Child Care Center Receives Two Gifts From Church

Children at the Cisco Day Care Center, located at 804 Ave. H., received two Fisher Price record players from the Redeemer Lutheran Vacation Bible School Class last week.

The VBS class votes each year on how they will spend the money that is collected at the VBS summer classes.

Winona Payne, administrator at the Child Care Center said the record players will be used in the school room and one for the toddlers room. Winona said the Center is very appreciative of the record

players and they will be put to good use.

The center does require a fee to keep children in their facility, but, the fees charged for day care do not cover the expenses of the operation of the Day Care Center.

Linda Wende, a Vacation Bible School teacher at Redeemer Lutheran, stopped by the Press to report what the VBS had done. Linda said that she strongly believes in the Day Care Center and she hopes that other churches and organizations will give to

help keep the center open. The center is dedicated to filling a need of the community to provide child care for working parents.

The Day Care Center building was purchased with donations from churches, individuals and clubs in Cisco. They do not receive any state, federal or other governmental aid.

Mrs. Payne said the monthly operating deficits, maintenance cost and improvements are paid for with contributions from the same local organizations.

The workers in the center are dedicated to providing loving, caring, educational care of the children. Mrs. Payne said a lot is required of the employees of the Child Care Center.

Winona reported that she and another employee, Leslie Wood, received their sound certificates recently. They are qualified to test the hearing and visions of the children at the center. They are also required to have someone who is a certified CPR specialist and who has taken a first aid course.

Elderly Woman In Cross Plains Attacked

Lawmen with the Eastland County Sheriff's Department and Callahan County Sheriff's Department are investigating the possibility of a connection between a Cross Plains rape and a Rising Star murder.

An 85 year old Cross Plains woman was attacked Sunday through the back door. The attack was reported to authorities several days

later.

It has not been determined by authorities whether a weapon was used in the attack. Authorities would not release the woman's name or whether she was sexually assaulted or not.

An autopsy report showed that Era Witt had been strangled, suffocated and beaten to death after being sexually assaulted. Her body was found in her home within several miles of the

attack on the Cross Plains woman.

Both Sheriff's Departments and the Texas Rangers are investigating both crimes.

According to Eastland County Sheriff's Deputy Jerry Heflin, both departments are working together on both crimes. He stated that currently each department is following up on any leads that are associated with the incidents.

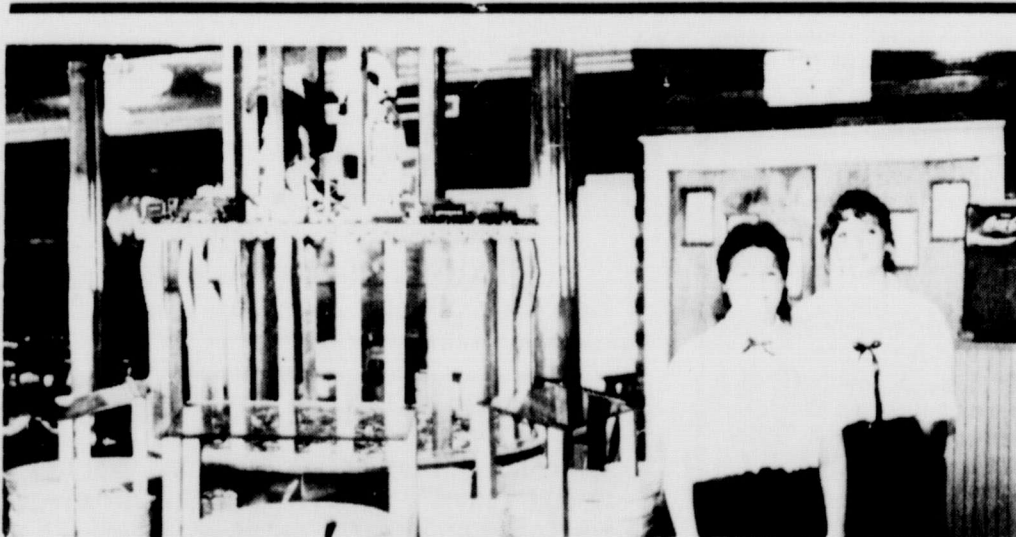

Search Ends After Five Days For Lake Drowning Victim

After 5 days of searching, the body of an Odessa man who drowned at Lake Leon was found late Thursday afternoon.

The body of Clifford Harris, 29, of Odessa, was discovered about 200 yards north of the area where he drowned Saturday afternoon. George Grady, Harris' father-in-law, and a friend were searching the area when they discovered the body. They notified Game Warden Payne who brought the body to shore.

Justice of the Peace Alford Bush pronounced Harris dead at approximately 6 p.m.

The body was taken by Edwards Funeral Home of Eastland before being transferred to Hubbard-Kelly Funeral Home of Odessa.

