Cisco Junior College Payroll Is Largest In Eastland County

The payroll of Cisco Junior College - \$1,706,055 for the current year - is the largest in Cisco and probably in Eastland County, President L. D. Woolley of the board of regents told the group at their regular monthly meeting last Monday night.

Ralph Glenn, vice president and business manager, revealed the payroll figures in the monthly financial statement to the board. The payroll amounts to \$142,000 month.

In addition to the \$1,706,055 per year in Cisco, the college has a substantial payroll in Abilene for their campus there and for Clyde for the third campus. The Abilene payroll amounts to \$43,000 per month or \$516,177 for the current year, while that in Clyde is \$5,963 per month or \$71,558 per year.

In other action, the board awarded contracts for repair and remodeling projects to be done during the summer. Contracts were awarded low bidders as follows:

Microplex, Eastland, Cluck Hall roofing, \$5,900.

Charles Hatten Roofing, Cisco, roofing work at the ag building, \$3,900.

J&J Air Condition Co., Eastland, air conditioning Schaefer Hall, \$13,500.

J&J Air Condition Co., Eastland, Fine Arts Building duct work, \$500; and new electric facilities in gym, \$750.

Pitzer Products, Kansas, repair work on gym floor, \$10,250.

Taylor Publishing Co., Dallas, printing 1987-88 year book, \$9,457.

The various projects will be paid for with money from the college's contingency fund, Dr. Henry E. McCullough, college president, reported.

The board heard a report on the recent Mexico trip by the CJC Band and Belles from Chairman Wyley Peebles of the music department. The resignation of Mrs. Jerry Toland, effective May 31, was accepted. Her

resignation had been previously announced.

Debora Robinson, wife of Science Instructor Robbie Robinson, was employed as a counsellor to fill a vacancy. She has been working as a counsellor in the Eastland schools for several years. Mrs. Robinson holds an associate of arts degree from CJC, a bachelor's degree from H-SU, and a master's degree from Tarleton.

The board approved plans to advertise for the purchase of a 15-passenger van at the July 13th meeting. It was decided that the broken windows at the Laguna Hotel will be replaced.

Dean Madison, recently appointed to the board to fill a vacancy after the death of J. D. Yardley, was sworn in by President Woolley, who

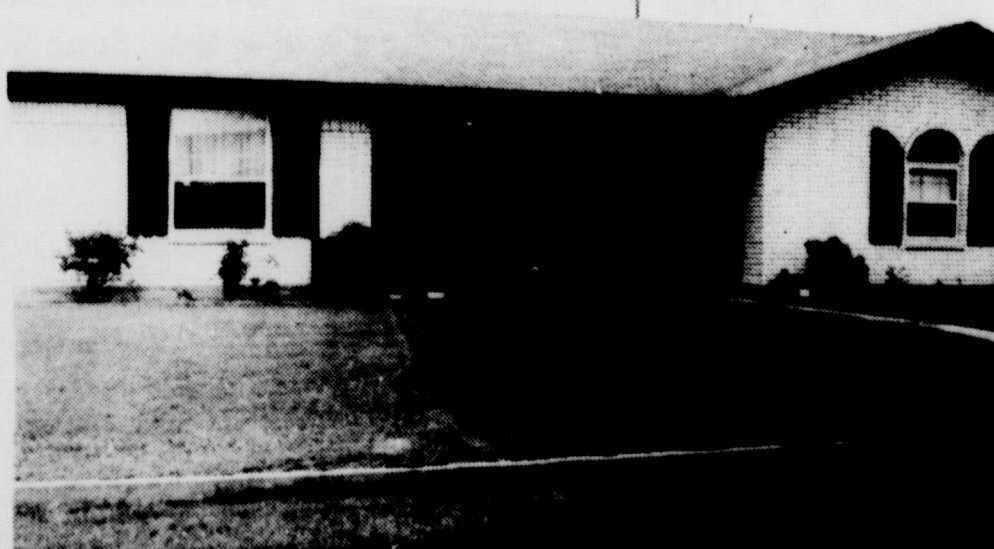
The money raised at this benefit supper will be used to buy emergency equipment for the rescue unit and regular fire fighting equipment for the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department.

Warrants Issued For Two Of Three Armed Burglars

Two suspects have been identified and investigators are still seeking the identification of a third responsible for the Wednesday armed robbery at Beskow Jewelry store in Eastland.

