Last year's basketball season ended at the McLennan Community College Gym for the Cisco Junior College Lady Wranglers with a heart breaking 68-69 loss to Odessa in the regional semi-finals. The 1987-88 season will start in the same location with CJC opening against Howard County on Wednesday, Oct. 28, in the McLennan Community College Classic. Game time will be 4 p.m. and it is expected to be a tough contest. The classic continues on Thursday and Friday with the Lady Wranglers going against Temple at 8 p.m. Thursday and Wharton at 6 p.m. Friday.

This year's team, coached by Ronnie Hearne, will be hard pressed to match the accomplishments of last year's team. Last year the Lady Wranglers were 24-6 for the season, 12-0 in the Northern Conference with a third straight Conference Championship, and extended their home court winning streak to an impressive 36 games.

The 1987-88 edition of the Lady Wranglers returns with three starters and several other experienced sophomores. Returning starters are 6'0" Lisa Schoemer from Hawley, 5'10" Tia Rosser from Keller, and 5'11" Naidene Tiemann from Priddy. from Plainview has been impressive at the point guard position and should play an important role in this year's team. The Lady Wranglers will be on the road playing until November 24, when they will try to extend their winning streak to 37 games in the Cisco Junior College Gym. 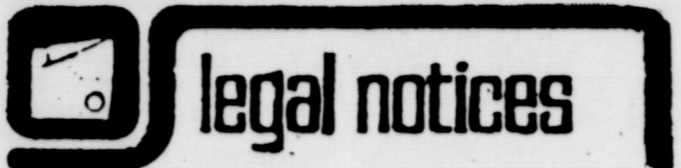

Discussions at the Commissioners Court Monday centered on plans for the Jail. Plans to bring the building up to requirements of the State Jail Standards Commission, were reviewed, the expansion also of the present facility. Provisions were made for a temporary Jailer to fill in for Jailer Bill Green.

All Commissioners were present at the meeting, with Judge Scott Bailey presiding. Among others presents was James Wheeler, an Abilene architect, Sheriff Don Underwood, and Assistant District Attorney Bill Dowell. The Commissioners voted to make an offer to a land owner with property joining the present jail to sell this land to the County for \$60,000. Also approved was an alternate plan which would give the landowner

He asked permission from the Commissioners to finish the rest of this schematic design on the jail. The finalized work would include the floor plan, cost etc. of a facility for 48 inmates.

The Commissioners approved his request. On the current jail, Wheeler reported that efforts to replace the lighting and upgrade the Inter-com system were stalled for lack of equipment.

"The light fixtures are not here," he said. "I understand they are due for shipment today."

"The holes for pushbuttons on the Inter-com have been drilled, and we are waiting for equipment there too."

Some of this equipment has to be custom-made, he said.

Sheriff Underwood reported that last week Jailer Bill Green fell while at work and broke his hip. It would be about five months before he could go back to work.

The Sheriff said he wondered if there was some way the Jailer could stay on the county payroll and the amount from his Workman's Compensation be put in the General Fund and used to hire a temporary Jailer.

After discussion, the Commissioners agreed on a leave

of absence for Jailer Green. A temporary employee will be paid \$5 per hr. for five months, with his salary to \$5.38 per hour if he continues to work longer.

Commissioner Billy Bacon reported that the Jail had 18 inmates at this time, with an average of 17-18 for the past few weeks. This is below the 24-prisoner limit required by the Jail Standards Commission.

Bill Dowell, Assistant District Attorney, reported that the mandamus case involving Eastland County was the 5th case on the docket in the Court of

Criminal Appeals in Austin on Wednesday, Oct. 28. Emory Walton will represent the county.

The Commissioners appointed Shirley Wheeler of Olden as an Alternate Election Judge for Pct. 2.

Also approved was a request by Christie Gas Transmission Corp. to cross County Rd. 494 in Pct. 2 with a pipeline. This crossing is on Tudor Road, in the eastern edge of the county. Norman Christian stated that the line should be laid 48 inches below the level of the road, and this was put in the contract.

