

Cisco Lions Club To Host First Bass Tournament

It was an article that the Houston, police department had issued that gave Twelve Rules for Raising Delinquent Children. Some of the rules were "Begin with infancy to give the child everything he wants. In this way he will grow up to believe the world owes him a living. Never give him any spiritual training. Wait until he is 21 and then let him 'decide for himself.' Take his part against neighbors, teachers, policemen. They are all prejudiced against your child. Prepare for a life of grief.

You will be likely to have it." Onetta said the clipping survived the fire and she hopes that maybe some of the young ones today will stop and think about some of the words in the article.

Bill said, "A little switch wouldn't hurt a child with growing up.

Onetta added, "Some are a little too slow to whip and some are just too fast to whip. I think that a man's voice is more demanding and children listen to their father more than they do their mother.

Bill then added, "You've got to keep after it and repeat to children what you want them to do until they do it. After spanking them, I set them down and talked to them. It hurts you more than it did the child.'

Onetta said while laughing, "Oh I don't know about that. I can remember getting a spanking from my

Daddy and it really hurt." When asked how many grandchildren and greatgrandchildren they have, they said around 45 to 50. There was only one grandchild who didn't get to make the Housewarming that was held last Saturday at their new home.

Amendment Proposed For Balanced Budget

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Supporters of a federal balanced budget joined Congressman Charles W. Stenholm in impressive numbers to introduce a proposed amendment to the U.S. Constitution requiring a balanced budget.

The proposal, which could become the 27th Amendment to the Constitution, was introduced with more than 230 original co-sponsors in the House, the most support ever in the history of this legislation. Congressman Stenholm is the chief sponsor in the House along with Senator Dennis Deconcini (D-Arizona). Promoting the Stenholm-Deconcini bill are four other chief sponsors, Congressman Larry Craig (R-Idaho), Congressman Bob Smith (R-Oregon) and Congressman Tom Carper (D-Delaware) in the House and Senator Orrin Hatch (R-Utah) in the Senate.

As proposed in the amendment, Congress and the president would have to agree on annual revenue estimates, and government spending could not exceed the revenue. Raising the national debt, which currently is at a record \$2.3 trillion, would be increased only if approved by three-fifths of the Congress.

Upon Congressional approval, the measure would then be presented to the states for ratification. In order to amend the Constitution, 38 states would have to approve the proposal before it became law.

"Our failure to respond to the debt crisis weights heavily on my mind," said Stenholm, dean of the West Texas delegation, "I continue to worry about the unfortuante, fiscal legacy we are leaving our future generations. The way we deal with, or fail to deal with, our deficit is one of the most frustrating feelings I've encountered during my time in Congress," Stenholm said.

"Right now all we see is the president blaming the problem on Congress, the Congress blaming it on the president, the House blaming it on the Senate, and nothing gets done. We must do something to force

Another belief of old Kang



Gov. Bill Clements has signed into law a bill authorizing Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission to establish a mandatory hunter education program.

Senate Bill 504 would enable the Parks and Wildlife Department to set up a training course and require persons of a specified age to complete the course before hunting in Texas with firearms or archery







Officials at the Fort Worth District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers report that recent heavy rains have raised Proctor Lake to 1175.79 feet above mean sea level, 14 feet above the conservation pool making the lake a poor choice for the 4th of July weekend.

The high water has created some potential dangers including underwater obstructions such as signs, tables, shelters and drinking fountains. Floating or submerged debris is also hazardous to boaters and skiers. About 40 to 50 percent of the recreation facilities are either underwater or unuseable because of the water levels.

Approximately \$8 million in flood damages have been saved since the flood gates at Proctor were closed to impound water in 1963, \$897,000 of which was in June 1987.

Flooding conditions greatly reduce visitor capacity and could cause severe overcrowding. Lake users are encouraged to make alternative plans for the July 4th weekend.

Pack in clean, hot jars and cover with boiling syrup, leaving ½ inch headspace. Close the jars and process in a boiling-water bath, allowing 20 minutes for pint jars and 25 minutes for quarts.

Sugar Syrup. Each quart of fruit requires from 1 to 1½ cups of sugar syrup. Sugar syrup is made by cooking sugar in water or fruit juice until it dissolves. Use the following proportions:





BAKED TUNA STEAKS WITH BACON

- 4 thick tuna steaks 8 strips lean bacon 2 green onions, minced ½ cup dry white wine
- Generous milling of pepper 1 teaspoon paprika 1 Tablespoon minced parsley

Arrange steaks in a single layer in a buttered baking dish or casserole. Heat wine-onion mixture to a boil and pour it over the steaks. Scatter in crumbled crisp bacon, cover with lid or foil, and bake for 10 minutes per inch thickness of fish. Remove cocktail picks, sprinkle with parsley, and serve.






