Lela Lloyd Receives An Award For Hilton Book

Lela Latch Lloyd, Cisco teacher and author, has received notification from the Delta Kappa Gamma Society of a state award for her book "Cradle of Hilton's Empire."

A formal presentation of the Award Certificate will be made at the Alpha (Texas) State Birthday Luncheon on Friday, June 19, at the State Convention in Dallas. Mrs. Lloyd plans to be present for the event.

Mary Ann Waldon, the Alpha State Chairman of this International Society of Teachers, informed Lela Lloyd by letter of the honor. Mrs. Lloyd has been a member of Delta Kappa Gamma for a number of

years. The Cisco Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, Beta Upsilon, recommended "Cradle of Hilton's Empire" to the state organization. The letter of recommendation for this historical book was written by Louise Taylor. June Hicks is president of the local chapter.

Mrs. Lloyd's book tells of the era when Conrad Hilton and a partner bought and operated the Mobley Hotel. The book also gives some other Cisco history.

It was published last fall, and first presented to the public in the Mobley-Hilton Hotel on Dedication Day of the restored building October 13, 1986.

Defense Calls Witnesses In Crime Trial

Defense Attorneys Woodley, Gray and Pullman began calling witnesses Monday in the Organized Crime Trial in 91st District Court with allegations and accusations heating up the case.

On trial for the abduction-murder of Debra Garcia of Cisco are Pat Starr, Brenda Andrews and Richard Hinton. At least two others are expected to be tried later. Charles LeFlore and his brother, Thomas Le Flore

were convicted of the crime in 1982 and 1983, and are serving lengthy terms in prison.

Special Prosecutor Bill Hart rested his case against the three defendants last Friday. Toward the end of that

day's testimony Bobby Laird, a jail trusty at the Eastland County Jail, alleged that the District Attorney

Emory Walton had been bribed in the case.

Buddy Haun Retires After 38 Years

R.P. (Buddy) Haun, R.P. (Buddy) Haun, Supervising Resident Engineer of Eastland, Stephens and Comanche Counties for the Texas Highway Department took early retirement on May 31, 1987 after 38 years of service.

Buddy was born and attended public schools in Coleman, Texas graduating from High School there in 1944 and entering Texas A&M on the Tri-Semester wartime schedule.

He enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps in 1945 and served until August, 1946. After discharge, he re-entered A&M graduating in June, 1949 with a B.S. degree

in Civil Engineering and started to work with the Highway Department Engineer's office in Comanche, Texas.

In October, 1950 Buddy was re-called to duty and received his Commission in the Marine Corps for the Korean Conflict where he took part in the Punchbowl and Bunker Hill campaigns during the first Chinese Winter Offensive. He served as Company Commander "B" Co., 1st Engr. Bn., 1st Marine Division.

Upon release from active duty, he returned to Comanche and married the Coleman High School Home Economics teacher, Imogene Newton. In June of

1954 Imogene and Buddy moved to Eastland where he began work on the design and construction of the Interstate System across Eastland County.

In 1960 he assumed responsibility for Eastland County as the Supervising Resident Engineer. Later his area was expanded to include Stephens and Comanche Counties.

His future plans are to work primarily as a surfacing and asphaltic concrete pavement Consultant with Justin Industries and various Contractors.

The Hauns have two children, Ann Folsom and Brian Haun and one grandchild, Gardner Folsom.

article printed in the Abilene Reporter News last Saturday morning.

He expressed the opinion that District Attorney Emory Walton should be held in contempt of court for giving statements to a reporter for this paper. he

reviewed the "gag order" on courthouse personnel. Judge Fitts did not cite Walton, saying that he could not hold a witness until they have been instructed.

The Defense Attorneys then joined in a motion for a mistrial, citing lack of evidence. This was overruled by Judge Fitts.

The jury was brought in at 10 a.m., Monday, but stayed only a few moments. This happened more than once that morning.

David Cunningham, once employed by Attorney Hart as a private investigator in the Garcia case, was called to the witness stand. After considerable discussion as to the value of the testimony of Cunningham, the Investigator was allowed to review his files before testifying.

Monday afternoon continued with witnesses and sometimes detailed proceedings. Johnnie Morren, who was Eastland County Sheriff at the time of the 1981 crime, said that defendant Pat Starr was at his home when Morren talked to Pat's mother, Thelma Starr Sellers, at about 7 a.m. on Nov. 29, 1981, the morning Debra Garcia disappeared.