9. The Oldest Man and Woman Exhibitors will be honored during the special

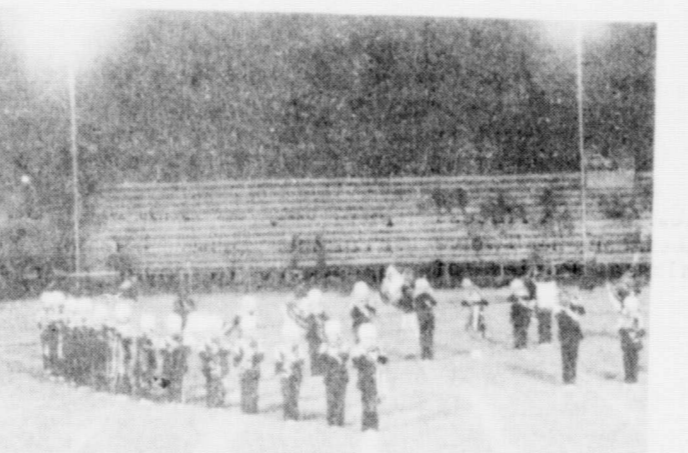
recognition program on Thursday, November 5 at 2

p.m. (Past winners of the Oldest Man and Woman Exhibitor award are ineligible to receive the honor during the current year's Bazaar).

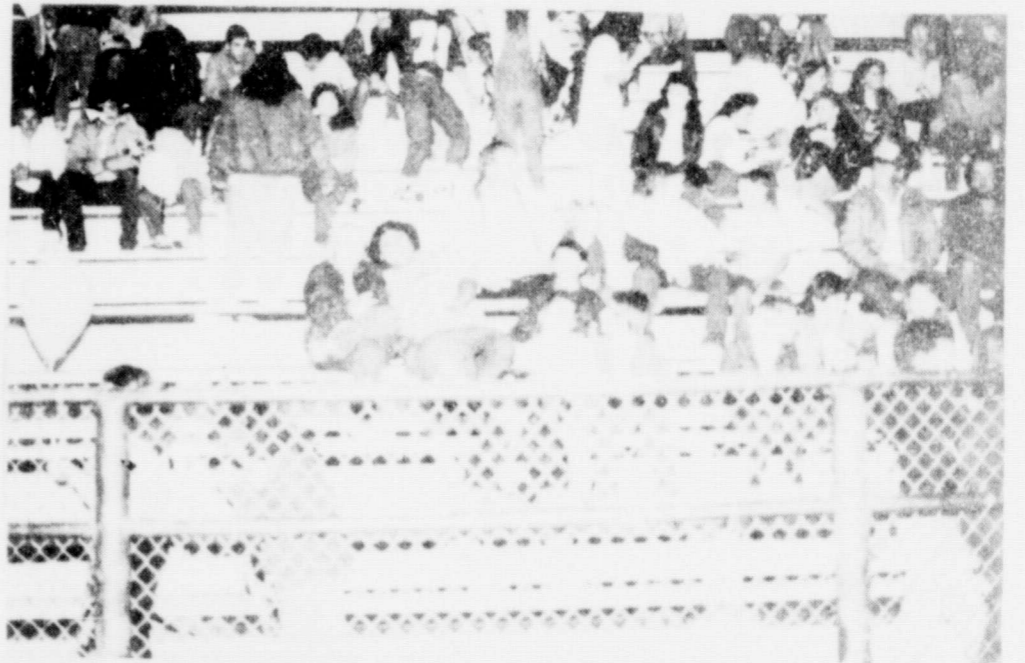

### I've Been Wrong Before

Probable the least justifiable reason for losing my temper was the rejection of an idea. Maybe the anger was because, like some people have called an idea ones "brain child" and people resent violently a hurt to their children. You might take tearing your idea apart about as badly as someone tearing a real child limb from limb.

I grew up in coal country and years ago a series of explosions in the same mine killed men but their cause was undetermined. Having had contact with testing of gas from Texas natural gas wells and knowing that gas is not simply "gas" but a mixture of methane, hydrogen, and heavier combustible the BTU (heat) content can vary widely with some gas having hydrogen as to be too poor to market under present conditions. Gas in the Panhandle in some wells contained helium which doesn't burn at all. But while not a hot cooking gas, hydrogen explodes violently.

Knowing that the gas detecting devices of that period (I don't know about now) could only detect methane, I wrote the Bureau of Mines in Washington my thought that the undetected problem might be hydrogen. They did answer my letter but rejected as quite improbable my idea.

There they were with dead men on their hands, no idea why, yet they rejected without investigation a suggestion. Oh yes, they did mention that a new device capable of detecting hydrogen as well could be developed but would be very expensive. I wondered what the bureaucrats thought the value of lives would be set at if they asked miners families?

Maybe they thought that because the idea was free it was worth the asking price, NOTHING. Maybe they felt that no idea had value unless it originated in their own bureaucratic baliwack. Maybe they just sat on their fat and didn't rally care. I was angry but impotent as most who encounter entrenched bureaucracy.

