## Loboes To Have Scrimmage Friday Against Baird

Football fans have been invited to Chesley Field here Friday to see the 1987 Loboes of Cisco High School in their first public outing as they take part in a controlled scrimmage with teams from Baird High School. The program will start with the junior varsity squads at 6 p.m.

Coach Buddy Sharp reported that his Loboes were enjoying a good fall practice season that has been free of disabling injuries. Workouts are held daily at 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on the practice field near Community Gym. The two-a-day

workout schedule was due to end Thursday of this week with one session daily in the afternoons next week.

Jerrod Jeffcoat, who finished last season as the Lobo quarterback, appears set as the starter there this season. Matt Goosen is his backup. Top running back prospects include Joe Flores, Brian Wagnon, David Zell, Larry Fields and Kody Wallace. Wallace will probably see action at end along with Mark McGinness, Doug Witt and Harvey Perkins.

Tackle prospects include



Coach Sharp said they would play as many men as possible Friday to give everyone experience on both offense and defense.

## Travel Trailer Destroyed By Fire



Willie Hunt, Jr., of 803 West 8th Street sustained minor injuries and was suffering from smoke inhalation after a travel trailer he was working on caught fire and burned last Saturday night.

Mr. Hunt, driver and medical technician for Patterson Ambulance Service, was taken to E.L. Graham Memorial Hospital where he was given emergency treatment and released. He expected to be back at work Tuesday.

Firemen were called at 11:20 p.m. and arrived in time to see the travel trailer, parked near the Hunt home, as it burned. Mr. Hunt said the trailer was a total loss but was covered partly by insurance. He had been working on the trailer, he reported, when he left around 11 p.m. for a few minutes.

Returning, Mr. Hunt said he found the trailer engulfed in flames. Opening the trailer door, there was an explosion-like noise, he said, and "I was blown backwards." Cause of the blaze was undetermined. Mr. Hunt, who is a driver for Patterson ambulance, also is employed at Graham Hospital.

Considerable property damage was caused Sunday afternoon and night by a grass fire that started some four miles north of Putnam and burned over several thousand acres of ranch land between Putnam and Moran on State Highway 6.

Firemen from five area cities, including Cisco, sent men and equipment to help fight the blaze that was

swept northward by a high south wind. The fire broke out around 3 p.m. and firemen and volunteers, including half a dozen bulldozers and numerous water tank trucks, fought it passed midnight. Some of the volunteers remained on the job all night and were still there Monday morning as fire continued to break out from time to time.

Starting in the Isenhower Estate Ranch area, the blaze swept through that large ranch to others including those of Thomas Holland, Fred Wylie, Bobby Moore, and Roy and John Hounshell and others. At least two vacant residences were destroyed, including the Isenhower place, were destroyed. The barn and outbuildings at the Leonard Alvey (Dyer Estate) place were burned but the residence was saved.

REA and West Texas Utilities Company power lines were damaged and many were out of service Monday morning. Telephone service was still available as most of their lines are now underground. Numerous places had many fences destroyed, and a number of oil leases had damage to their wells and storage facilities.

Observers said the monetary loss would amount to many thousands of dollars. It was the area's worst grass fire in many years, observers said.

Cause of the fire was undetermined, firemen said. The railroad does not run through the area covered by the blaze.

Cisco firemen Kenneth Boyd, Joe Jarvis, Larry Weikel and David Gill took and truck and spent several hours helping contain the blaze.

**PUBLIC NOTICE  
LETTER TO PARENTS  
Dear Parent or Guardian:**  
The Cisco Independent School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for \$.35. Children from households that meet Federal Income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast. To apply for free or reduced price meals, complete the enclosed application, sign it and return it to the school.

**FOOD STAMPAFDC HOUSEHOLDS:** If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with

Dependent Children" for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp or AFDC case number, print your name, and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm you eligibility.

**ALL OTHER HOUSEHOLDS:** If your household income is at or below the level shown on the enclosed scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application: (1) list the names of everyone who lives in your

household. Include ~~parents~~, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household; (2) list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social security number print "None"; (3) list total monthly income and amount of income (BEFORE deduction for taxes, social security, etc.) each person received last month and where it is from, such as wages, retirement, or welfare. If you have a household member from whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly income.

**VERIFICATION:** The information on the application may be checked by school officials at any time during the

school year.

**REPORTING CHANGES:** If you list income information and your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you list a food stamp case number or AFDC number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your child.