According to the Beskows (Charles and Billie), they were in the process of closing the store for business that day when the trio entered the store and asked to look at some expensive jewelry.

One of the two men drew a pistol and shoved the Beskows to the back where they were bound and gagged and pushed behind the drapes that separate the store areas.

The woman then proceeded to clean out the display case that contained the diamond jewelry and took items from several of the other cases before they left the store.

The robbery took place around 4:30 p.m. and after freeing themselves, the Beskows notified the police, and a bulletin was issued for a watch for the two young males and one female, described as 'very dirty', and armed with a small caliber pistol.

A man seeking a parking place in the area at about the time the trio fled the scene, told police investigators that he saw three people that possibly fit the description. He stated that they left in a brown colored car, possibly an Oldsmobile.

After further investigation it was determined that the suspects had purchased the pistol that day from a local pawn shop. The sales ticket, which contained identification from the drivers license, was used to produce information from the Abilene

Police Department that included photos of a white male, 5'8", 150 lbs. with brown hair and eyes, and that of a white female, 5'6", 145 lbs. blue eyes and blond hair. The two have been positively identified by the photos by the Beskows, a salesman at the pawn shop and by an Olden man who said the three stopped near his home about 5:15-5:30

p.m. with a flat. Police later discovered empty jewelry boxes stashed in the man's garage. The man stated that the suspects told him they were on their way to Fort Worth.

Warrants for Charles Frank Snelson, 26, and Debra Caren Taylor, aka Deveraux Wilson, 26, were issued early Thursday afternoon and bulletins were sent to the Dallas-Ft. Worth area and to the Abilene area where the pair are supposedly from.

According to Charles Beskow, a confined amount of loss is not available but said the amount was "sizeable". One loose diamond that was taken was reportedly valued at \$3,000.

The third suspect that police are searching for i.d. on is described as about the same size as Snelson. Both men wore beards during the robbery.

Cisco police are investigating a house break-in and a storage building robbery, Chief Billy Rains reported Friday.

The residence owned by Patricia Swiney of Howell, Michigan, at 701 West 17th Street in Cisco was damaged when the back door was broken open, Mrs. Swiney reported Thursday. Nothing was missing but damages to property amounted to some \$150. Policeman Chris Key took the report.

Betty Clapp of 606 West 9th Street reported Thursday that a storage building back of her home had been burglarized sometime after June 8th and that hand tools valued at some \$250 were missing. Police Sgt. Frank Thumsden was directing an investigation.

Mr. Rains reported the arrest of Thomas B. Smart of Cisco Thursday on a warrant from the sheriff's department at Albany on a felony charge of hindering a secured creditor. Policeman Larry Weikel took him to the county jail in Eastland and Albany authorities took custody later in the day, the chief said.