According to witnesses Harris took his two children, ages 10 and 5 years and a 4 year old friend boating around 3:30 p.m. Saturday. Ted Meacham of Olden shortly afterwards came upon the boat with the three children frantically waving

and crying. He transferred the children to his boat and took them to shore.

According to the girl, Harris dove into the water to retrieve his hat and tried to

swim to the boat. A 30 m.p.h. wind pushed the boat ahead of Harris and he called out that he could not make it to

The peas snapped at

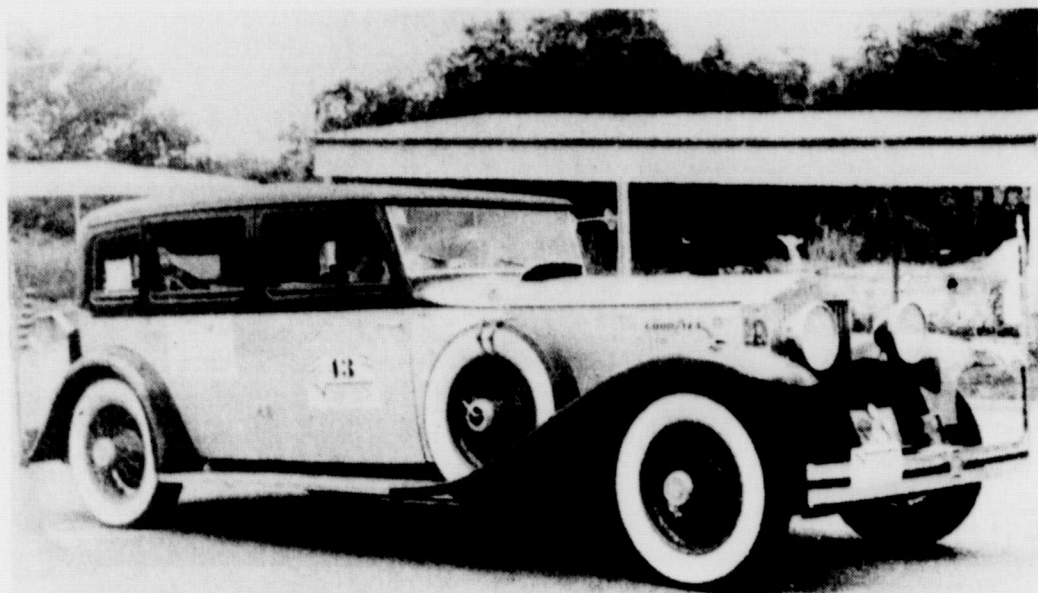
everyone and were given black eyes in return.

Nutrition Program

Last week we discussed the 1985 dietary guidelines for American women as outlined by the American Dietetic Task Force. We will continue to list the recommendations. We suggest you clip this article and add it to last week's seven recommendations.

Women should eat plenty of iron rich foods; reduce intake of salt and sodium, containing foods; she should eat foods for necessary nutrients, using vitamin and mineral supplements only under specific circumstances; if you drink, limit alcohol intake to one or two drinks daily; by all means avoid smoking; change diet, exercises, and other health promotional behaviors to correspond with an individual's own identified risk factors and finally if you have questions about the adequacy of your diet, consult a registered dietitian and by all means if you are eligible, participate in a senior center program. If I got it I would certainly feel no love for those who brought and spread it. Blood transfusions etc. cause about two percent

of AIDS cases. More than nine in ten are victims of their own misconduct. Business By Appointment

A new way of taking care of Social Security business is now available to the public.

Interviews by appointment have been provided in many offices in recent years and have proven to be very popular. Now the service is being offered by every Social Security office.

To set up an appointment,

you merely call the Social Security office. You can either arrange to visit the office at an agreed upon time, or you may arrange to have the Social Security office call you at a certain time. If the office calls you, the interview may be made by phone a copy of the application mailed to you for your

signature. When it is received back in the office, it is handled just as any other application.

Taking care of Social Security matters by appointment is a natural development. Most Social Security matters can be handled by telephone; and in recent years, "teleservice" has become an important service option for the public. However, it is not intended to displace any other option, and we continue to encourage people to call, visit, or write the Social Security office—whichever is most convenient for them.

Offices that have used the appointment system note that people tend to be more prepared for the interview. During the initial contact, they have an opportunity to find out what documents they need to handle the matter and can have them on hand during the interview.

Prepare For Home Food Preservation

COLLEGE STATION — Many fruits and vegetables are beginning to ripen and home canners should be getting prepared for the harvest. Preplanning before home food preservation can make the process easier and safer.

"It's a good idea to check out any questions you have before beginning any home food processing," says Marilyn Haggard, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. "County Extension agents can tell you if your preservation methods are safe, and will provide you with the latest research based processing times and procedures."