**FOSTER CHILD:** Your foster child may be eligible for meal benefits. If you wish to apply for meal benefits for a foster child, contact the school for help with the application.

**NONDISCRIMINATION:** Children who receive free or reduced price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

**FAIR HEARING:** If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: Ray Saunders, Superintendent, P.O. Box 1645, Cisco, Texas 76743, telephone 442-3056.

**CONFIDENTIALITY:** The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determination and verification of data.

**REAPPLICATION:** You may apply for benefits anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but need to apply later in the year, please fill out an application at that time.

You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

ORDINANCE NO. 0-87-5  
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CISCO ESTABLISHING THE TAX LEVY FOR THE 1987-88 BUDGET YEAR OF CISCO, TEXAS; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That for the budget year of 1987-88 there is hereby levied on all of the property located in the City of Cisco, Texas, on the first day of January, 1987 and not exempted from taxation by the Constitution and statutes of the State of Texas, an ad valorem tax of \$.55 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of 100 per cent of the assessed market value of such property for the purposes listed below, such tax to be apportioned as follows:

\$.55 on each and every \$100.00 valuation of 100 per cent of the assessed market value of such property is hereby levied and assessed to provide revenue for carrying on the City government and the current expenses thereof.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

SECTION 3. The City Council, in order to provide adequate time to prepare tax statements for 1987-88, declares an emergency and that the provision of the Charter of the City of Cisco calling for two readings of an ordinance be dispensed with, and that this ordinance take effect as an emergency measure immediately upon its passage and approval.

## Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent

Walnut caterpillars continue to defoliate pecan trees in our area. The caterpillar is a serious threat to pecan and walnut trees. They defoliate oak, willow, honey locust and certain woody shrubs sometimes, but prefer pecans and walnuts. The caterpillars develop in large clusters and rapidly defoliate yard and orchard trees, if not controlled. Spraying with insecticides is the best control measure. To avoid as much damage as possible, spray the caterpillars when they are still young.

The adult insect is a moth with a two-inch wing span. It is brown and tan with a dark region on the body behind the head and has wavy, dark lines across the front wings. The adults emerge from pupae which overwinter in the soil at the base of the trees. The female moth later deposits about 300 eggs on the underside of one of the leaves.

Caterpillars, or larvae, hatch from the eggs in about 9 days and live together in a group. They are reddish brown when young and turn black with white markings and long white hairs when they are older. Large larvae are conspicuously fuzzy and may grow up to two inches long.

Young larvae feed only on soft tissue, leaving a

skeletonized leaf behind, while older larvae feed on the entire leaf, including the petiole. The last few stages, or instars, do the majority of the feeding damage. Larvae characteristically arch their heads and tails in a defensive posture when disturbed. Since they feed together, damage may be localized to just a branch or two. Isolated trees are more subject to attack than orchard trees.

The caterpillars often move in a group to the tree trunk to molt from one stage to the next, leaving a path of fur-like hair and cast skins. When they finish feeding, they drop to the ground and pupate in the soil. They do not spin a cocoon but form a naked pupal case.

In Texas, at least two generations of the insect develop each year. We had the first generation in June. The second generation has been hatching out for the last three weeks. The second generation has been hatching out for the last three weeks. The second generation is almost always larger in number and cause more damage than the first. In most years they do not cause a problem, but this is one of the worst years for the caterpillars.

Wasp and fly parasites sometimes attack walnut caterpillars but cannot be depended upon for complete

control. The egg masses found on the leaves of small trees can be removed by hand. Groups of caterpillars found on the trunks or branches during molting can also be destroyed.

For larger trees and plantings, the application of insecticide sprays is the most practical method of control. However, it is more effective if the eggs and immature larvae are detected early and sprayed before extensive damage occurs.

Use products containing Sevin, Malathion, Diazinon, Zolene, Orthene, Methoxychlor, Dylox, Proxol, Pydrin, or Bacillus Thuringiensis. Thoroughly spray leaves, twigs, limbs and tree trunks. Large infested trees may require treatment by commercial applicators with high-pressure sprayers.

Insecticide label clearances are subject to change, so be sure to read and follow carefully the instructions on the container label. The pesticide user is responsible for the effects of pesticides on his own plants or household goods as well as problems caused by drift to his property or other properties or plants.

At the Eastland County Extension Homemaker "Jam Session" held recently we had a great attendance which was for the purpose of planning fall Extension Homemaker activities. Along with our Jam Session, we served homemade bread and jam. Dora Schaefer baked the traditional bread and I made a different kind of bread called Cornmeal Mini-Loaves.

