City Of Cisco Has Submitted Application To Receive Money To Work On Northeast Section Of City

City manager Mike Moore told the City Council members that Cisco has submitted an application to the Texas Community Development Program for 1987-88, at the regular meeting held last Tuesday night. The City of Cisco is proposing a grant request to the Texas Department of Community Affairs for \$275,000.

Mike said Cisco is competing against 25 to 30 other Texas cities who have submitted an application. There will only be five or six cities who will receive the funding he said.

If Cisco is approved for the program improvements for the northeast part of the city will begin. Mike said street paving will begin and code enforcements will be upheld. There will be sewer placement and water line placement among several other

improvements in that part of the city.

Mike said the City will have a public hearing at 5:30 p.m., Monday, Nov. 2, in the Council Chambers of City Hall. The public hearing will be held for the purpose of soliciting citizen input for the development of a Community Development program. All citizens, particularly low income residents, are invited and encouraged to attend he said.

Before the regular meeting began, city council members, the city mayor and five guest were given a tour of the new wastewater treatment facility and the water treatment plant.

Mike explained the method of operation of the two plants to the guests. Those making the tour were Mayor Joe Wheatley, council members Vernetta Pierce, Bural Chambers, Roy Den-

nis, Arlie Whitely and Allen Masters, water department superintendent Leon Boles, and guests Bobby Ingram, Evelyn Valek, Don Shepard and Wanda Hallmark.

Mike said he is proud and pleased with the City of Cisco employees. He said he is pleased with the accomplishments that have

been made in Cisco. Mayor Joe Wheatley added there have certainly been a lot of improvements made in Cisco over the last 5 or 6 years.

In other matters, city council members accepted City Manager Mike Moore's

Large Crowd Is Expected To Vote Tues. At Election

A large crowd is expected for this Tuesday's Special Election. Cisco voters will go to the polls on Nov. 3, to cast their vote on 25 constitutional amendments and two referendums. Cisco voters will go to the Corral Room, 400 Conrad Hilton Ave. Voting booths will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

There were approximately 90 county absentee votes turned in at the Eastland County Courthouse.

The two referendums are the most popular issues for the voters to decide on. Referendum No. 1 submits to the voters the question of whether the 15 members of the State Board of Education should be appointed instead of elected. If the proposition

passes, then Governor Clements will appoint a member of the board for each district, with the consent of the Senate. If the proposition fails, the members will be elected from these districts.

Referendum No. 2 submits to the voters the question of whether pari-mutual wagering should be legal in Texas on a county-by-county local option basis. If pari-mutual wagering is adopted by the voters statewide, a county must also pass a separate proposition on pari-mutual wagering at an election held in the county before any such wagering may be conducted in that county.

Everyone is encouraged to vote Tuesday, and let their voices be heard.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor: Please allow me to address several of the most common questions asked concerning PROPOSITION 14, STATE'S LIMITED RIGHT TO APPEAL, that will appear on the ballot November 3, 1987.

I. WHY IS STATE'S RIGHT TO APPEAL NEEDED? The Texas Constitution presently prohibits the State from appealing any ruling by a judge that occurs at any stage of a criminal prosecution. Texas is the only state in the country in which the people's representative, the State, is powerless to challenge a trial judge's ruling. This is true no matter how legally out of step they may be and no matter how disastrous they may be to the fair and appropriate outcome of the case.

II. WHAT DOES PROPOSITION 14 DO? Proposition 14 amends the Constitution to allow the State to appeal in certain situations carefully limited by law. The law that would govern if Proposition 14

passes would give the State the right to appeal pre-trial legal rulings that dismiss indictments or prevent the State from introducing certain evidence at trial before a judge or jury.

III. WILL THE STATE BE ALLOWED TO APPEAL NOT GUILTY VERDICTS? NO. The State can never appeal not guilty verdicts and Proposition 14 does not change that.

IV. WILL PROPOSITION 14 ALLOW THE STATE TO DELAY OR DRAG OUT TRIALS? NO. It does not allow the State to drag out or delay trials by appealing. Once a jury is selected and sworn in, the State's right to appeal automatically ends and the trial proceeds to its uninterrupted conclusion.

V. CAN THE STATE PUNISH A DEFENDANT BY KEEPING HIM IN JAIL WHILE THE STATE APPEALS? NO. If a defendant is on bond when the State appeals, he remains on bond. If he is in jail, the judge must set a reasonable bond. If the judge's pre-trial ruling would terminate the prosecution if

upheld on appeal the defendant is entitled to be released from jail on a personal bond while he awaits the higher court ruling.