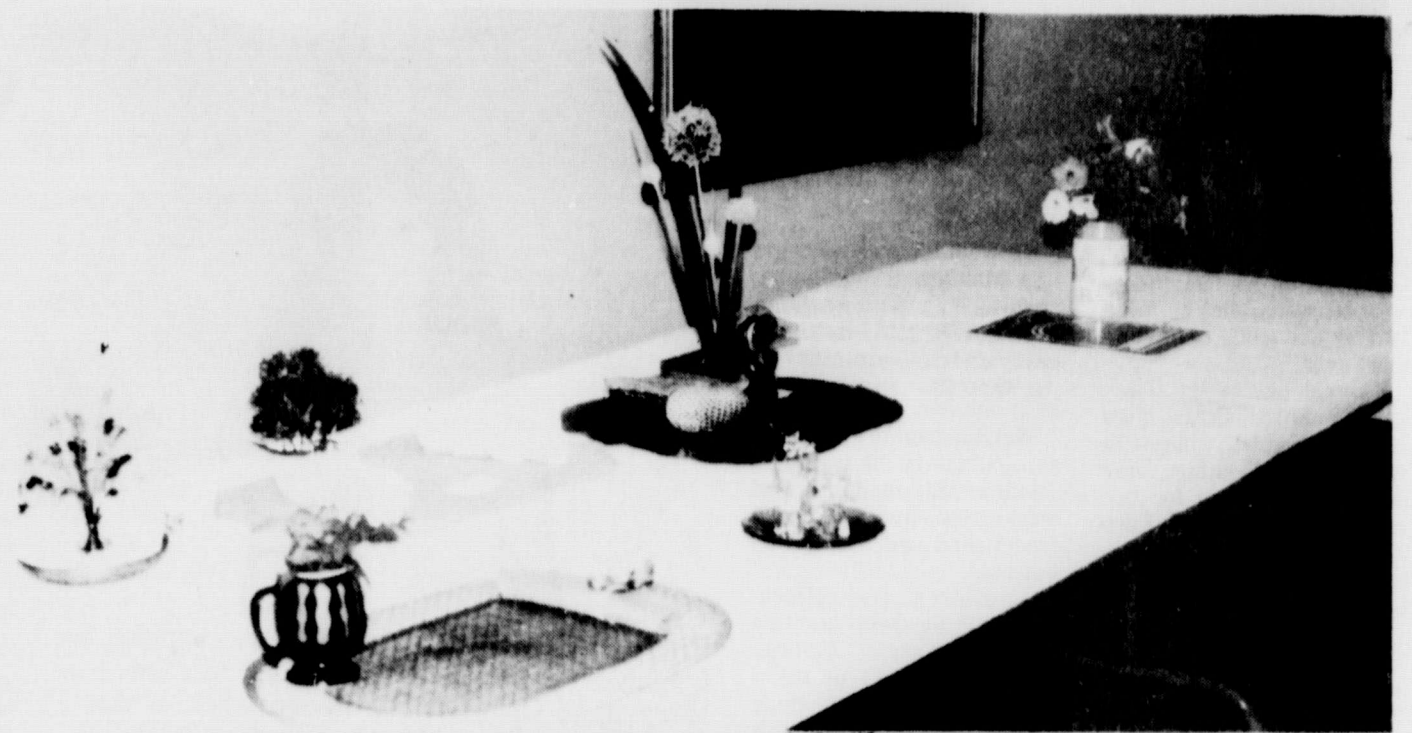

This year the 4th of July celebration in Cisco will be the best ever according to Ivan Webb, board member of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce committee.

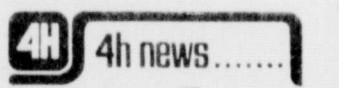

The Little Miss Cisco Pageants will also highlight the day. The pageant will begin at 7:00 p.m., at the Pavillion in City Park.

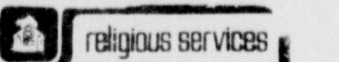
And to top off the day, the Cisco Chamber of Commerce is working hard to provide the fireworks display that will end the days activities.

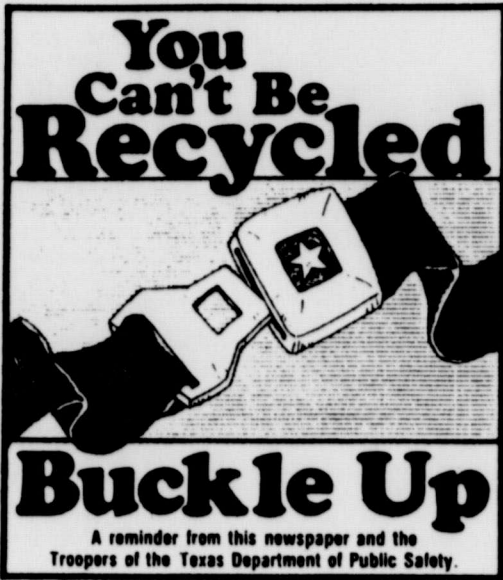

Winning By Losing - 'Fit For Life' Style

COLLEGE STATION--Weight control is a concern of many Texans, who realize that they can win by losing.

Since 1985, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has helped more than 3,000 Texans control their weight and improve their overall fitness and eating habits through a comprehensive 12-week educational weight control program called "Fit For Life."

"The goal of any successful weight control program is not only to lose weight but also to maintain long-term, permanent weight control," explain Dr. Mary Ann Heussner, health education specialist, and Dr. Alice E. Hunt, nutrition specialist, both with the Extension Service. After the lesson series, those taking part had lost an average of 4 pounds for a total of 12,000 pounds—or six tons!

A follow-up survey with participants of the "Fit For Life" program showed that they not only maintained weight loss but continued to lose an additional 3.7 pounds each and 5.6 percent of body fat one year after completing the program, the specialists add.

Heussner and Hunt note that although Americans spend billions on weight loss programs, most of those who lose weight gain it back within a few months.

