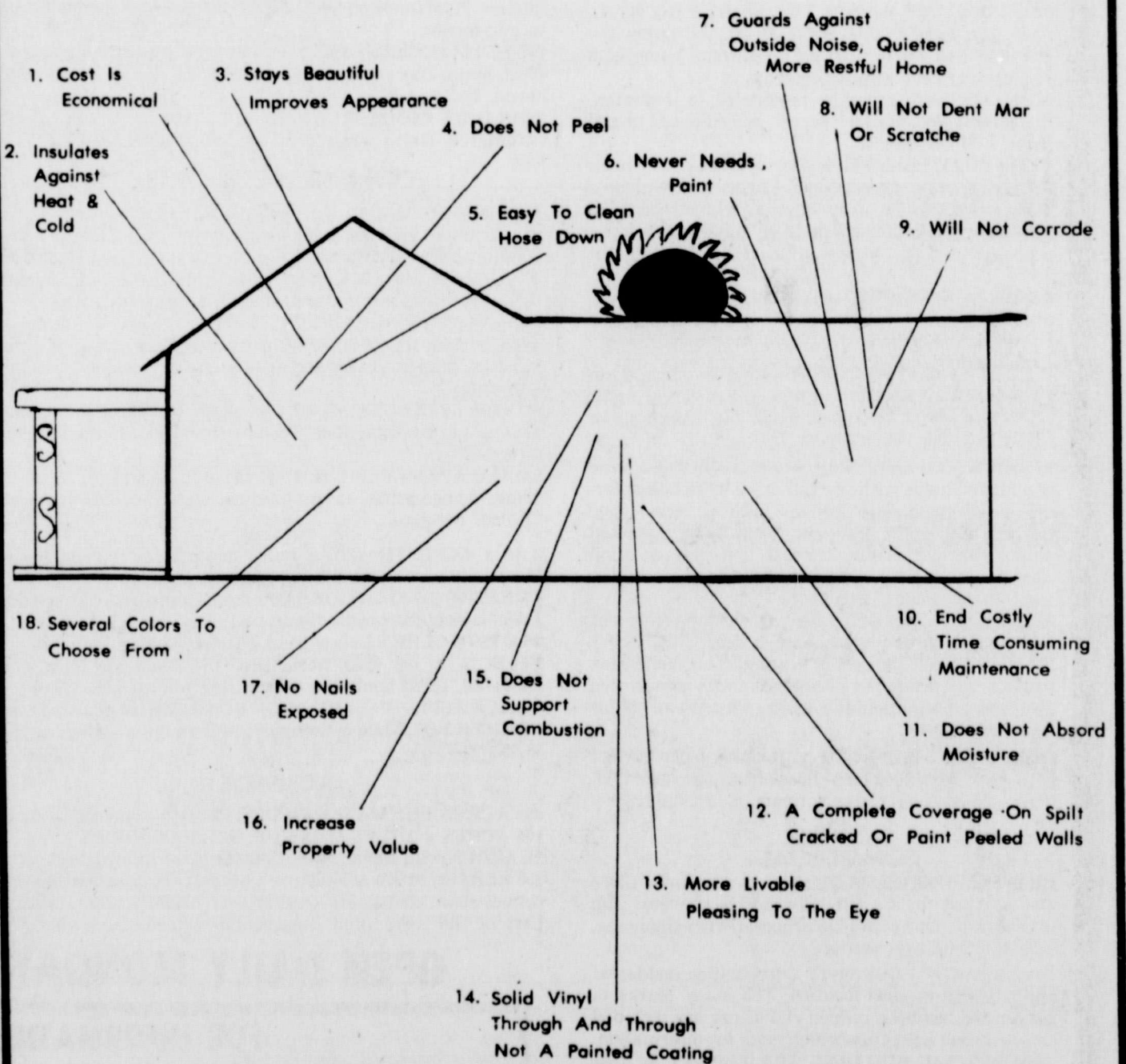

Dear Readers--The President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped reports that the Leonard Cheshire Foundation, which has established 70 Cheshire Homes for handicapped people in Great Britain, and an additional 102 homes throughout the world, has provided a grant which makes it possible to open an office in Washington, D.C.

Cheshire Homes provides homes, in a normal family sense of the word. These homes give handicapped individuals who are unable to live independently an opportunity to live creative, purposeful, lives in which they share the responsibilities for

operation of the homes.

## Wagley, More Than President

A visitor to the Texas Railway Car Company, just north of Ranger, first notices the impressive layout of metal buildings, equipment, and railway cars stretching for a half mile along a spur beside the T and P tracks. The stir of men and machinery is a vivid contrast to the cedar-dotted hills above the valley. This subsidiary Company of American Car Company and Tiger International is a big enterprise now, with about five million dollars invested in the local plant. It has a two million dollar payroll, and employs 175 people, with 19 of these working in the office building. The Company services and repairs three to four hundred railway cars each month, and plans a one and one-half million dollar expansion.

But one of the most outstanding features of this industry is found right in the front building the President, W.S. Wagley. His office, perhaps, is typical of an Executive—carpets, modernistic furniture. Nothing much of the past, or personal affairs, except photographs of his family and a wall full of plaques given in appreciation of Mr. Wagley's services and contributions in Abilene, Ranger, and elsewhere. But the brown-eyed man behind the massive desk is far from typical. He talks of people more than machines, and feelings more than finance. He speaks in a calm, unhurried voice, throwing out enough good vibrations to reach to the far side of the plant. Or maybe they reach all the way to Ranger, where he serves as Director of the Boy's Club, Director of the Chamber of Commerce, serves on the Board of Regents of Ranger Junior College, and director of the Industrial Foundation. Other contributions to the town have been sizable: a dormitory at the College, and a building for the Boy's Club. It's enough to make a person wonder how this man handles life with such apparent ease, while many others have such great difficulty.