VI. WHY SHOULD PROPOSITION 14 PASS? Because it is only fair. It is time to add balance to the scales of justice on behalf of victims and the general public.

Lastly, over 2,500 Texas prosecutors, as members of the Texas District & County Attorney's Association, endorse this amendment as a positive step toward better law enforcement.

Voting for Proposition 14 is a chance for citizens of Texas to help eliminate some of the inequities that exist when criminal defendants get off on legal technicalities.

Dear Editor: On Tuesday, November 3, Texans will go to the polls to determine whether pari-mutuel betting will finally be legalized in the Lone Star State.

A state with a centuries-old tradition of horsemanship, Texas has an economy already heavily vested in horses and horse-related business and activities. With \$1,013,000,000 added to the gross national product in 1985, Texas is at the heart of the nation's horse business, an industry that generates jobs in -- and taxes from -- farming, real estate, manufacturing, insurance, veterinary medicine, even tourism.

And even without the direct benefits of a Los Alamitos or Ruidoso, more Quarter Horses that made official starts on recognized tracks last year were foaled in Texas than any other state; more owners of starters live in the state; more breeders make their homes here. (For that matter, one ought to walk through the parking lots of any pari-mutuel track in Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma or New Mexico, and county the number of Texas license plates...)

You've probably heard of the studies that show pari-mutuel wagering would bring with it an increase in breeding farms and training facilities, in farm land use and demand for agricultural products: The Texas Department of Agriculture estimates that more than \$500,000,000 annually could be put into the Texas farm economy. Bob Bullock, the Comptroller of Public Accounts, estimates that, within five

years of establishment, some \$100 million annually would flow into the coffers of the Texas Treasury, and the cities and counties could share another \$7 million.

Polls indicate that a substantial majority of Texas favor legalizing betting. The problem is that many of them don't feel as strongly in favor of it as most of the vocal minority that absolutely, adamantly, opposes it. A good many proponents, in other words, may not bother to vote.

If you're a Texan, go vote on November 3rd. And take a carload of your friends with you.

From the beginning the publicity has stated however that family stories "of up to 500 words" and a suitable

family picture would be printed at no charge. We probably didn't spell it out good enough that extra words would indeed cost ten cents a piece and that extra photos would cost \$15.00 each. We'll all know better next time.

Anyway, there are still many hard-working volunteers working reading, counting words and writing letters to those who over-wrote, and we guess extra measures of understanding are called for as we all do our dead level best to come out with an acceptable book for our kids and grandkids.

Let's re-emphasize this in particular: no one here is making any money off the book. Everybody involved locally are volunteers who are willing to give of their time and efforts to bring it off, but no one should even think about anybody locally making any money off the project. The local volunteers are giving much

more in time and talent than any who might be charged a bit for extra wordage. The effort was launched with that thought in mind. The locals will do the work and the publishing company will do the book for which they will be paid from book sales. The volunteers have to follow the guidelines of the publishing company which is an old and reputable company in every respect.

But even if you are charged some extra, it'll be less than what local volunteers are contributing to the development of the book. How much would you charge to affix mailing labels to 9,000 envelopes? You cannot put a price tag

on the amount of volunteer labor that's going into this book. And it's not over yet, so please, understand that "yes, we do want all the stories we can get," and "yes, it may cost you a little extra if you've over-written your family's story", but really now, if you've deemed it important enough to include the extra words, don't you also deem it important enough to pay the extra fee?

The Taylor Publishing Co. which is pledged to produce a quality book for us, is the only entity that will realize any profit from this project, and they're not in business for their health, so they deserve their profit.

No one locally is making a dime from the effort, and yes, it's a big headache, dealing with all of us, but they haven't given up yet, and we personally appreciate the hard work that they're doing to help making a good county history possible for us.

We apologize for not making it perfectly clear from the beginning, and we'll know better with the next one, but for now, we all ask patience and understanding.

That's the Eastland County spirit.

ANSWER: At one time the benefit was payable if the deceased had been eligible for Social Security. The regulations have been changed and only one of the spouses will be eligible. The reason, the way I understand it, is to save federal funds.

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I read an article stating the "oldest population is growing by leaps and bounds." Are we going to become an "old" person nation?

ANSWER: It looks that way, doesn't it. For instance two years ago, 1985, there were 25,000 Americans 100 years of age or older. It is projected in 2050 there will be a million. During the next 15 years we must build 40 nursing homes each month

to keep up with the demand. We are a healthy nation and medical science has enabled the aged to grow more old. We have many social problems ahead of us!

