Number Of Items Brought Before City Council Tuesday

A number of items was brought before the Cisco city council for review and action at Tuesday night's regular city council meeting, and one of two new council members was sworn onto the council.

Mr. William J. Eudy was sworn in as council member place IV at the meeting replacing LeeRoy Witzsche before any new business was transacted. Lonnie Grady, elected as council member III, had been called out of town and was unable to attend the meeting; therefore, Dick Ward will continue to serve in that capacity until Mr. Grady is officially sworn in at the next meeting.

Previous to the swearing in of Mr. Eudy, the council approved the minutes from the past meeting and heard the city manager's report for last month. His report included the following items: city crews started Monday replacing dead water meters throughout the city; a new type of chemical has been purchased for street repair and maintenance; there was a total of 22 fire calls during the month; there was a major break in the water line north of town, near the Country Club road turnoff; Roland Stroebel checked the transformers at the Battle Creek pump station and reported they are still good; there are three police officers attending certification school; there has been some vandalism at the sewer plant and some vandals have placed plastic trash bags of sand in the city's sewer system, one of which was recovered.

The Cisco taxi cab service has been having problems with an Eastland taxi doing service in Cisco. Mr. J.T. Husband, owner of the Cisco cab franchise, stated the Eastland service says it has a government contract and can do anything it wants in Cisco. Mrs. Husband said it takes all of Cisco's business in order for them to be able to afford to run the cab, and she went on to say, "If we take care of Cisco, they (the Eastland cab) should take care of Eastland."

Council members heard a discussion concerning the alleged unfairness of the Cisco Girl's Softball Association in choosing teams and distributing equipment. City manager

John Boland stated the only reason the matter was being brought before the council was the fact that the city has given \$500 the past two years to the Girl's Recreation Program. Following a lengthy discussion of the allegation, council member Louise Allison stated, "We can't run the softball league, it is up to the association to solve its own problems." Mayor Hugh (Chief) Brown said he is in favor of the money going to the girl's recreation program but he emphasized that all the girls should receive benefits of the money. He went on to say he appreciates what the association is doing and thinks a recreation program is needed. He also said he feels all girls should have the same opportunity to participate in the program.

The first reading of a Standard Housing Code ordinance for Cisco was approved by all council members at the meeting. Council member Ward made a motion to accept the first reading. Council member Witzsche seconded the motion with council members Lucy Collier, Raymond Whitley, Louise Allison, Ward, Witzsche, Morgan Fleming and Mayor Brown voting in its favor. Council member Witzsche made a motion to accept the second reading of a one percent utility sales tax ordinance. Council member Whitley seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Council member Witzsche also made a motion to accept the second reading of a flood insurance ordinance. Council member Allison seconded that motion and all voted in its favor. The results of the canvassing of the Cisco city council election were tabulated and council member Ward made a motion they be accepted. Council member Witzsche seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Following the canvassing of the election, Mr. Eudy was given his oath of office by city manager Boland. Mr. Eudy then replaced Mr. Witzsche at the council table.

The election of a Mayor Pro-Tem was postponed until Mr. Grady can be sworn into office.

City engineer, Billy Jacobs was present at the meeting to inform council members that he is ready to begin

taking bids for the repaving of Front Street. Council members agreed to hold the May 8 regular council meeting at 2 p.m. and open the contractual bids at that time. Council member Ward made a motion to go out for bids, seconded by council member Collier with all voting in its favor.

Council member Ward also made a motion to pay the monthly bills. It was seconded by council member Whitley and all voted in its favor.

Council member Collier made a motion to designate Thursday, April 12 through Wednesday, April 18 as Spring Clean-Up Week in Cisco. This time was suggested since it would be prior to the Cisco Folklife Festival and Frontier Jubilee. Council member Whitley seconded the motion and all voted in its favor.

Reverend John Jones, pastor of the Greater Mountain Top Pentecostal Church, gave the invocation.

April 12-18 To Be Clean-Up Week

The Cisco city council voted at its regular meeting Tuesday night to designate April 12-18 as Spring Clean-Up Week in Cisco.

During that time, local citizens may call City Hall in order to get trees, brush, refuse from cleaned-out attics and garages, hauled to the city land-fill free of charge. City manager John Boland asked that citizens be patient while waiting for city crews, since there are only two dump trucks to service the entire town.

Anyone having metal objects to haul off is asked to call the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, which will arrange for its pickup.

