The Texas Energy Advisory Council, the state's main source of official advice when it comes to energy, passed a resolution almost two months ago calling on the federal govern-

With the 66th session more than half over, the House of Representatives appeared to be trying to make up for lost time this week as members tentatively approved a wide variety of bills that would aid an even wider variety of people.

Quickly, the House approved a measure requiring health insurance plans to cover chiropractors' costs, gave its okay to a "cancer registry" so that trends of the disease can be studied, said yes to a bill that would give the state the authority to guarantee loans for family farmers and ranchers and voted to restore the voting rights of convicted felons not on probation or parole. The House also took on the sticky issue of initiative and referendum and came out doing about what the

Senate had done up to that point-nothing. In the House, debate on a bill giving voters limited initiative and referendum rights (restricted to rolling back excessive property tax increases) was postponed until late April.

amendment is attached to the Senate version of Orange Rep. Wayne Peveto's tax reform bill that has had problems in the past getting through the Legislature.

Short Snorts

The Senate also moved this week to solve some of the problems pointed out by Chief Justice Joe R. Greenhill in the first-ever "State of the Judiciary" address that came in the opening weeks of the session.

Senators passed legislation that would allow intermediate courts of civil appeal to handle criminal cases as well. During his address to the Legislature, Greenhill suggested such a move in an attempt to deal with the backlog of cases facing the criminal appellate courts.

While mortgage money around the state appears to be drying up and with fewer and fewer consumers being able to withstand the financial burden of becoming a homeowner, the Senate gave its tentative approval this week to legislation creating a state housing authority. Voters will be asked to approve the money needed (\$200 million in state-backed bonds) to fund such an agen-

Forty-two states have some kind of housing authority financed by taxpayers. This issue of a state housing authority has rattled around the Capitol since 1971 when then-Sen. Barbara Jordan filed a bill to

A Great Lady

Conrad Hilton's success story had its beginning in Cisco, Texas, where he operated his first hotel, the two story red brick Mobley. During the oil boom in Eastland County, in 1919, Conrad Hilton headed for Cisco to seek his fortune. Little did he know that it would be in the hotel business. He had come south with visions of laying the cornerstone of his banking empire.

When he arrived in Cisco, he headed for the first bank he saw. It was for sale, and the price was right. But, before the bank was delivered into his hands the price had gone up.

Disappointed, he strode to a two-story red brick building boosting itself as the "Mobley Hotel." It looked like a convenient place to sleep-nothing more. "The milling press in the hotel lobby acted like sardines clamoring to get into the can." The hotel owner hollered, "Full up, come back in eight hours when we turn this lot loose." The thought struck Hilton that the customers were allowed to sleep eight hours and then get a complete turnover. H. L. Mobley, the owner, explained to him, "three times every twenty-four hours, day in and day out." "They'd pay to sleep on the tables in the restaurant if I'd let'em." He told Hilton that he was tied to it with an anchor and a chain. He said "I ought to be out there in the oil fields making real money." When Hilton heard this, trying to keep the excitement out of his voice, he inquired about the hotel. It was for sale, fifty thousand cash, including a bed for the night. Hilton didn't want a bed; he wanted to see the books. After three hours of careful inspection of the books, he thought that a man would be crazy to want oil. This had banking beat all hollow.

willing to learn and earn cents. their fortune. Drown couldn't believe it was a hotel. It was a cross between a flophouse and gold-mine, but Ciscoans had so much oil in their eyes they couldn't see it.

Hilton, Drown and Mobley settled at \$40,000. Mobley gave them one week to transfer funds. Hilton's life savings amounted to \$5,000 which he was willing to invest. Drown moved another \$5,000 when he turned up with a rancher looking for an investment. Mary Hilton, Conrad's mother, mailed a check for \$5,000. Four days had been used up, and they had half the purchase in their hands. After having rehearsed a sales talk, he approached the Cisco Banking Company. Before he got to the bank the president knew all about the Mobley. His bank was loaded with money, and since he would outright own a half-interest, they were prepared to make the loan. It was almost too easy. Then the rancher's check bounced. Immediately he went to inform the bank president that the whole thing was off.

Instead of being thrown out, the president just pressed his fingers together, swung his chair from left to right and thought. Then Hilton was possessed with an idea. and the bank president liked it. The \$5,000 was loaned to the rancher on his ranch. The following day at noon, the Mobley changed hands. They were in the hotel business. Hilton immediatemade Drown the manager. He hadn't been in the hotel business five minutes before he knew that this was "it." The Mobley Hotel, in Cisco, was his first love, she was a "Great Lady." She was indestructible, the ideal hotel to practice on, and Conrad Hilton and L.M. Drown did just that. Hilton and Drown continued to sleep in the chairs in the office to free more bed space. They charged only fifty cents for the rooms, and at mealtime everyone sat at a long table and ate all they wanted for only twenty-five

One night, after a rather unpleasant dream, Hilton awoke wide-eyed and perspiring. He shook Drown to semi-consciousness and said excitedly, "This hotel's

> got too much waste space." By sunrise Hilton knew exactly what to do. He ordered some carpenters to close the dining room and split it with partitions, just enough space for a bed and a dresser. Then the main desk was cut in half and a news and tobacco stand installed. Another corner of the lobby surrendered an ill-used potted palm to make way for a small novelty shop which was rented immediately. Within a few weeks the books showed that they had taken on a good thing-and made it better.