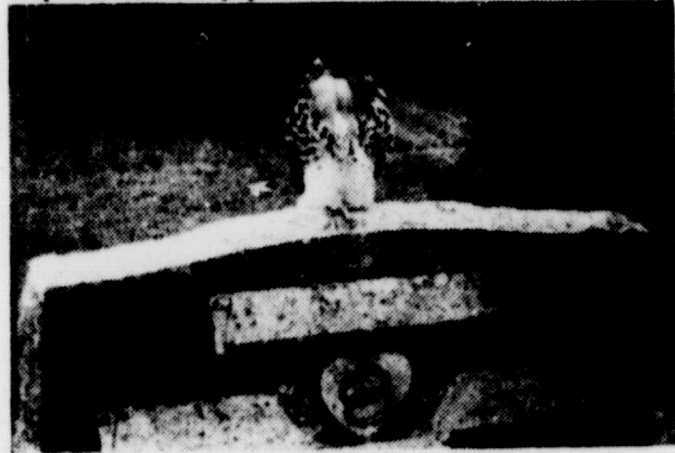
During a break in Morren's testimony Judge Fitts admonished Starr's lawyer, Keith Woodley, for a remark he shouted at Hart.

More witnesses were on the stand Tuesday morning. Marie Starr, a sister-in-law of Thelma Sellers, testified as to times she saw her nephew Pat during several days at the time of the Garcia abduction.

Donald Boyd of Cisco, manager of the Pitt Grill at the time, testified that Thelma Sellers and son Pat were in the Restaurant eating breakfast about 8:30 a.m. on Nov. 29, 1981.

"Johnnie Morren had talked to her - she was to keep her eyes and ears open," Boyd said.

At press time Tuesday other testimony was being given by Bill Pence, retired Eastland County Deputy and jailer. He recalled that when he heard of Debra Garcia's disappearance, and how he

Parents--Be Alert!!

According to police authorities, a form of tattoo called "Blue Star" is readily available in some areas of the United States. It is a small sheet of white paper containing the blue stars the size of a pencil eraser; each "star" is impregnated with LSD and can be removed from the paper to be placed in the mouth. Absorption can occur through the skin also simply by handling the paper tattoo. There are also brightly colored paper tabs resembling postage stamps in size, which have pictures of Superman, Mickey Mouse, and other Disney characters, butterflies, clowns, etc. These stamps are packed in a red cardboard box with a picture of Mickey Mouse wrapped in foil in a clear lock-type bag. This package contains five one-inch square stamps. This is a new way of selling acid, designed to promote more addicts through appeal and enslavement of children to its addiction.

A young child could happen upon these and have a

fatal "trip". It is also learned that little children could be given a free "tattoo" by older children who want to have some fun or by others cultivating new customers.

A red stamp called "Red Pyramid" is being distributed, along with "Micro-dots" in various colors, as small as a pinhead, and another kind called "Window Pane"; which has a grid that can be cut out. These are all laced with drugs.

If you or your children see any of the above described, DO NOT HANDLE! These drugs are known to react very quickly into your body and some are laced with strychnine. Symptoms are hallucination, mood change, and severe vomiting. Get to the hospital as soon as possible, and notify the police.

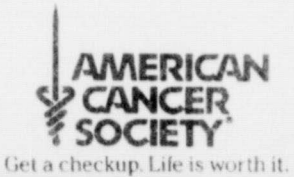

County Included in \$300 Million Highway Improvement Program

BROWNWOOD-A \$300 million program to improve roadways throughout Texas was approved at the May meeting of the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission. The program includes 325 project covering more than 1,600 miles of highways, said Raymond Stotzer, Engineer-Director for the highway department.

About 140 of the project involve upgrading roadways to current standards, Stotzer said. Other projects include resurfacing, repair work, and some safety improvements. The majority of the projects will go to contract during the next 21 months.

In Eastland County, a project to rehabilitate the surface of selected ramps on Interstate 20 from the Callahan County line to near FM 570 has been included in the program.

Bryan Neaves of Eastland will be the Highway Department resident manager in charge of the project.

'23 Murder Trial Set Records

A murder trial in Eastland County 64 years ago set at that time and concluded with a guilty verdict and death sentence.

Judge E.A. Hill of the now-abandoned 88th District Court read the verdict at 12:07 a.m., after the case went to the jury at 8:50 p.m. on a Saturday. It was the second time in the history of the county that the death penalty had been assessed. The first case, several years earlier, resulted in a new trial being granted, and the punishment was made 99 years.

The second death-sentence case, described in detail in a Nov. 4, 1923 issue of the Eastland Oil Belt News, had a somewhat different ending.

