## Cisco To Have Fun Filled Fourth Of July Celebration

An entertainment program that includes everything from a fishing tournament, a beauty contest, carnival and a big fireworks spectacular has been assigned for the July Fourth holiday enjoyment of Cisco area residents on Saturday.

The day's program will kickoff at the 6 a.m. opening of the fishing tournament headquarters at City Park in Cisco. Fishermen will seek big bass in Lake Cisco and Lake Leon and weigh-in between 3 and 4:30 p.m. Saturday at the headquarters. Their \$21 entry fee in the Cisco Lions Club sponsored event will include \$20 in prize money.

There will be a flag ceremony at City Park at 9:45 a.m. Saturday under the

direction of the John William Butts Post of the American Legion to open the program there. Assorted contests, including swimming and diving, dominoes, horseshoes, washers, ring toss and T-ball will start at 10 a.m. at the park.

The Lions Club Carnival's assorted booths will open at 11 a.m. at the park, including a Coke Ring, Balloon Darts, a dunking machine, baseball throw, dime pitch and others.

The Lions Barbecue Stand will operate most of the day with Brad Kimbrough and Eddie McMillan turning out their "world's finest cooking." Lions will also operate a soft drink booth during the day, and the Dr. Pepper Bottling Co. is providing the club with Dr. Pepper without charges.

There will be a softball game between city employees and a group of citizens at 3 p.m. Saturday at the City Park baseball field for the enjoyment of July Fourth visitors, according to an announcement.

Chamber of Commerce Manager Don Shepard reported that the game was added to the day's program to fill an entertainment void and to provide fun for players and spectators. There will be no charges for the game.

There will be free entertainment at the park pavillion during the day, featuring such groups as the Jammie Dee Dancers of Ranger, the Cisco Senior Citizen Band, Gary Fink and Tim Hull, Wendy and Joe, R. D. Weeks and Sons, Susan Wester and Elizabeth Webb,

a First Christian Church Youth Group and the Ghost Riders C&W Band.

At 7 p.m., the Little Miss Cisco Contest will be held (see story elsewhere) at the park. Following the contest, the Fireworks Spectacular will be held under the supervision of Bruce Smith. Funds for the fireworks were being collected by the Chamber of Commerce, coordinators of the day's celebration program.