City Manager Boland stated the city's participation during clean-up week will be emphasized on weed control and drainage improvements in the downtown area.

Lonnie Grady was elected to the position of council member place III and William J. Eudy was elected to council member place IV. Grady was elected with 292 votes over Willard Lee Johnson who received 141 votes, and Tex Underwood who had 47 votes. Eudy received 297 votes defeating Stephen Wheeler who had 112, and Ealy Black who received 82 votes.

Grady and Eudy will replace Dick Ward and LeeRoy Witzsche on the Cisco city council. Other council members are Lucy Collier, Raymond Whitley, Louise Allison, Morgan Fleming and Mayor Hugh (Chief) Brown.

Armo Chambers and incumbent, Jay Richardson were elected to two-year terms in the Cisco Hospital District board of directors election. From a total of 569 votes, Chambers received 392, Richardson had 314 and Danny Schaefer got 273. Hold-over directors are Lloyd McGrew, Emma Lee Donovan and Ayres R. Cermin, M.D.

In the Cisco Independent School District board of trustees election, Roy G. Hathaway was elected to place VI and incumbent, Emmett Rich was elected to place VII. Hathaway received 320 out of a total of 561 votes to defeat his opponent Bruce Stovall, who received 237 votes. Rich received 387 votes to defeat Travis Starr who received 171.

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





Keeping Well

FEBRILE CONVULSIONS
A very disturbing condition seen in some infants and

children is a convulsion (or seizure) that occurs when the child has a temperature

elevation. Fortunately this only happens in a small percentage of children. Unfortunately if a child has this tendency, he will have a convulsion almost every time his fever rises rapidly. The convulsion is usually a generalized seizure with

jerking of the child's arms and legs and a drawing backward of his head. This only lasts a few seconds but seems like a much longer time to those watching the youngster. The child may become limp and lose consciousness for a short time. These episodes occur as the fever first starts and suddenly rises. The convulsions are usually not repeated as long as the fever stays up. It is the sudden rise in body temperature that seems to cause the convulsion.

Most of these children outgrow the problem by three or four years of age and have no further febrile illnesses. In a small group of these patients this may signal the onset of epilepsy and in later years they may have convulsion unrelated to fever. However, in most of these children the convulsion are harmless and do not lead to later trouble.

The treatment of children who have febrile convulsions is to attempt to keep their fever down by giving aspirin, cool baths, etc., when they get an infection. Probably the best treatment is phenobarbital in small doses which seems to prevent the convulsion if started early enough in the course of the child's illness.

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

GORDON SPOT

Ticks are again causing problems for people and their pets in Eastland County. These nuisance pests were especially troublesome last year and it appears they are going to be a problem this year.

Heavy infestations in the home may require treatment by professionals. Light infestations can usually be

controlled with light spot treatments with household sprays containing 0.5 percent diazinon or runnel. Treatment of the dog's sleeping quarters, chairs, baseboards and around doors and windows is usually necessary. Removal of the dog from the house plus treatment of the infested area may be the only means

to control severe infestations.

Outside the house, ticks may be controlled with sprays or dusts of diazinon or carbaryl (sevin). Use five percent carbaryl dust at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds per acre where vegetation is thin. This would be .6 pound per 1,000 sq. ft. Increase the dosage in heavy vegetation. If spray is used, mix two quarts of 25 percent diazinon emulsifiable concentrate in 25 gallons of water (5 tablespoons per gallon). Apply at the rate of one gallon of spray per 1,000 square feet of infested area. Handle all insecticides properly and follow all directions on the label before applying control treatments.

Dogs should be examined frequently for ticks. Light infestations can be controlled by dust containing five percent carbaryl (Sevin). Rub the dust to the skin and apply to the animal's sleeping quarters weekly. Heavy infestations on pets may be handled best by dip treatments purchased from a veterinarian.

Most tick species cannot survive in cleared areas and mowed lawns where they are exposed to excessive sunlight and predators. Cutting grass and weeds,

removal of useless shrubs and keeping the area clear of debris is very important in controlling ticks on home premises and recreational areas.

Have you noticed an army of small black worms feeding on your trees? A population explosion of the spring cankerworm has occurred in many areas of central Texas, and some have been found in Eastland County.

Common names of the cankerworm include inchworm and measuringworm. These names refer to the spanning or measuring action of the larvae as they move from place to place. More than 1,200 species occur in North America.