### CORNMEAL MINI-LOAVES

2 packages active dry yeast  
1/2 cup warm water  
1 cup milk, scalded  
1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 tablespoon salt  
1/2 cup water, cool to lukewarm  
5 1/2 to 6 cups all-purpose flour  
2 1/2 cups cornmeal

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Pour scalded milk over shortening, sugar and salt; stir occasionally until shortening melts. Add water. Stir in 2 cups flour and eggs. Add yeast and cornmeal. Stir in enough additional flour to make soft dough. Turn dough out onto lightly floured surface;

knead 8 to 10 minutes or until smooth and elastic. Shape dough into a ball. Place in a greased bowl, turning to coat surface of dough. Cover; let rise in a warm place about 1 hour or until doubled in size. Punch dough down. Shape to form 6 French bread-shaped loaves about 6 inches long. Generously grease 2 large cookie sheets; sprinkle each with about 2 tablespoons cornmeal. Place 3 loaves on each cookie sheet. Cut three 1/2 inch deep slashes across the top of each loaf. Cover; rise about 45 minutes or until nearly doubled in size. Bake at 500 degrees F. 18 to 20 minutes or until golden brown.

## Doing Business With Social Security

If you need to get in touch with Social Security, Glyn Hammons, Social Security Manager in Abilene, has some important tips for you. They will enable you to conduct your business as quickly and as easily as possible.

"One big suggestion I have is to use the phone more," Hammons said. "Most Social Security matters can be handled this way. For example, you can request a Social Security number application for your child; apply for monthly benefits; report a change of address, work activity, or other event that may affect your benefits; get assistance in filling out a Medicare form; and get answers to questions."

Of course, some people prefer to visit a Social Security office and talk directly with a represen-

tative, Hammons said. In this case, they can call and ask for an appointment so that the waiting time in the office will be shortened. Also, they can find out what information and documents to bring with them.

"Although you can call Social Security any time during regular business hours Monday through Friday, there are certain periods when you are less likely to get a busy signal," Hammons explained. "Unless the business is urgent or you want to apply for benefits, the best time to call is after the middle of the month. Also, afternoons and the last half of each week are generally less busy than mornings or early in the week."

## Baird Mayor Has Memories Of Eastland County

Frank Payne, Mayor of Baird, says that he has enjoyed serving in that office for the past five years.

He does not plan to run for another term, however, so will retire next spring at the end of six years.

"When I told people that news during the last City Council meeting they didn't believe me," chuckles the tall, gray-eyed man. "But after all, I'm 74 years old, and I feel like six years is a good chunk of my life."

Payne mentions his strong ties to Baird, where he and his wife Cora May, have lived since 1944. But he says he will always have special memories of Eastland County, for he spent his childhood and youth in this area.

Born in Dublin, Texas in 1913, Frank Payne came with his parents to the Desdemona area when small. In December, 1924 the family moved to a farm in the Punkin Center community, near the town of Mangum.

Frank remembers Mangum, southwest of Eastland, as a thriving health and tourist center. It had a large hotel, a railroad depot, and various other buildings. He especially remembers the Mangum Baptist Church, whose members met in a building east of the present location.

"I was saved during one of those meetings, there in an old brush arbor near the Church," he says. "It is really good to go back and see

the Mangum Baptist Church still active. Everything else in the town is gone - hardly a trace of it."

Payne says he also likes to go back to the town of Eastland and look over some of the landmarks. He worked in several service stations there before moving away.

While looking back over his years as Mayor Baird, Payne lists several things he considers highlights.

One is the acquiring of the new candy factory, Grumpy's Specialties, for the town. This business, located on Market St. is expected to employ around 24 people within the next two years.

The Mayor made four trips down to Austin over a period of 4 1/2 years to obtain the Grant which helped finance

the project. The owner of the factory will start paying the Grant back next July. Grumpy's is off to a successful start, and will be quite an asset to the community.

Payne says another important thing was the passing of an Animal Control Ordinance by the City Council on Aug. 10.

"I feel this will help with a real problem the City has experienced," Payne says.

The non-binding public vote we had on this matter showed 118 For such an Ordinance and 34 Against. The Council decided to go along with public opinion on this."

In spite of such concerns - and sometimes lengthy City Council meetings - being Mayor has been generally enjoyable, Payne says. But now that he has decided to not to run again, he is beginning to think of other things he wants to do.

"You know, I used to like to play golf," he says.

