Mr. Moore expressed special thanks to the Cisco Civic League, the Cisco Kiwanis Club and the Cisco Rotary Club for the donation of some \$750 to buy paint and materials for improvements.

The Council considered a plan to close Lake Cisco Park temporarily to restrict its use by undesirable groups and to discourage vandalism that has destroyed much of it. It was decided to ask the Lake Cisco Development Committee to study the matter and to make recommendations

The city manager noted that deterioration has been considerable in recent months due to vandalism.

The city manager also reported that street grading work is progressing nicely despite numerous recent rain storms. He said that fogging equipment will be run twice weekly throughout the city in a mosquito eradication campaign. This will continue until the mosquito situation improves.

The Council re-appointed Mrs. Lois Holder as alternate city judge. CPA Joe Cooper was named independent auditor for the 1986-87 fiscal year.

Action on a preliminary budget was delayed until the July 14th meeting.

The monthly financial

statement for May showed revenues of \$609,153 or 64 per cent of the 1986-87 budget. Only \$513 of the total came in during May, according to the report by Bookkeeper Maryann Perry. Some 90 per cent of ad valorem and personal taxes have been collected for the current year.

General fund expenses during May totaled \$72,074 to bring the year's total to date to \$595,602 - 62 per cent of the budget. The utility fund had revenues of \$47,223 and expenses of \$61,378 during May. Water Department expenses amounted to \$47,764.

Mayor Joe Wheatley presided over the meeting. Present were Councilmen Allen Masters, Arlie K. Whitley, Roy Dennis and Bural Chambers, City Manager Moore and City Secretary Ginger Johnson.



# **Homemaking Hints**

#### TAEX SPONSORING "PARENTING" LETTER SERIES

If you are the parent of an infant or expecting a newborn, then you will be interested in requesting a free mail-out letter series. The Eastland County Extension Service is sponsoring a series of twelve information letters for parents during their infants' first year. The letter focuses on child development and the role of parents for each month the fist year of an infants' life.

Parenting, especially during the early years, is a very important responsibility.

If you wish to receive these free letters, then telephone the Extension Service office, 817/629-2222, or contact Mrs. Janet Thomas, County Extension Agent, P.O. Box 189, Eastland, Texas 76448.

Because of limited postage budget all 12 letters will be mailed in one large envelope to conserve postage.

#### SAFE HOME PROCESSED FOOD

Home processed food can be a safe, nutritious souce of quality food if sound practices are followed. Begin with garden fresh,

unblemished produce. Wash vegetables under running water using a vegetable brush to remove stubborn soil. Do not leave vegetables in water to soak as a loss of nutrients can result.

Keep all work surfaces, utensils and containers especially clean. Wash canning jars in hot soapy water and rinse in hot water. Jars to be used for jellied products and pickles should be sterilized with boiling water.

Follow USDA approved processing times, and have dial gauge canners tested annually. We will be glad to check yours free anytime at the Extension office in the Courthouse. Store home canned foods in a cool, dry, dark place. Keeping them away from light prevents the loss of some vitamins, and cool storage temperatures prevent the growth of bacteria that only grow at elevated temperatures in canned foods

Boil home canned vegetables 10 minutes (20 minutes for corn and spinach) before serving. If

microwaves or a steam canner. These methods don't assure thorough processing. All low acid foods need to be processed in a pressure canner

Don't eat questionable foods. Discard jellied or pickled products with mold growth. Don't remove the mold and eat the rest of the product.

Common sense, research based processing times and procedures, and good food handling practices help to assure safe home processed foods.

If you like pickles and would like to make some homemade sweet pickles, then here is a quick method for the busy woman.

#### REFRIGERATOR PICKLES

4 cups sugar 4 cups cider vinegar 12 cup salt 1<sup>1</sup>4 teaspoon turmeric 1<sup>1</sup>4 teaspoons celery seed 3 onions, sliced 4 pints cucumbers (sliced thin)

Mix together sugar and spices in a cold syrup. Do not hold local and state titles heat. Pack cucumbers in 4 are: sterilized pint jars and slice onions equally in each. 



As we all know, there is hardly a household in the State of Texas which is not experiencing the ill effects from the crisis in the oil industry. We have lost roughly 30% of our State's revenue due to foreign situations beyond our control. Our economic outlook is unlikely to improve unless the State takes positive and innovative steps to foster new growth. As the Senate sponsor of a series of bills designed to infuse the State's economy with new revenue, I stand confident in our ability to overcome these obstacles. The creation of the Texas

The Department is authorized to issue up to \$25 million and will be charged with the task of identifying and correcting instances where State regulation actually inhibits the growth of small businesses.


# **Ainsworth Wins Suit Against County**

favor of Ainsworth, and also awarded \$4,000 to Keith Woodley, his attorney. Another \$6,000 will be paid to Woodley in legal fees if the County appeals the verdict. Attorney Bill Hart, who

represented Eastland County, stated that bids for repair of the county-owned equipment were not properly advertised by the late Jack Blackwell, then Commission of Pct. 2.

Woodley cited a statue that allows persons with special expertise to be employed by the county without bids. He told the jurors that Ainsworth had that type of expertise.



Pecan trees in Eastland County look better than they have in years, especially the native trees. The rainfall that they received last fall and continuing in the last spring and early summer has really stimulated heavy growth on many of these trees

It seems that the insects are taking advantage of the good foliage and are helping themselves to a good meal. In this column last week I discussed the webworms and calnut caterpillars. These leaf eaters are continuing to do damage to pecan trees. This past week the yellow pecan aphids or "honeydew'

aphids began their population explosion. These sucking insects build to high populations in mid-summer in most years. After feeding in large numbers for about 2-3 weeks their population usually falls off just as quickly as it appears.

Most commercial pecan growers do not control the vellow aphids because their presence do not cause great harm. But, its a different story for the yard tree owner. The honeydew or sugar water secreted by the aphids cause real problems to those who park cars or set under the pecan trees. The greatest damage to

I plan on reintroducing the mandatory motorcycle helmet bill during the upcoming special session of the Legislature that is set to convene on June 22. During

## **Texans Health Outlook**

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, do doctors take medical assignments when they per-

form eye operations? ANSWER: The only way you know if any doctor takes medicare assignment is to ask the doctor. The American Society of Cataract and Refractive Surgery has filed suit against the human, health services secretary Otis Bowen, asking that the provisions of the Omnibus budget reconciliation Act of 1986 restricting how much physicians may charge medicare patients for Cataract Surgery be declared unconstitutional.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I understand the new Catastrophic plans for medicare being proposed by the Reagan Administration will fill all the major gaps now left uncovered by the present medicare system.

ANSWER: This is not true. Long term care services, especially custodial care in a nursing home, is still a huge uncovered cost under medicare. Furthermore, the new plan would not cover any of Part B services under which you are now covered. This Catastrophic program is very complicated and will require a great many headaches before it is put into place.



home administrators and state health agencies about medicaid discrimination.