QUESTION: Mr. Cartee, I see you are a member of AARP. I have been thinking about joining. How many members are there?

Know When To Contact Social Security

It is important for the people in the Big Country area to know when to contact Social Security, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

A person should contact Social Security:

- Before getting his or her first job, because a Social Security number is required to get proper Social Security credits for earnings. Employers are required to examine a person's Social Security card. Be sure to apply for a number at least 2 weeks before it will be needed.
- After a death in the family to see if survivors benefits can be paid.
- When someone in the family is disabled, to find out if disability benefits can be paid.
- At retirement--at 65 for full rate benefits or as early as 62 for reduced benefits. Sign up for Medicare 2 or 3 months before 65 even if there are no plans for retirement.

- Any time there is a question about Social Security. When a person calls Social Security, the people there can tell him or her:
- How much work credit is needed to be insured for benefits.
- Who can get benefits
- How to replace a lost Social Security or Medicare card.
- How to apply for monthly Social Security benefits.
- How to get a free statement of the earnings reported to a person's

Social Security record.

• What documents a person applying for benefits

What the dog and horse gambling industry forgot to tell you.

The Revenue-Raising Myth

- In state after state, once pari-mutuel gambling is legalized, the unhappy truth is that horse and dog racing brings in less than 1% of any state's revenue. Texas State budget analysts predict that after five years of racing, dog and horse track gambling might bring in \$110 million per year in revenue for the state. That is only 1/2 of 1% of the state's current \$192 billion annual budget needs.
- Across the country, state legislatures have had to slash the state's portion of the gambling take from a high of only 8% to a current low of 1/2 of 1%. Texas would begin with only a 5% take.
- Last year, the newly-built Canterbury Downs racetrack in Minnesota-projected by the racing industry in 1985 to earn \$10 million dollars for the state--lost \$7.9 million dollars.
- The legal counsel for the Pennsylvania State Racing Commission said that the cost of regulating racing will soon outstrip the revenue most states receive.
- The Texas Horse Racing Association's study in 1985 forecast 4,000 jobs at racetracks, only 10% of which would be permanent.

The simple truth is that dog and horse gambling won't help our economy: racing produces no product; it employs migrant, seasonal workers at a minimum wage. It is a declining business that raises almost no money for the state.

CAPITOL UPDATE

Everybody is doing it and probably we can't do it better but we're going to attempt to explain at least some of the proposed constitutional amendments. Time and space prevent me from discussing all of the proposals but I do want to explain those that will affect the state as a whole or have a particular impact on rural districts.

Amendment No. 1 would allow the legislature to use public money to provide for the guarantee of a grain warehouse self-insurance fund to be financed by the grain industry. This would protect farmers and depositors of grain in public warehouse facilities.

Supporters say this amendment would help protect farmers and grain depositors by ensuring that grain elevator and storage companies can continue to operate in a stable manner.

Opponents say we shouldn't use the state's credit rating to bail out certain industries that have become poor bonding or insurance risks.

Amendment No. 3 would, on the death of a person who is 65 or older, allow the homestead exemption on school taxes to be continued for that person's surviving spouse if the spouse is at least 55 years old.

Supporters say this would protect surviving spouses who are at least 55 years old or older from suffering a huge increase in school property taxes.

Opponents say this would unfairly give special protection to a select group without consideration for single people in the same age bracket.

Amendment No. 4 would allow the legislature to provide programs and make loans and grants for economic development to private enterprises.

Supporters say this would stimulate the state's economy which would increase tax revenues and reduce unemployment.

Opponents say public funds should not be used to support private businesses.

Amendment No. 5 would allow counties to levy a property tax, if approved by local voters, to help pay maintenance and operation of toll roads located wholly or partially within their taxing jurisdiction. Also it would allow joint projects by the Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the Texas Turnpike Authority.

Supporters say highways can be built faster as turnpikes rather than freeways which use federal dollars and that Turnpike Authority bonds will improve if state and local credit guarantee repayment.

Opponents say Texans already pay for a state highway system through motor fuel taxes. Toll roads should be paid for by people who use them and not from additional property taxes.

Amendments No. 6, 7, 8, 9 and 23 would allow the issuance of general obligation bonds to finance the development and production of Texas products and businesses (No. 6), certain local public facilities (No. 7), correctional institutions and MHR facilities (No. 8), Superconducting Super Collider research facility (No. 19) and additional development of water supply, water quality and flood control (No. 23).