Many cankerworms feed on various trees and may cause serious defoliation. Some species overwinter as pupae while other overwinter in the egg stage. Most species have one generation per year; some have as many as five or six generations. We should only see one damaging generation from this pest this year.

The larvae are about one inch when full grown. They are relatively long and very slender. Color varies with the species from green to

gray to black. The immature stage produces an abundant amount of silken webs.

Cankerworms are easy to control. However before control measures are applied, inspected to assess damage. Heavy infestations often do not cause significant damage. Apply chemicals only when extensive foliage

loss is evident and larvae are still present.

Chemicals cleared for use on cankerworms include *Bacillus thuringiensis* (Dipel), Carbaryl (Sevin) and Orthene.

Fruit growers may want to control this devastating pest to maintain tree foliage. Foliage loss can reduce the thrift and vigor of fruit trees.

VA Payments Boost Economy For Eastland County

Recent statistics indicate that the economy of Eastland County has received a significant boost as a result of Veterans Administration payments to veterans, their dependents and their survivors.

According to James T. Wright, Veterans County Service Office for Eastland County, VA payments for fiscal year 1978 totaled \$1,452,063.00. Of this amount, \$962,061.00 was paid in the form of compensation and pension; \$368,771.00 for readjustment and vocational rehabilitation;

\$73,231 for insurance and indemnities; and \$48,000.00 for direct loans.

All of these amounts were paid directly to the residents of Eastland County. According to the County Service Office, in addition to materially adding to the economic health of the county, these benefits have alleviated many hardships for veterans and their families in time of need.

Wright added that his office was ready to assist any county residents who believe that they have a claim for veterans benefits.







The difficulty comes when we are unable to balance the scale — to take what is just, to give what is fair.



Many times in the Bible we are reminded that it is contrary to the laws of God for those in positions of power or authority to withhold from any man that which is his due.



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

Most are provided in group settings, such as schools, community centers, churches and public housing. In addition, many low-income, elderly persons can stretch their incomes with food stamps — the food coupons that are used like money at the grocery store and are used like the government meal program for less than face value. An individual need not be receiving assistance payments to qualify for food stamps. Information about the program can be obtained from the state or local agency on aging or your local department of social services, human resources or welfare.

THE ELITE BEAUTY SALON

The Elite Beauty Salon was started approximately in 1928 by Elizabeth (McCracken) Donica and was located on Avenue D in the rear of the X-ray Barber Shop. After several years of working there, the shop was moved to about where the Ferguson "Ready To Wear" was located and then it was moved to Avenue E for several years. Mrs. Dessie Covington purchased it from Mrs. Donica in 1963 and business was growing so rapidly that there was not enough room to take care of everyone. The shop was then moved to a larger building at 814 Avenue D. There she had nine hairdressers on duty.

1963 was the year for hair color and the curly perms. Business was booming and the prices were considerably lower than today. Shampoo and Sets were \$1.50, Hair cuts were \$1.50, weekly Color Rinses were 50 cents, Bleach was \$12.50, but one application seldom was enough to bring out enough color to apply a light toner. Today prices are quite higher, but so is everything else. Today, Shampoo and Sets are \$5.25, Hair cuts are \$4.50 and \$6.50 depending on the cut you need for your style, Virgin Bleach \$30.00, and Tints are \$15.50 with the shampoo and sets.

Today, the Elite Beauty Salon is located at 507 West Second Street with eight hairdressers and business is still progressing.

DRESS

From "Flappers" to Levi's and back again fashion has been going in circles since the 1920's. There are a few differences in comparing today's styles with those of the 20's. In the 1920's it was considered very unladylike for women to wear slacks or pants of any sort, especially in public. Dresses were worn by women at all times even when working in the fields, and the length was below the knees. Boys dressed much the same as they do today. They wore blue jeans, kahkis and just about any form of trousers, (almost all tapered to the ankles.) Suspenders were worn most of the time instead of the belt, and some wore hats to school. A boy's hair was not cut until he started to school or was about nine or ten years old. The style of hair was short, usually clipped around the ears in a crew cut fashion.

In some schools all grades were taught in one big class room with only one teacher. These were mostly rural schools. It was not mandatory that kids attended school since most children had to help on the farm. Teachers were encouraged to spend a night in the homes of their students at least once or to eat with them so they could get to know them better. In some schools it was not uncommon for the teacher to be a few years younger than some of his or her own students, since one could start teaching upon high school graduation.