"Come to think of it - I haven't had time to play a game in more than five years - just about the time I became Mayor!"

## Educators Gathered For Annual ATPE Leadership

Educators from across the state gathered in Arlington Aug. 13 for the seventh annual ATPE Leadership Workshop hosted by the 42,500-member Association of Texas Professional Educators, the largest independent educators' association in the country.

About 150 local and regional ATPE leaders attended informative

workshops and shared membership recruitment ideas they prepared for the new school year.

Attending from the Eastland and Cisco local units were Cindy Bilby, Diana Gregory, Donna Coxsey and Ruth Stewart.

ATPE expanded its leadership training program this year and conducted similar workshops in Austin,

where ATPE is headquartered, as well as in Houston and Lubbock.

"This year's workshops were particularly successful because we had more leaders than ever getting involved," said Hazel Moye, ATPE's state president from McAllen.

"Our expanded program allowed more leaders to attend, and the training they

received will make them better able to serve our members and promote the association's philosophy," she said.

Highlights of the workshop in Arlington included an overview of education issues in Texas' regular and special legislative sessions and a discussion of ATPE's professional liability insurance policy.

## Adapting To Kindergarten

Even the parents of children who have attended pre-school or day-care can have mixed feelings about sending their child off to kindergarten, says family life specialist Diane T. Welch.

"The pre-schools and day care centers that many children attend have some elements of school, but also try to simulate a home-like environment," observes the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

"Kindergarten focuses on teaching children the formal skills they need for success in the school environment, she explains.

"It's not unusual for parents to almost regret that the child must face the demands of school, and yet be proud that he or she is growing into a self-sufficient individual who can adjust to and enjoy the world outside the home," adds Welch.

"Children will have mixed feelings too," she says, "so by expressing their joys and concern, parents become a role model for the child, encouraging open communication about school."

According to the specialist, some parents fear that by allowing children to express negative emotions about starting school, they will encourage these feelings. But talking about it allows the child to acknowledge and work through these emotions without shame or guilt.

She suggests using the last few days of vacation to smooth the transition to kindergarten with some of the following activities:

- Don't make promises, but talk and wonder with the child about school. Read books about school and tell your own stories about the days when you went to school. Help the child

understand about progress in learning. Some children are upset to find they can't read the very first day!

- Make a visit to your child's classroom and teacher. Some schools schedule these visits with parents in advance. Explore the playground and bathroom, try out the chairs and find the water fountain.
- Encourage your child to play with another child who will be in the kindergarten class, so he or she will have a friend there.

- Get a head start on schedule changes by adjusting bedtime and mealtime if that will be necessary once school begins. If new day-care arrangements for before or after kindergarten are necessary, start the day-care routine before school begins, so the child doesn't have to adjust to both at once.

- Help your child learn his or her whole name, address, telephone number and what to do if you're late arriving at home or school.

On a trip to Jerusalem I visited with the antiquity dealer who bought the Dead Sea Scrolls from a Bedouin shepherd boy. The shepherd had discovered them in 1947 in the caves located by the Dead Sea. The leather scrolls were found in broken pottery jars. Scholars patiently unrolled the crumbling scrolls and translated the writing. Radiocarbon tests of some of the linen scrolls wrappings show the caves were in use sometime between 100 years B.C. and 100 years A.D. Two copper sheets found by the jars contained a list of places where

members of the Jewish sect, the Essenes, had buried their treasures. These scrolls had remained intact due to the dry climate of the Dead Sea area.

As I visited with the antiquity dealer, Dr. Joseph Saud, former curator of the Palestine Archaeological Museum in Jerusalem, came into the shop. I was to hear more about this important discovery. He told me that he was one of the scholars who translated these scrolls into our modern language. He commented, "It has been proven historically that Jesus lived,

died, and was resurrected from the dead. It has left no doubt."

I must confess that this statement by this Jewish scholar had a profound effect on me. After centuries God had seen fit to allow a historic fact to surface to remind the scoffers that Jesus truly was His Son.

It is good to have historical proof. However, Jesus said, "Blessed are they that have not seen, and yet have believed" (John 20:20). Christians are identified by their confession of Jesus of Nazareth. He is the son of God and the Lord of Life. The scriptures teach that

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

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# Bench Marks For 1987-88 School District Budget In Texas

AUSTIN—Last year trustees in the 1,061 local school districts adopted budgets totaling \$12.2 billion and levied local property taxes totaling \$5 billion to pay for it. The state provided \$4.8 billion of foundation aid, bond sales, and other revenue.