Supporters say approval of these bond projects would approve badly needed jobs in the state, stimulate the state's economy and help cover the cost of bonds by increasing state and local tax

I've Been Wrong Before

Still, my boss lady had laid down the rule: "Courtesy at all times. We do not reply in kind to angry people with problems."

Reading the back of the application, last employer "Wierion, W.Va. US Steel. How far did you live from Mingo Junction?" He nearly fell off the chair. Mingo Junction is about as big as Morton Valley, Okra, Nimrod, or similar places.

"I lived right there but how come you know a place nobody ten miles away ever heard of?"

"Well, my mother was from there and I was born a few miles back in the hills from there. Since I have this job it seems that these

Texas people will give an out of state man a chance if they can."

After his embarrassed apology he explained that he and his brother-in-law had worn out roads looking for jobs, the brother-in-law had given up even filling out applications, the gas tank was low and pocket money lower, no longer eligible for more unemployment, and not know what direction to head in.

There was absolutely nothing in their line in Brownwood employment area. In fact, there was practically nothing period. I did not know of two places but neither was in our district and a phone call therefore was forbidden. So I wrote directions and names on cards and wished him luck. Week end found me here on the farm and about 9: the phone rang. "The boss told me I could call on company time and thank you. He arranged transportation and everything so the brother-in-law took the remaining cash and car and headed east." The employer had one opening.

An hour or so later the phone rang again. "Gordon Clark?" the voice said, "I hadn't thought of you in 20 years. I didn't know but what you did. I hired this guy you sent up to Weatherford and just called to thank you for remembering me."

The odds against it happening were astronomical but it did. Now if there had just been a way of getting credit on the job — but no such luck. Anyhow I felt like I had earned part of what tax payers were stuck for me be-

ing here.

So I wasn't always a Texan. In fact, when I first applied for admission to Texas A&M the registrar Mr. R.L. Heaton sent back a formal letter saying that due to large enrollment they were not taking out of state students. (My high school record was from Calif. where I had only spent one year. I became about as upset as that other W.Va. hillbilly and wrote Mr. Heaton three pages which included facts like TX being my mailing address since entry in service, my son being born here, having built a house here and intending to be here until they pat me in the fact with some of this Texas soil. Furthermore I informed him I had for three years past paid my poll taxes like a White man and didn't like the brush-off I was given. Furthermore, I stated that if you had to be born here to be a Texan there were a lot of people they brag about like Houston, Crockett and the like who never qualified, having come from the same neck of the woods I did. I expected nothing but was only venting my anger in letter form (as I still do at times). Imagine my surprise when he replied that by furnishing legal evidence of living here over one year I would be admitted.

John Hart was sheriff and the first man I met in Eastland when I came in my sailor suit looking for the wife I had married in Calif. He had contacted Billy Hardin, her cousin, and Bill took me to the home at Yellow Mound.

So I asked John Hart if he would write an affidavit attesting to my time of residence. He said he non-

ly would do that but was willing to lie a bit by telling them I was an honest and upstanding citizen.

Three years later (I went summers to get the degree early) I was to meet Mr. Heaton whom I had studiously avoided but I needed a transcript to apply for my teaching certificate. He came from his office when the secretary took my name in. As there were two Gordon Clarks at A&M he wanted to know if I was the one from Eastland. "OH, LORD," I thought and said I was.

"I have a letter you wrote," he said. Right then I felt sure that those three pages of giving him what for could have better been toned down.

"Burn that," I said somewhat surprised that he even remembered that violent outburst after three years.

"By no means," he replied, that was a classic. I never got one like that in all my years here and I intend to keep it.

After that I felt more than ever that I really was a Texan, accepted and qualified to brag about it.

The point I hope to make here is not that getting nasty pays but rather that one should not be too ready to take "NO" for the final answer on anything important. I "lucked out" as they say but knowing your rights can serve you well and being sure there is no higher authority to appeal to before you walk away can profit you at times. Of course you will have your work cut out for you if each bureaucrat up the ladder feels obliged to uphold even a wrong verdict by an underling. Just remember, "It's the squeaky hinge that gets the grease."

Maurice Newton, Two Careers To Remember

By Viola Payne Most people have only one career retirement during their lifetime, so it is a unique occasion.

But when Maurice Newton of Baird retires Jan. 1 as Agency Manager of the Callahan/Shackelford Farm Bureau this will be the second retirement for him. He will have memories of two distinct careers in his life.