The "Fit For Life" program not only helps individuals and their families

lose weight and keep it off, the lesson series also focuses on control of blood pressure, follow dietary guidelines, improving cardiovascular fitness and increasing flexibility.

"The improvements in health and fitness equate to improved economic health for Texas," the specialists emphasize.

"Good eating and exercise habits are critical to the control of obesity. In addition, obesity is a risk factor for at least 5 of the 10 leading chronic diseases which account for the majority of health and medical dollars. Controlling weight and improving fitness reduces the risk health problems," says Hunt and Heussner.

Since cost of health care is one of the major financial concerns of families today, the Extension Service began a two-year research study in 1984 which involved 50 counties throughout Texas. Extension health and nutrition specialists developed the 12-week weight control lesson series incorporating research-based nutrition, exercise and behavior modification principles.

These Extension specialists in turn trained county Extension agents to conduct the lesson series throughout the state. The impact of the weight control and fitness program was evaluated by measuring changes in body weight, per-

cent body fat, flexibility, muscular strength and endurance, and cardiovascular fitness. At the end of the 12-week program, participants had achieved statistically significant improvements in these fitness areas.

"Success of the program is based on making small, practical, easily adopted changes in exercise and eating habits, which add up to lifelong weight control," the specialists say.

They note that economic implications of being overweight and under fit can be severe. Obesity, they explain, increases the chances that employees will suffer from back pain, and backaches account for 93 million lost workdays in the nation annually. Additionally, people who are 40 percent overweight visit their doctors and miss work twice as often as the average individual, and this costs employers an extra \$1,000 per year for each such overweight worker.

Heussner and Hunt say that nationally business and industry spent \$97 billion for health care in 1984, while that same year \$387 billion—or \$1,584 per capita or roughly 12 percent of the Gross National Product—was spent across the nation on health and medical care. It took \$23 billion to cover health and medical costs of Texans that year, they add.

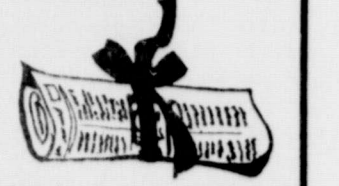
"By the year 2000 health

and medical care costs are estimated to be about \$4,000 per capita, which means that the bills for Texans will skyrocket to \$92 billion. That's why good eating and exercise habits are critical to the control of obesity and its many associated health problems," the specialist says.

Delta Kappa Gamma To Hold State Convention

Over one thousand key women educators in Texas have already registered for the 58th annual state convention of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International.

The four-day convention of the members of Alpha State, Texas, will begin Wednesday, June 17, and is scheduled for The Registry Hotel in Dallas.

Three members plan to attend the convention from Eastland and Callahan Counties.

Dr. Theresa Fechek, newly elected international executive director of the society, will conduct a workshop on society concerns to open the convention.

A series of committee and special interest workshops will take place throughout the convention. In addition, a memorial service will honor those members who died since last meeting. Olive B. Schaefer, Rising Star, will be remembered.

A special presentation will feature the 295 Texas chapter presidents on Friday evening in a program entitled "Stairway to the Stars." June Hicks, Carbon, will be Beta Upsilon's president recognized.

Other special events will include the Women in the Arts exhibit featuring original works of art to be judged, with first place winning exhibits to be displayed at the Southwest Regional Conference of the Society in Denver in mid-July.

In addition, several members will receive the State Achievement Award for service to the state. Lela Lloyd, Cisco, will receive "Women Writers in Print" Award. Members joining over fifty years ago. Mrs. Vernon Johnson, formerly of Eastland, now of Fort Worth, and Miss Louis Snoddy, formerly of Cisco, now of Waco will be honored, as will honorary members of both chapters in state. Mrs. Joseph Perkins, a state honorary member, from Eastland will be recognized during the birthday luncheon.

During the executive session, members will vote on a slate of officers for the biennium beginning July 1. The convention will close with the installation of new officers during the final banquet designed to honor presidents and founders. A reception following the banquet will honor incoming and retiring officers and committee chairmen. Ruby Lee Pirtle of Cisco will also attend.