"Using the correct procedures in home food preservation is important," the specialist maintains. "Incorrect methods can allow bacteria growth in the food, which may cause food poisoning or lead to

spoilage." If you have any doubt about the safety of your home processed food, don't hesitate to call the County Extension agent, she says.

"Food can sometimes be saved if you act quickly. Tell the agent what you think went wrong. Review the exact steps you followed when processing the food, being careful not to leave anything out. The smallest thing might make the difference," says Haggard.

"Have your dial gauge canners tested annually, and get any questions answered before you begin food processing," she suggests. "Preparation can save you a lot of time, money, and needless frustration."

Texans Health Outlook

by Roy V. Cartee

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I keep reading about the catastrophic plans for Medicare that are being proposed by President Reagan and Secretary Bowen. Do they fill in all the major gaps now left uncovered by the present Medicare program?

ANSWER: No. Long term care services, especially

custodial care in a nursing home, is still a huge uncovered cost under Medicare. Furthermore, the new plan will not cover any of the Part B services (the doctor's part).

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee when a person enters the hospital and expects to use the Medicare coverage is it necessary to obtain in writing that the Medicare would "be running out" if I would like to appeal?

ANSWER: You bet. You must have this information in writing to understand who made the determination, to be able to exercise your appeal rights and be entitled to the required 48 hour grace period.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I continually have problems with my feet. Is it possible to obtain Medicare payment for treatment of my feet?

ANSWER: Treatment for flat feet and removal of corns and warts from the feet are not covered. However, there are certain coverages that might apply in your case and we encourage you to ask your doctor if the treatment is covered by Medicare before the service is rendered.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I am having trouble with my hearing and I am finding extreme difficulty in knowing to whom I should go for treatment.

ANSWER: The effect of a hearing impairment is subtle, yet devastating. Today over 20 million Americans suffer from a hearing impairment. Too many people feel wearing a hearing aid is a sign of "old age". It is true hearing impairments are common in older adults. Many middle aged and young people are affected as well. If you, or someone calls to your attention, detect that you are having hearing difficulty you should contact an otologist (a physician who specializes in the ear, nose



Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

Walnut caterpillars are still doing a lot of damage to pecan trees. The caterpillars are completely consuming all the foliage on some untreated pecan trees.

Dee Williamson, who lives north of Eastland tells me that he noticed the caterpillars do not eat at night, but congregate together in large clumps or balls on the tree's trunk or major branches. During the early morning you can find the clumps of caterpillars and spray them. They are easily killed with almost any insecticide. If you do this, you don't have to spray the entire tree and you use much less insecticide.

A large number of peanut growers who planted from June 29, to July 7, are reporting very poor stands of peanuts. We have looked at plant stands in a large number of peanut fields. The Extension Plant Pathologists and Seed Company representatives have examined the problem, but at this time we do not know what caused the problem. Peanuts planted before these dates are doing very well, although, the crop is very late due to the heavy rains in May and June.

I sometimes hear people say they use chlordane as a general spray around the house. No pesticide should be used unless it is stated on the label that it is approved for that particular pest and on that crop or area.

The Texas Department of Agriculture, says, that three separate incidents of misuse of chlordane has affected hundreds of Texans. Consumers must be made aware that this is not a product to be kept around the house for general use. It is a toxic and persistent chemical.

One case of misapplication of chlordane was at five Houston-area apartment complexes by maintenance workers. Chlordane was improperly sprayed on exterior walls and on the surface of the ground.

Another misapplication of chlordane in an unknown number of buildings in the Paris and Bonham areas by a Termite Control Company. That company had its

licenses revoked.

A third case of misuse was by a 15 year old student at Hope Christian School in Henderson. He sprayed chlordane improperly both inside and underneath school buildings. The student was hospitalized and treated for pesticide poisoning.

Rules have been proposed to take chlordane and three related chemicals off the over-the-counter market. Some have recommended that the product be band completely.

It is illegal to use chlordane except for underground termite application. It is the most widely used termite control chemical and would be a blow to termite control should we lose the chemical.

The thing we should always keep in mind is to exercise caution when buying, using or storing any pesticide. Read the label, wear protective clothing and most of all, use common sense.

Granddaughter Seeks Information

Mrs. Kelly Cotterill is in town researching a book that she is doing about her grandfather, the late Mr. G.G. Hazel. Mr. Hazel was born in Eastland in 1888 in a covered wagon. Kelly is covering 100 years about her grandfather. This is the grandfather that raised her.

Mr. Hazel practiced law in Eastland 1921-29 and served as mayor and district attorney. He was also on the school board. During his tenure in the land office, Mr. Hazel authored HAZEL'S LAND LAWS OF TEXAS, which was used as a textbook at the University of Texas.



A revolving salad bar at Puttin On The Ritz Restaurant in Cisco is "Probably the only salad bar of its kind in Texas," according to Dan Wester, restaurant owner.