Locally, the Carbon I.S.D. tax levy was increased by 7.3 percent; Cisco I.S.D.'s, 10.8 percent; Eastland I.S.D.'s, 5.8 percent; Gorman I.S.D.'s, 6.5 percent; Rising Star I.S.D.'s, 14.5 percent; for 1986-87 as compared to a 8.2 percent increase for the average school district in Texas.

The figures come from the latest issue of "Bench Marks for 1987-88 School District Budgets in Texas", an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

School budgets adopted last year called for spending an average of \$3,088 per student for current operations plus \$281 for interest and repayment of debt and \$464 per student for capital outlay.

Carbon's budget, \$4838.73; Cisco's budget, \$2744.47; Eastland's, \$2420.59; Gor-

man's, \$4,005.55; Ranger's, \$3,308.67; and Rising Star's, \$3,938.70, per student for current operations.

For debt service, Carbon's, \$0.00; Cisco's, \$61.75; Eastland's, \$199.92; Gorman's, \$187.23; Ranger's, \$207.39; and Rising Star's, \$112.67; and for capital outlay, Carbon, \$137.17; Cisco, \$916.77; Eastland, \$344.42; Gorman, \$130.06; Ranger, \$12.29; and Rising Star, \$99.79.

per student based on the 113 students enrolled in Carbon; 917 in Cisco; 1,061 in Eastland; 346 in Gorman; 651 in Ranger; and 216 in Rising Star in the Fall Semester of 1986.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by Carbon was \$24,384; Cisco, \$20,623; Eastland, \$21,522; Gorman, \$21,866; Ranger, \$20,944; and Rising Star, \$22,014. The average among all school districts in Texas was \$24,487 per classroom teacher.

In Carbon I.S.D., the average salary for administrators was \$35,294, and \$19,752 for other professional support employees (Librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.).

In Cisco, \$33,633 for administrators and \$20,330 for

support employees; In Eastland, \$38,564 for adm. and \$23,413 for support employees; Gorman, \$37,072 for adm., and \$28,834 for support employees; Ranger, \$37,894 for adm., and \$19,964 for support employees; and Rising Star, \$31,998 for adm., and \$24,342 for support employees.

Four dollars in five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense average \$2,506 per student, as compared to \$3,577.89 in Carbon I.S.D.; \$2,019.81 in Cisco I.S.D.; \$1,788.78 in Eastland; \$3,001.51 in Gorman; \$2,427.55 in Ranger; and \$3,038.84 in Rising Star. Payroll expense is a combination of salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 10.5 students in Carbon; 19.1 students in Cisco; 19.2 students in Eastland I.S.D.; 13.3 students in Gorman I.S.D.; 14.6 students in Ranger; and 11.4 students in Rising Star I.S.D. compared to a statewide pupil-teacher ratio 1 to 17.4. Because of small classes, especially at the high school level, and abbreviated teaching schedules, many classes have more than the average number of students.

The average school district imposed a property tax at the rate of 79.3 cents per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 93.8 percent of market value (selling price).

The "true tax rate" was 74.3 cents (79.3 times 93.8 percent) statewide. Locally, the Carbon I.S.D. imposed a rate of \$7.70; Cisco, \$8.10; Eastland, \$7.95; Gorman, \$7.16; Ranger, \$9.10; and Rising Star, \$1.400, while property was appraised at 95.4 percent in Gorman of its market value making the true rate \$.734 per \$100 of market value (selling price).

In Cisco I.S.D., it was appraised at 97.2 percent, making the true rate \$.787.

In Eastland I.S.D., it was appraised at 97.0 percent, making the true rate \$.771.

In Gorman, property was appraised at 89.8 percent, making the true rate \$.643.

In Ranger, property was appraised at \$100.8 percent of its market value, making the true rate \$.918.

And in Rising Star, property was appraised at 93.0 percent, making the true rate 1.302 per \$100 of market value.

The report points out that the calculation of a true rate based on market value rather than appraised value enables a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools. In 1986, the true tax rate exceeded \$1 in 196 school districts in Texas.

The tax on a house in the Carbon district that would sell for \$80,000 would have been \$577. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$541, and if owned by a person 65 years or older, the tax on an \$80,000 house in Carbon District would have averaged \$469, or less if subject to a tax freeze.

In Cisco district, the tax on an \$80,000 home would have been \$609; with homestead exemptions, \$571; 65 or older, \$495.

In Eastland district, tax on an \$80,000 home would have been \$569; with homestead exemptions, \$534; 65 or older, \$463.