"Yes, I am eighty-two years old," Wagley begins. "No reason why an older person shouldn't keep busy and learn new things. I didn't know a thing about running the Railway Car Company when I came here in '73—just owned a lot of stock in it. Shortly after that I sold out to Tiger International. I told them I didn't know a thing about repairing cars, but I knew people. They told me to stay on as President!" He chuckles. "We have grown fast, and now we have a reputation as one of the best car-repair companies in the nation. We have a branch plant over in Roscoe—I drive over to see about it."

Mr. Wagley has definite ideas why the plant has prospered. "I have good people here—highly skilled people, and people learning skills. I love my employees, and they know I will treat them right. That's the most important part of running a business. These people are my family-my children." He chuckles. "Maybe I ought to say 'Grandchildren!'"

"As for my education, you can say I am an Under-graduate, still attending the School of Hard knocks. I quit public school with the eighth grade, and my Father told me if I didn't intend to go to High School I had better go to work and get into business for myself. I followed his advice, but I don't want anyone to pattern after me on quitting school.

Life is easier if you get an education. College teaches you how to think."

His parents, Mr. Wagley says, contributed important things to his life, such as principles of right living, and a religious faith. Wagley joined the Baptist Church when young. "My father, he remembers, 'Had only a third grade education. But when I was born, in 1896, he was running a furniture store at West Station, north of Waco. People seemed to respect him."

When W. S. was seven years old, the family moved to Channing, in the Texas Panhandle. Then the family settled in Artesia, New Mexico, and finally in Oklahoma. His Father farmed, ranched, and ran furniture stores. While at Artesia W. S. had an unusual experience.

"We were living on a 320 acre farm," he recalls. "And I was out at the barn one day. I had been wondering what I was going to do with my life. As I started walking back to the house, I had a craving desire to spend my life helping young people. But then, I was born, in 1896, he was running a furniture store at West Station, north of Waco. People seemed to respect him."

"This experience was like a vision to me. I didn't exactly know how to follow it, but I didn't forget it."

W.S. quit school in Altus, Oklahoma, and began work in a wholesale grocery house. At age 18 he became manager of a branch office of a wholesale grocery company in Mangum, Oklahoma. In World War I he joined the Marines, becoming a Physical Instructor at Paris Island. This training, he says, taught him the value of physical fitness. He still takes daily exercises when possible.

After the war he tried what he calls "a dozen" different things, finally settling into Real Estate. He worked in Dallas, and moved to Abilene in 1926. He married, and had two children—a son, W. W. Wagley, and a daughter, Betty O'Banion. W. W. Wagley is a Distributor for a Merchant's Supply firm in Seattle, Washington. There are six grandchildren in the family, and six great-grandchildren.

During his early business years W. S. Wagley wondered why he was not more successful. Finally he gained insight into the cause of his trouble. "I was not operating on sound principles," he says. "I had a high temper, I did not care enough for other people, I was insecure. I was trying to do everything on my own strength. So I prayed to the Lord for good judgement. I decided to turn all my affairs over to Him, and let Him decide the outcome. From that time on I felt at peace with myself, and things have gone well for me."

In 1933 he organized the W. S. Wagley Realty Company in Abilene, and waded through the depression. He prospered, and followed through on his dreams of helping young people. He helped get the Y.M.C.A. started in Abilene, and worked with the Boy's Club. He worked with the Chamber of Commerce and many community projects. His wife Mary, also, assisted the community through Club work and other functions.

In 1944, during World War II, Wagley served as President of the Lion's Club and State President of the Texas Real Estate Association—all at the same time! He became a business and personal counselor to a number of people. After the war the Wagley Realty continued to develop city property, but also developed Elmwood West and Brookhollow Additions. He took pride in the building of these fine homes, and mentions that they have continued to increase in value.

During this time Mr. Wagley operated an insurance and loan Company in connection with Real Estate. He also assisted in getting a Real Estate License Law enacted in Texas. During the 1960's Mr.

Outside, rail cars of every description are beached around the siding. Oil tank cars, chemical cars, coal cars, cars for hauling foodstuff. Cars with bashed-in fronts, carried in from some big wreck.

Parts are carefully stacked on the right. The large corrugated steel building is for welding, and there are places for steam cleaning, sandblasting, stenciling, many things.

Wagley finally circles a line of tank cars, repaired and gleaming with fresh black paint. "those cars look just like new." He smiles. "I get a feeling of accomplishment, every time I see the results of this work."

"I get the same feeling when I see Ranger prospering and growing. It's a great town—it has a good location and so many assets. No reason why it can't keep right on. And I want to be around to enjoy it—to think I had a part."

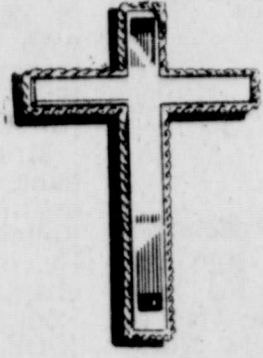

**Picking Cranberries**

**Freezing Cranberries**

To freeze fresh cranberries for use all year-round, place the berries into a plastic container or bag. Seal tightly and put in the freezer. When using, pour out the amount needed, rinse and drain. Cook or chop without thawing.