His first retirement was Sept. 1, 1972, after 24 years in the U.S. Air Force. He had achieved the rank of Senior Master Sergeant.

He left the Air Force earlier than he had originally planned. His father had died, and his Mother was ill and alone on the farm 3 mi. east of Moran.

About a month after his Air Force retirement Newton went to work for the Farm Bureau in Baird. He and wife Margie and children Michael, Debora and Sandra moved into the town.

As Manager of the Farm Bureau, Newton has offered a Multi-line insurance program to farmers and ranchers in this area. His work has shown a continuous 15 yr. gain, climbing from 530 members in 1972 to the present 1448.

Mr. Newton's Farm Bureau office is at 309 Market St. in Baird. Two secretaries, Janice Grant and Judy Franke, help with many details of the Agency. Iky Akers of Clyde is the current Farm Bureau President.

One good thing about Newton's Farm Bureau work was that it brought him back in contact with an area

and people familiar to him. The son of B Newton and Alice (Hayes) Newton, Maurice was born on a farm in the Cottonwood community.

"Yes, my father's name was really 'B' Newton," he says. "You should have heard the fits the Air Force gave me over that name for next of kin!"

"My Dad was a twin, and the other little boy was 'D' Newton. He died when young."

Maurice says that his family moved to the farm near Moran when he was young, so that was always 'home' to him. He attended the Moran schools, and reports that his Sixth Grade teacher was Julia Ballard Worthy, who now lives in Eastland.

He joined the Air Force Sept. 1, 1948, and took basic training in San Antonio. He was placed in communications, and sent to Germany at the time of the Berlin Airlift.

"This airlift revolutionized air transportation," he says. "Coal was the primary thing the people needed, but food and medicine were also carried."

This trip was only the beginning of his adventures, with assignments sending him back and forth to the United States and into many foreign countries as the years went by. While stationed at Carswell Air Force Base at Ft. Worth in 1951 he married Margie Cooley of Leakesville, Miss. The young couple moved on to stations at Sandia Base, New Mexico, Deep Creek, Washington, Bryan, Tex. and Alaska. Each of their three children were born at different locations.

While located at a base in South Carolina in the late 1950's Newton helped in the building of Cape Canaveral - now Kennedy Space Center. He was in and out of the Center on communications work when the space program was in its infancy.

The next foreign assignment was in Okinawa, then he came to Pennsylvania and spent part-time in work back at the Cape.

During the Viet Nam war Newton was sent to the Philippines for two years. The Airbase where he was stationed received a number of wounded from the war zone, and no one could see the condition of these young men without realizing how terrible the fighting was.

About this time Newton became ill with a chronic bronchitis. This was either

induced by the high humidity in the Islands, or caused by an allergy to some type of vegetation there. The Doctors never could figure out which.

It was good to come back to the U.S. on the assignment to Tinker Air Force Base in Oklahoma City. There he worked on training projects with National Guard Units from various parts of the country. From Oklahoma he went to Hawaii for two years, and there decided to retire.

"It was interesting to see all those places around the world," he says. "And I enjoyed most of them. I believe my children gained something from the travel too. But it was always great to come back to the U.S., and I always knew I would finally settle here."

Maurice, his wife Margie and daughter Sandra of the home plan to continue living in Baird after the Farm Bureau retirement. They are members of the Baptist Church here, and have friends and Maurice's

Chamber of Commerce activities.

The married children are nearby too. Daughter Debora (Newton) Robinson, the wife of Robby Robinson, is a Counselor at Cisco Junior College. Robby Robinson is an Instructor in the Science Department at CJC. The Robinsons have a daughter, Jordan.

The son, Michael, is an English teacher at Cooper High School in Abilene. Michael and his wife, Belinda, have a son, Joshua.

After Jan. 1 Maurice Newton plans to spend more time working on the land where he grew up - the stock farm near Moran. He raises good cattle and hay on this place.

In speaking of his Farm Bureau retirement Newton says he has enjoyed the work. "It's been a good fifteen years - I hate to leave. I hope the people give my successor the support and cooperation they've given me."

Peanut Prospects

When it rains in late August and early September and is clear and dry in October expect a good peanut crop. County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon says, that statement is normally true, but not necessarily true this year, because peanuts were planted about one month later than usual.

The last half of May and first half of June is the period when most peanuts are normally planted. However, from 16 to 17 inches of rain fell in May and June delaying most of the planting by at least one month. Spanish peanuts need 110 to 120 days from

planting to maturity. Runner peanuts need 140 to 150 days to mature. This means that the peak harvest will be in November rather than October.