Children had to walk

to school which was usually several miles away; today we just jump in the car-and-go. Lunches were carried in syrup buckets, long ago, in contrast to our modern hot lunch served in an attractive cafeteria-for those who wish to eat there.

The dress code was also different. It was unthought of for a girl to wear slacks to school; today many girls wear slacks and no one thinks anything about it. Education has certainly changed over the years from the time of the one-room school-house, but our society and mode of life have also changed.

Statistics

Approximately three million students are expected to receive diplomas from American high schools at the end of the 1978-79 school year. For many, this will be the culmination of 12 years of formal education. However, for about 60 percent of the graduates, enrollment in a degree-credit program at a university or college can be expected. Of those 1.8 million, if current trends are any indication, about 24 percent will receive a bachelor's, 7 percent a master's and 1 percent a doctor's degree.

An estimated 10 million people will be enrolled this fall in post-secondary programs creditable to a bachelor's degree. Most, about four fifths, will attend public institutions. Presently, there are more than 3,000 universities and college, including branch campuses in the United States. Over 500 are concentrated in California and New York alone.

Although costs have risen over the years, enrollment in programs of higher education has continued to increase. A contributing factor has been the availability of junior colleges and other low-cost public institutions. In addition, various government programs such as the Guaranteed Student Loan Program and the Basic Educational Opportunity Grant Program have proved to be inviting to many students who may have had financial difficulties.

Those were the days...yes, those were the days. Education has changed drastically over the past fifty years here in Cisco. We have come from a small, wooden, one-roomed school-house to three large brick school houses. Also, we have come from outdoor toilets to modern indoor ones.


Many years ago several grades were combined into one class in a one-room school-house. Today, no grades are combined and each class usually has at least 25 students in each room. Reading, writing, arithmetic, and a few other subjects taught. Slates and blackboards were used for all school work except for

spelling which was written on paper. Today's, in contrast, very little work is done on blackboards and everything else written on paper. This is an advantage since things written on paper can be used to study from and blackboards or slates had to be erased.

At certain times of the year students would be turned out so that they could help their parents pick cotton. Today, with the modern machinery there is no reason for school to be turned out. Also, most students didn't go past the sixth grade because people didn't think education was as important as they do now.

Required Standard Tests

Colleges Require Standard Tests

Most colleges require applicants to take one or more standardized tests prior to admission consideration. Included among the common examinations administered are the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT), the Preliminary Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, (PSAT/NMSQT), and the American College Test (ACT).

The PSAT/NMSQT is a one hour and 40 minute objective test usually taken by high school students in their junior year. It provides them with useful information in planning for further education and better prepares them for the similar SAT. By evaluating the results of this test, high school counselors can advise students concerning their college plans.

The three and one-half hour ACT evaluates academic development and competence in four specific subject areas: social sciences, English Usage, mathematics, and natural sciences.

The SAT is a three hour objective test designed to measure verbal and mathematical skills related to successful college work. The verbal portion requires understanding and correct use of words, a measurement of one's vocabulary comprehension. The mathematics section feeds the applicant specific numerical information and asks him to reason with it.

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County Commissioners Court To Meet

The County Commissioners Court will meet on May 10 to open bids for the construction of a new county jail. The court will meet on May 14, to consider passage of an order authorizing the is-

suance of certificates of obligation of the county in an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000 to build the jail. The Court is under a federal court order to build a new jail for the county.

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

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Congressional Comment

by Charles W. Stenholm



WASHINGTON, D.C.—Federal paperwork generates almost seven million cubic feet of paper annually and contributes to an economic burden of more than \$40 billion a year. This massive wasted effort stifles innovation, inhibits productivity, and accelerates inflation. This information glut is a reflection of a society that is beginning to mistrust itself.

Paperwork intensive programs are brought about because society begins to doubt the integrity of a certain sector of the economy. In the last several years mistrust and hostility have given us the Occupational Safety and Health Administration to regulate the health and safety in our businesses; ERISA recently extended massive regulation over many of our pension plans; the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission often tells employers who they can hire and fire; and the IRS, the biggest paperwork transgressor of them all, continually gives us conflicting and inaccurate information and then threatens reprisals for ignorance of the law. What government is saying is that I do not trust the way you run your affairs, therefore I am going to regulate them and make you disclose every detail no matter how trivial. This situation breeds hostility as people become resentful of having some one constantly looking over their shoulder and interfering in their affairs.