Delta Kappa Gamma was chartered in Austin on May 29, 1929 with a dozen teachers from selected areas of the state. It has since

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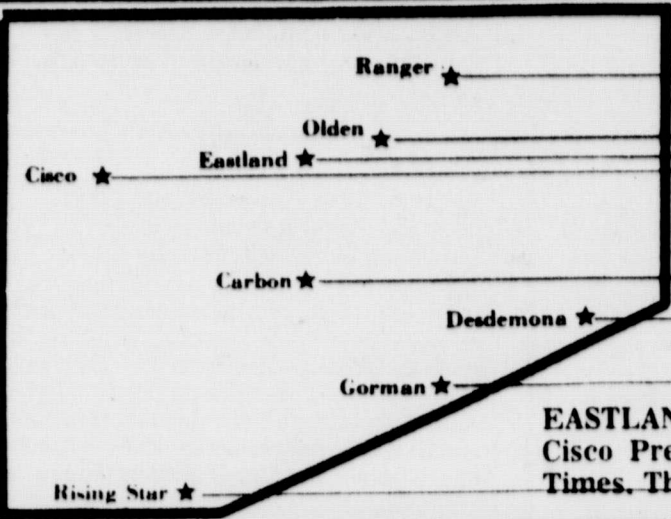

Monsoon-type rains continued to push across Eastland County this week, due to a Gulf low overriding a stationary cold front.
Although most the rains were light, the thunder-showers Wednesday afternoon were accompanied by heavy downpours, thunder and lightning. Rising Star reported 2 and one-half inches that afternoon.
Thursday brought rains from the south, with Gorman reporting rainfall almost all day long. At mid-afternoon a tornado was sighted in the clouds around Abilene, but

similar sightings were reported in Eastland County.
Ron Bailey, head of the ASCS office in Eastland, reports that it has been raining since May 14 - almost a month. More than 21 inches have already fallen for the year, with 27 inches supposed to be the average total for a whole year.
"It's a hard year for the peanut farmer," Bailey says, "but a great year for grass. There have been a lot of new grass plantings in the county, and all are doing well. A number of pastures have been sprigged in

Coastal Bermuda, and planted in Klinegrass.
"There is a promising new type of Love Grass being tried," the Soil Conservationist says. "This is called Wilman Love Grass, and is highly palatable."
DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent, also remarks on the month-long rainfall.
"There have been at least 15 inches in all parts of the county since May 14," he says. "It has become really detrimental to the peanut farmer. Most of them haven't been able to get in their fields since the rains

started.
"The ideal date for planting the Florarunner peanuts is June 1, since they take 140 days to mature. The Spanish peanut takes 110-120 days.
"Close to 60 percent of the peanut crops in the county are the Florarunners, but I suppose some of the farmers will change over this time."
About 15 percent of the farmers had already planted before the rains started in mid-May, Gordon says. These are doing fairly well where they haven't drowned out or been away by high water.

June 10 was the final date that peanuts had to be planted to be eligible for crop insurance, the County Agents notes.
"As far as I know, that date has not been extended," he says.
Some of the hay in the county needs cutting right now, Gordon remarks, but it is too wet to get in the fields. He still expects a bumper crop, however, for there is enough moisture to make several cuttings.
"It's a good year for the cattlemen," he says. "The main problem now is to get the peanut crop in."

TEXAS HEALTH NEWS AND VIEWS

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I read the other day that the bathroom was a poor place to store pills. Where should they be stored?
ANSWER: According to Arthur I. Jackowitz, doctor of pharmacy, of West Virginia University, writing in the U.S. Pharmacist, heat and moisture generated by steam from your bath or shower could cause your drugs to spoil or lose their effectiveness. Instead, he says, store them (except those that specifically require refrigeration) at room temperature in a dry place such as the linen closet, bedroom or kitchen cabinet - away from heat and strong light and certainly out of reach of children.
QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I read where older people are more likely to experience pain than younger people. Is this true?
ANSWER: A recent national survey, conducted by

Louis Harris and Associates, says no. It revealed that younger people are more likely to suffer from headaches, backaches, stomach aches, muscle pains and dental pain. Joint pain is the only isolated pain that is a primary late-life phenomenon, with 71 percent of older people experiencing it, compared with only 41 percent of younger people. As a personal thought: it is suspected the older person has experienced pain of such magnitude that when there is lesser pain it is overlooked or perhaps pain relievers react more quickly for some older person.