After revamping the first floor of the Mobley, he had a second idea that has become basic in all Hilton hotels. It was called Espirit de corps. It means clean rooms, spotless halls, plenty of fresh soap and linen. And in 1940 it also meant lunches for the train crew. The folks at the Mobley would make box lunches for the crew and leave them on the window sill for the crew of the old MKandT





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

Dear Sir The purpose of this letter is to correct a portion of your article in Thursday's paper concerning your City Commission meeting wherein your local taxi operators met with your council and complained of Eastland's Checker Cab, alledging that we are solicting business in Cisco.

Your paper, as well as the Eastland Telegram, Ranger Times, and the Rising Star and Gorman papers, carried a classified ad in the March papers, placed by Central Texas Opportunities of Coleman. The ad stated in part that they were seeking a person or persons to transport Medicaid patients in Eastland County to and from doctors' offices, regardless of where they had to go. Some of these Medicaid people have to go to Abilene doctors and they are not financially able to pay a local taxi or bus fares, and consequently Central Texas Opportunities pays for this.

We have the taxi franchise in Eastland and are fully licensed and insured, so we applied for the task and were granted the contract to operate throughout Eastland County in doing this. We are paid by the hour, and by the mile, for picking these people up and transporting them to their doctor, dentist, or chiropractor. Medicaid patients do not pay us a dime for our services.

The impression left during the City Commission meeting, according to your article, was that we are soliciting regular taxi fares in Cisco. We are not, and we told Mr. and Mrs. Husbands when we got this contract that we would be picking these Medicaid people up and Mr. Husbands at the time said he understood and that it would be okay. We then thought that any possible misunderstanding had been averted, but apparently Mr. Husbands has changed his mind.

Also, at no time have we ever said, or left the impression, that just because we have this type of contract, "we can do as we please." We have discussed this with your City Manager and with

Maybe it was because these ladies used a personal automobile to transport the Medicaid people in, rather than a taxi. The persons who are ac-

tually going to be hurt by the attitude of Cisco people who are apparently opposed to this are Medicaid people, and eventually Cisco taxpayers whose money will have to be used to pay the transportation fees to carry these people to and from doctors in Cisco and Abilene. Yours truly,



ALLERGY

An allergy is an unusual reaction of certain tissues in a person's body on exposure to some substance which in most people would not cause any reaction.

Probably the most common allergic manifestation is "hay fever" more properly called allergic rhinitis. This is a form of allergy which causes a reaction in a person's nose, mouth, eyes, and sinuses resulting in the well-known symptoms of sneezing, watery eyes. increased nasal discharge, and intense itching of the nose, eyes, and mouth, and throat. This allergic rhinitis is most commonly cause by wind-borne pollens or fungi. These pollens are from trees or grasses of many kinds. These same symptoms can be caused in certain people by house dust, animal danders, foods, cigarette

cases of allergy with rashes of various kinds. Sometimes large whelps are seen which come and go and may appear on any part of the body. A fine red rash is often seen and in more chronic skin allergies hard, thick plaques appear and may last for

weeks to years. With some allergic reactions the patient's lips may swell, eyelinds swell, and even his joints may become swollen and painful. These allergic manifestations may be caused by foods, medicines, many things that one comes in contact with such as soap, make-up, certain materials, the dyes

used in cloth, perfumes, plants, jewelry, and chemicals.

The diagnosis of the cause of the given allergy is made by a careful history or by allergy tests done on the patient's skin or on his blood. Diagnosis may be extremely difficult.

Treatment of the allergic reaction depends on the type of reaction and the cause. Some causes can be eliminated or avoided. Other causes can be treated by desensitization (shots to increase the body resistance). And the offending substance). Many drugs are used to control the symptoms of the p, individual patient.

Ask any group of people, excepting clergymen or Bible students, how often - if at all - the word 'Easter' appears in the Bible, and you will hear surprising answers. Replies will range from - "I'm not sure" ... "I don't know" ... "I think several times in the New Testament" .. etc.. Actually, - and this may surpise you, the word 'Easter' is mentioned only once.. but NOT in connection with Christianity's Easter or he resurrection.

How then did the word originate? This question too has a somewhat surprising answer. People in past ages worshipped many gods or goddesses; a god for this and god for that. Among these gods was named Eastre; worshipped as the Goddess of Spring. Because Christ's resurrection occured during the Jewish Passover [a Spring Festival], early churchmen chose the word Easter to commemorate His resurrection.

Easter customs, coloring eggs, feasting to celebrate the coming of spring, putting on a new bonnet and dressing in pretty clothes; all these and other customs date back to the B.C. era...One of the nicest customs is this - and we're glad to participate in it when we say - "Happy Easter to you".




