Trial For Garcia Murder Case Defendants To Begin March 30

Rulings on some 50 motions, covering a variety of subjects, were expected to be rendered by the 91st District Court this week after the end of a pre-trial hearing Monday for four defendants in the Debra Garcia murder case.

The pre-trial hearing was presided over by Judge Jim Wright of the 91st Court with the exception of motions that affected the court and these were heard by District Judge James Morgan of Comanche's 220th Court.

Judge Morgan ruled on a defense motion that Bill Hart, special prosecutor, and Judge Wright be barred from the case. He denied the motion. The other motions covered the speedy trial law along with an assortment of other matters. Attorneys expected rulings to be com-

There is going to be a Rattlesnake Hunt Breckenridge on Saturday and Sunday, March 21 and 22 sponsored by the Breckenridge Kiwanis Club. Anyone who might be planning on hunting snakes this year might want to read the following facts concerning rattlesnakes before setting out on the hunt. The information is supplied by the Sweetwater Jaycees Rattlesnake Round-up each year.

The questions and answers supplied by the Sweetwater group are as follow:

How long do rattlesnakes -The oldest on record, in

captivity, is 26 years old. How long do rattlesnakes

-The longest turned in at the Sweetwater Round-Up was 74 inches. The longest recorded is 84 inches.

-They are born alive in lit-

ters of 8 to 16 babies. They are capable of biting at

birth. Are big rattlesnakes more

-Big snakes have larger quantities of venom, but drop for drop the newborn's venom is more concen-

Do rattlesnakes return to the same den each year? -Usually they do, but if the

den is damaged, or they are caught in a cold spell they will den at the closest place. How far can a rattlesnake strike?

-As a rule, it is about onehalf their length. What happens if a rat-tlesnake looses a fang?

What are some enemies of the rattlesnake?

-Besides man, they include: hawks, owls, roadrunners and kingsnakes.

When one rattlesnake bites another is there any ill ef--Rattlesnakes are quite

resistant to venoins of their own species. Cause of death would not be from venom, but from a fang puncturing a vital organ.

Do rattlesnakes always sound a warning with their rattles before striking?

-Rattlesnakes need not rattle before striking and do not do so before striking

Can you tell the age of a rattlesnake by counting it rattles?

-Rattlesnakes acquire a new segment of the rattle each time they shed. The frequency of shedding varies with the snake and how fast it is growing and how well it is feeding. A rattlesnake may shed four to eight times a year. Therefore it is not possible to determine age by counting rattles.

Does a rattlesnake have to be coiled to strike?

-Any venomous snake can strike or bite from any posi-

Are rattlesnakes slimy? -The skin of a rattlesnake is dry to the touch, as is the case with all reptiles.

What do rattlesnakes eat? -The most common food is rodents (mice and rats) but they will also eat birds.

The four defendants, all charged with the 1981 murder case, and their attorneys are: Brenda Gail Andrews, Butler and Gray, Georgetown; Richard Hinton, by Saul Pullman; Pat Starr, by Keith Woodley; and, Joe Thomas Perry, by Leslie Vance.

trained by the Internal Revenue Service, will be staffing counseling sites in the Senior Citizen Centers of Cisco, Eastland, Ranger, Gorman, and Clyde from Feb. 1 through April 15. Walter Knowlden, coor-

dinator for the Tax-Aide Program, said the service is designed to help the older persons and also taxpayers who are unable to afford professional advice and to help them understand income tax forms and to become familiar with special

The counselors, many who have been in the Tax-Aide Program for several years, receive 40 hours of training by the IRS each year and are trained on all the new income tax changes.

According to Mr. Knowlden, past experience has indicated that many older persons are unaware of special benefits they are entitle to claim and are paying more than they are required to pay. Some may not even be required to file a return because of limited income.

Taxpayers using the service should bring copies of their previous year's returns and their forms for the current year. They should also bring with them all their W-2 and W-2P forms with all their 1099 forms regarding income received, including their 1099 SSA from Social Security. They sould also



To Cities

AUSTIN--State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$1,343,538 to 95 cities and 66 counties out of the 119 cities and 71 counties that have legalized charity bingo and levy the two-percent local gross receipts tax on the game.

Net payment to Eastland county for bingo tax amounted to \$384.39, up 372.6 per cent from the same period last year of \$81.34.

Among the counties receiving Friday's payment, Dallas County received the largest check, totaling \$123,406. Harris County's check was for \$105,878. Tarrant County received \$103,193 and Bexar County was sent a check for \$72,651.

The city of Dallas received the largest check among cities which levy the bingo tax, for \$87,837. The city of San Antonio's payment was for \$57,692. Fort Worth received a check for \$57,664 and Houston's check was for

Allocations less than \$100 during the first three periods were retained until the cumulative payment reaches \$100, or until the fourth quarter returns are allocated in the next calen-

As of Friday a total of 1,576 non-profit organizations were licensed to hold bingo games in Texas.