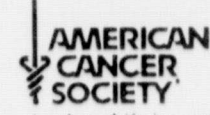

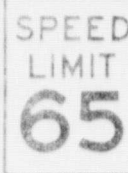

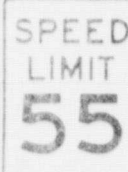

Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

Over 15 inches of rain in the last 30 days has caused a lot of problems. This period of time is normally the peak peanut planting time. There have been only a few days within the last 30 that peanut growers could do any work in the fields. Runner type peanuts planted now will not mature before November. Spanish peanuts require about 20 days less time to mature.

We have not had the flooding problems that some areas have had, but local flooding and excess rain have caused many problems. One of these problems is insects, especially mosquitoes and flies, which pose potential health problems. Filth and debris left by storms create excellent breeding conditions for houseflies and mosquitoes, some of which can spread typhoid, dysentery and encephalitis.

To control insects, such as mosquitoes, remove their breeding places. This could be any standing water, especially stagnant water. In warm weather this should be done as soon as possible after rains.

Empty water from barrels, old tires, cans and other containers. Many kinds of mosquitoes can be severe nuisances as well as carriers of diseases. The most troublesome kinds are those that breed in temporary rain pools, flooded areas, ponds and water trapped in tin cans and other containers. Receding water is trapped in ditches, ruts, under buildings and other places where the "wigglers" or larvae can develop.

If drainage is impossible, treat water puddles still standing with larvicide oil or an approved insecticide.

If flood waters have covered a garden some produce may be unsafe to eat. This depends on the kind of produce, maturity of produce at the time of flooding, time of year, severity of flooding, duration of flooding, bacterial content of floodwater, and likelihood of contamination from sewage or other bacterial contaminants.

In general, fruits and vegetables that were immature at the time of flooding should be safe to eat by the time they are ready for harvest. For added safety, clean produce well, and cook before eating.

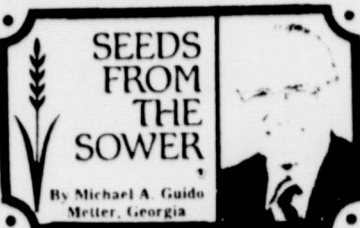
If flood waters covered the vegetables that were ready for harvest there is a danger of bacterial contamination. These vegetables should be disinfected, peeled and thoroughly cooked. Some vegetables are more susceptible than others to bacterial contamination.

Leafy vegetables, such as lettuce and cabbage and fleshy vegetables and berry fruits such as, tomatoes, summer squash, strawberries and peppers would be highly susceptible to bacterial contamination.

Root, bulb and tuber crops such as, beets, onions, and potatoes would be less susceptible to bacterial contamination. Disinfect these vegetables, peel and cook them thoroughly before eating.

Produce with a protected fruit or impervious outer skin, such as, peas, melons, eggplant, sweet corn or winter squash, should be washed and disinfected before the outer shell, skin or husk is removed. Then shell, peel, or husk the produce and cook it if possible.

To disinfect vegetables and fruits wash in a strong detergent solution with a scrub brush to remove all silt. Then soak in chlorine solution for 15 to 20 minutes. Rinse thoroughly with safe drinking water. A chlorine solution can be made by adding household bleach containing from two to six percent chlorine water. The amount of bleach to add to water would depend on the percent of chlorine it contains. If it contains two percent chlorine add two tablespoons to one gallon of water or if it contains four percent add only one tablespoon per gallon and if it contains six percent add three fourths of a tablespoon of bleach to one gallon of water.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK
June is National Dairy Month. Milk and other dairy products are essential for good health because of the calcium. Calcium is important for strong bones and teeth, helps blood clot normally, and aids in normal functioning of nerves, muscles and heart. Children

under 9 need 2-3 servings of milk; children 9-12 requires 3 servings, teens require 4 servings; and adults need 2 servings of milk. A serving of milk is 8 fluid ounces.

TEXAS SHERBERT
1 tablespoon or 1 envelope gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
3/4 cup sugar

1 can (6 oz.) frozen fruit juice concentrate (grapefruit, orange, lemonade or tangerine)
2 1/4 cups buttermilk

Soften gelatin in cold water. Dissolve over hot water. Mix with sugar and stir until dissolved. Add fruit concentrate to gelatin mixture; add buttermilk and stir well. Turn into freezing tray. When mixture is partially frozen, remove to bowl and beat until smooth. Return to tray and continue freezing until firm. Serves 6.