In Gorman district, tax on an \$80,000 home would have been \$480; with homestead exemption, \$451; and 65 or older, \$391.

In Ranger district, tax on an \$80,000 home would have been \$656; \$616 with homestead exemptions; and if age 65 or older, \$534, or less if subject to a tax freeze.

And in Rising Star district, tax on an \$80,000 home would have been \$1021; with homestead exemptions, \$958; and if 65 or older, \$830, or less if subject to a tax freeze.

Revenue lost from exemptions exceeded a billion dollars. To balance school budgets, the revenue loss from exemptions was imposed upon other tax payers in the school district.

Local property taxes plus state aid was \$4579 per student in Carbon I.S.D.; \$2973 in Cisco I.S.D.; \$2877 in Eastland I.S.D.; \$3129 in Gorman I.S.D.;

\$3433 in Ranger I.S.D.; and \$4295 in Rising Star I.S.D. as compared to \$3075 statewide. The primary purpose of state aid is to equalize state and local tax resources among schools. In 1986-87 tax resources ranged from less

than \$2500 per student in 30 districts to more than \$10,000 in eight districts.

## Volunteers Are Needed At Texas Department Of Human Resources

"The needs are critical here too."

That was the report heard by persons who met at the First Baptist Church, 405 S. Seaman, last Thursday. The purpose of the meeting was to gather information about the food, clothing and job needs of the community, and discuss how resources could be pooled to meet these needs.

During the meeting it was stated that the Department of Human Services in Eastland is in urgent need of volunteers to help process applications for assistance. There are special needs for Clerk Assistants and Casework Assistants.

The Department of Human Services is located on the Fifth Floor of the Exchange Bldg. on North Lamar in Eastland.

The general responsibilities of a Clerk Assistant are to stamp and collate forms, copy verification documents, assist with mail and prepare dummy cases. The clerk also files forms in casefolders, does some limited typing prepares recertification packets for mailing, and purges cases.

The skills and abilities needed for these jobs include the ability to follow verbal and written instructions, the ability to relate to a variety of people, and the ability to respect the confidential nature of information.

The Clerk Assistant must also file in alphabetical, numerical and chronological order. Light typing ability is helpful but not essential.

On training, a two-hour orientation to the agency is provided. On-the-job training is provided by the income assistance staff.

The volunteer clerk-assistance work is done in four-hour shifts, with Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons preferred. Other items are also available.

There are some benefits to a Clerk Assistance Volunteer. The volunteer gains experience in working in an office setting, learns about the AFDC and Medicaid programs, and

gains experience in working with others in a professional manner.

Another area of volunteer need is for a Casework Assistant. This volunteer will assist clients on completion of forms, assist clients with collateral contracts and verification needs, and screen applicants for completeness.

The volunteer will also complete home visits to determine residence for family members, telephone clients to remind them of appointments, and make referrals to other agencies.

The same abilities are needed as for the Clerk Assistant. The time commitment differs, however - around 8 hrs. per week is needed. The time can be agreed on based on needs of office and time available to volunteer. The training is the same as for the Clerk Assistant.

Benefits to the Caseworker volunteer are about the same as for the other job - an opportunity to learn about the program, experience in working with others in a professional manner, and, in

Casework, experience in working with people in need, and an opportunity to learn about food stamps.

Although not listed as a "benefit", there will also definitely be a joy in knowing that you have helped people less fortunate than yourself.





A carrier of the AIDS virus may have no signs or symptoms of the AIDS disease and may not develop the disease. Carriers can infect someone else through sexual contact, or sharing needles or syringes for intravenous drug use, but not through normal casual contact.

manager, said recently negotiated contract revisions reflecting the continued soft price of natural gas makes the refund necessary.

"As our cost for boiler fuel went down, we simply over-collected under the fuel rate approved by the PUC," Kennedy said.

This will be the sixth refund made to WTU retail customers since the summer of 1985. The fuel rates charged to customers have been adjusted five times since 1985, but the price of natural gas, WTU's main power plant boiler fuel, has continued to decline.

WTU's base rates have not changed since December 1984. However, on May 19, 1987, the Company filed for an increase in base rates necessitated by the completion of the new coal-fired Oklahoma Power Station near Vernon. The assured supply of coal under a long-term contract is expected to help stabilize WTU's power plant fuel costs.

The refund will be made through one-time credits to retail customers in December subject to approval of the PUC. The typical residential customer will receive about \$7.00.