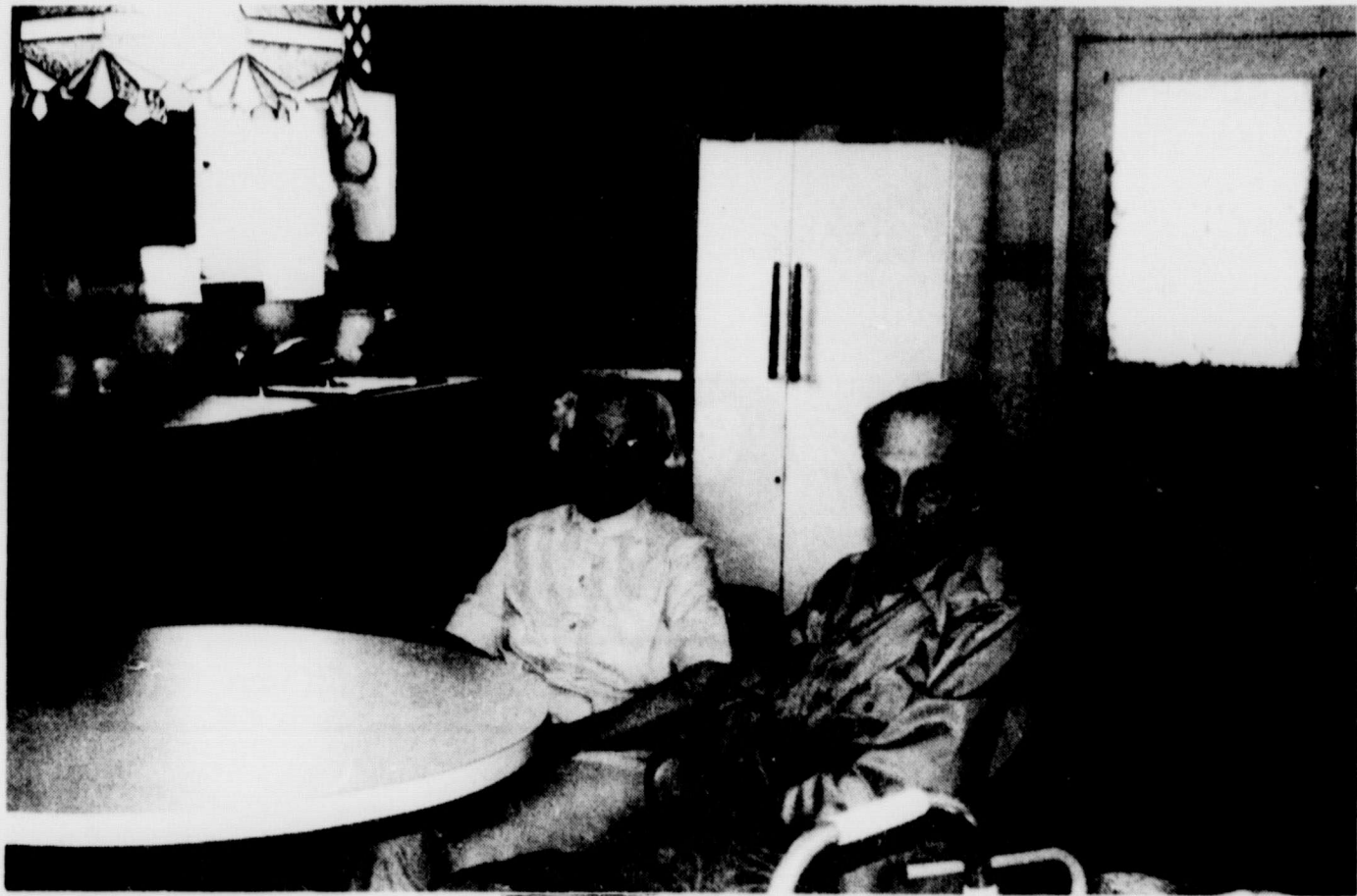

## Bill And Onetta Batteas Are Proud Of Their Nine Children Who Built Home

Bill and Onetta Batteas have settled in their new home at 311 West 9th Street here in Cisco. Their home, built by their nine children and their grandchildren is a very beautiful home. They are shown in the above photo

sitting in their dining room. The couple lost their home and most of their belongings last April 2 when it was destroyed by fire. Their family began a project to rebuild a new home for them. When it was commented to Onetta that their story had

appeared in the Abilene, El Paso, Corpus Christi, Austin and several other Texas papers she exclaimed, "Well, I didn't know they (their children) were doing anything unnatural." Mr. Batteas added, "They had to work hard when they were kids and they just worked hard now to get this done."

The names and home towns of their children are, Lester Batteas of Sweetwater. "He's been building houses now for 30 years, so he knew what he was doing," Bill said. J.D. Batteas lives in

Dallas. He inspects government work. Onetta said, "When Russia was giving so much trouble in Germany awhile back and planes couldn't fly into certain areas, J.D. invented a device to help planes fly in those areas. And they are still using this device on airplanes today."

Linton Batteas, the baby of the family, owns Batteas Builders in Cisco. Bill and Onetta moved to Cisco from Roby 14 years ago, since Linton lived here. Their daughters are Elizabeth Simmons, a housekeeper in Abilene.

Onetta said the clipping survived the fire and she hopes that maybe some of the young ones today will stop and think about some of the words in the article.

Bill said, "A little switch wouldn't hurt a child with growing up."

Onetta added, "Some are a little too slow to whip and some are just too fast to whip. I think that a man's voice is more demanding and children listen to their father more than they do their mother."

Bill then added, "You've got to keep after it and repeat to children what you want them to do until they do it. After spanking them, I set them down and talked to them. It hurts you more than it did the child."

Onetta said while laughing, "Oh I don't know about that. I can remember getting a spanking from my Daddy and it really hurt."

When asked how many grandchildren and great-grandchildren they have, they said around 45 to 50. There was only one grandchild who didn't get to make the Housewarming that was held last Saturday at their new home.

Onetta said, "I really want it put in the paper that we want to thank everybody for being so kind. Everybody in town we knew and some we didn't have really been kind to us."

A plaque by their front door reads, "The Batteas House That Love Built." That says it all.

A poem written by their daughter Darlene about three years ago for their anniversary, was printed in the World of Poetry Anthology. They had a framed copy of the poem but it was destroyed in the fire. They now have the book of poetry on their living room table.

The poem reads:  
Happy Anniversary  
For sixty three years,  
You have been together.  
And all of life's storms,  
You've successfully weathered.

The bad times were hard,  
The good times were good,  
But they were all held together,  
With generous love.

Nine children you reared,  
A most difficult task,  
But God knew you could do it,

## Amendment Proposed For Balanced Budget

WASHINGTON, D.C. - Supporters of a federal balanced budget joined Congressman Charles W. Stenholm in impressive numbers to introduce a proposed amendment to the U.S. Constitution requiring a balanced budget.