Poor government employees. We are all too hard on them. We do get distressed by endless waiting as when I wanted to see eye doctors at Veterans Administration hospital in Dallas. Your appointment is made months in advance yet on the day you wait and wait and wait some more. That particular day was the worst. Still, my wife was with me to chat with and to fetch a cup of coffee least I be called while getting one myself. The day dragged toward five and I feared I might have to ask my boss at Texas Employment Commission for another day off if they said, "Come back tomorrow." The winter day grew dim and waiting patients became impatient and cursed "these blankly blank bureaucrats."

"Discussion turned toward occupations. There was a mechanic who gave up his trade because of failing eyes, a driller from Ranger, etc. until someone asked me, "Say buddy, what do you do?" My casual reply, "Oh,

I'm just another bureaucrat," was followed by stunned silence. Even my wife who should have expected weird replies from me was shocked. On the way home she admonished that I could at least have said I was a placement interviewer.

It turned out that when we got in one doctor and an intern were doing the work several usually did. One doc. had called in sick, another had fallen on the side of his boat while fishing Sunday breaking ribs, yet another was injured in an accident and might never recover. Those "bureaucrats" who apologized for our long wait were missing supper too but waiting in the hall we impatient ones didn't know what was holding things up. The average bureaucrat would have shut it down before five.

My own boss at TEC was probably responsible for my more understanding attitude. She admonished us in training that we might encounter hostility. Most people who enter an employment office have serious problems. They have no job and they have dependents looking to them for their daily bread. Naturally they are going to be "up tight" and may let their hostility and frustration boil over on the interviewer. Nor does the man off the street understand the rules, regulations, and laws which govern what must be done. Thus, we kind never to reply in kind regardless of how abusive they might seem.

One incident which stands out involved a man looking for work following the slump precipitated by the oil embargo. No sooner had the receptionist handed me his application that he said, "You G-- D-- Texas people won't give an out of state fellow a chance." But that is a story a bit long for now so if you want to read it you will be PATIENT I hope.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, as you know the flu season is just around the corner. I took the flu shot one time and it made me sick. Do you have information who should take those shots?

ANSWER: According to the doctors you may need a flu shot if you are among the following: A healthy person over 65 years of age; or any person with a chronic (long term) condition like: Cancer, diabetes, disease of the heart and lungs, kidney disease, anemia, tuberculosis and aids and related condition. Also those who take certain medications like steroids, or those who live in a nursing home or institution, or a health care worker should consider taking the flu shots.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I care for my mother but I need to get away every now and then. Is there a program in this section of the state where I could leave my mother and know she is being cared for?

ANSWER: Yes. The Graham Memorial

Hospital in Cisco has a respite program. Respite programs offer support so that family care-givers may take a break from the demands of caring for a frail person in the home. Such care may be provided for a few hours or for several weeks.

QUESTION: Can you tell us about the home care services and are they available in this section of the state?

ANSWER: Home care services are available throughout the big country. I would suggest you ask your doctor or look in the yellow pages for assistance. The number of home health agencies certified under medicare rose by more than 50% between 1982 and 1984. We do not have recent figures. Medicare only covers skilled care provided by certified home health agencies under defined conditions.

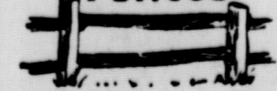

# Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Agent

## BEEF PROMOTIONAL BOOTH

The Eastland-Stephens-Palo Pinto Extension Agents-Home Economics are joining a Statewide campaign to educate the public on the "lean truth" about beef. Beef is lower in calories, fat, and cholesterol than most people think.

At the Tri-County Cow-Calf Clinic on Wednesday, October 28th at the Eastland County Livestock Showgrounds, the public is invited to visit the beef promotional booth that the home economists will be sponsoring. Our booth will be on display from 9:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m.

The booth will feature a large display illustrating the cholesterol comparisons of various meat groups. Also, two computer nutrition programs will be available and we can analyze your diets.

How does beef stack up when compared to poultry, which is generally preceived to be more healthful?

Using 3 ounce cooked portions, beef has 73 milligrams of cholesterol, chicken fried with skin on has 74 milligrams and roast chicken served without the skin has 76 milligrams. Dark meat turkey has 72 milligrams and light meat turkey 59 milligrams. One large egg, incidentally, has 252 milligrams of cholesterol.

The American Heart Association recommends consumption of no more than 300 milligrams of cholesterol a day. Beef fits easily into a healthful diet.

Until recently, facts and figures on beef were based on a 30 year old study made before beef was being bred to be leaner and lower in cholesterol.

Research on today's leaner, trimmer beef paints a rosier picture for the consumer whose taste buds are more tuned to an occasional steak than to an

everyday diet of fish or chicken.

Come by this coming Wednesday, we will, also, have beef recipe booklets available free to you.

## RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

Ghosts and goblins, tricks and treats, pumpkins and parties -- and Halloween treats are just a few of things that come to mind when we think about this holiday devoted to fun.

## GREAT PUMPKIN COOKIES

2 cups flour  
1 cup quick or old fashioned oats, uncooked  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 cup butter or margarine, softened  
1 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
1 cup granulated sugar  
1 egg, slightly beaten  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
1 cup solid packed pumpkin  
1 cup semi-sweet real chocolate morsels  
Assorted icings or peanut butter  
Assorted candies, raisins or nuts

Preheat oven to 350°. Combine flour, oats, baking soda, cinnamon and salt; set aside. Cream butter; gradually add sugars, beating until light and fluffy. Add egg and vanilla; mix. Alternate additions of dry ingredients and pumpkin, mixing well after each addition. Stir in morsels. For each cookie, drop 1/4 cup dough onto lightly greased cookies sheet; spread into pumpkin shape, using a thin metal spatula. Add a bit more dough to form stem. Bake 20 to 25 minutes, until cookies are firm and lightly browned. Remove from cookie sheets; cool on racks. Decorate, using icing or peanut butter to affix assorted candies, raisins or nuts. Yields 19 to 20 large cookies.

Variation: Substitute 1 cup raisins for morsels.

(ED. NOTE: Voters in this county and across the state will go to the polls on Tuesday, Nov. 3, and mark ballots in the General Election which offers no candidates for offices, but does offer 25 choices on proposed Constitutional Amendments and two binding referenda. The following is a summation by the Texas Research League in its publication Analysis.)

In 1873, Richard Coke was elected Governor of Texas having defeated the incumbent E.J. Davis, a Republican Reconstructionist. Two years later, with the Democrats firmly in control, Texans set about drafting a new constitution. After almost a decade of carpetbagger rule in the post-Civil War era, Texans were skeptical of vesting too much power in government. As a result, the 1876 Constitution attempted to limit spending and debt

creation, legislative actions and executive privilege. Detail usually found in statutes in other jurisdictions became a traditional part of the Texas constitution.

Wholesale revision attempts have not been successful; the last, in 1975, was overwhelmingly defeated by the voters. Changes to the constitution have had to come in the form of amendments - a form seemingly readily accepted by Texans. Through 1988, a total of 465 amendments will have been submitted to the electorate; 287 have been approved.

The 70th Legislature approved another 28 amendments (a new record) for voter consideration. Twenty-five of these will be on the ballot this year; the other three will be submitted in 1988.

1987 AMENDMENTS Bonded Debt. Texas is a

pay-as-you go state; the constitution requires a balanced budget and prohibits debt creation. Prohibits, that is, except where it is otherwise specifically authorized; a practice frequently utilized. Five amendments (Nos. 6, 7, 8, 18 and 23) authorize the legislature to issue additional state bonds.

Economic Development. Three amendments (Nos. 1, 4, and 5) are directly related to the state's current economic development efforts. Each is an attempt to overcome the constitutional ban on government lending credit or granting public moneys to an individual or corporation. (Some of the bond authorization proposals also could be grouped as economic development endeavors.)

Property Tax Exemptions. The constitution once required that all property be subject to ad valorem taxes based on full market value. Over the years a long list of exceptions have been written into the constitution by amendment. Proposals Nos. 3, 10, 11, and 20 would expand that

list. State Government. Three proposals (Nos. 9, 21, and 22) pertain to limitations on state executive and legislative offices.

County Government. County organizational structure and authority are severely restricted by the constitution. Amendments Nos. 15, 16, and 24 would provide some limited flexibility for counties.

Special Districts. The constitution authorizes the legislature to create various types of special districts for the performance of specific functions. Proposals Nos. 2, 13, 18, and 25 pertain to these limited local governments.

Miscellaneous Provisions. The final three amendments (No. 12, Community Property; No. 14, State Criminal Appeals; and No. 17, Municipal Tort Liability) deal with separate, but important, topics.

## TWO BINDING STATEWIDE REFERENDA

Texas' voters, for the first time, have been asked by the legislature to pass

statutory law. In each case, the subject matter was so controversial that the legislature could not reach a conclusion on their own. Public referendums most often are included as advisory matters, but in this case they are binding votes.

State Board of Education. No. 1 proposes to retain the present appointed status for the State Board of Education. A "yes" vote means the Board members will be appointed; a "no" returns the members to an elected status.

Parimutuel Betting. No. 2 proposes to permit, on a local-option basis, wagering on horse or dog races. A "yes" vote would allow local voters to approve betting.