The agent says, that in 1986 runner peanuts were planted on 8,379 acres in Eastland County and Spanish peanuts were planted on 14,396 acres. A.S.C. Service records show that in 1986 22,776 acres or peanuts were harvested and yielded 31.5 million pounds for a per acre yield of 1386 pounds. This was the highest per acre yield since 1981, when the average yield was 1427 pounds.

The crop looks good this year according to Gordon, but it is too early to know how it will compare to last year's crop. A lot will depend on the weather during the next 6 or 7 weeks, he said. The soil is very dry now and some crops need moisture and warm weather to complete maturity. Other peanut fields are infested with nematodes and plant diseases, and rain and warm weather would only increase the damage. All agree that a heavy frost or freeze in early November would be very damaging.

The August USDA crop forecast for peanuts predicts the Southwest crop (Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico) to total 640 million pounds, up 7

percent from 1986. Southern Blight, a disease that kills the peanuts, has been around for many years, but is especially damaging this year. Sclerotinia Blight was first found in Eastland County peanuts this year. It is, also, a fungus that kills the peanut plants, but cannot be controlled with the same fungicides that are used on Southern Blight.

Thirty peanut growers who attended a peanut disease tour last Friday had a first hand examination of Sclerotinia Blight. The disease is characterized in the early stages by small white tufts of cottony-like growth on the stems near the ground line. The fungus spreads rapidly. Later stages of the disease show up as severe plant stem shredding accompanied by the production of many small, black, irregular-shaped sclerotia the size of mustard seed. The plants die rapidly, accompanied by stem shredding.

Reports vary from growers who have harvested early planted peanuts. Some said it was the best dry land peanut crop they have ever made, while others said they were very disappointed in the yields.

There was some indication last week that buyers were going to pay a small bonus on peanuts that meet grade standards. This would help growers realize greater returns, regardless of their yields.

The Increase Of Crime

The experience in other states has clearly been that the introduction of pari-mutuel gambling has significantly increased criminal activity. 10% of all new gamblers will become addicts-a disease as destructive as alcoholism or drug abuse. Compulsive gamblers are responsible for 17% of wife abuse and 13% of child abuse cases; they commit 40% of all white collar crimes. A shocking 86% admit to committing felony crimes while pursuing their addiction.

The FBI Director William Webster wrote in American Legion Magazine (Jan., 1985), "We know of no situation in which legalized gambling was in place where we did not eventually have organized crime."

Then DPS Director Jim Adams wrote Texas legislators (1985), "Legalizing pari-mutuel gambling in this state would provide organized crime with a substantial profit-making opportunity that would be hard to ignore."

The Chief of Police in Shakopee County, Minnesota (home of the nation's second newest horse racing track, (Caterbury Downs) said the crime rate has risen 45% and the burglary rate 100% since that track opened. (Reported in the Fort Worth Star Telegram Mar. 16, 1987.)

The Oklahoma Sheriff whose jurisdiction includes Blue Ribbon Downs (a track converted to pari-mutuel in 1984 after that state approved pari-mutuel gambling) has had his jail population increase from an average of 9 persons per day to 16 persons per day since the track became pari-mutuel. He has also had a significant increase in the number of warrants he now serves on people racing horses or working at the track who left elsewhere with bills outstanding.

Law enforcement officers from across the state are opposing this pari-mutuel gambling referendum.

Texas Coordinating Board To Co-Sponsor Austin Conference

Federal legislation and its impact on community colleges is the focus of a Federal Update Conference that the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board will co-sponsor Nov. 1-3 in Austin. The Austin conference is one of only four of its kind to be held this year in different regions of the country.

The Coordinating Board is co-hosting the conference with the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges (AACJC) and the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT).

The conference begins at 3 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 1 with an open hearing before the ACCT-AACJC Joint Commission on Federal Relations on proposed legislation affecting adult and vocational education. The hearing and two days of panel discussions will focus on such issues as Pell grants and Higher Education Act funding, tax reforms and employee educational assistance, Job Training Partnership Act amendments, immigration regulations, and institutional liability and insurance.

Federal program specialists, congressional staff, community college and business leaders, and ACCT-AACJC federal relations staff will lead the conference panel discussions.

Speakers include Dr. Thomas R. Wolanin, who spearheaded the Congressional staff work on the 1986 Higher Education Act which strongly reaffirms education and college access as na-