The proposal, which could become the 27th Amendment to the Constitution, was introduced with more than 230 original co-sponsors in the House, the most support ever in the history of this legislation. Congressman Stenholm is the chief sponsor in the House along with Senator Dennis Deconcini (D-Arizona). Promoting the Stenholm-Deconcini bill are four other chief sponsors, Congressman Larry Craig (R-Idaho), Congressman Bob Smith (R-Oregon) and Congressman Tom Carper (D-Delaware) in the House and Senator Orrin Hatch (R-Utah) in the Senate.

As proposed in the amendment, Congress and the president would have to agree on annual revenue estimates, and government spending could not exceed

the revenue. Raising the national debt, which currently is at a record \$2.3 trillion, would be increased only if approved by three-fifths of the Congress.

Upon Congressional approval, the measure would then be presented to the states for ratification. In order to amend the Constitution, 38 states would have to approve the proposal before it became law.

"Our failure to respond to the debt crisis weighs heavily on my mind," said Stenholm, dean of the West Texas delegation. "I continue to worry about the unfortunate, fiscal legacy we are leaving our future generations. The way we deal with, or fail to deal with, our deficit is one of the most frustrating feelings I've encountered during my time in Congress," Stenholm said.

"Right now all we see is the president blaming the problem on Congress, the Congress blaming it on the president, the House blaming it on the Senate, and nothing gets done. We must do something to force

ourselves to resolve this issue. We must pass this legislation," he said.

The area's congressman called on House leaders to bring the measure to the floor by Sept. 17, 1987, the 200th anniversary of the U.S. Constitution. "I think it would be most appropriate to have action on this during the anniversary of the framework for responsible, democratic government. May it remind and encourage the Members of this body of the jobs that we were elected to do," he said.

The proposal is similar to the Balanced Budget/Tax Limitation amendment presented in the last Congress. At least two dozen national organizations, such as the National Tax Limitation Committee, National Taxpayers Union, and the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, have indicated support for the resolution.

## Safety Belt Paid Off For Dallas Survivor

When Dallas attorney Christopher Turner heads out for his Fourth of July picnic, you can bet he'll be wearing his safety belt.

If he had failed to buckle up one morning last February, he probably wouldn't have been around for Valentine's Day.

"I'm sure I would have had a severe spinal injury, and probably would've been killed," said Turner, looking back on the Feb. 10 accident that demolished his car and sent him to a hospital emergency room. "The seat belt saved me. There's no question about it."

The 43-year-old attorney, an official member of the Texas Safety Belt Survivors' Club, was on his way to the

office when a speeding car struck the left side of his Mazda GLC as he crossed a street. "I had stopped at the stop sign," recalled Turner. He looked both ways, then started through the intersection, watching his right side. He had no warning of the crash until, "out of the corner of my eye, I saw the car coming in my front door," he said.

"The roof folded like an accordion, the driver's side was crunched into the passenger's side," Turner said. It was close quarters for a man who stands 6'3". The ceiling collided with his head, causing a concussion, but he credits the safety belt for keeping his spine in one piece. "I and the belt and the

seat all moved together...it kept the top half of me from being torn away the other half," he said.

Stories like this one are worth thinking about, especially with a three-day Fourth of July weekend coming up," said George R. Gustafson, president of Texas Safety Association and a spokesperson for the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts. "Chris Turner's accident—his first, in 28 years of driving—shows that belts can make the difference between life and death, even for the best of drivers.

Many Texans, and many out-of-state visitors, will be on the roads in the next few

days. With speed limits up to 65 miles per hour on some rural interstates, the risks will be even greater," said Gustafson. "If people don't fasten their belts and take the extra moments needed to properly restrain their

young children, this holiday could end in tragedy for many families."

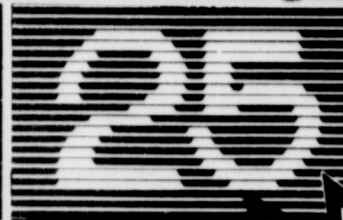

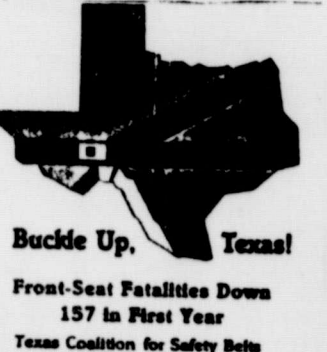

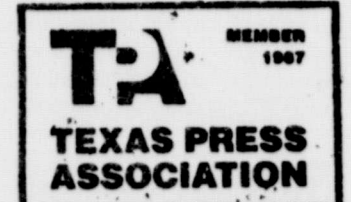

Senate Bill 504 would end the Parks and Wildlife Department to set up a training course and require persons of a specified age to complete the course before hunting in Texas with firearms or archery.