The turntable was at the famous "Little Bit Of Sweden" restaurant in Dallas. At the Dallas restaurant the turntable was used as a revolving meat table, he said.

Dan designed the additional tiers at the top of the salad bar. He said he added the toy trains and dolls at the top of the tiers because he played with trains as a young boy and his sister played with dolls, so he thought that everyone might enjoy the remembrances. The salads are delicious

and look very appetizing. Two of the favorite salads are the marinated broccoli, cauliflower and mushroom salad and the fresh fruit salad.

The chef who prepares the salads and the other delicious food is Joe Martin. Joe has been a chef for over 50 years. According to Dan, Joe's specialty is seafood.

Joe has been a chef in France and Switzerland. He has also worked in the Adolphus Hotel in Dallas from 1950 to 1953. He said he tried to retire recently, but couldn't do it. He moved to Cisco and began working at "Puttin On The Ritz".

"I never went to school. I learned on the job. You had to go through the butcher shop, the bakery, the fry sta-

tion, the broiler station and the soup station before you could become a full fledged chef," he said.

Martin is a certified chef and his certificate is framed and hanging in the hallway before you enter the main room of the restaurant. Hanging there also is a framed certificate stating that Joseph Martin is a member of the American Culinary Association, American Institute of Chefs.

One of the main desserts that Martin prepares is "Pure Sin." When the dessert is brought out everyone stops to stare as the waitress carries it past them. There is also a look of astonishment on the faces of the customers who ordered the dessert. With fresh strawberries, chocolate cake, ice cream and chocolate topping, it looks delicious.

He said he also likes to fry strawberries. He said they are delicious.

One out of town customer was talking to Dan and asked if very many of the local citizens realize how lucky they are to have such a restaurant in this area. And she added, "If they don't I can't understand why not."

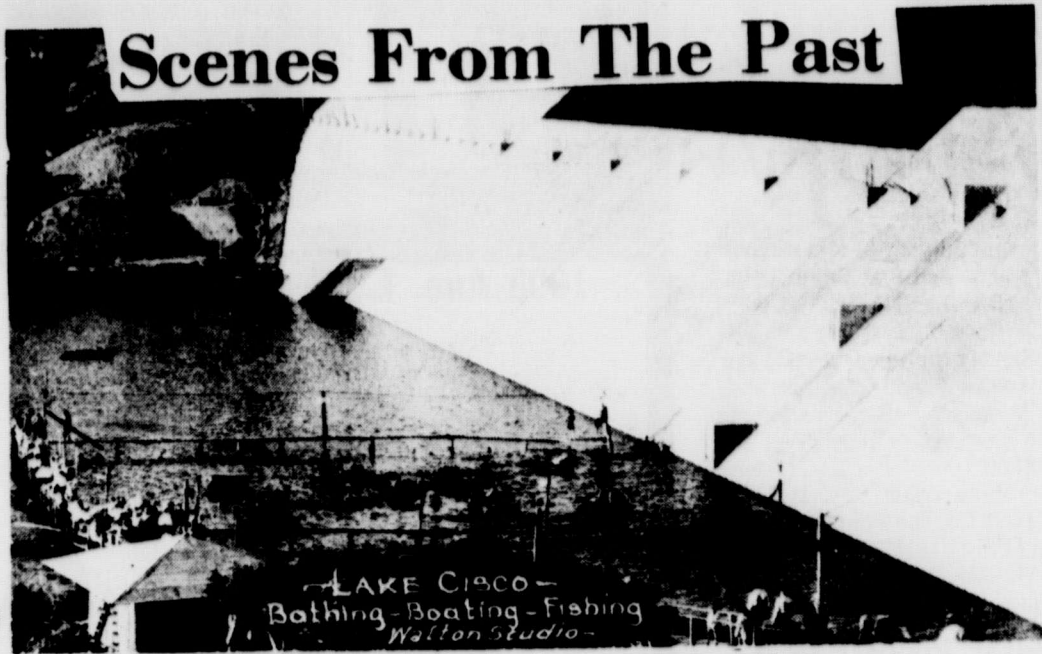
Lions Club Is Pleased With July 4th Results

the boat. It was at this time that he apparently went under.

Dragging began shortly afterwards but was called off due to high winds and rough water at about 9 p.m. but resumed again early Sunday morning only to be again called off about noon due to dangerous lake conditions.

Members of the Eastland County Bass Club, Eastland Volunteer Fire Department and Ranger Fire Department along with many residents of the lake, searched the area again Monday. Members of the Eastland Fire Department used power tools and lights to search the area after dark but called off the search at about 11 p.m.

Planes were used to search from the air each day and many firemen, bass club members and residents continued searching until Thursday when the body was found.

Game Wardens Kenneth Payne of Eastland, and Dick Corley of Breckenridge coordinated the 5-day search.