According to a local citizen who supplied the old newspaper, said that this defendant later had his sentence commuted to life, served four years, escaped and so far as is known, was never heard from again around here.

The Oil Belt News described the case as establishing a record for the number of witnesses—63; for the time required to present the evidence—three and a half days and three night sessions; and for the great attendance throughout.

There are many family names in the account of the trial: Senator Joe Burkett, special prosecutor; Assistant County Attorney Gilvie Hubbard; Defense Attorney T.J. Cunningham; Sheriff Barton, Deputy Sheriff Jamison, and Policeman Spahr and Graham.

"Elzo Been, another special prosecutor, made the opening address, in which he outlined the State's case forcibly and eloquently.

He reached emotional heights and brought tears to the eyes not only of relatives (the murder victim), but to the eyes of member of the audience. He spoke in part as follows: (and thereafter three columns of solid type quoting his opening remarks complete.)

"In concluding, Mr. Been asked the death penalty, denouncing the murder as being without extenuating circumstances.

"Let (the defendant) pay the penalty with his life. We promise him that when the paring comes, his loved

ones will be allowed to be near—though (the victim) was murdered with no one near at the last moments. We promise (the defendant) a better resting place than the one he provided for (the victim)" — lifting up the twisted piece of barbed wire found near the victim's body. "We promise (the defendant) a better resting place than the one he provided for the victim — a trench in a lonely thicket far from home and family, where wolves prowled and snakes hissed and there the body lay smoldering away for seven long months."

"Defense Counsel Cunningham then addressed the jury. He was followed by County Attorney Barnes who spoke forcibly 45 minutes.

"Another defense counsel, Judge B.D. Shropshire, who made a strong battle throughout the trial

delivered a powerful plea for the defendant.

In this case, the victim's body had been found in another county, and the jury was admonished to return a "not guilty" verdict unless they each and every one were convinced that the murder had occurred in Eastland County.

"It is probably the most dramatic case in the annals of Eastland County and in some respects without a parallel in the history of the State. The evidence relied upon by the State was entirely circumstantial but the prosecution did not hesitate to ask the death penalty. The defense sought to shift the shadow of suspicion on the shoulders of the defendant's brother, and the brother's testimony was one of the main links in the chain of State's evidence."

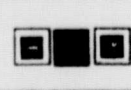

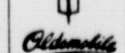

I've Been Wrong Before

I went to Dallas and took a friend to the area Palestinians' celebration of Land Day. For several years now they gather in whatever place they are and begin with a minute of silent memorial to the first six martyrs for the land. Those six entered their own land and refused to leave when ordered upon which they, unarmed and unresisting except for the clinging to their inherited soil were killed in cold blood by Israeli security forces. Each year since then more resisters are killed. Still they cling to the ever smaller portion they have left.

Why don't they leave the land of oppression and let Zionist Jews have it?

To where pray tell? To other Arab countries, some say quite simply. But in Jordan they already nearly outnumber Jordanians and are considered a threat by sheer numbers to the government of the Hashemite king. Maybe to Lebanon? There they have been repeatedly slaughtered by "Christians", Israeli raids and Shiite militias. Better to be buried in their native soil. At least the "wet-back" can go back to where he came from but once a Palestinian yields to Zionist persecution he can not change his mind. So a small group gathered in Dallas as in many places to pledge again their love for a soil many have never even been permitted to set foot on and to collect the small financial contributions they make in solidarity with those who still retain a foothold. Always they dream of that nation with land of their own.

So I join them in their moment of silent remembrance and listen to music made on strange instruments with songs and speeches I do not understand. But this one thing I do understand, the love of one's own soil. As certainly as I speak the same language as in England, Canada, or Australia I would fight anyone who tried to deport me to there because this land once belonged to Indians.

The nutrients of which my body was made grew from this land and to it they should return and the spirit will belong here regardless of where the body lies.

A man who doesn't love the land is unworthy of even the six foot of it his miserable carcass might occupy but one who loves his soil and his own people honors any spot on Earth where he might be fallen.

So much did a Palestinian value my friendship that he spent a day and night in vigil at the hospital and in comforting my folks. I have other valued friends but he ranks with the best. He is on the PLO, was democratically elected to their national council to represent his people living in Southwestern U.S. He is not a freedom fighter with an automatic rifle but fights in his own way with heart and mind to provide food for the starving victims of siege, artificial limbs for maimed children, and education for the deprived ones. No headliner, no wild eyed terrorist the media love to project but like the vast majority of his people, an honest, tender-hearted human being. Yes, but above all he is PLO and very very proud to call himself Palestinian.