However, implementation depends upon availability of funds, and the bill did not include a deadline for setting up the program.

The department already has a hunter education program using volunteer instructors who certify about 13,000 students annually. The Texas course is recognized by other states that require nonresident hunters to complete a hunting safety course before being issued a hunting license.

The legislation, signed on

June 11, also would recognize equivalent courses taken by nonresidents in other states as being valid in Texas.

Brownwood: Water murky, 9 inches over spillway; black bass fair to 5 pounds on purple whitetailed worms and chartreuse tailed worms in 4 feet of water; striper fair to 5 pounds on 1/2-ounce jig with Flirtail Flirt trailer; crappie good in number but small in size on minnows; white bass fair schooling early and late, some around lighted docks at night on slabs, jigs and Shysters; channel catfish good to 5 1/2 pounds in shallow grassy flats on worms and shrimp.

Houston County: Water clear, 78 degrees, normal level; black bass good with 3 fish to 10 pounds, 11 ounces on black lizards; striper fairly slow; crappie good but hard to find on minnows; white bass good to 10 fish per string; catfish good to 22 pounds on trotline with live bait.

Rayburn: Creeks and civers muddy, lake fairly

clear, 75 degrees, 6 inches below pool level; black bass real good to 6 pounds on topwaters and worms; striper slow midlake, some in lower end of lake; crappie real good with limits to 2 1/2 pounds on minnows mostly; white bass slow; yellow catfish good to 49 pounds below 147 bridge on trotline with live perch; channel catfish good on rod and reel with wide variety of baits.

Toledo Bend: Water clear, 3 1/2 feet low; black bass fairly good on worms, topwaters and cranks to 6 pounds; striper good to 26 pounds near the dam and around islands in the dam area trolling Big Macs and Long Bill Redfins, green and white jigs, topwaters, Boy Howlys and Zara Spooks; white bass slow; crappie good in number and size; catfish good until about a week ago to 30 pounds on trotline baited with sunfish.

Calaveras: Water murky, 82 degrees, one foot high; black bass good to 7 pounds on plastic worms and cranks; striper good to 3 pound average on chicken liver or silver spoons; crappie poor; catfish good to 10 pounds on chicken liver and talapia; redfish fair to 4 pounds on shad or silver spoon; corvina good to 5 pounds on shrimp and silver spoons.

Granbury: Water murky, 70 degrees, one foot low; black bass good to 5 pounds on purple and white worms, spoons; striper slow; crappie real slow; white bass slow; catfish good to 7 pounds on trotlines baited with live perch.

Possum Kingdom: Water slightly murky, 13 feet low which is normal for about one year; black bass excellent to 5 pounds, several 3s on topwaters and worms; striper slow; crappie excellent to 1 1/4 pounds on minnows; white bass good with good numbers on slabs, Flea Flies and topwaters; channel catfish real good to 27 pounds on trotline with perch and goldfish; channel catfish good on chicken liver to 2 1/2 pounds.

Proctor: Water clear, 74 degrees, 14 feet high; black bass fair to 4 pounds on artificials; striper fair to 6 pounds on white jigs; crappie fair to good on minnows, many caught on minnow baited trotlines; catfish good to excellent to 6 pounds on trotlines baited with minnows and shad. Three fishermen caught 200 fish in three days on trotlines.

Spence: Water clear in main lake, muddy in river, 75 degrees, 11 feet low; black bass fair to 8 pounds on chartreuse buzz baits; striper good to 20 pounds trolling perch; crappie slow; white bass slow; catfish good to 4 pounds on trotlines baited with minnows, nightcrawlers.

Twin Buttes: Water clear, 75 degrees, 3 feet low, black bass fairly good to 10 1/4 pounds on spinners in 12-15 feet of water; hybrid striper good to 11 pounds on Storm crank; crappie real good to 15 fish per string on jigs; white bass slow; catfish fairly good to 25 pounds on trotline baited with goldfish.