No comprehensive legislation has ever been enacted to alleviate this problem and concerned citizens are beginning to ask why. The answer is that bureaucracies are formed to respond to a particular need and once they perform their function they are not discarded but continue in existence. In an effort to justify their existence they issue needless reports and require unnecessary paperwork. Also it is extremely difficult to form a consensus on how to approach this problem.

Everyone wants to lessen the burden but on one wants his fields to be touched. Environmentalists resist attempts to limit the authority of the EPA, OSHA is supported by labor organizations, and other regulatory agencies are often supported by the very industries they regulate.

Certainly I believe in such goals as maintaining a quality environment and protecting the health and safety of our citizens, but these results cannot be attained efficiently by bureaucrats who promulgate uniform regulations for all sections of the Country. Certainly our problems in West Texas are much different from those of the people in New York City.

We must remember that we live in a good society, not a perfect society, and that we will never cure all the evils of the world no matter how many laws we pass or regulations we promulgate. Regulating every aspect of our daily lives in order to correct a few isolated abuses is like killing a fly with a sledge hammer; it may sometimes be effective, but it is certainly not efficient.

During my service here in Congress I intend to do something about the problem of federal paperwork and regulation. I have joined a committee called the Forum on Regulation which is made up of a bipartisan panel of 160 members of Congress. This organization will try to form a consensus on what needs to be done to alleviate this problem. Also I serve on the Investigations Subcommittee of the Post Office and Civil Service Committee. This Subcommittee will shortly begin hearings on the paperwork issue. Your assistance in this effort will be helpful. I would welcome receiving your views about specific instances of federal paperwork and that you consider excessive and unnecessary. With your help we can together seek a solution to this problem.

PANAMA, R.P.-- When you see something in the newspapers or on television about Congress doing something regarding the Panama Canal Treaty you can bet that the story gets top play in the Republic of Panama. People here are quite interested in the treaty.

The agreement is supposed to be finalized and transfer of property to begin October 1, with the final turnover taking place in the year 2000. Implementing the new treaty, however, is likely to prove arduous and complex, filled with obstacles and difficulties. You get that impression as a close-hand observer.

Here are some of the considerations in the treaty:

1. Transfer of mobile equipment.
2. Transfer of the Panama Canal workers' contributions to the Social Security Fund.
3. Salary and labor policies.
4. Transfer of 461

buildings comprising 1,084 living units, 30 public buildings, 269 smaller structures, 48 areas for public use, 106,000 hectares of undeveloped land, 1,500 hectares of partially developed land, 20 commercial services, 147 company activities, 241 non-profit activities, the port of Balboa and Cristobal, and the Panama Railroad.

In addition, Panama must prepare to provide such public services as health, hospital, cemeteries, schools, libraries, post offices, immigration, customs, quarantine, police, land permits, business permits, justice, jails, fire fighting systems, street maintenance and lighting, aqueducts, telecommunications, sewage systems and some other things.

You see quite a few articles in the English language Panama newspaper (and probably in the Spanish language newspaper) about worker unrest. U.S. citizens employed

by the canal number several thousand. Many have lived here most of their lives. And they are pretty concerned. The unions are active in the transfer.

Thousands of ships go through the canal each year. They pay passage fees based on tonnage. The average toll is about \$13,500. The Queen Elizabeth II, one of the largest ships afloat, went through the canal March 31 and paid a transit fee of \$68,499. A good many years ago, writer Richard Halliburton swam the canal and was charged a transit fee of 36 cents after his displacement tonnage was calculated.

The canal is about 25 miles long and ships are "lifted" 85 feet in three lockages. The journey through the canal takes about eight hours.

Work began on the canal in about 1900 by the French. After a few years, the USA took over and the canal opened in the 1850s. A railroad parallels the canal - some 25 miles long. You can buy a round trip ticket for about \$3.00 and use a day for the outing, spending several hours in Colon on the Atlantic side.

The Summit Gardens, located near the main administration building, spread over some 300 lush tropical acres and contain some 15,000 varieties of plant life. The USA has army, navy and air force bases in Panama. Military and canal people number some 40,000 US people living here.

Panama service stations stock no lead-free gasoline. Cars built for sale in Panama, as well as other Latin American countries, are not equipped with catalytic con-

verters...safety belts are not required in cars here...And the surgeon general's warning about cancer doesn't appear on cigarette packages bought in Panama shops.

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
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