In this world of compromise, pragmatism, situation ethics, and self center it would be honor for me if I too could be numbered with the steadfast. I believe the Arabic word is SAMED.

Now the bad news: Zionists trying to still the small voices of accusation in America have conspired with FBI, Los Angeles police and Immigration and Naturalization Service to arrest eight Palestinians and one Kenyan wife in a thinly disguised attempt to intimidate others. But if they go unchallenged they obviously intend to go further. One young woman so roughly treated is an American citizen, having lived here 19 years. Is it for the likes of her (a college student) that INS plans for internment camps resembling those for WW II Japanese-Americans are actually being implemented?

The "antiterrorist" planning does much resemble plans formulated long before Pearl Harbor to intern Japanese-Americans. The media build-up is similar. Never mind that the greatest number of terrorist incidents in the US can only be attributed to Jewish extremists. Arabs are targeted for internment. Are we actually ready for CONCENTRATION CAMPS IN THE USA?

Sure we are because though you read and think "Heaven forbid" you will never protest to anyone in Washington. It has well been said, "All that evil needs to triumph is for good men to remain silent."

Could I also be interned? Yes, for once people with pseudo-religious reasons encourage the weed of injustice it can take the whole garden. Be not deceived, injustice has been and is being done. But as Henry David Thoreau indicated, in times of injustice the disgrace is not being in prison but rather in remaining outside.

The deadline for submitting family stories to be included in the new Eastland County Book has been extended through June 30, 1987 according to Ron Bailey, County Coordinator.

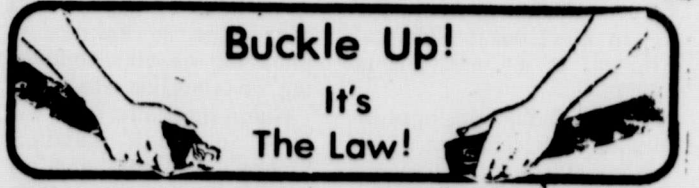

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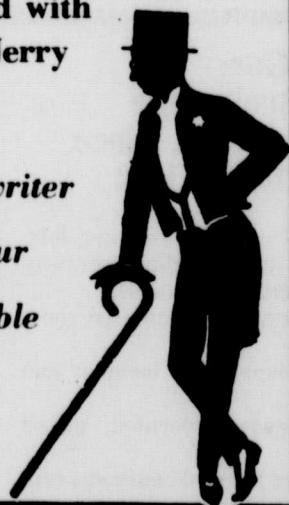
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People n Things

THE SPRING 1987 issue of Cross Timbers Review published by Cisco Junior College has an interesting little item by Prof Wesley Valek about Callahan County's Mystery Buildings. We quote Wesley's piece as follows:

"Known to locals as the 'Spanish building,' two stone structures, located east of Putnam, have defied identification since the first Anglos came to the area more than a century ago. They were old when my father came here in 1888," Mrs. Laura Jobe told Dr. Duane Hale, (former Ciscoan interested in historical things) in an interview in 1972.

"The buildings, approximately one mile apart, are identical in construction and size: 13 feet long, eight feet wide and eight feet high. The floor is two feet below ground level and each building has a three-foot by six-foot door. At the rear of each is an 18x18-inch window. There is no evidence of a fireplace or smokehole. The remains of a stone corral and cistern are easily seen near one of the structures.

"Since the Spanish were actively searching for gold and silver as far north as Brown County in the late 18th century, speculation has been that the structures were built by the Spanish, but for what purpose? Since the building were militarily indefensible, too remote for storage purposes, too elaborate for miners or mustangers, one can only

wonder: Quien sabe?" Dr. Ken Hammes, head of the English department, has a drawing of one of the buildings on the same page. The new issue, like the others, has a number of excellent articles, poetry and the like. Dr. Monte Lewis, CJC prof, is editor of the Review.

THE SUNDAY issue of the Abilene newspaper carried an interesting article about the jail at Baird in Callahan County. It is the oldest in Texas, the story says, and the jail standards commission is about to close it down as it violates the civil rights of inmates (no real modern plumbing or air conditioning, no television, etc.). Guess the Baird folks will have to follow Eastland County's example and lay out several hundred thousand dollars to build a jail that will satisfy the whims of federal judges.

IF YOU MISSED the current Hilton Dinner Theater offering of "I Do, I Do" last weekend, you're in luck. It's playing again this coming Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights with the de luxe dinner plus a dessert only performance on June 3rd at 8 p.m.

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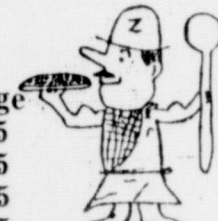
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