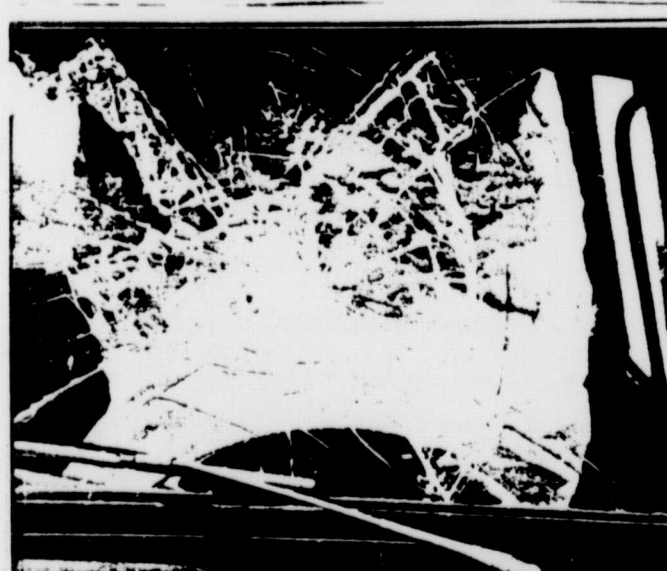

## Silver Lining Starting to Show in Texas' Economic Cloud

One day not too long ago, a West Texas cattleman, hard hit by a prolonged drought, noticed a neighboring rancher driving up the road, kicking up dust all the way.

"I've got some good news and some bad news," the neighbor reported. "Someone just cut a hole in your fence and stole 100 head of your cattle. That's the bad news."

"The good news is that he left one bull and one cow behind."

The rancher, although hard hit, had the necessary ingredients for recovery. That's sort of the way things are with the Texas economy right now. Things are bad. You don't have to look much further than the front page of this or any other newspaper in Texas to be reminded of that.

There is some good news, though. We have the necessary ingredients for recovery, and there are signs that it may be under way. We can look at some economic indicators in Texas to see that our economy may have bottomed out and is headed in the right direction at long last.

I'm going to deluge you with facts, but I want you to see that our efforts to improve the business climate in Texas—and lessen our dependence on oil and gas—is paying some dividends. We need to be reminded occasionally that our hold-the-line-on-spending attitude is bad news for the bureaucrats who maintain bloated budgets, but good news for those who want to operate a business in Texas.

Many of you will remember that our low-tax and pro-business philosophy in Texas earned us high marks in Inc. Magazine's 1986 "Annual Report on the States." In fact, Texas ranked third among the 50 states in terms of "best business climate in the nation."

• The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reported in April that the number of employed individuals in Texas increased by 58,000 in a one-month period, and by 152,000 during the preceding 12 months.

• The number of jobless Texans decreased by 90,200 between February and March of this year, down to 668,400—its lowest point since April 1986.

• The percentage of unemployed in Texas dropped substantially between February and May—from 9.2 percent to 8.6 percent.

• Manufacturing continued a slow but steady upturn between February and March by gaining 1,300 jobs.

• The number of new business corporations established in Texas between January and April of this year totaled 12,481.

All that, of course, is good news. There are signs that better news is on the horizon. For example, it has been predicted that:

• U.S.—Mexico trade will top \$33 billion in 1987, up 20 percent from 1986 when Texas sent Mexico \$13 billion in goods and Mexico sent Texas \$15 billion in goods.

• The maquiladora—or twin-plant—program will experience significant growth. By 1995 there will be an estimated 1,500 twin plants employing about 1 million workers. That compares with 789 plants and 217 workers in 1985.

• Bank deposits in Texas will increase to \$259.4 billion in 1987, a 10.3 percent increase over 1986.

• Although personal income experienced only a slight increase in 1986, it is projected to increase by 3.3 percent in 1987, from \$216 billion to \$223.2 billion.

All that is good news. I'm confident more is on the way.

## EMPORIUM RECIPE CANNED PLUMS

Wash the plums, cut them in half, and remove the pits, or prick the skins and use them whole. Heat to the boiling point in medium or heavy syrup. Pack in clean, hot jars and cover with boiling syrup, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Close the jars and process in a boiling-water bath, allowing 20 minutes for pint jars and 25 minutes for quarts.

Sugar Syrup. Each quart of fruit requires from 1 to 1 1/2 cups of sugar syrup. Sugar syrup is made by cooking sugar in water or fruit juice until it dissolves. Use the following proportions:

Light Syrup: 2 cups sugar to 4 cups water = 5 cups syrup  
Medium Syrup: 3 cups sugar to 4 cups water = 5 1/2 cups syrup  
Heavy Syrup: 4 1/4 cups sugar to 4 cups water = 6 1/2 cups sugar  
(Allow 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 pounds for each quart jar)
